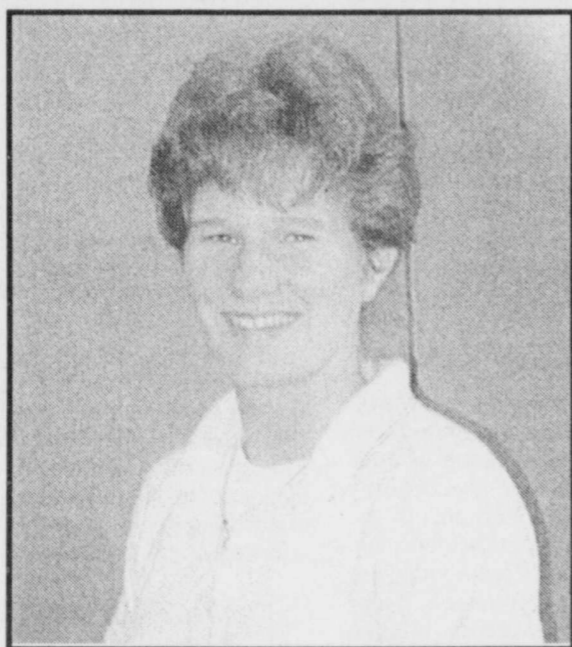

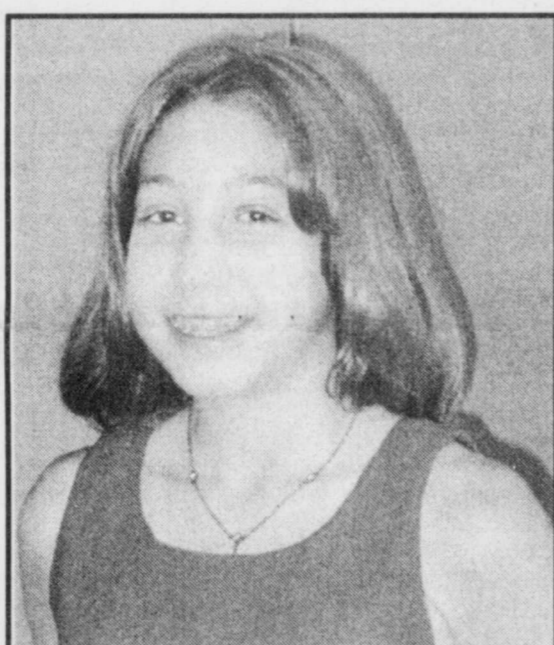

Called meeting of Bogata council draws large crowd

The special meeting of the Bogata City Council saw approximately 30 visitors Monday night.

The council was called to order at 7:00 p.m. and convened in Executive Session under Article 6252-17, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, after opening prayer. The purpose was to discuss employees. The council reconvened at 7:18. No action was taken on "council members conduct and behavior". Action was taken on deliberations in the executive session, including a unanimous vote for the motion to appoint Freddy L. Booker as a city employee to the position of Peace Officer at salary of \$8.50 per hour, effective pay week beginning May 14, 1999.

The appointment by ordinance of Nelda Webster-Talley to the position of City Secretary, the approval of Jean Bivins Upchurch as Assistant City Secretary and the approval of Julie Davidson as part time Clerical were all approved unanimously.

Discussion and possible action on the repair and replacement of the old 1975 flat bed city street truck and possible action on the selling of the

1988 Ford dump truck was an agenda item. Steve Farmer of Farmer's Heavy Equipment Service discussed the condition, needed repair and cost of repair of the two vehicles. Following the discussion Jack Crane made the motion to fix the blue truck for \$2,500 the motion was approved unanimously after a second by W.T. Harbison. The sale of the 1988 Ford was tabled.

Another old business item was possible action on assistance from GDM Construction on the City's efforts to repair city streets. The Mayor gave cost estimates for the repair of approximately 51,000 feet of street. The consensus of the council was to place a request for bids in the newspaper for the repair of 25,000 feet of street going north and south and planning to repair an additional 25,000 feet of street going east and west next budget year.

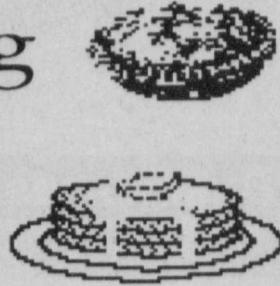
The council passed unanimously agenda items as follows: give to each new council member a printout of expenditures for this fiscal year, to date; to purchase a load of oil sand and begin to repair the holes in the

street by the city employees; the hiring of all personnel will be done by the council with recommendation for the appropriate supervisor; all employee grievances should be brought to the city council, following the guidelines set forth in the employee handbook, the hiring of Mitch Cannon for summer help.

The most lengthy item on the agenda was discussion and possible action on the Mayor's use of the city vehicle for any reason. The majority of the citizens in attendance spoke on this agenda item in favor of the Mayor keeping full access to the use of the city truck. The discussion became quite verbal at times. Newly elected councilman, Jack Crane made the motion to take the truck away, clarification was requested by the Mayor to Mr. Crane. Mr. Crane clarified his motion as meaning "for use of vehicle for city business". The Mayor called for the vote. Teresa Smith and Randy Kennedy voted for the approval of the Mayor's use of the vehicle. O.E. (Edd) Spencer, W.T. Harbison and Jack Crane voted against the Mayor's use of the city vehicle.

2 cups sugar
4 eggs
6 tablespoons cocoa
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 jar (7 ounce) marshmallow creme
1 cup peanut butter
2 cups chocolate chips
3 cups crispy rice cereal

In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar; add eggs. Stir in cocoa, flour, vanilla and salt. Spread into a greased 13x2 inch baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until brownies test done. Cool. Spread marshmallow creme over cooled brownies. In a small saucepan melt peanut butter and chocolate chips over low heat; stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in cereal. Spread over marshmallow creme layer. Chill before cutting. Store in refrigerator. Makes about three dozen.

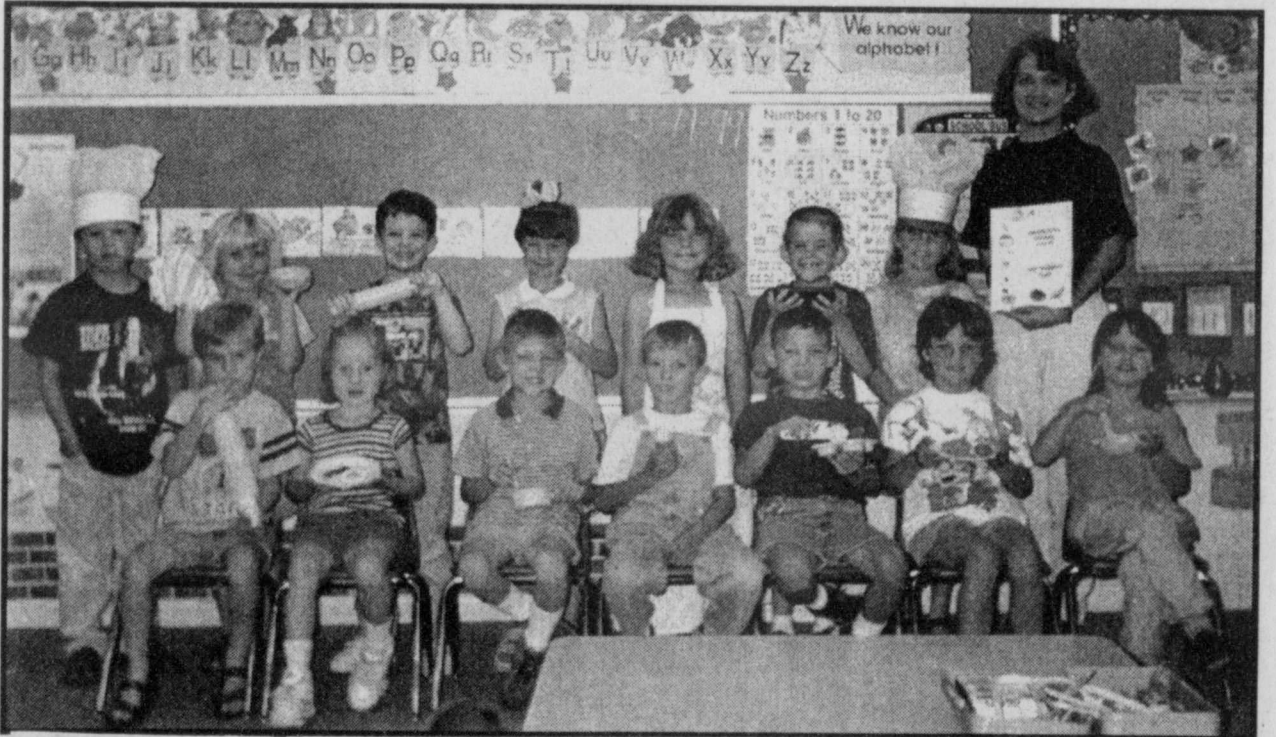

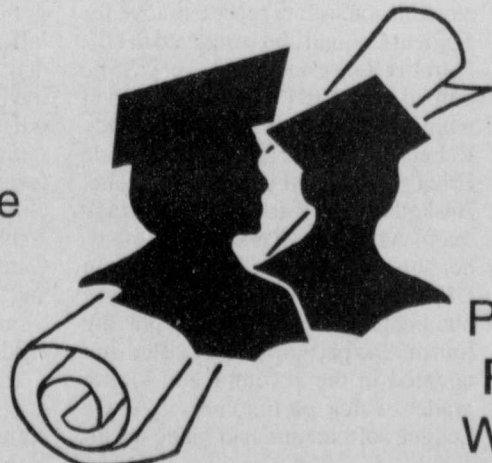

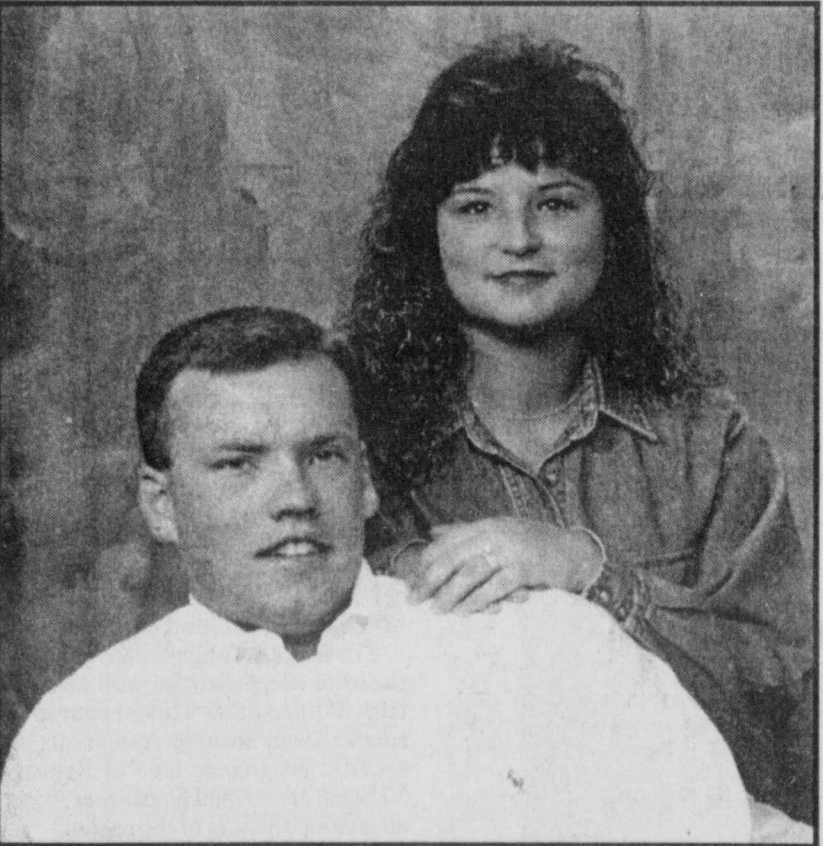

FOOT NOTES

SHOULD YOUR CHILD SEE A PODIATRIST?

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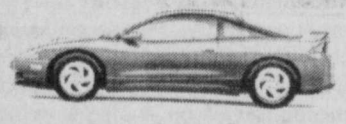

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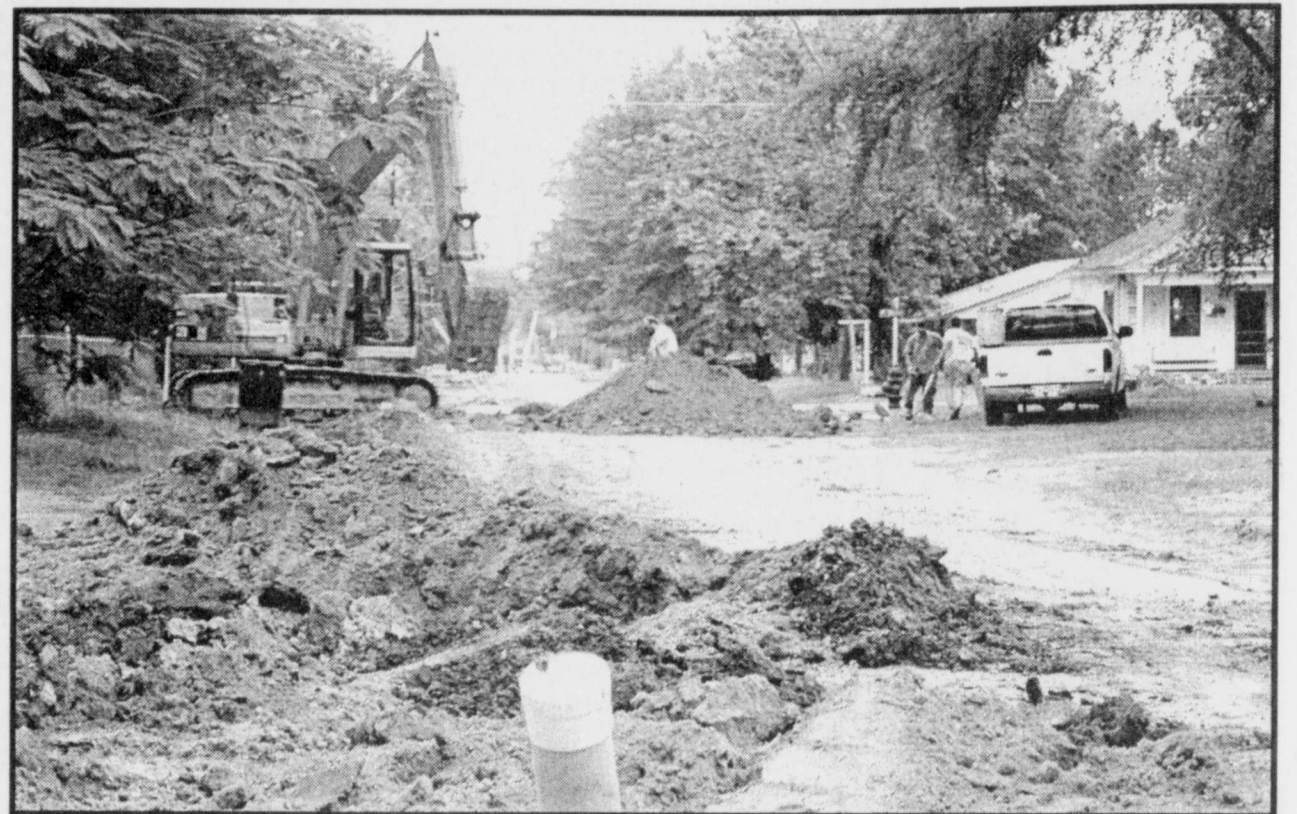
