## Bogata Fire & Rescue upgrades to ALS

The Bogata First Responders have been granted Advanced Life Support Defibrillator status by Life Net EMS and their medical director.

Randy Kennedy, administrator for the First Responders, David Baumgardner, Executive Director of Life Net and Dr. John Norris, Medical Director for Life Net, each signed the new contract to upgrade from Basic Life Support to ALS-Defibrillator.

Automated External Defibrillators are used in cardiac arrest cases where the patient is not breathing, does not have a pulse and is in a shockable rhythm. Defibrillation must occur early for it to be effective. In the past,

the response time of the ambulance was too long for the ambulances defibrillator to be effective in most cases. The First Responders response time is much shorter, therefore giving the patient a much greater chance of survival.

Bogata Fire and Rescue has purchased and received their AED. Half of the cost will be paid for by a matching funds grant received from the Texas Department of Health.

The fire department is seeking donations to help pay the balance. The proceeds at the upcoming hamburger supper on November 21 will also go toward the AED.

**Butter Roll Sauce**  
1-1/2 cup milk  
1/3 cup sugar  
1-1/2 tablespoon flour  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cook until thickened and pour over roll.

**Butter Rolls**  
Prepare biscuit mix and roll out. Sprinkle with sugar. Dot with butter and vanilla. Bake until brown.

**Grilled Jalapeno Chicken**  
6 boneless chicken breasts (skinless)  
1/2 cup fresh lime juice  
1/4 cup honey  
2 tablespoons fresh cilantro  
3 jalapeno peppers-sliced & unseeded  
2 tablespoons soy sauce  
3 cloves of garlic-chopped  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
Place chicken in 13x9 dish. Combine lime juice and remaining ingredients in a blender or processor and process until smooth. Reserve 1/4 cup marinade and pour the rest over chicken turning to coat. Cover and refrigerate 8 hours or overnight. Grill as usual, basting with reserved marinade.

**German Potato Salad**  
2 pounds potatoes  
1/4 pound bacon  
1/2 pound franks  
1/2 cup minced onion  
1-1/2 tablespoons sugar  
2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/3 cup vinegar  
1/3 cup water  
1/4 cup minced onion  
2 tablespoons green onion  
1 tablespoon parsley  
1 teaspoon celery seed  
4 hard cooked eggs  
Saute bacon in skillet until crisp. Remove and saute franks in same skillet. Remove and drain. In same skillet make a dressing by leaving about 2 tablespoons bacon drippings and sauteing 1/2 cup onions until tender. Meanwhile, mix flour, sugar and salt and pepper. Add the vinegar and water to these and add to the onions. Cook until thickened. While you are making sauce, boil potatoes. Mix all ingredients and potatoes and add to sauce. Serve.

**Marinated Pea Salad**  
1 can shoepeg corn-drained  
1 can LeSeur peas-drained  
1 jar diced pimentos  
1 bell pepper-chopped  
1 bunch green onions-chopped  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup vinegar  
1 cup oil  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon pepper  
Combine sugar, vinegar, oil, salt and pepper in saucepan. Bring to a boil and pour over other ingredients and let stand overnight in refrigerator. Drain before serving.

**Ham Jambalaya**  
1 cup chopped onion  
3/4 cup chopped bell pepper  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
1 clove minced garlic  
2 cup cooked ham  
1-1/4 ounce can diced tomatoes  
1-1/4 cup chicken broth  
1/2 teaspoon thyme  
1/8-1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper (pepper sauce may be substituted)  
1 bay leaf  
3/4 cup long grain rice  
Brown onion, pepper, celery and garlic in a little oil. Add tomato, ham, broth, spices and rice to first ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer covered for about 20 minutes or until rice is tender. This can be stirred occasionally if needed.

**Sweet and Sour Chicken Wings**  
30-40 chicken wings-divided  
1 cup soy sauce  
1 cup brown sugar  
3 lemons-juiced  
dash of ginger  
dash of garlic powder  
1/2 cup sherry  
Mix all ingredients together in a container. Add chicken wings and marinate overnight. Bake on a cookie sheet at 350 degrees uncovered for 1-1/2 hours. Stirring occasionally.

**North Texas Chili**  
2-1/2 pounds diced roast  
1 tablespoon shortening  
4 cups water  
1/4 cup diced onion  
1 teaspoon garlic powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon red pepper  
4 jalapeno peppers  
2-3 tablespoons chili powder  
2 teaspoon ground cumin  
1/4 teaspoon ground oregano  
1/8 teaspoon ground bay leaf  
2 beef bouillon cubes  
1-8 ounce can tomato sauce  
2-3 tablespoon chili powder  
2 teaspoon ground cumin  
1/4 red pepper  
1 teaspoon garlic powder  
Brown meat in shortening. Add water and next five ingredients. Bring to boil and simmer uncovered, one hour. Add water as needed to keep liquid 1/2 inch above meat throughout cooking procedure. Remove jalapenos and strain liquid, 2-3 tablespoons chili powder and next five ingredients; stir well. Simmer uncovered for 1 hour and 45 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and simmer about 15 minutes. Serves 6-1/2 cups.

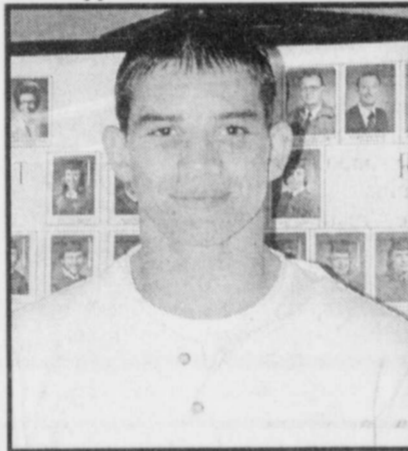
In the third the Rebels took the kick-off and moved the ball to the Pat 48. Justin Tucker again made a good offensive run to pick up another 9

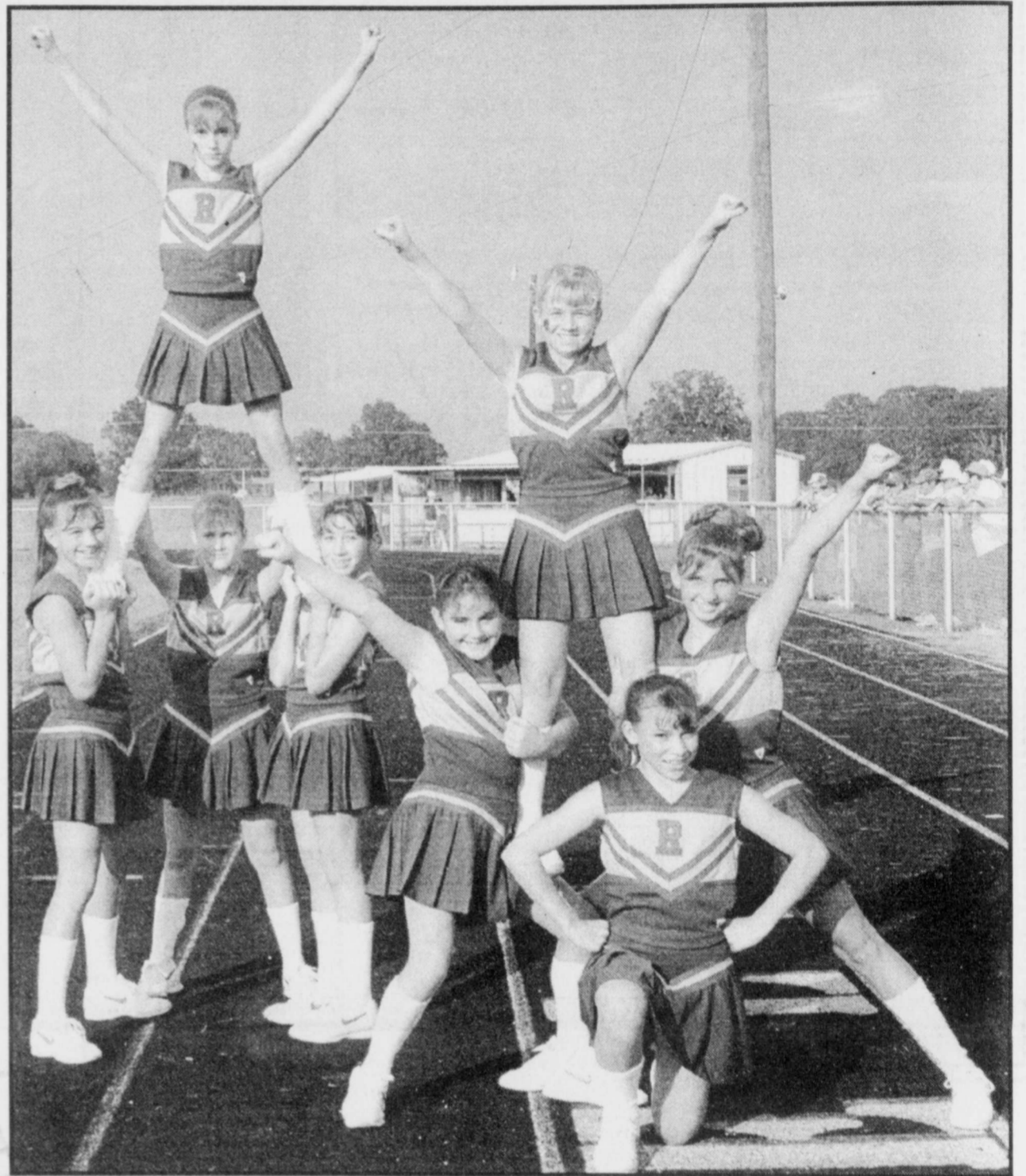

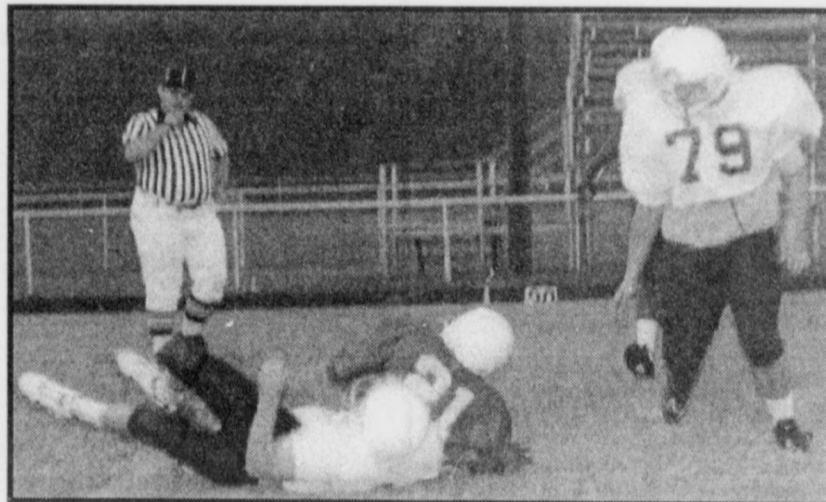

Under their direction the body of Alton Peek was disinterred Tuesday, October 20th for further investigation. The County Attorney's office was in charge of carrying out the necessary procedures. Peek's family and widow, Michelle Peek consented to the procedure. Mr. Peek was buried in Lamar County after the disinterment. All procedures were carried out according to state law, the press release says. Forms were signed by the president of the Boxelder Cemetery Association, the owner of the cemetery plot and the wife of Alton Peek. Since proceedings of the Grand Jury are secret, the public was not informed. The Grand Jury's term expires at the end of October. An additional meeting is scheduled this week. Peek was shot to death Nov. 11, 1996, at a farm near Boxelder. No one has been arrested in the killing, but a man thought to be a prime suspect reportedly killed himself a month after Peek's death.

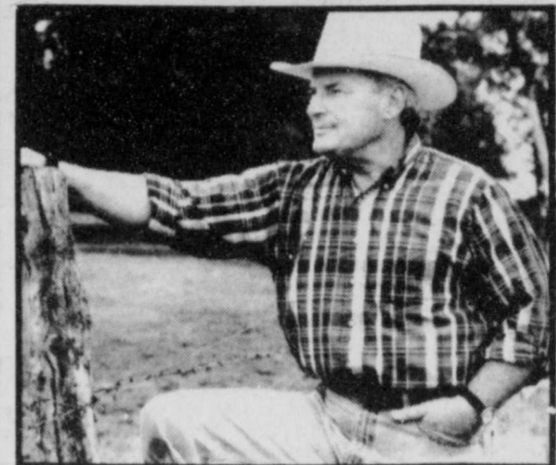
