As you are aware, April is Child Abuse Prevention Month. In the last year, I have been privileged to serve on the Board of the Children's Trust Fund of Texas, this organization was formed to help prevent child abuse in Texas. We applied for and received a grant for parenting classes in Red River County. These classes meet for six weeks four times a year in four towns in Red River County. This means that Bogata, Clarksville, Avery and Detroit have 24 weeks a year of free parenting classes, these classes include a free meal plus child care. You may ask is this important for our county?? I think it is very important, if we can teach our children how to be better parents, we will have better children

growing up in our county. Child abuse is a very big problem in Red River County, just look at your local newspaper and see how many are arrested for some sort of problem involving a child, and these reports are about half of the actual acts of violence to our children, because most child abuse cases are not even reported. Sexual abuse to children in our county is the fastest growing crime we have. Imagine the impact this act has on a little child.

You and I can help our children. Report any type of neglect or abuse to a child, be it verbal, physical or sexual. You can report to the County Sheriff's Office at 427-3838 or call the Child Abuse Hot Line at 1-800-252-5400.

Remember, our children are the most precious resource we have in Red Rive County. If something were happening to our water supply, everyone would be concerned. Aren't or children more important?

Butter sides of 1-1/2 quart saucepan. In it combine sugar, water and cream of tartar or corn syrup. Stir over medium heat til sugar dissolves and mixture boils Cook without stirring to soft-ball stage(238 degrees). Immediately pour onto platter. Do not scrape pan. Cool till fondant feels only slightly warm to touch about 30 minutes; do not move. Using spatula or wooden spoon, scrape fondant from edge of platter toward center then work till creamy and stiff. Knead till smooth and free from lumps. Wrap; place in covered container to ripen 24

To tint and flavor fondant: for vanilla fondant, knead in I tablespoon soft butter and I teaspoon vanilla. For pink peppermint fondant, knead in 10 drops of peppermint extract and 4 drops red food coloring. Shape and decorate.

Marzipan

Prepare I recipe Fondant to ripen 24 hours. Next day, warm fondant over hot water and work to smooth cream(about 2 minutes), adding a few drops of water is needed. Work in one 8-ounce can(1 cup) almond paste till smooth. Place in bowl, cover with damp cloth and let ripen several hours. Divide into parts; coloe with red, yellow or green food coloring and shape fruits. Dry fruits overnight on their sides on waxed paper. Next day, add blushes or sugar coating. Leaves-Tint green and form tiny leaves

and berry "hulls' Pears-Tint yellow. Mold pear shape. using 2 teaspoons each. Add cloves for blossom ends and press on leaves. Next day, pat or brush on a pink blush, using red food coloring mixed with water.

Peaches-Tint orange. Mold balls using 1-1/2 teaspoon each. Flatten on both ends. Crease one side with knife Add cloves at one end, leaves at another. Next day, add pink blush, using food

Apples-Tint green or red. Mold balls using 1-1/2 teaspoons each. Add cloves at one end, leaves at another. Next day add blush using red food coloring.

Bananas-Tint yellow. Mold bananas using 2 teaspoons each. Next day, tint ends green and streak with cocoa dis solved in equal amounts of water.

Strawberries-Tint red. Roll into balls, using I teaspoon each. Spape point at one end and flatten the other. Add hull. Let dry overnight. Brush with cornsyrup and roll in red sugar. Dry thouroughly.

Bogata School teachers remembered

The Bogata School System had more than its share of great teachers. One of my favorites was Mrs. Doris Strain. She taught typing, shorthand and Bookkeeping during my years at BHS. Typing and shorthand class were both sheer pleasure for people who loved words. Mrs. Strain had an easy-going personality that made learning easy. She seemed to enjoy the subjects she taught, especially shorthand. I remember when she'd teach us a new character, how fast we would learn it and went to learn another. She made learning so much fun, we hated for the class to end. I would have liked two shorthand classes a day.

I never remember her losing control of her class - or herself. I never remember her even raising her voice one time in class. She never had to.

Even though Mrs. Strain's shorthand and typing classes were fun, bookkeeping was not as enjoyable because we didn't have calculators to add the long columns of figures. Time and time again, someone would ask to borrow something when we were halfway down the column, and then we'd have to stop and start all over again. But that was not Mrs. Strain's fault; no school system had calculators in the fifties. But typing and shorthand more than made up for the agony of bookkeeping without cal-

Bogata had many fine teachers. Back in grade school, I remember Mrs. May Dan Bell, who taught fifth grade. My family had moved to Bogata from Kilgore that year, so she was my first teacher in Bogata. She was just about as perfect as they come. She went back a chapter or two when I told her where my Kilgore class had been and let the Bogata Kids review so I could catch up. I remember we were studying the Mediterranean Sea and the perfume industry in that area.

I remember Mr. Seay who was the

us math, I believe. The day that Nancy Alsobrook fainted in class and fell in the floor he almost had a heart attack. His face turned ghostly white; we thought both of them were going to

If we could somehow all go back and have another year with our favorite teachers at Bogata, I would listen harder and be more serious. After all, we would use what we learned from them at BHS every single day for the rest of our lives.

I remember Miss Pat Felts in English. She read Huckleberry Finn, among others, to us, even though we thought we were too grown up to enjoy being read to like a toddler. But she changed our minds. I hated for the bell to ring. She could translate McBeth and make it jump off the page and come alive. Reciting poetry in Miss Felt's class was almost the death of us. We were terrified - even nauseated with fear having to recite "How Do I love thee" by Elizabeth Barrett Browning. ("I love thee with the breath, smiles and tears of all my life, and if God choose, I shall but love thee better after death.") and Rudyard Kipling's L'onvoi. ("When earth's last picture is painted and the tubes are twisted and dried..no one shall work for money, no one shall work for fame but each for the joy of working...")

The day we walked out of English class for the last time in May of 1953, she started to tell us how she felt, but when she saw our tears, she choked up and broke down too. She turned to the blackboard and with that familiar slanted backward style of her's, she wrote out her good-byes. Then she stood at the door and hugged us as we filed out the door, and we knew we were leaving a part of our hearts and growing up years in that room.

I remember Mervin's math class. He could make even math interesting, even if it did half kill us to

grade school principal and also taught understand the complicated math theories. He was so likeable, and he made us feel that we were worth taking time to listen to - as well as to teach. He treated us like young adults

rather than children. I remember going past the office and seeing Genetty's big smile that always made us feel that no matter what was happening in our lives,

somehow everything was going to

turn out okay. I remember Mrs. Fitzgerald who made the world hum for me. Everything we did in our Homemaking class was exciting and ended way too quickly. I'd have loved an eight hour Homemaking class. I wish I could go back and listen to it all over again.

Mrs. Holder was a great teacher. She taught civics, among other things, and helped us practice our speeches. I loved her and her class. Her pa-

tience was unending.

I remember Mr. Cody teaching history. We all got boiling mad, literally, my heart pounded and by blood raced, studying the Texas Revolu-tion, "Remember Goliad," "Remember the Alamo,," and finally, Santa Anna's captur at the San Jacinto Battlefield.

We had incredible teachers those four years when BHS was our whole world. We didn't even know how fortunate and sheltered we were to have had this amazing set of teachers. We had the mistaken idea that everyone had teachers of this caliber. What we learned - and especially the ones who taught it with their whole hearts - made an impact on me that lingers today, forty-four years later. Our school may have been replaced by a newer, more modern Rivercrest. That's okay, we know our children deserve a nice place to learn. But we don't want to forget what the old one did for us. BHS really was our whole world for four years, and it did a great job in shaping us into the men and women we wanted to become.

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

JOHNTOWN METHOD IST CHURCH-

History of the Johntown Methodist Church

The Johntown Methodist Church was built sometime between 1918 or 1919 or in the early twenties.

The J.A. Watts family moved from Cuthand to below Johntown about 2 miles where he ran and owned a sawmill. Later they moved up closer to Johntown and built a house. Mr. Watts furnished the lumber for the church, traded it for dressed lumber and the church was built. They were devout members. It was built just across the road from where they built their home. It had a bell tower and someone would go on Sunday morning about 9:00 o'clock and ring the bell to remind people to come to Sunday

School and church. Mrs. Willie Lee Watts-wife of J.A. Watts, would sometime go down to W.A. Cotten's Grocery store and invite people that were there to come to church. She was a great worker in the church, was Sunday School Superintendent for many years, until she became disabled. She would get up programs on Christmas, Easter, Children's Day and other holidays. One time she made Angel Wings and the children were angels. The church grew and had many members. Some of them were the Sam Hervey family, Bud Baxter and family (father of Lydia Hawkins) Pete Barnard's family and of course all the Watts family. Calhoun, Patton (Frances Mayes Rozell's grandfather) some of the Coopers and York family. Calhoun Patton lived about 2 miles east of Johntown and he would ride a horse to church every Sunday. He was a faithful member. He would always stay for lunch with the Watts. Their home was always open for the ministers or anyone else. It was a prosperous church for many years. The people of the community visited back and forth with other churches when there was a revival. The Methodist would visit with Baptist and Baptist with Methodist. Many souls were saved and would join the church of their choice. They were Baptized in a pool or lake or Sulphur River.

The Church belonged to the Methodist Conference and they sent out their preachers to Cuthand, Rosalie, Lone Star and Johntown. One Sunday a month in each place.

In about the late fifties the church began to decrease in numbers. Many

moved away on jobs, but the faithful few who were left continued to have services. Tandy Boyd, my father, was Sunday School Superintendent for several years, but it finally discontin-

The Pentecostal people wanted to start services there and the members that were there were happy to have someone carry on the work. The first Sunday there was about 50 attending and it grew until there were 100.

Brother Thompson from Bogata Methodist would fill in once a month during this time and Bess Pope came and sang specials. They carried on the church until the Pentecostal built a church below Johntown on Highway 271 about 1/4 mile and named it Harvest Temple Church which was Undenominational for anyone who wanted to attend. After this the church became a community center where many activities were held until it discontinued. After this the church went back to the Methodist Conference and they sold it to William Taylor Dodd. He had it torn down and built a large brick house in the place where the Methodist Church stood. The people of the community have many memories of the church. Most of the members went to Bogata United Methodist Church.

When World War II ended some of the children went out to the church and rang the bell. Everyone was so glad the war was over.

I always went to the Methodist Church as long as it was a church. A bishop came and preached on Sunday and told someone I would be a worker in the church. I did work in the church as long as I was able. I didn't much believe it at the time he said it, but I never forgot him and what he said. I was always proud to be a Methodist. They used to say the sun never set on the Methodist Church. It was spread across the World. I married Travis Watts, son of J.A. Watts and lived in the Watts Home across from the church and took care of them when they became disabled and passed away. My parents were Tandy and Tennie Boyd who were lifelong residents of Johntown. My children are Shirley Watts Allums of Johntown and Nelson Eddie Watts of Gun Barrel




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
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
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
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
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

It is once again Saint Patrick's Day and I am again reminded of Coach Timothy Dunn and how we got our uniforms on that 1945-46 basketball

In a magnanimous gesture of patriotism in 1942, Superintendent Branson put Bogata High's athletic program in the deep freeze for the duration of the war. I had moved from Talco to Bogata that summer just in time to get in on it at the beginning of my freshman year.

We went wild in August of '45 when Japan surrendered. Amid gin whistles tooting, guns shooting and horns honking, it was finally over. We boys asked Mr. Branson if the war was "over enough" for us to have a basketball team. He thought it over and hired us a coach named Timothy Dunn. We figgered he must have starred at Notre Dame.

We didn't have uniforms, but Mr. Branson let us play in our overalls and Khakis. We weren't allowed on the floor wearing brogans, so we played barefoot or in sock feet. I liked socks. I could slide ten feet with the ball and not be whistled for trav-

Doyle Glover liked to stop quick, though, so he played barefoot. Doyle was so big, he sometimes kept going after his feet squeaked to halt. He went headlong into a wall one night and left a 12 inch hole in the plaster.

Playing without uniforms was okay with us. The thing that mattered most was we were playing. However, all that changed the night we played Clarksville in our gym. Clarksville was coached by Frank Branson, Jr., our superintendent's son.

Frank, Jr. was one of my World War II heroes. I worked in the drugstore after school and in the summers during those war years. Frank was in college and single. He would come home on weekends and hang out at

the drugstore. Some of the best looking girls in town worked behind the fountain with me on those busy war weekends. The Great Depression had ended the day the war started and servicemen were sending money

People came from miles around to Bogata on Saturday nights. The sidewalk was so crowded, they had to walk in the street. About a fourth of them were soldiers from Camp Maxey and airmen from Cox Field. Some-

body ought to write a book. People were elbow to elbow in the drugstore on Saturdays. We would get so busy working the fountain, we didn't have time to look up at the customers. Frank never hesitated to don an apron and lend a hand. We worked in close quarters behind that fountain. The girls liked him and he could charm the horns off a billy goat.

It was sad when Frank came in and told us good-bye. He had joined the Navy and was on his way to the Pacific. We had seen James Wallace Thomas, Gene Garrett, J.C. Caldwell, Junior Alexander and Bob Later walk out those doors.

Frank was wounded and returned in time to become coach at Clarksville for the '45-'46 season. We seniors were thrilled to be playing. Getting to play Frank's Clarksville team in our own gym and on the court he had played on just made it better.

So, Joe Welch, Doyle Glover, Gene Stonger, Dale Craddock and I took the floor that night in our overalls and Khakis. The Clarksville team had nice warm-up suits. During the warm ups, I chased down our ball - we only had one - and retrieved it near Frank. He said, "Quinnon, don't you boys have warm-up suits?" He grinned when I told him that we were wearing them. I think he expected us to peel down to our uniforms at game time.

That was on Friday night. Monday afternoon, Timothy Dunn told us, "Come on boys, let's all go down together to Mr. Branson's office and

tell him that we want some uniforms." Within two weeks we had the purtiest green uniforms I ever saw. No warm ups, though.

The 46'ers were a great bunch of kids. Timothy Dunn was our coach and home room teacher. I don't attend the reunions. I prefer to remember us the way we were and reminisce nostalgically on St. Patrick's Day.


