It's about communication I finished a book by Anne Perry recently. Her mysteries are set in Victorian England and she researches them carefully for authenticity.

The thing that struck me about life back then was incredible slowness or lack of communication!

In this involved murder mystery there is the suspect, two of her friends, a solicitor (lawyer), a detective and the police. All are having to communicate with one another.

How do they do this? There are only two ways, either to go in person, or else to send a messenger! If a reply is needed the messenger must wait until one is hand written, then carry it back. Often these hand written letters must be copied over because more than one person needs to read them. That means the messenger must either walk, run or take a horsedrawn cab from location to location, waiting at each place until he has received replies or additions to the communication.

A letter from London to Scotland, a mere 450 miles, could take several days to arrive, and the reply, of course, took the same length. And that was after the train system was in use! Think how slow things were before that!

The sheer slowness and complication of the communications was really an eye opener.

I suppose when the telegraph first appeared on the scene it must have been absolutely breathtaking with it's speed and efficiency.

Then came the telephone, when ordinary people could simply pick up the instrument and chat. Soon, even long distance calls could be put through with no delay.

For a number of years after the advent of the telephone it

Street rodding is worth the "extra miles" to local couple

Most people have a hobby. Every now and again, someone pursues excellence in their hobby beyond what ordinary enthusiasts are willing to do. These people are happy to go the extra mile. And for Hugh and Vicki Jeffus of Deport, that has meant over 100,000 miles! Hugh and Vicki are street rodders. This year, at the National Street Rod Association's Grand Nationals in Louisville, Kentucky, that dedication paid off when they captured the South Central Region Safety Award. There are only seven of these prestigious awards given nation-wide, out of 14,000 street rods inspected.

For those unfamiliar with street rodding, members travel to rod runs nationwide to compete in various categories, play games and generally enjoy fellowship. The Jeffus' do this in their customized 1936 Ford pickup. The bright red pickup boasts a 350 V-8 engine, and like all street rods is not a classic car but a customized, "souped up" vehicle. No, they don't race it. But they don't trailer it to events, either. It's low slung body has been driven every mile of the way to any event they attend, all the way from Deport, Texas to places such as Spokane, Washington and Burlington, Vermont in pursuit of awards and fun. In the course of this quest they have now travelled to all 48 states and twice to Canada.

Hugh and Vicki have been featured in two magazines, Street Rodder Pickup and Super Street Truck . They are currently on the internet at street rodding.com after winning the Grand National award, and may be on ESPN. The walls of their bedroom are literally out of room for more plaques, and trophies are stacked in the corners. These plaques are a story unto themselves, since many are home made especially for rod runs. Pistons, hand painted wood, tooled leather and lots of imagination contribute tot he originality of these awards. Many rod runs are for charity, and the car club that Hugh and Vicki belong to, the

Northeast Texas Travelers, always holds a meet to raise money for needy children. hugh is a director in the Lone Star Street Rod Association, the state organization.

The Safety Selection award comes about by way of a rather lengthy process. Every street rod belonging to the NSRA has the option of participating in a 23 point inspection, much stricter than ordinary state inspections. Fire extinguishers, leaks from lines or hoses, seat belts, etc. are carefully checked. In addition, interviews are conducted by the safety inspectors as to how involved the street rodder is, what they do to promote the sport, how involved family may be plus many more questions.


At the Oklahoma City Regional Nationals this summer, Hugh was nominated for the safety award. Then, they competed against other nominees at the Grand Nationals in Kentucky.

The NSRA puts out a little booklet called the "Fellow Pages". These are association members who are willing to help out a fellow street rodder if they have problems on the road. Since many of the parts for a street rod are custom parts and not readily available, this little guide is invaluable. If a mechanical problem arises it isn't unusual for a member from the Fellow Pages to stay up most of the night helping a stranded traveler.

The Jeffus family purchased the "Little Red Truck" in 1988 in San Antonio. In 1991 it received a "ground up" restoration, which means it was completely disassembled and redone.

They must travel light, since there is very little space in the vehicle, and Vicki is a master at packing clothing that will travel well. She enjoys the travel and visiting with fellow members just as much as Hugh does.

For Hugh and Vicki Jeffus street rodding is more than just a hobby. While they enjoy the time away from his job as president of Community National Bank of Detroit, what they really enjoy is the challenge, the pursuit of excellence in the field, and the chance to see the country in a rather unusual way.


E-Mail over the internet opened up yet another wide, wide world.

As always, balance your checkbook regularly. Pay Atten-When you receive a transaction receipt from your tion to Your institution, check it for accuracy and save it to compare against your statement. It's also smart to review your credit report to make sure it doesn't contain inaccurate information.

> Remember all your payment options (checks, credit cards, debit cards, ATMs and tellers) in the event that one doesn't work as planned. The Federal Reserve has plans to ensure that there will be sufficient cash available for consumers. If you withdraw money, make reasonable decisions based on solid information; don't put yourself at risk of being robbed or losing valuable interest payments.

Be skeptical if someone asks for your account information or tries to sell you a product, service GaurdAgainst or investment that's supposedly Y2K "safe". Pro-Y2K Scams tect your personal information, including your bank account, credit card and Social Security numbers.

> The federal government's protection of insured deposits will not be affected by Y2K. If you have more than \$100,000 in an insured bank, thrift or credit union, you may want to make sure you understand the insurance rules. 

Ducks Unlimited urging more land to be put into CRP, WRP

Across the country, two American traditions are quickly disappearing, abundant wildlife habitat and family farms. A pair of voluntary government programs promises relief for both, and current bills in the U.S. Congress could expand these programs nationwide.

The United States is losing it's wetlands (some of nature's most productive ecosystems) at a rate of more than 170,000 acres a year. Grasslands, forests and other important habitats are disappearing at similarly alarming rates.

At the same time, global economic problems are forcing many farmers out of business. Last fall, Congress approved nearly \$6 billion in emergency farm aid. Federally subsidized crop insurance may cost another \$4 billion.

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) are restoring wildlife habitat and , at the same time, helping save many family farms. By paying farmers to set aside land for wildlife, these programs have restored millions of acres across the country at a cost of about \$2 billion annually.

The Conservation Reserve Program was initiated in 1985 to help stem erosion on agricultural lands. The program pays farmers to retire their croplands from production for ten years, slowing erosion and providing prime cover for breeding birds and other wildlife. Today, more than 36 million acres are enrolled in CRP. The Wetlands Reserve Program places conservation easements on

marginally productive agricultural lands and restores them to wetlands. More than 800,000 acres are enrolled in this program. Many WRP lands are in the environmentally important, Mississippi Delta.

Today, both CRP and WRP are becoming victims of their own success. The number of acres allowed in both programs is limited by Congress and both are due "ill up" soon. However, many landowners are still interested in enrolling their lands, both for economic and conservation purposes. Bills recently introduced in Congress would raise the caps on acreage for both of these programs.

Officials from Ducks Unlimited, the continent's largest wetlands and waterfowl conservation group and other groups are recommending that the cap on CRP be raised from 36.4 million to 45 million actes. Likewise, they would like to see the WRP cap raised from 975,000 to 2 million acres.

"We are encouraging our members to contact their congressmen and urge them to support the expansion of CRP and WRP", says Matt Connolly, Executive Vice President of Ducks Unlimited. "These programs are examples of government programs that work for wildlife and work for people

Infantry Division in both World Wars. In 1917 the Division joined Gen. Pershing's A.E.F. and as it was being assigned to the Western Font, the Armistice was signed. It advanced more than 345 miles in the European Theater, taking 63,338 prisoners and liberating hundreds of towns. Veterans of the famous "Battle of the Bulge", crossing of the Mozelle and Rhine rivers, and the "lightening streak" in pursuit of the Nazis across the heart of Germany, fighting many bitter battles from the once impregnable Siegfried Line to the Czechoslovakia border.

The combat ability of the 87th Infantry Division was held in high regard by Gen. George Patton, Commander of the U.S. Third Army, and this Division received 3 Bronze Battle Stars for its most valiant efforts in the battles of the Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe.




Basketweaving will be taught
