Think about all the ladies you know who have that much determination. I'll lay bets that you know a number of them.

There were generations of women who paid strict attention to details...the details of hair and face, clothing and appearance. I don't mean that they spent a lot of money on these things, or that they were vain. I mean that standards were set and standards were upheld.

One had to be clean, neatly pressed and dressed and hair fixed. It was simply a matter of pride.

Me, I'm a flat out slob and coward. If I fell and broke my leg you'd find me mud smeared and whimpering in the emergency room. I frankly just don't have what it takes to get cleaned up first!

Worry about my hair? I don't do that on good days, much less on days when I'm ill.

I think it stems back to my 'generation"....face it, there were no standards back in the late sixties and early seventies!

Weddings were held outdoors with flowers in people's hair and bare feet. Ragged jeans, unstyled hair was the norm. I won't tell any of you about some of the outfits I had!

So, what happens, as my generation ages? We don't change. We are basically a bunch of pretty slovenly folks!

"Foundation garments" for us?...forget it. Heels and hose at all times.? No way!

But I do admire those women who preceded us for those high standards of personal appearance. Unfortunately, my admiration doesn't mean I try to emulate it.

They are made of sterner stuff, my friends, much sterner



As a former resident of Bogata I was actively involved in many phases of the community. There were countless Saturdays that my deceased husband, Jerrel Vickers, and myself cooked fish, stew and chili with the Lions Club. We traveled the communities giving to the needy with eyeglasses and food. We spent endless hours at the rodeo with the concession stand and at the Frontier's Day Racing Turtles. Jerrel and I took great pride in Bogata and most especially the Park that he and I helped build. Jerrel was the Lions Club president during key phases of the park construction. He spent hundreds of hours with other co-ordinating the building of Thomas Park. The softball field carries his name. One of Jerrel's last wishes was to see the park completed.

Recently, it has become obvious that there has been a certain amount of vandalism and neglect at our cherished park. In all societies there will be vandals; however, these vandals must be brought to justice. Members of the community have tried to find out who these vandals are, but they have been met with "It's none of your business-we'll handle it.

When creating the park, it was my understanding, and Jerrel's also, that a park board was established to see after its perpetual care. The board consisted of community members, who would put the park before their personal interests and see after it as if it were their own. It is my understanding that the city council Never passed a resolution creating such a park board. The initial park board, that never really existed, made all the decisions and developed the park into what you see today. Now the city holds the purse strings of monies left. over from initial construction, and makes all decisions relating to the park. I toured the park recently and was appalled to find the deteriorating condition of the pavilion roof and playground equipment. These maintenance items should have been dispatched months ago. Someone should answer for the inept handling of these important maintenance items.

It is my feeling that a park board should be established by the city council to see after its much needed upkeep. This board should be able to act independently of anyone, spending park monies set aside by the Lions Club, the initial park grant and donations. The board would also be proactive in seeking out benefactors for future upkeep and improvements.

After Jerrel's death I relocated in Corpus and have since retired in Paris to be close to friends and medical facilities in my mature years. I still maintain my Lions membership in Bogata and enjoy coming there often. I encourage you and your readers to visit our park and to ask your council men and women: "Who is ultimately accountable for its current condition?"

In a 2-day trial this past Thursday and Friday, Eapthern Smith of Bagwell was tried for the aggravated assault of a child. County Attorney Jack Herington reported that after about an hour of deliberation, the jury returned a verdict of guilty. During the second phase of the trial, the 12 member jury returned a verdict on punishment of 99 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. Sentencing is set for Wednesday, April 9 before District Judge Jim D. Lovett.

Herrington hopes this verdict will send a message to others that this kind of conduct will not be tolerated in Red River County. "We have a huge increase in the number of sexual assault of children cases this past year. We are giving these cases priority settings on our docket.'

Above and below reminds me of a fact I learned after reading a scientific study-results of years of documentation there is proof that pound for pound there is more life below the ground than above. Surprisingly should all life below earth's surface be destroyed Life as we know it could not survive!

This should give each of us a great desire to work hard to cultivate and propagate the food supply and maintain the health of our plant, animal, fish, bird

and friendly insect life.

A few things that can be done:
Cattle-should have ample feed,
water and shelter available. Disease control should include control & prevention of external and internal insect infestation.

Maintain a program to insure good calving program.

Immunize adult animals and

young for bacterial & viral dis-

If a herd disease problem exists-possible lab tests would be indicated.

Always keep in mind overall herd improvement. Small Animals-dogs, puppies should be immunized with

(puppy shot) which contains distemper, hepatitis, lepto. parvo & bordetella.

A worming program is important while young and continued at regular intervals in older animals. Most of all annual Rabies Vaccination should be done.

Heart worms are a problem, but can be well controlled by proper medication given monthly.

Tick, Fleas, mosquitoes and lice can & should be controlled. There are several good methods. These insects are necessary to control as they are common vectors and transmitters of certain diseases. This is true in most

animals & even people.

Let's make this season a time that our Livestock & Companion animals will be fed and healthy. So that we may say with pride that we enjoyed with love & pride our creatures both great & small, bright & beautiful, wise and wonderful and most important; God made them all.



I went to the front of the class, remembering Miss Cameron had told me I sang like a bird. I opened my mouth and sang to the first grade tiful smile.



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
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**Bogata School memories** 

By Lawrence M. Vaughan I started to school in Bogata at the

beginning of the third grade after having gone to Johntown the first two years. My teacher was Miss Vera Lamb and she was an excellent teacher. I have a picture of the third grade class of that year, 1934-35. I spent the entire summer prior to this dreading the change to a new school. Fortunately, I never had to make another change through high school. The third grade was in the old red brick building on the ground floor on the northwest corner of the building.

My fourth grade teacher was Miss Mary Harden and I also liked her. I remember her being a strict disciplinarian, and in those days there were no restrictions on swinging the paddle. The fourth grade room was also on the ground floor on the northeast corner of the building.

The fifth grade was upstairs on the northeast corner. My teacher was Miss Gladys O'Brian who later married Rex Craddock. She also transferred to high school later during the war and taught me again in freshman English- Another excellent teacher. While in the fifth grade, the New London School explosion occurred. Bob Later was in my class and his father was working in the oil field in the New London area. Each night Bob's father would call home and tell all the horrible events that were involved with this terrible tragedy. The next day, Miss O'Brian would allow Bob to stand before the class and relate them to us

During that year, 1936-37, Bogata built the water tower. We could see

the progress from our schoolroom and hear the riveting going on. I think that the gymnasium was also built about that time.

The hot lunch program began around that time. If you had carried your lunch every day until then you would realize how much such a program meant. The cost was five cents per day per student. In the beginning, each student had to bring, from home, one plate, (not cracker), a glass, a knife, fork and spoon, none of which could have wooden handles. I thought

the food was excellent. We could have all the grapefruit juice that we could drink. At first, I didn't like it but soon developed a taste for it.

Indoor plumbing soon followed and we thought we were really uptown. Before this, outdoor toilets were

The following year, the sixth grade was the largest ever. Miss Merle Nance was the teacher at the beginning, but soon after school started, Mr. Roy Leftwich was hired and the class divided. I drew Mr. Leftwich and enjoyed him very much. The two sixth grades were in classrooms that had been a part of the old auditorium. When the new gym was built we began using it for all assemblies. Miss Nance's sixth grade was upstairs on the northwest corner and Mr. Leftwich's sixth grade was upstairs on the southwest corner.

In the seventh grade my teacher was Mr. Eugene Garrett. He made math easy for me. He also had us memorize the Preamble to the Constitution. All who could not recite it by the prescribed time had to remain

after school until they could.

My high school years, 1939-43 seemed to pass all too quickly. World War II began in 1941 and had an immediate effect. Teachers became scarce, many athletic programs discontinued due to gasoline shortage, and many young men went into military service. High School teachers that I was exposed to were Mr. Floyd McCrury, Mr. Earl Witcher, Mr. J. A. Bradley, Mr. F.L. Branson, Mr. W.S. Cody, Miss Roberta Yant, Miss Vivian Davis, Miss Ethylene Williams, Miss Margaret Miller and again, Miss Gladys O'Brian.

After graduation in 1943, I served in the Navy being discharged in 1946. I then took advantage of the GI Bill and got a degree from Texas A&M. In all the other schools and training programs that I attended I found that I had a firm foundation. This I attribute to the Bogata School system. They did an excellent job with what they had, and I appreciate this

very much. I have only good memo-

ries of the Bogata School System.



### Depression

Feeling "depressed" may be a fleeting mood of a few moments to several days--what is usually referred to as "feeling blue" or "being down."
This is not diagnosed as depression, medically speaking, and, in most cases, can be self-treated. Each of us knows what diversions will lift our spirits, and we usually seek that sort of distraction to dispel the temporary depressed feeling. In addition, it is natural for people who have had a recent loss, for instance, to feel grief, sadness and other symptoms of "depression" for even a longer period of time. This kind of grief reaction is also not considered a medical problem unless it persists.

Depression becomes a medical problem when it immobilizes a person, leaving him or her unable to carry on normal activities or to derive pleasure from any source.
