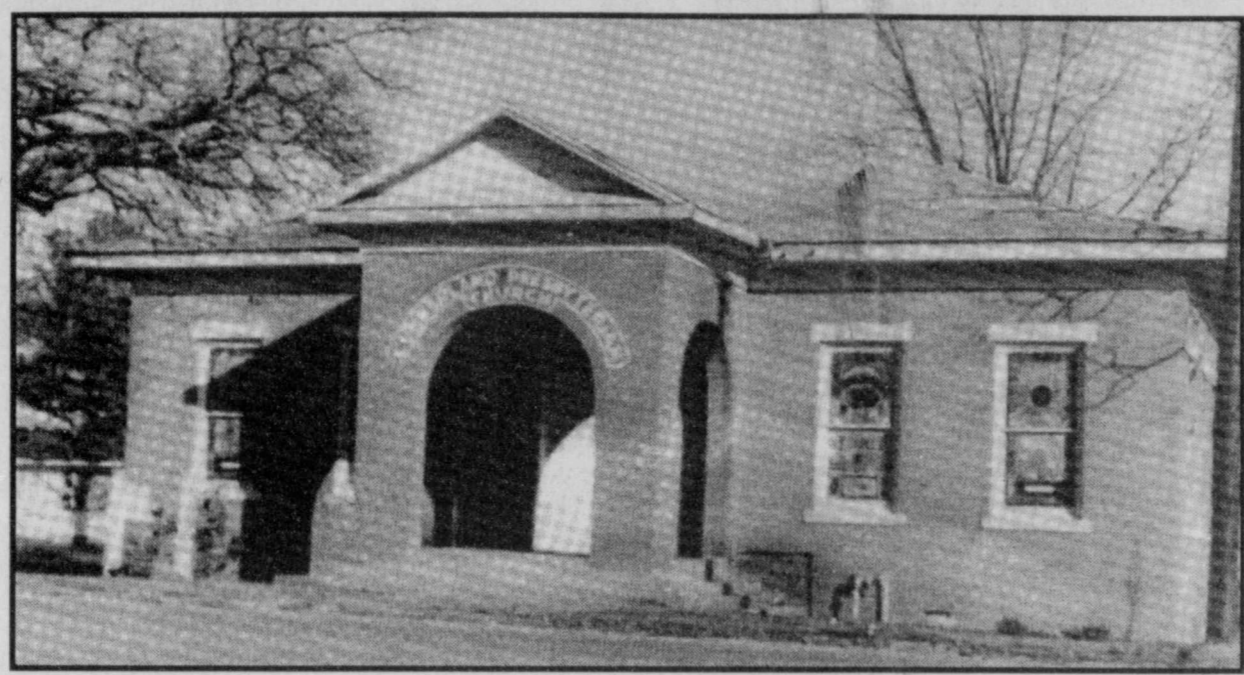

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church was organized in Bogata in September, 1877 by Reverend Charles Manton. There were 13 charter members. They first worshipped in the little building which Mr. Humphrey built in the park area for several years. W.J. Wilkinson was elected presiding elder. Reverend Manton served the church as pastor for three years. He was instrumental in the building of a manse for the preachers to live in. Reverend Rice Hendricks became the next pastor. Under his leadership plans were formulated to build a new church. A site was selected on North Main Street and a frame structure was erected. F.L. Rodgers succeeded Brother Hendricks and in 1890 the church was completed. Eventually this church was used by all denominations for many years. Pastors who served the Cumberland congregation from time to time were Reverend P.M. Jeffery, Brother Dysart, and Brother Day in the early days. In 1906 on account of the union movement in the Presbyterian Church the church property was taken over by the U.S. A. Presbyterians. In 1917 the congregation built a new brick church across the street on North Main. The building committee consisted of H.L. Stubblefield, D.L. Sorrels and L.L. Howison. Preachers who served this church were J.L. Waddle, Erby, Andress and Brother Cheatham, among others. This church was abandoned in 1978 after the membership was reduced to only a few. The church was very lively for many years. D.L. Sorrels was the Sunday School Superintendent for many years. Members were some of the oldest citizens, early day settlers. (This was taken from the History written by the late Iva Lassiter Hooker.)



In a 9:00 a.m. ceremony September 11, 1998 on the old parade grounds at Ft. Riley Kansas Donald W. Nolen of Smithville was inducted as "A Distinguished Member of the 34th Armor Regiment". The award was authorized by the Secretary of the Army and was presented by Major General Freddy E McFarren. Nolen was installed with one Desert Storm veteran and one other Viet Nam veteran. Nolen served with the unit in 1970 and was with them when they spearheaded the invasion into Cambodia, for which the unit received a valorous unit citation. There were five other regiments involved in the ceremony, all of which installed new members. Also present were family, guests, current officers and cadre, the commanders horse mounted colors, past inductees, a static display of armored vehicles and The First Cavalry Band from Ft. Hood Texas. His wife, Janis, accompanied Nolen. "I was very honored to receive this distinction. The officers, men and women at Ft. Riley treated Janis and me great, it was a wonderful experience." Nolen and his wife have two children and four grandchildren: he is the son of Don and Billie Nolen of Bogata. In the photograph Nolen is wearing the white hat.

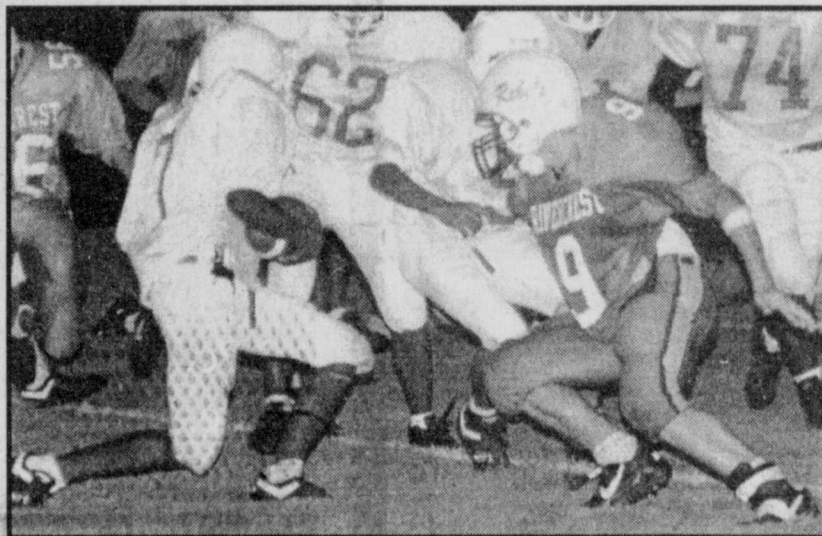

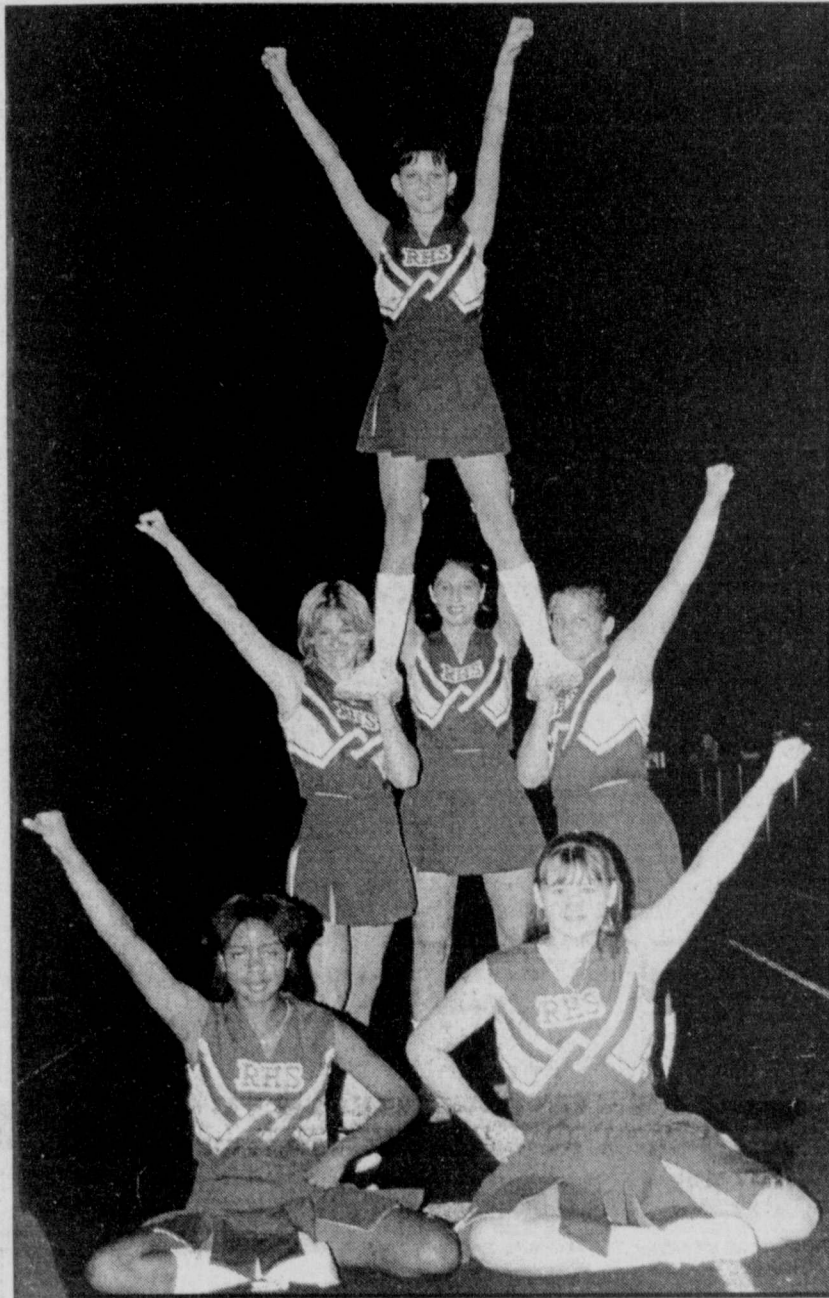

1869. They had ten children: Maggie Flora, William Jacob, Alta Lila, Jiles Mitchell, Addie May, John Burl, Mary Frances, Amos Earl, Charles Gilbert and Floyd Lunsford.

Worth Baker, the only grandchild present for the dedication, tells the story of how close William came to getting killed in the war. He had long hair, a bullet came by and took part of it off. From then on, he had short hair.

A vintage fashion show, gun slingers from the wild west as well as Wagonmasters horse and surrey tours will take everyone "A Step Back In

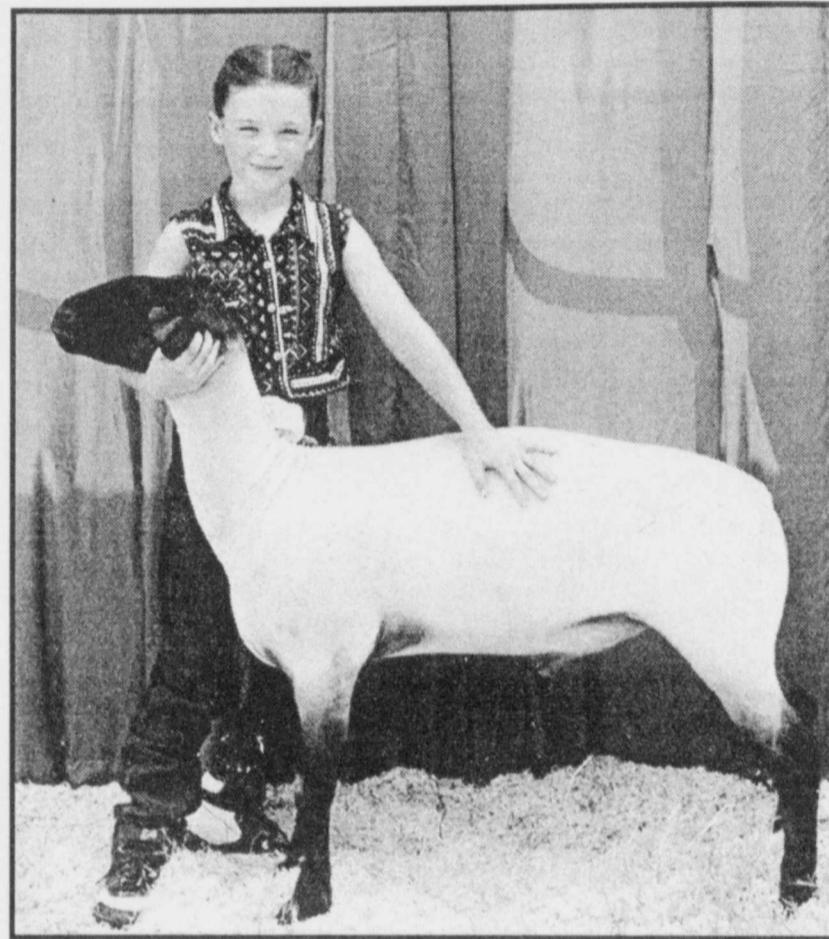
Time".

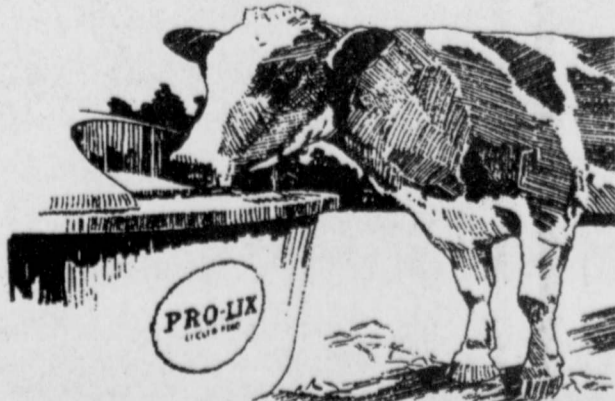

Alzheimer's caregivers experience challenges & rewards

For persons caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's disease, the phrase to remember is "pace yourself". "People need to realize that Alzheimer's disease affects the entire family," said Dr. Naomi Nelson, a physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine's Alzheimer's Disease Research center in Houston. "No one person can do it all."
 The number of people touched by the disease is staggering. Four million Americans have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's, and another 19 million Americans provide some level of care for a loved one with the disease.
 Caring for someone with Alzheimer's can take its toll on a family, so good communication between family members is critical. "Families may need to seek professional help to sort out communication difficulties. Long-standing problems can become more troublesome as the family copes with the disease," she said.
 Primary caregivers should make lists of things that need to be done, ask for help and delegate tasks to others. "Many people don't ask for help and than have feelings of resentment and frustration toward others," Nelson said. "Don't expect others to know what kind of help you need. You need to be specific."
 Retaining a sense of self is also important. Caregivers often get so involved in caring for the person with Alzheimer's that they neglect their own physical, mental and spiritual well-being.
 Nelson encourages family members and other caregivers to:
 * Avoid social isolation by fostering friendships.
 * Maintain a sense of humor.
 * Find a confidant outside the family to share concerns.
 * Participate in community support groups, counseling and educational programs.
 * Make use of adult day care or temporary nursing-home care when a break from caregiving is needed.
 * Seek nurturing activities that promote happiness and relaxation.
 Friends and family can be a big help by making sure the primary caregiver gets adequate time away from caregiving responsibilities.
 "Many grown children say how rewarding it is to help both parents by caring for one while the other takes a much needed break," Nelson said.

Shelton dedication to be held Saturday

Several descendants of Jesse and Rachel Marrs Shelton, who died in the mid-1800's and were buried in McKenzie Cemetery near Clarksville, have erected a monument in their memory at their burial site. A dedication ceremony will be held on Saturday, October 10th at 1:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Jesse Shelton established Shelton's Fort, an Indian fortification located southeast of Rocton, in 1837. The fort served as a Republic of Texas post office and was the site of Methodist worship services. Shelton's Fort is now recognized as one of the most historic locations in Lamar County. A Texas historical marker was erected there in the 1970's.

Jesse Shelton served as Lamar County's first Justice of the Peace and as the first postmaster. He also helped select the site for the county seat, Paris.

Because of declining health, Jesse and Rachel Shelton moved to Clarksville in their later years to be near their children. They were buried in

McKenzie Cemetery, which has been established by the Methodist Episcopal Church South. Most likely, they had wooden markers which were destroyed one of the many times the cemetery was burned. McKenzie Cemetery is now owned by descendants of the Reverend J.W. P. McKenzie, who was a good friend of the Sheltons and founder of McKenzie College near Clarksville.

The Sheltons had ten kids. Many of their descendants live in northeast Texas.

Wright worked as a housekeeper at the Warner Hotel and Benjamin painted houses and worked at the Fort Huachuca Fire Department as a fireman. At that time, he would drive through Palominos because the shortcut, Highway 90, through the divide, was not built.

Prudence came to the long-term care center in December, 1995, after a short stay at Hill Haven Center in Sierra Vista. Up until then, she had lived on her own with visits from family, friends and members of her church to assist her.

Aside from Dorothy and Donald, the party was also attended by their brother, Phillip and Donald's wife, Paulette. Mrs. Wright also has 18 grandchildren; 29 great-grandchildren and 13 great-great-grandchildren.

She is the aunt of Thurman Franks of Paris and Ruth Gray and Luther Wright of Deport.

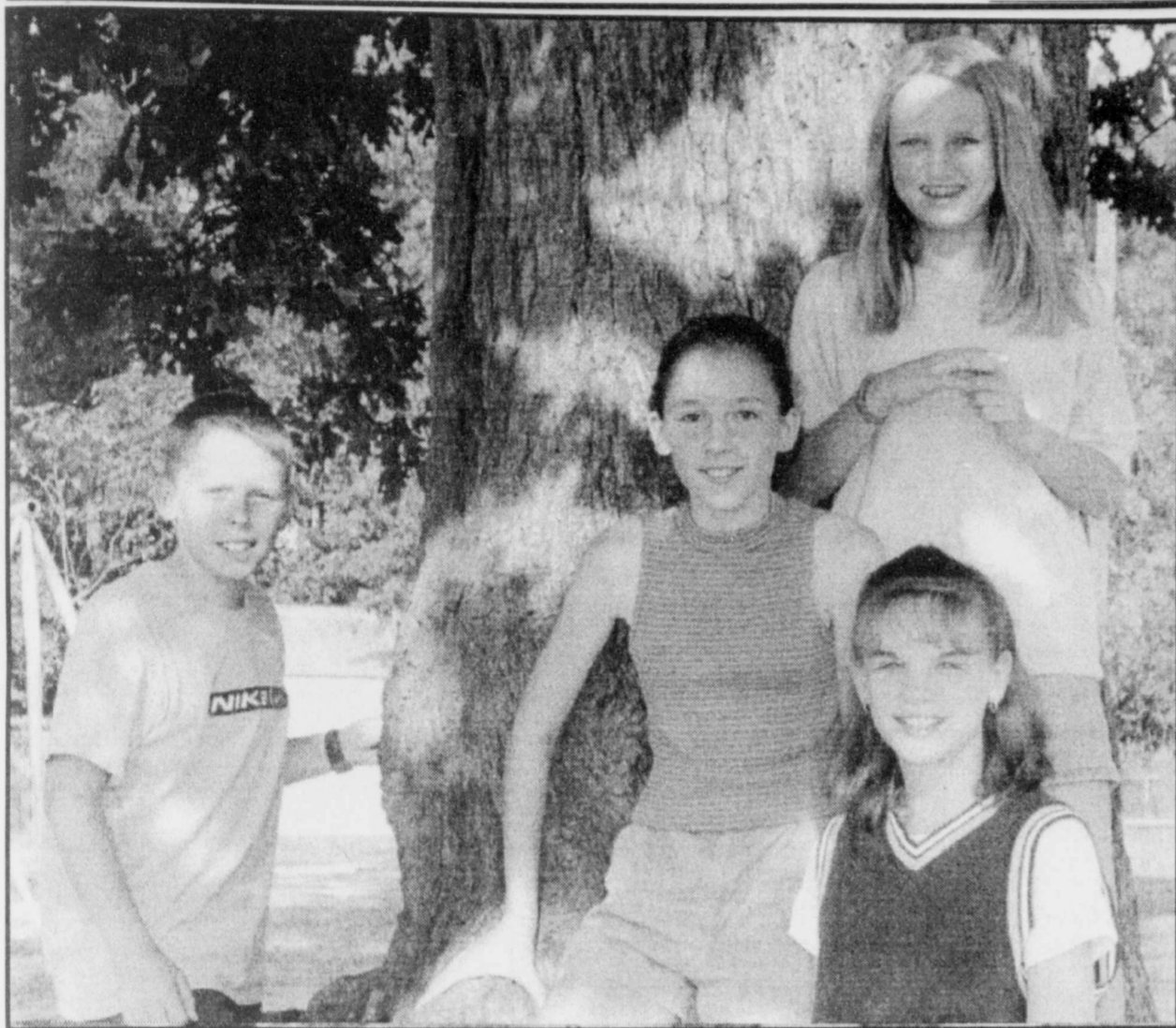

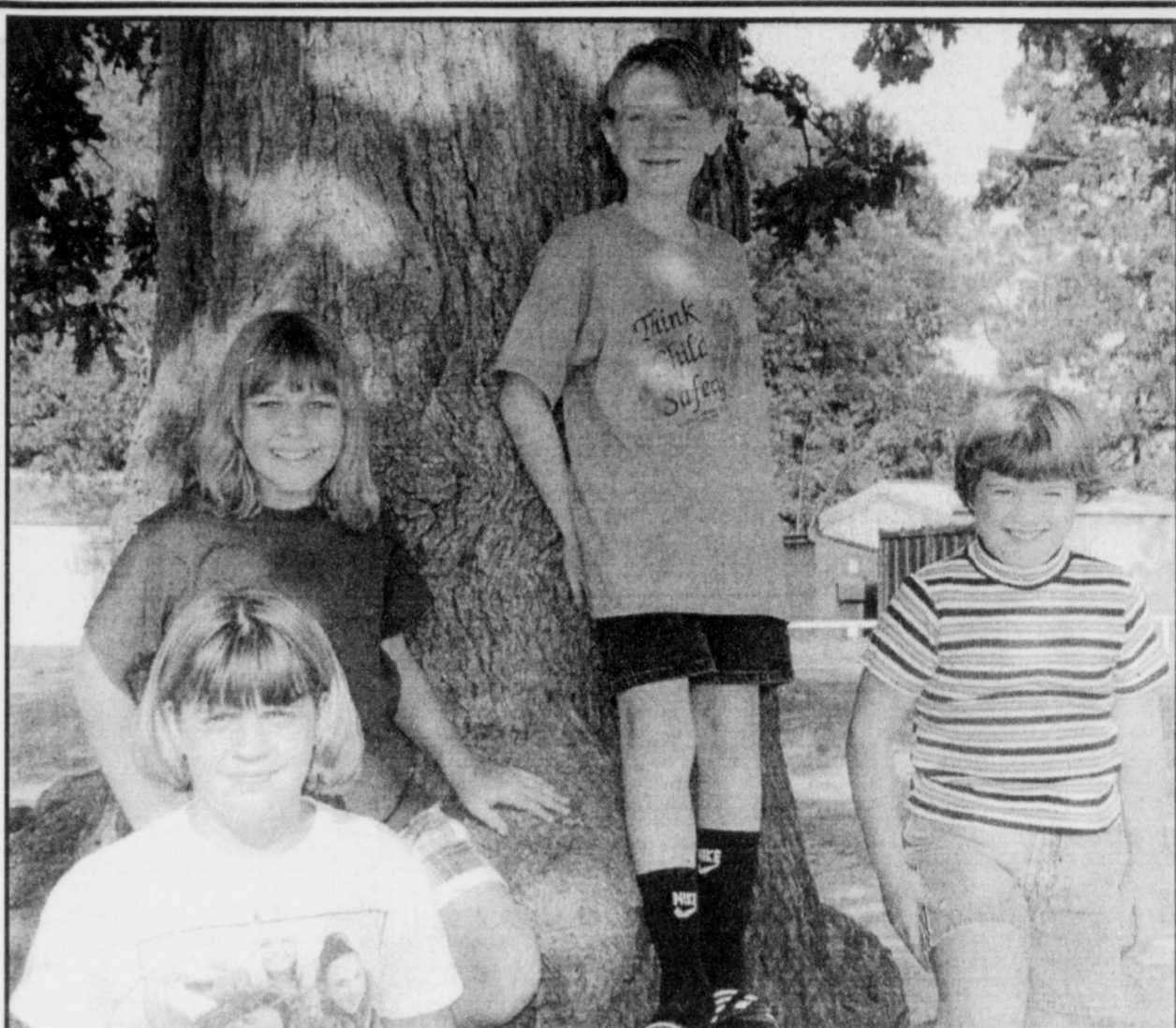

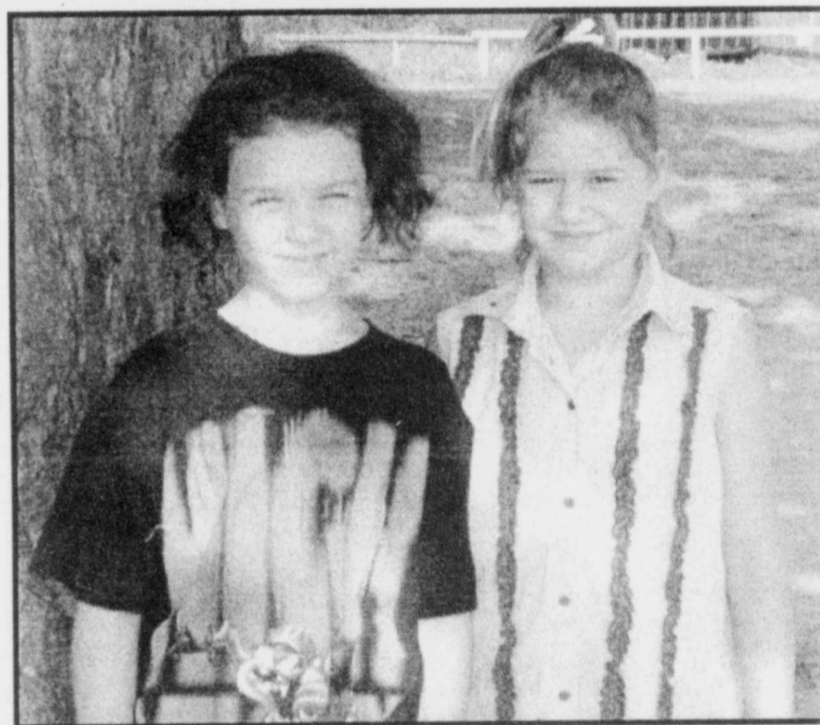

To the Editor: Subject: COPS Universal Hiring Program

A grant application dated July 6, 1998 was submitted to the U.S. Department of Justice with very little information given to the public. After reviewing the application I would like to bring up a few questionable points.

To begin with, on the first page of the "Support Information" section of the application, I quote "The community is situated on Texas Highway 82 which is a main corridor from Texarkana to the Sherman/Dallas area." That appears to me to be Clarksville, not Bogata. And on the same page, the city has requested a waiver of its 25% matching funds because "Presently the tax base of the community is not adequate to support a police department. Then under the "Long-term strategies" - The city of Bogata has a five year plan to increase the tax base to be able to support a police department." Unless they receive the waiver, the federal share decreases and the local share increases from 25% the first year to 75% the third year.

On page twelve of the "Community Policing Information worksheet" the question is asked, "Do you have assurance from your local government that these officials will be retained?" The reply, "Yes." How will we pay for them? The city's police department budget alone will be more than all other services combined. "The community can only afford a modest tax increase..." What is "Modest?" Give us an amount.

Coffee shop talk seems to be, "Keep the six officers for three years then cut back to a smaller department," but will this be allowed? According to the requirements, "The applicant hereby certifies that it understands that it must abide by its submitted plan to retain the additional officers positions at the conclusion of the grant period." This means we pay all costs from that point on. Some seem to believe we will have a full police department while someone else (the federal government) pays for it. This is not the case. There are no free rides when dealing with the government.

This community needs for more than an over-staffed police department. Grants for street, water and sewer lines, fire department and first responders would be nice. Maybe a quarter of a percent sales tax to build a commercial park to create jobs should be first. We pay this amount of sales tax on items we buy when we shop in other towns around Bogata. I'm not against a Police Department. Bogata needs a police department, but one within reason, one we can pay for.

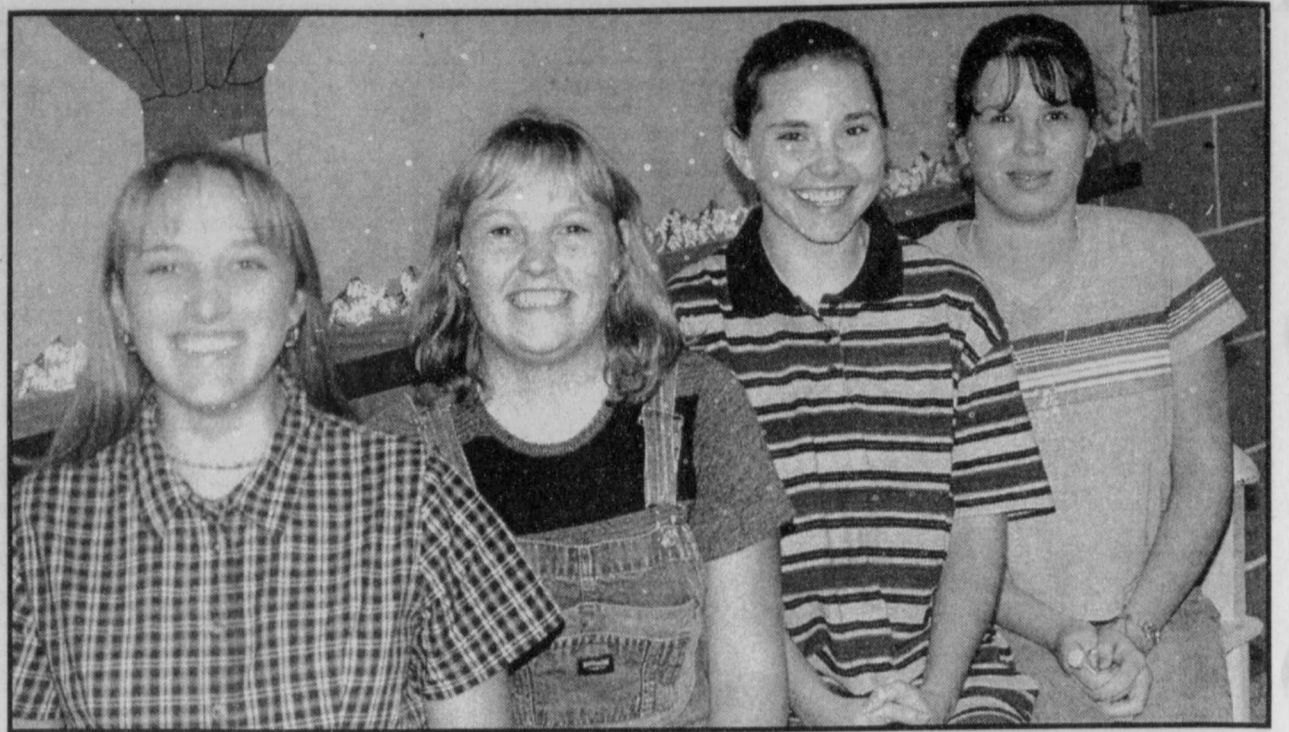
