Bogata couple loses horses in Cruelty complaint

Red River County Justice of the Peace J.R. Lewis ordered on Monday morning, August 2, that three horses and two mules belonging to Chris and Wendy Albritton of Bogata, TX be sold, concluding the 9:00 a.m. hearing to determine what would be done with the animals.

Earlier in July, the couple had been cited for violation of a Bogata city ordinance concerning animals being housed inside the city limits. The couple had asked for a trial by jury concerning this ordinance.

This citation was followed by a complaint of animal cruelty being filed against the couple by the Lamar County Humane Society.

Upon the cruelty to animals charge being filed, both Chris and Wendy Albritton were arrested by Red River County officials and placed in Red River County Jail last week for violation of a Class A Misdemeanor until they posted bond for their release. Bond for each was set at \$1,000.00.

The original complaint to the City of Bogata was lodged against the Albrittons last year by Bogata citizens concerned with the animals' welfare.

The complaint alleged that five animals were being kept in the couple's back yard, three of which were chained to trees, making it impossible for them to reach food and water, had it been available to them.

Following testimony from Bogata Police Chief Charles Clegg, Mrs. Georgia Fergen representing the Lamar County Humane Society, Dr. Hardy Stewardson, D.V.M., and Bogata citizen Donna Rozell, Judge Lewis heard testimony from Chris Albritton, refuting the claims made against himself and his wife, Wendy.

Chief Clegg gave an update on dates of complaints filed and his investigation into the charges from the City of Bogata's standpoint.

Georgia Fergen from the Lamar County Humane Society, stated

through documented reports of her investigation of the complaints and her on site visits, found that the animals were in poor physical condition and that adequate food, water and shelter was not offered to the animals. Three of the animals, Mrs. Fergen continued, were chained to the trees in such a manner that they could not even lay down to sleep or rest. She testified that the animals were not given access to water or food, even though temperatures had soared over the 100° range.

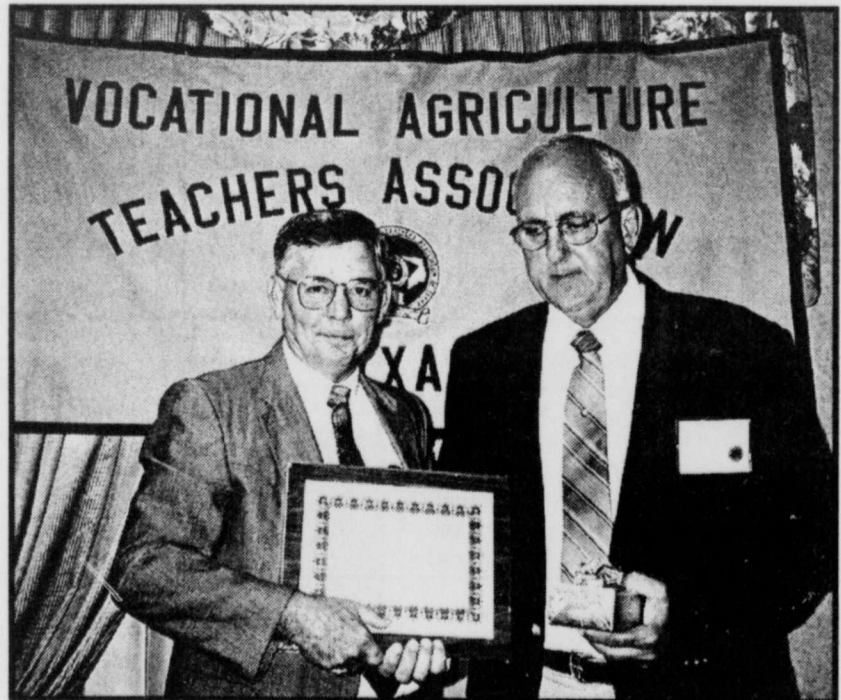
She also stated that a round bale of hay had been donated to the Humane Society for these particular animals by Roy Marris and that he had personally delivered the hay to the animals. When that bale of hay was gone, the Albritton's called the Humane Society again for assistance, and she and her husband donated their personal hay to the animals, which was delivered by her husband.

Dr. Stewardson testified that upon his inspection of the animals, and he stated that all five animals were in similar physical condition, that "on a scale of 1 to 10; 10 being obese, 1 being a walking skeleton, and 5 being in good physical condition, the condition of the animals was about a 1 1/2."

In their defense, Chris Albritton presented feed bills to the court, and their plans to obtain more property for the animals in question. He stated that they did indeed feed and water the animals, but usually at such a time that no one was aware of it.

Concluding the testimony and upon Judge Lewis' determination of the facts presented, Lewis ruled that the animals, now in the custody of Dr. Stewardson, be sold, with proceeds from the sale going first toward the expenses incurred by the animals, and the remainder being forwarded to the Albrittons.

Charges are pending with the Red River County District Attorney.

Stew Cookoff will be September 11

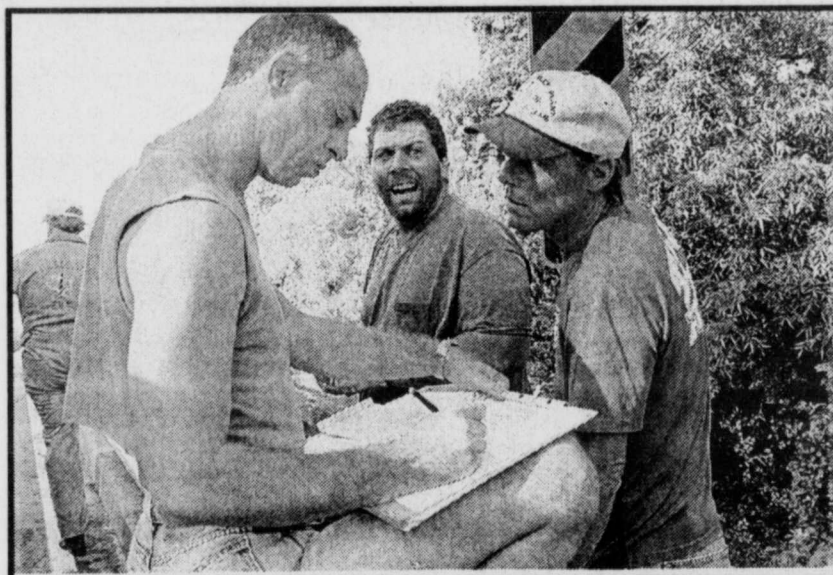
The annual Red River County Stew Cook Off will be held Saturday, September 11 at the fairgrounds in Clarksville.

Country Cooking

This is a continuation of last week's recipes, courtesy of the Lamar County Extension Service out of Paris and Extension Agent Glenda Trimble Wise. This week we are dealing with relishes.

Nothing tops off a meal like a sweet, delicious, home-canned relish. Discarding the value of your time and labor, canning homegrown food may save you half the cost of buying commercially canned foods. Canning favorite and special products to be enjoyed by family and friends is a fulfilling experience and a source of pride for many people.

Many vegetables begin losing some of their vitamins when harvested. Nearly half the vitamins may be lost within a few days unless the fresh produce is cooled or preserved. Within 1-2 weeks, even refrigerated produce loses half or more of some of

its vitamins. The heating process during canning destroys from one-third to one-half of vitamins A and C, thiamin and riboflavin. Once canned, additional losses of these sensitive vitamins are from 5-20 percent each year. The amounts of other vitamins, however, are only slightly lower in canned compared with fresh food, if vegetables are handled properly and canned promptly after harvest, they can be more nutritious than fresh produce sold in local stores.

The advantages of home canning are lost when you start with poor quality fresh foods; when jars fail to seal properly; when food spoils; and when flavors, textures, color and nutrients deteriorate during prolonged storage.

Here are some favorite relish recipes we thought you might enjoy. S

bination of vegetables, mixed with spices to make any meal a banquet!

Corn Relish-if you don't care for cabbage, use celery instead!

Cucumber Relish-use up all of those extra cucumbers that are too big for pickles!

End-of-the-Garden Pickle-use extra vegetables that you don't have a lot of on hand for this extra special mixture!

Piccalilli or Green Tomato Relish-a combination of green tomatoes and cabbage that can't be beat!

Rummage Relish-this is a kind of clean-out-your-garden relish with everything but the kitchen sink!

Sweet Pickle Relish-great on hot dogs, hamburgers or just a bout anything!

Zucchini Relish-another recipe for this favorite vegetable of many!

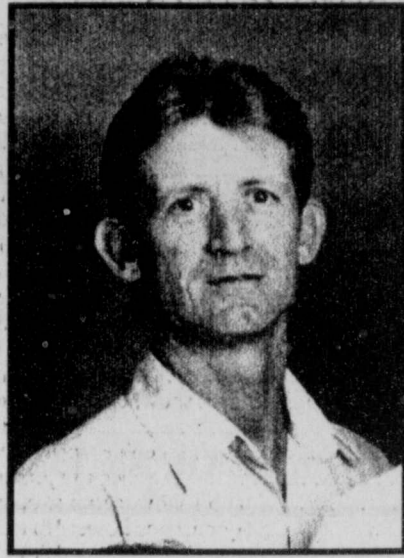

<p>Chow-Chow Relish</p> <p>1 quart chopped cabbage 1 cup chopped sweet red peppers 3 cups cauliflower 2 cups chopped green tomatoes 2 cups chopped onions 2 cups chopped sweet green peppers 1/2 teaspoon ginger 3 tablespoons salt 1-1/2 cups sugar 2 teaspoon celery seed 2 teaspoon dry mustard 1 teaspoon mustard seed 1 teaspoon tumeric 2-1/2 cups vinegar</p> <p>Combine vegetables and sprinkle with salt. Let stand 4-6 hours in cool place. Drain well. Rinse and drain. Combine sugar, spices and vinegar in large pot. Simmer 10 minutes. Add vegetables; simmer 10 minutes. Bring to boil. Pack relish into hot jars. Leave 1/4 inch head space. Process 10 minutes in boiling water canner. Yield 4 pints.</p> <p>Corn Relish</p> <p>2 quarts cut cooked corn 1 quart chopped cabbage 1 cup chopped onion 1 cup chopped sweet green pepper 1 cup chopped sweet red pepper 1 tablespoon tumeric 1-2 cups sugar 2 tablespoons dry mustard 1 tablespoon celery seed 1 tablespoon mustard seed 1 tablespoon salt 1 quart vinegar</p> <p>To make corn relish with fresh corn: Boil ears of corn 5 minutes; cut corn from cob. Combine corn with remaining ingredients in large pot. Bring to boil; reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes. Pack hot relish in hot jars. Process 15 minutes in boiling water canner. Yield 6 pints. Recipe Variations: To make corn relish from frozen corn: substitute an equal measure of frozen corn for fresh; defrost corn. Follow directions. To make corn relish with a vacuum packed canned whole kernel corn, substitute an equal measure of canned corn for fresh corn. Follow directions.</p>	<p>Cucumber Relish</p> <p>2 quarts chopped cucumbers 2 cups chopped sweet green peppers 2 cups chopped sweet red peppers 1 cup chopped onion 1 tablespoon tumeric 1 tablespoon mustard seed 2 teaspoons whole cloves 1/2 cup salt 2 quarts cold water 1-1/2 cups brown sugar 1 quart vinegar 2 sticks cinnamon 2 teaspoons whole allspice</p> <p>Combine vegetables in large pot; sprinkle with tumeric. Dissolve salt in cold water and pour over vegetables; let stand 3-4 hours. Drain; cover vegetables with cold water and let stand 1 hour. Drain thoroughly. Combine sugar and vinegar in large pot. Tie spices in a spice bag; add to sugar mixture. Bring to boil; pour over vegetables. Cover; let stand 12-18 hours in a cool place. Bring vegetables to a boil; reduce heat and simmer until hot. Pack hot relish in hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Process 10 minutes in a boiling water canner. Yields 6 pints.</p> <p>End-of-the Garden Pickles</p> <p>1 pound zucchini-cut in 1/4 inch slices 1 large sweet red pepper-1/2 inch strips 1 pound green beans 2 tablespoons mustard seed 1 teaspoon cinnamon 3 cups cider vinegar 1/2 carrots-1/4 inch slices 1/2 pound pickling onions-1/4 inch slices 2 large sweet green peppers-1/2 inch strips 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup white sugar 2 tablespoons dry mustard 1-1/2 tablespoon salt 1 teaspoon ginger</p> <p>Mix vegetables; set aside. 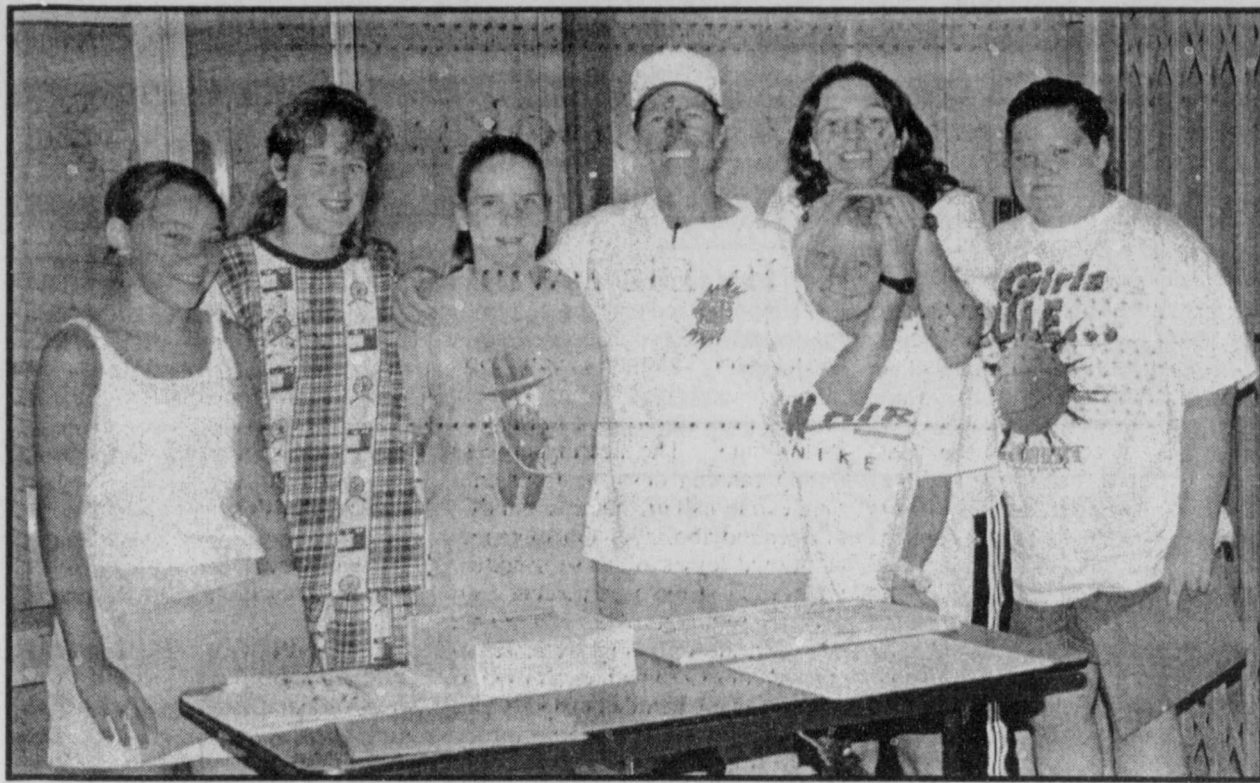

\$2,000 reward being offered in connection with arson fires

A \$2,000 reward has been offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for setting hay fires in the Pattonville-Deport area between the weeks of July 9, 1999 and July 30, 1999.

Anyone with information concerning these fires should contact with Investigator Tuttle at Lamar County

Sheriff's Department at 737-2400 or if one wishes to be anonymous they may contact Lamar County Crime Stoppers at 785-TIPS.

To date, over 400 rolls of hay and some structures have been lost to arson in the area. The last fire was on Friday, July 30, on County Road 15700, and destroyed almost 200 rolls of hay.

August 6 is earmarked as annual "tax holiday"

According to Carole Keeton Rylander, Comptroller of Public Affairs, the new sales tax holiday for clothing and footwear, will begin this year at 12:01 a.m. August 6 and continue through until midnight, August 8. The tax break, which is expected to save Texas consumers \$69.2 million in state sales taxes, and up to another \$15.5 million in local sales taxes over the biennium, was approved by the 1999 Texas Legislature.

Here are some highlights about the sales tax holiday:

The tax holiday will be held every year on the first Friday, Saturday and Sunday of August. This year, both state and local sales taxes will be waived. In future years, however, while the state sales tax will continue to be waived, cities, counties and other local taxing entities will have the choice of participating in the holiday or continuing to impose the tax.

Most clothing and footwear priced at least than \$100 will be exempt from sales taxes. Customers will receive the break on individual items, regardless of the amount they buy.

Clothing and footwear that are used primarily for athletic activities or for protective wear are not eligible for the exemption. Customers buying golf cleats and football pads, for instance, must pay sales tax.

Also not included in the sales tax holiday are accessories, such as jewelry and watches, items that are carried rather than worn, including handbags, briefcases and wallets and clothing rentals, such as formal wear and costume rentals, and repairs and

alterations.

Tax free items include: baby clothes, bathing suits, belts with attached buckles, boots, cowboy, niking, bras, bridal apparel, not rentals, caps/hats, baseball, fishing, golf, knitted, choir robes, coats and wraps, costumes, diapers adult and baby, dresses, formal clothing, gloves, gym suits and uniforms, hooded shirts and hooded sweatshirts, hosiery, jackets, jeans, jerseys, baseball and football, jogging apparel, such as bras, suits and shorts, lingerie, neckwear and ties, pajamas, pants and trousers, raincoats and ponchos, robes, shirts, shoes, sandals, slippers, sneakers, tennis, walking, socks, shorts, suits, slacks and jackets, sweatshirts, sweatsuits, swim suits and trunks, tuxedos not rentals, underclothes, work clothes and uniforms.

Taxed: accessories generally barrettes, elastic pony tail holders, wallets, watches, backpacks, baseball cleats and pants, belt buckles without belts, climbing, fishing, rubber work, ski and wader boots, buttons and zippers, cloth and lace, knitting yarns and other fabrics, dry cleaning services, football pants, golf gloves, handbags and purses, handkerchiefs, hard hats, helmets, bike, baseball, football, hockey, motorcycle, sports, ice skates, jewelry, laundering services, leather goods except belts and wearing apparel, football, hockey, soccer, elbow, knee and shoulder pads, personal flotation devices, rented clothing including uniforms, formal wear and costumes, roller blades and skates, safety clothing, glasses, bicycle, bowling and golf shoes.

Housing directors asked to consult

Melba Ladd, Director of the Deport Housing Authority and Donna Rozell, Director of the Bogata Housing Authority, have been asked to serve on a team of HUD personnel, software vendors under contract to HUD and representatives of local housing authorities. This committee is being asked to complete a reporting program that will be used by East Texas Housing Authorities included in the litigation suit Young vs. Cuomo. From the 84 authorities, four directors were chosen; Melba Ladd from Deport, Donna Rozell from Bogata, Leanna Dickson from Port Arthur and Andy Davis from Tyler.

The first meeting was held in Dallas on July 19-20-21 at the office of

the software vendor, Computer Program Services, Inc. Progress was made as members of the committee were given the opportunity to give input to the needs of all committee members.

Subsequent meetings are planned for the near future to address needs that will allow reporting by housing authorities that will serve the requirements of the court of Judge William Wayne Justiss.

The committee included one member from HUD Washington, D.C., four members from Ft. Worth office of HUD, seven members from Computer Programs Services, Inc., and the four housing directors.

Horses can serve as warning signs of mosquito-borne encephalitis

Mosquitoes, as standard operating procedure, can make life miserable for humans, poultry, horses and livestock. This summer, there is a small chance that in East Texas a common garden variety mosquito bite can lead to death.

Texas Department of Health officials have reported incidences of eastern equine encephalitis in East Texas. Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) is a disease that can be fatal to both horses and humans. In Louisiana, the disease has been cycling for more than two months, killing 40 horses and an uncounted number of emus. Most recently, two humans in Louisiana have been infected, with one man still in a coma. The eastern variety does not just kill those with weakened immune systems like the other varieties do. It can strike down a man in the prime of life. It is something to be concerned about.

Recently, the disease has spilled over to the East Texas counties of Jasper, Harrison, Cherokee and Hardin. Though no East Texans have

yet to become infected, 30 to 40 emus have died of the disease in Jasper County, while in Harrison, Cherokee and Hardin counties there are reports of horses either killed or diagnosed with the disease.

Entomologists don't know which mosquito species transmits the disease, but they do know that Western Louisiana and East Texas are home to the same species. This week, Dr. Jimmy Olsen and members of his staff collected mosquitoes in East Texas counties where horses and emus were infected. They hope to determine exactly which species of mosquito is the vector. If identified, it will be possible to predict which counties are at risk. Until then, it would be wise to consider any mosquito suspect.

Once infected, horses begin to show clinical signs of EEE in about 5 days while symptoms in humans take 7 to 10 days to appear. The mortality rate in horses infected with EEE is from 50 to 90%. The fatality rate in humans is 65 to 80%, according to a

Texas Department of Health release.

There is an EEE vaccine for horses but not for humans. People are urged to lower their risk by wearing long-sleeved shirts and pants and using mosquito repellent. The most effective products will contain Deet, but the strength of the active ingredient will vary. Look for Deet or N,N-diethyl-m-toluamide on the list of ingredients and choose a product with the highest concentration.

Because horses show symptoms quicker than humans, they can act as sentinels for EEE activity in an area. Symptoms in horses include: fever, irregular gait, wandering, circling, incoordination, yawning, grinding of teeth, pendulous lower lip, the inability to swallow, paralysis and occasional convulsions.

In humans, the symptoms include: fever, headache, vomiting, lethargy, neck stiffness and coma. Again, everyone is urged to use mosquito spray as self protection.

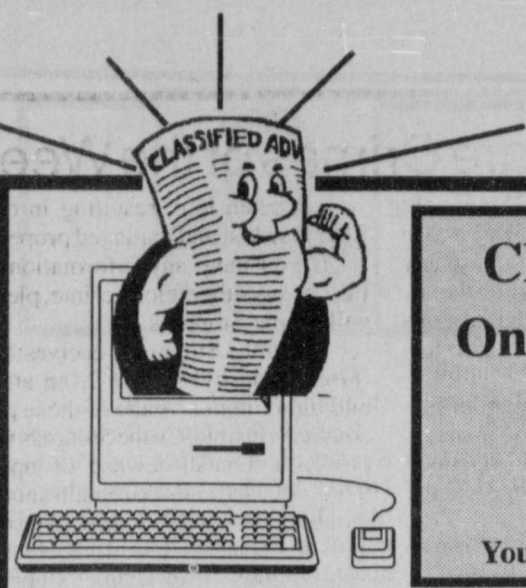

 Application: The City of Bogata, P.O. Box 400, Bogata, Texas 75417, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, (TNRCC) for a renewal of TNRCC Permit No. 10065-001, which authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 332,000 gallons per day. Issuance of the proposed Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. 10054-001 will replace the existing NPDES Permit No. TX0022322 issued on August 9, 1993 and TNRCC Permit NO. 10065-001.

The plant site is located southeast of the City of Bogata, approximately 3100 feet southwest of U.S. Highway 271 and 5000 feet east of State Highway 37 in Red River County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to Morrison Branch; thence to Little Mustang Creek; thence to the Sulphur/South Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are limited aquatic life uses for Morrison Branch and Little Mustang Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are high aquatic life uses and contact recreation.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will authorize the conditions under which the facility must operate.

Public Comment/Public Meeting. Written public comments and requests for public meetings may be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address provided in the information section below, within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. A public meeting is intended for the taking of public comment, and is not a contested case hearing. A public meeting will be held if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application.

Contested Case Hearing: The TNRCC may grant a contested case hearing on this application if a written hearing request is filed within 30 days from the date of newspaper publication of this notice. The Executive Director may approve the application unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days after newspaper publication of this notice.
