Proceeds will go for the Sandy Lake competition, entry fees and meals for the trip.

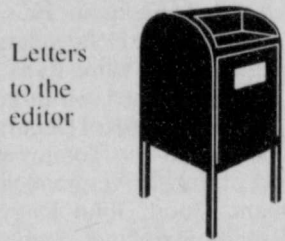

Dear Editor:

I read, with considerable interest, the article you published last week concerning the moving of our Elementary and Junior High campuses to a site next to the Rivercrest facility. Realizing that the existing structures need replacement, I would assume that it is a viable option to consider moving everything to Rivercrest. There are those in our communities of Talco and Bogata who have strong sentimental ties to these structures and rightfully so. But time has moved on and we must change and adapt. When we talk of opposition to the "Rivercrest Move," it is my feeling that it is not the abandonment or razing of the old buildings rather the defection of the Elementary and Middle Schools from our town that is sure to cause controversy. In my limited travels, I have seen what used to be thriving communities turned into ghost towns. When asking what could have happened, a characteristic I invariably find is that the school consolidated leaving parents with no real reason to move into the community. You will hear the proponents talk of all the miles that band and athletic students are bussed currently. How many miles will EVERYBODY be bussed when the "Rivercrest Move" is passed and in place? How easy will it be for "granny" to pick up the children or for them to walk home after basketball, band or football practice. A bond election will be the method chosen to finance the new facilities. Our school district will sell bonds for immediate capital to build the new structures, then over the course of years the district will buy them back. Do not let anyone tell you that bond obligations will not affect your taxes. Where is the money coming from that will redeem these bonds on the redemption dates?? Yes, from our tax dollars and state allocated funds. The existing facilities have been ignored, overlooked and neglected for years. Ask yourself why this has been allowed to happen. Drive by either campus, go into the bathrooms, look at the floors and windows and ask why these deplorable conditions exist. Wow, it sure makes the "Rivercrest Move" look more appetizing. If our board members

could assure me that neither town would decline as a direct result of our Elementary and Middle Schools not being in the city limits. I would be the first to say, Build the "Rivercrest Complex." Who knows, Bogata and Talco could actually be the first towns to grow after the school left their immediate area. As an alternative, let us consider the new buildings in our respective communities. Raze existing structures where necessary and rebuild. I have been told that the State would reimburse 76% of any new building expenditures, providing our school tax rate was at a State mandated minimum. Will the State mandate where the new structures are to be built??

I look to other schools; Prairiland, North Lamar and Clarksville. Each has built new campuses, or reconstructed older ones after initial consolidation. They could have combined their campuses but chose to leave the grade schools in the immediate environment where the students live. Why?? I wouldn't dare to call the men and women who made these choices anti-progressive.

No doubt, it is time to build. Feeling that bonds are the proper route of financing any future construction, I will not begrudge any reasonable amount of higher taxes levied as a result of newly constructed facilities. You will hear many reasons to justify the "Rivercrest Move". Investigate these issues for yourself. As citizens of Talco and Bogata we must ask ourselves if we really want our Elementary and Middle Schools to move from our towns. Question "Will a family wishing to enroll their elementary children in our school system have any incentive to move into the town or will they simply move into the fringe areas where there are no city taxes and commute; at best, it is hard to say. New houses out of town equals fewer new houses in town, equals less city tax base. I think the question lies deeper than what a gorgeous new complex would look like at Rivercrest. It would speak volumes about our communities if each had a gorgeous new complex of their own in Talco and Bogata.

To the Editor:

I would like to address this proposal of the new school. I have been a resident of this community since 1974 and was a student of Talco-Bogata CISD. I presently have four children of my own in the same elementary and junior high that I attended.

From time to time, we are asked to attend a school function at the Bogata schools and when you walk in the door you naturally look around at the rooms and halls where you attended as a student only you don't see any changes or improvements at all. Well, maybe I should not say at all, we have put in some portable buildings that are decent looking. As a contractor, you look at the old building and begin to wonder where would you start to try to improve this structure. There is really not a starting place except maybe from ground up, but just think what it would cost to do this sort of project. And if this is what we did, have we really spent taxpayers' money wisely. But wait - Bogata is not the only concern here, Talco has major problems as well. Talco has a two story building that has neither a fire escape nor do they have any handicap accessibility. Not to say that Talco School cannot correct this problem, but this is not a minor problem. We have major problems at both of our schools that will cost the taxpayers an enormous amount of money.

I got a phone call last week and was asked to attend a meeting at Rivercrest to discuss some options that the school board has come up with and get suggestions from some outside concerned citizens on this matter. The school board proposed to move Kindergarten through Eighth grade to the Rivercrest campus, keeping elementary grades separated from high school. With this, the first thought that came to mind was, "what is this going to cost us?" Then they told us how we could achieve this with the availability of government

Church has new building site

The Bogata Missionary Baptist Mission has acquired two and one half acres of land just north of the Bogata city limits for the location of their new building. Eddie and Virginia Spencer donated this property to the Mission. The members are extremely grateful to this couple for their generosity.

A building plan has been selected and the architect is now working on construction plans and site plans. A request has been made to the Texas Mission Builders of the Missionary Baptist Association of Texas for their assistance in construction. It is hoped that plans can be finalized and work

funding. AS it turns out, the taxpayers of this community would only be responsible for a very small portion of the funds for this project. This is very attractive to me. I will try to explain to you as it was explained to me how we are to obtain the remainder of the funds that it will take. It is called Tier II money. The way you qualify for Tier II money is by increasing your tax base enough that the state recognizes that you are serious about the growth of your school system. The government will provide a substantial amount of the funds and the taxpayers will provide the balance for the new school. I will admit, I do not like the idea of having my taxes raised any more than anyone else.. When you see what your tax dollars are doing for your community it makes you feel better, or it would me anyway. I have heard many say that moving the school out of the city would kill the city. To this I answer, are you telling me Rivercrest is not a part of our city? We are not moving the schools to another city, we are just moving to the Rivercrest campus, which is a part of Bogata and Talco. I graduated from Rivercrest High School in 1981 and was fortunate enough to have a job the day I got out of school, working in Talco. Of course, it had to do with the oil industry. That was where the good money was, but three years later it shut down. I started looking for another job with a future, there was nothing around here so I had to search elsewhere. I found a job to make a living for my family, but I have to spend a lot of time away from them. I would like to see my children and grandchildren have a future here. It can happen with the right steps taken to achieve this goal. A new school could be the beginning of growth for our community. Please, community do not be afraid of change, change can be good for all of us..

All of this week, as the weather gets warmer, everyone is getting out of doors and doing yard work, preparing to go to the lake, or just being lazy and doing nothing! Lots of folks go to the lake or find their favorite fishin' hole and do one of Texas' favorite sport, fishing!

Remembering back, (a few years-ha!ha!) some of my fondest memories were spent on the creek bank, fishing. I never was too serious about it as long as I had my book to read and a nice smooth place to watch the clouds roll by. . . an occasional baloney and cheese sandwich never hurt either.

So, where am I leading, you ask? Okay, so there are several fine restaurants around this area that cater to the fish lovers, but nothing beats the fresh-caught, meal-breaded, fried-in-hot-oil, golden-brown, calorie-filled, fat-by-the-bite, catfish. There are many ways that folks from Texas fry their fish and various batters that are used, but alas, we must bow to Mississippi as they are the number one ranked state for catfish production. It ranks first in total farm-raised catfish production, so maybe Texas is number one otherwise! Anyway, Mississippi also contributes 75% of the nation's supply. The "Catfish Capital" of the state is located in the northwest corner of the state and is Humphreys County. Next to it is Sunflower County, with small towns like Isola, Indianola and most notably is Belzoni, which also is known for their catfish production.

The fertile flatlands of Mississippi are prime for catfish farming. For an

economy long dominated by cotton, soybeans, and oil and gas, who would have thought that catfish farming would become so popular.

Texans still know that the best method for deep-frying catfish is a cast iron skillet with fresh, clean shortening, heated to bubbling hot. Now, that is another matter. Testing the temperature of the grease. Tried and true methods abound, but the best I have found is the "match" test. When you think that the grease is hot enough, drop a regular kitchen match in to it. If it lights up, it is ready for the fish. I can taste it now!

So here a few recipes for our "catfish connoisseur" readers. Hope you enjoy them and take a kid fishing. You will love it! See you in the kitchen!

Creole Catfish Cakes-This recipe takes catfish fillets and broils them and flakes them to mix with breadcrumbs and other ingredients to form patties that are fried.

Classic Fried Catfish-Catfish fillets, sliced thin and dredged in cornmeal mixture and fried to a golden-brown! Fantastic!

Blackened Catfish-Adds a little Cajun dash to this recipe.

Green Onion-Tomato Hushpuppies-What is fried catfish without hushpuppies. . . just can't have it without them!

Mississippi Hushpuppies-I'm sure they are not as good as the "good ole" Texas ones, but they will do!

Green Tomato Relish-Can't eat catfish with out this either. Brew up a batch to can and save for the winter time. Great!

Catfish Recipes

Creole Catfish Cakes
2 pounds catfish fillets
1/3 cup butter or margarine
3/4 cup all-purpose flour
2 cups milk
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
2 cups soft bread crumbs
1-1/2 cup diced red bell pepper
1/2 cup minced green onion
1/2 teaspoon hot sauce
1-2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1-2 tablespoons vegetable oil

Place fish on a lightly greased rack in broiler pan. Broil 5 inches from heat (with electric door slightly open) 10-15 minutes or until fish flakes easily with a fork. Flake into a large bowl and set aside. Melt 1/3 cup margarine in a heavy saucepan over low heat; add flour, stirring until smooth. Cook, whisking constantly, 1 minute; gradually adding milk and cook over medium heat, whisking constantly, 8 minutes or until mixture is thickened and bubbly. Stir in salt, pepper and mustard. Pour over fish. Stir in 1/2 cup breadcrumbs and next three ingredients; cover and chill at least 1 hour. Shape mixture by 1/4 cupfuls into patties; coat patties evenly with remaining 1-1/2 bread crumbs. Melt 1 tablespoon butter and 1 tablespoon oil in large non-stick skillet; fry patties in batches three minutes on each side or until golden brown. Add butter and oil as needed. Serve with tartar sauce.

Classic Fried Catfish
3/4 cup cornmeal
1/4 cup all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon ground red pepper
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
4 catfish fillets
1/4 teaspoon salt
vegetable oil

Combine first five ingredients in a large shallow dish. Sprinkle fish with salt and dredge in flour mixture; coating evenly. Pour oil to a depth of 3 inches into Dutch oven; heat to 350. Fry fish for 5-7 minutes or until golden brown. Drain.

Blackened Catfish
2 tablespoons paprika
2-1/2 teaspoons salt
2 teaspoons lemon pepper
1-1/2 teaspoons garlic powder
1-1/2 teaspoons dried basil-crushed
1-1/2 teaspoons ground red pepper
1 teaspoon onion powder
1 teaspoon dried thyme

4 catfish fillets
1 cup unsalted butter-melted
Combine first 8 ingredients in a large shallow dish. Dip fish in butter; dredge in paprika mixture. Place on wax paper. Heat in a large cast-iron or heavy aluminum skillet over medium-high heat 10 minutes. Cook fish, two at a time, 2-3 minutes on each side or until fish is blackened or flakes easily with a fork. Serve with lemon wedges.

Green Onion-Tomato Hushpuppies
1 cup yellow cornmeal
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 large egg-beaten
1/4 cup milk
1 tomato-chopped
3/4 cup diced green onions
vegetable oil

Combine first seven ingredients in a large bowl; make a well in the center of mixture. Combine egg and milk; add cornmeal mixture. Stir until moistened. Add tomato and green onion. Pour oil in Dutch oven to three inches. Heat to 375 degrees and drop batter by rounded teaspoonfuls into oil and fry until golden brown.

Mississippi Hushpuppies
1 cup self-rising cornmeal mix
1/2 cup self-rising flour
1 tablespoon sugar
1 large egg-beaten
1/2 cup milk or beer
1/2 cup diced onion
1/2 cup chopped green bell pepper
1 jalapeno pepper-chopped/seeded
vegetable oil

Combine first three ingredients in large bowl; make a well in center of mixture. Combine egg and next four ingredients; stirring well. Add dry ingredients and stir until moistened. Pour oil three inches deep and heat to 375 degrees. Drop by spoonfuls into hot oil and fry until golden brown. Drain.

Green Tomato Relish
1 gallon green tomatoes
1/2 gallon onions
1/2 gallon bell peppers
1 cup hot peppers
1 quart vinegar
5 cups sugar
red pepper for color

Cut vegetables into large chunks and add vinegar and sugar. Cook for 25 minutes. Pour into hot jars and seal.

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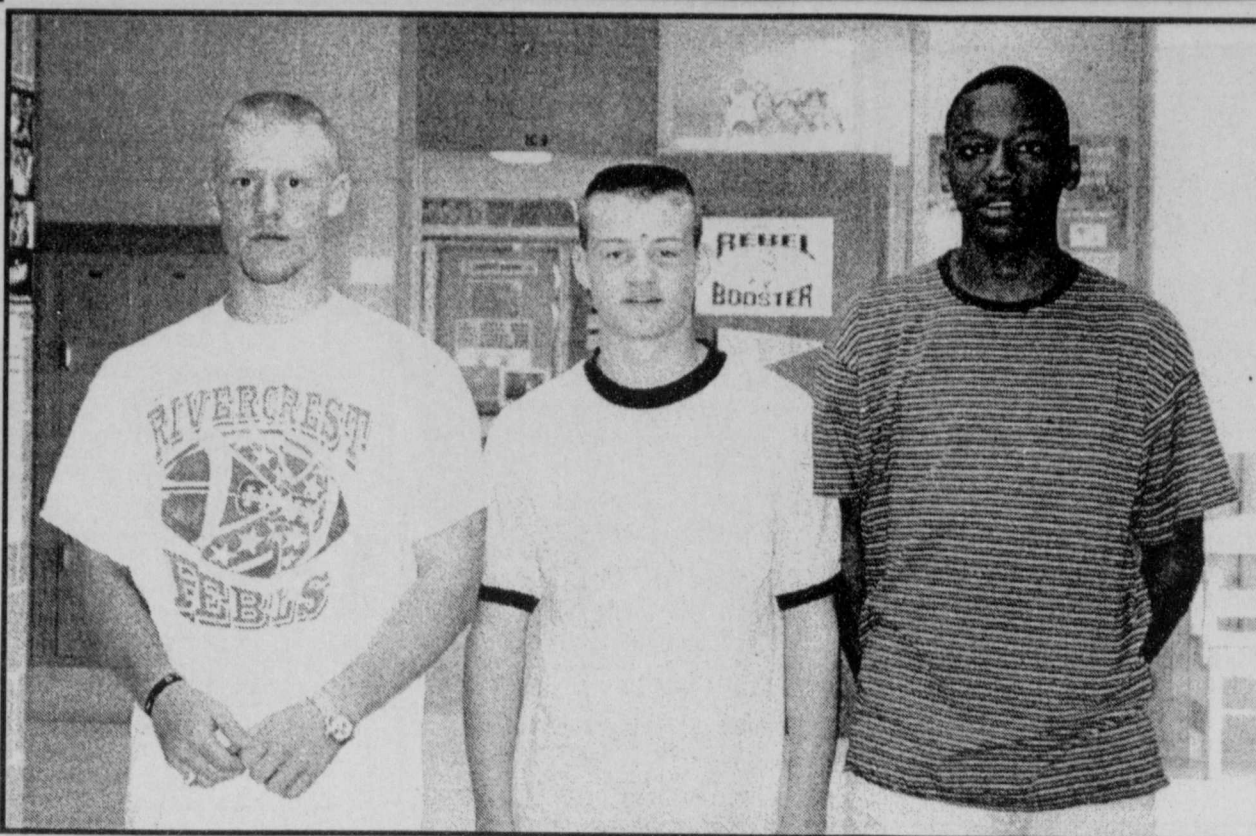

Talco-Bogata I.S.D. to discuss tax increase

The Talco-Bogata I.S.D. Board will meet on Thursday night, April 2 (tonight) for the purpose of discussing the amount of tax increase necessary to help fund a new school facility.

The facility under consideration will be built at the Rivercrest location and will provide classrooms for students first through twelfth grades.

According to Superintendent Gary VanDeaver, if the facility is built, state funding will be increased and could be used to help fund the construction of such a facility. It is possible that the funding ratio could be split 25% locally and 75% from state funding.

A committee composed of citizens from Talco and Bogata communities has been reviewing the facilities at Bogata, Talco, Rivercrest and neighboring school campuses. The committee will report to the board the results of their findings at a later date.

The unofficial price tag of such a facility is approximately \$7.5 million.

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Tax Relief for Farmers

New law will provide relief to some farmers when they fill out their tax returns this year.

The Taxpayer Relief Act extends to farmers affected by floods and other weather-related conditions the benefits of two existing tax law provisions that applied only in cases of drought.

One provision allows cash method farmers to defer income from livestock sales to the next taxable year, to the extent that the sales would not have occurred but for the weather-related conditions that caused the area to be designated as eligible for federal assistance. The other treats certain livestock sales due to weather-related conditions as involuntary conversions. Both provisions are effective in 1997.

The Act also allows cash-basis farmers to figure their alternative minimum tax using the installment method of accounting for sales involving the receipt of some proceeds in the following year, retroactive to 1987.

Medical Minimalism—Good For Patients?

(NAPS)—Many patients feel that their HMO offers only minimal medical care. If people are satisfied with the care they receive inside their managed care network, they won't pay extra to choose to see doctors and specialists outside the HMO system. At the same time, providing a point of service option at the time of enrollment does not affect the health care plan's ability to be aggressive in their cost containment activities.



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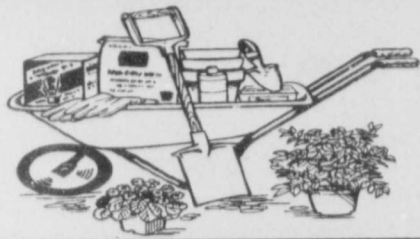
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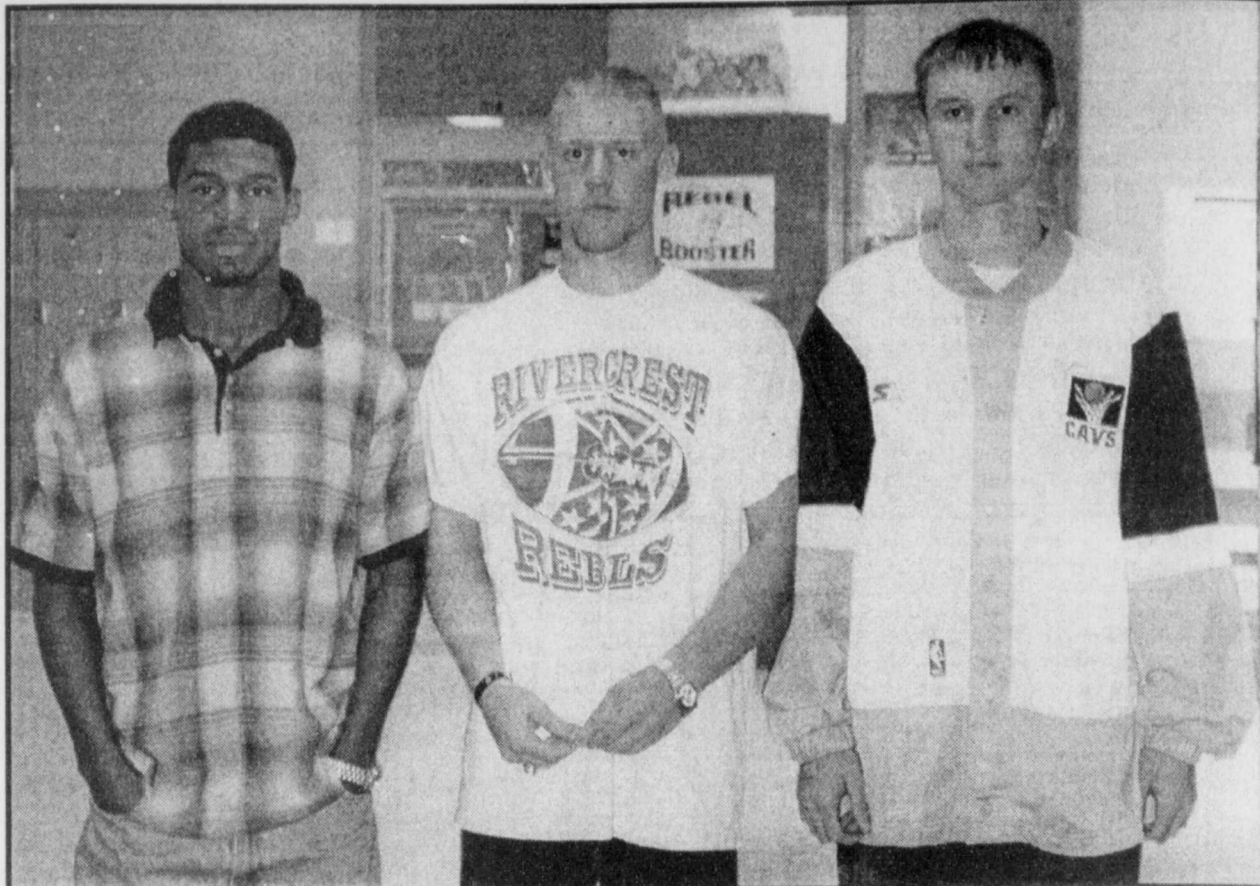

County Attorney Jack Herrington reported that the execution date for Reginald Reeves has been set by District Judge John F. Miller, Jr. for Tuesday, May 5, 1998 after the hour of 6:00 p.m.
 Reeves was convicted of the Capital Murder of Jennie Weeks in September, 1993. Miss Weeks was a 14-year old girl who had been raped and strangled to death by Reeves.
 The case was tried in Bowie County on a change of venue. All State of Texas appeals have been exhausted. The execution will take place on May 5 unless some action is taken in the federal court system. Herrington stated that justice will be served upon the execution of Reeves. A Co-defendant in the case, Ralph Brown, was sentenced to 35 years in prison for his part in the murder. The execution will be by lethal injection and will take place in Huntsville, Texas.

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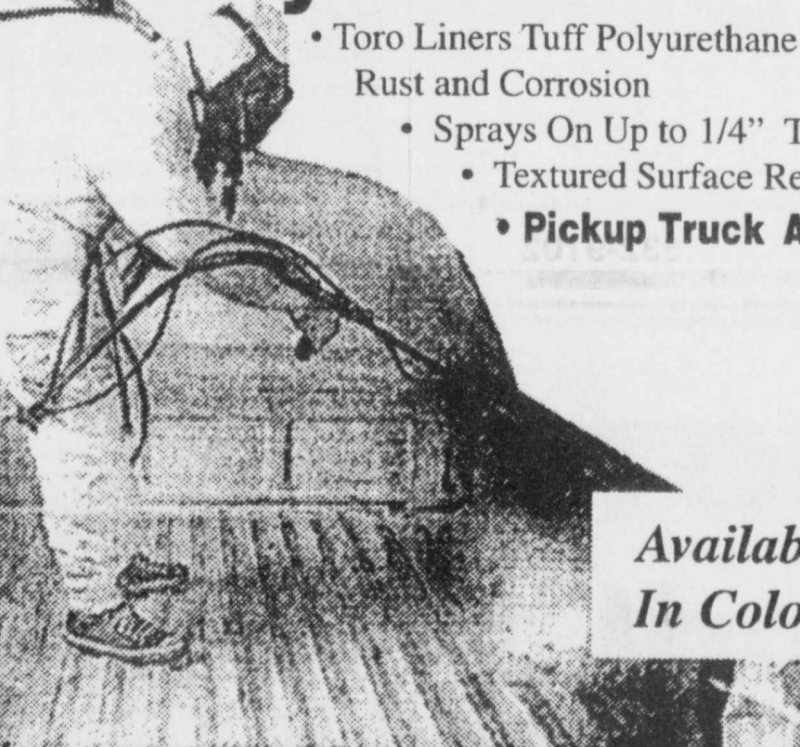

Cafeteria rules explained
 The Talco-Bogata cafeteria staff would like to explain the way the government lunch program works, due to children and parents misunderstanding the guidelines set by the government.
 Each day the government requires that one of three combinations be put on the tray of each child to meet the requirements for breakfast. Four components must be offered and claimed in order for the school to receive reimbursement. This means that these items must be put on the children's tray but it does not mean that the child must eat the items. Several students have asked the cafeteria staff not to put certain foods on their trays. But by law and in order for the school to receive reimbursement this must be done.
 The cafeteria staff also must put three items from each combination of a balanced diet at lunch in order for the government reimbursement. In grades Pre-K through 12 students must have been served per week or daily: 2 ozs. meat, poultry or fish, 2 ozs. cheese, 1 egg, 1/2 cup beans or peas, 4 Tablespoons peanut butter or other nut or seed butters, 3/4 cup of vegetable or fruits, 8 servings of bread or bread alternate per week, minimum of 1 serving per day of 1/2 pint milk per day.
 Again the staff reminds everyone that students are not required to eat these foods but they must served for government reimbursement.
