I believe that the majority of the high school students are in favor of the bond election. They have solid reasons why they are in favor of this. They have taken the time to think things out and discuss it whenever they have had a chance. They have



(Four dollars) per 1,000 gallons of water used in excess of the first 1,500 gallons




