Painting my special Christmas ornaments wasn't possible, I can't sit up long enough to get a straight shot at them. After about 4 hours of reading I was heartily sick of it! I don't watch TV much in the evenings, and I can't believe what's on daytime TV!

I discovered that being home alone and having fun means being home alone and healthy! Not being able to sit on the porch and watch the hummingbirds, wander for the kitchen with a snack, stroll out to the wash room to play with Teddy, my latest cast off kitten makes being alone no fun at all. What it translates to is that it isn't any fun to be alone unless one is also self sufficient, not helpless!

When Thomas came home late that night from work I was sooo glad to have some company. When he left to repeat the next day's work schedule I hated him to go. Each day someone appears to take me from my exercise machine, throw me a sandwich and then rushes back to work. It complicates their life worse than mine, too.

But, I don't particularly like being home alone this way. What I really can't figure out, though, is how, since it's only been five months since the first knee surgery, I could possibly have forgotten how lonely, frustrated and left out I felt!

Like I say, I need to be careful what I wish for. I have it. I can't wait to get back to work!

"Bodacious" inducted into ProRodeo Hall of Fame

Since the ProRodeo Hall of Fame first opened its doors in Colorado Springs, Colorado in 1979, rodeo's greatest athletes have been immortalized within its walls.

On August 14, on the Hall's 20th anniversary, six new inductees joined the legends who preceded them.

And included in the 1999 inductees was J31A, Dodge Bodacious, the baddest bull in the world of rodeo today.

Sammy Andrews of Addielou, owner of Bodacious, accepted the award on behalf of "Bo" during the induction ceremonies, accompanied by his wife, Carolyn.

Inductees were welcomed by more than 700 guests at the new location in the Hall's outdoor courtyard. Personal introductions gave way to video footage of each inductee's career, offering the spectators a glimpse into the past.

Bo was born in 1989 and at the height of his rodeo career, weighed in at 1,850 pounds. The famous Charbray bull brought home numerous awards during his active rodeo career, the highlight of which were consecutive Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association Bucking Bull of the Year honors in 1994 and 1995. He was also named National Finals Rodeo Bucking Bull of the Year for the same two years, along with being named the Texas Circuit Champion for 1994-95. He was named the Professional Bull Riders Bull of the Year in 1995.

In 1995, Bo bucked off three-time World Champion Bull Rider Tuff Hedeman at a bull riding, fracturing most of his face. Just a few weeks later at the National Finals Rodeo, Hedeman drew Bo again, but opted to take a no-score and "gate" the bull, in light of what had previously happened. Just two rounds later at the NFR, Bodacious knocked Scott Breeding unconscious and it was at that point that Andrews made the tough decision to retire Bo at the con-

clusion of the 1995 National Finals Rodeo.

His popularity hasn't diminished, though his presence in the arena spotlight has faded. Bodacious is still #1 in the minds of rodeo fans all across the country.

Bucking bulls are noted for possessing many qualities, such as strength, athletic ability, intuition, intelligence and heart, to name a few. But only the right combination in just the right amounts makes a champion bucking bull, and Bodacious got the mixture just right!

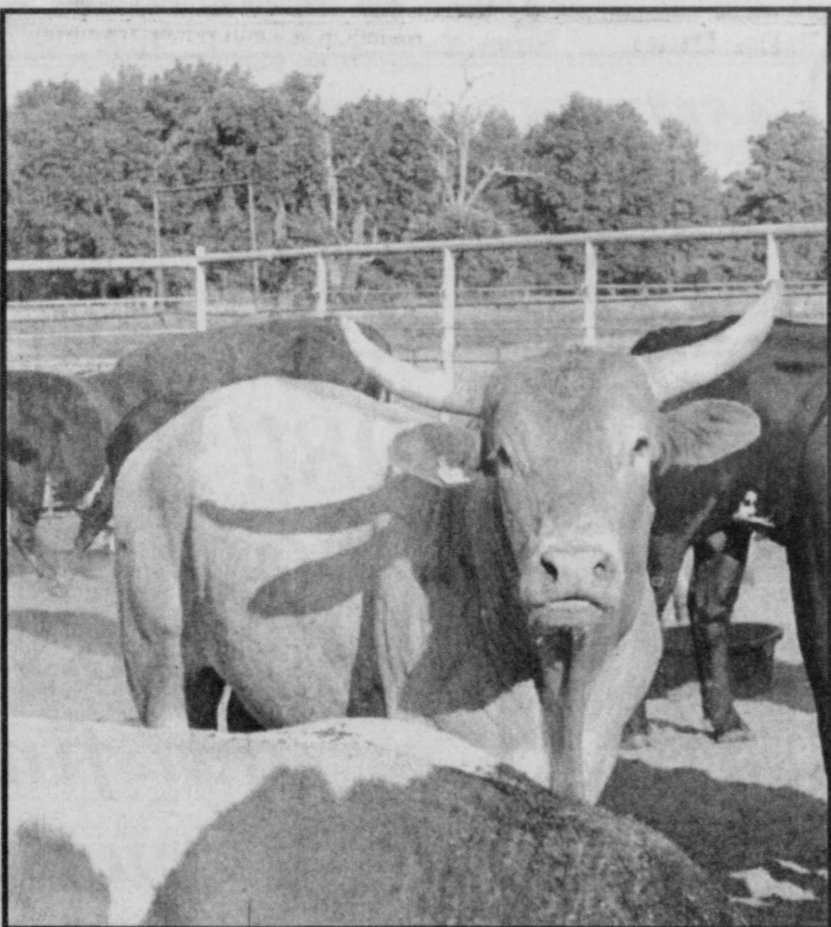
He has been featured in Sports Illustrated two times, GQ (Gentleman's Quarterly), Western Horseman and Penthouse, in addition to the "rodeo" oriented magazines.

In his career, Bo bucked off 127 of his 135 opponents, and most of those 127 fell short of making the two-second mark. His first two jumps out of the chute were awesome, and he got harder to ride from that point on.

And though Bo won't be competing himself anymore, he's left a legacy that only he could, a herd of young bucking bulls just waiting for their turn out of the chutes. Bull riders better not be squeamish, either, these "Baby Bo's" are loaded and ready.

Andrews humbly accepted a Casey Tibbs bronze on behalf of Bo and in his acceptance speech said "I guess I'll speak on behalf of Bodacious, seeing as how he'd probably wreck this place if we tried to bring him in here."

The other inductees joining Bodacious in the prestigious circle include PRCA announcer Hadley Barrett of Kersey, Colorado; rodeo producer Bob Thain of Reno, Nevada; saddle bronc rider Mel Hyland of Ponoka, Alberta, Canada; pickupman Charles "Lefty" Wilken of Hillsboro, New Mexico; and six time All Around Champion Cowboy Tom Ferguson of Miami, OK.

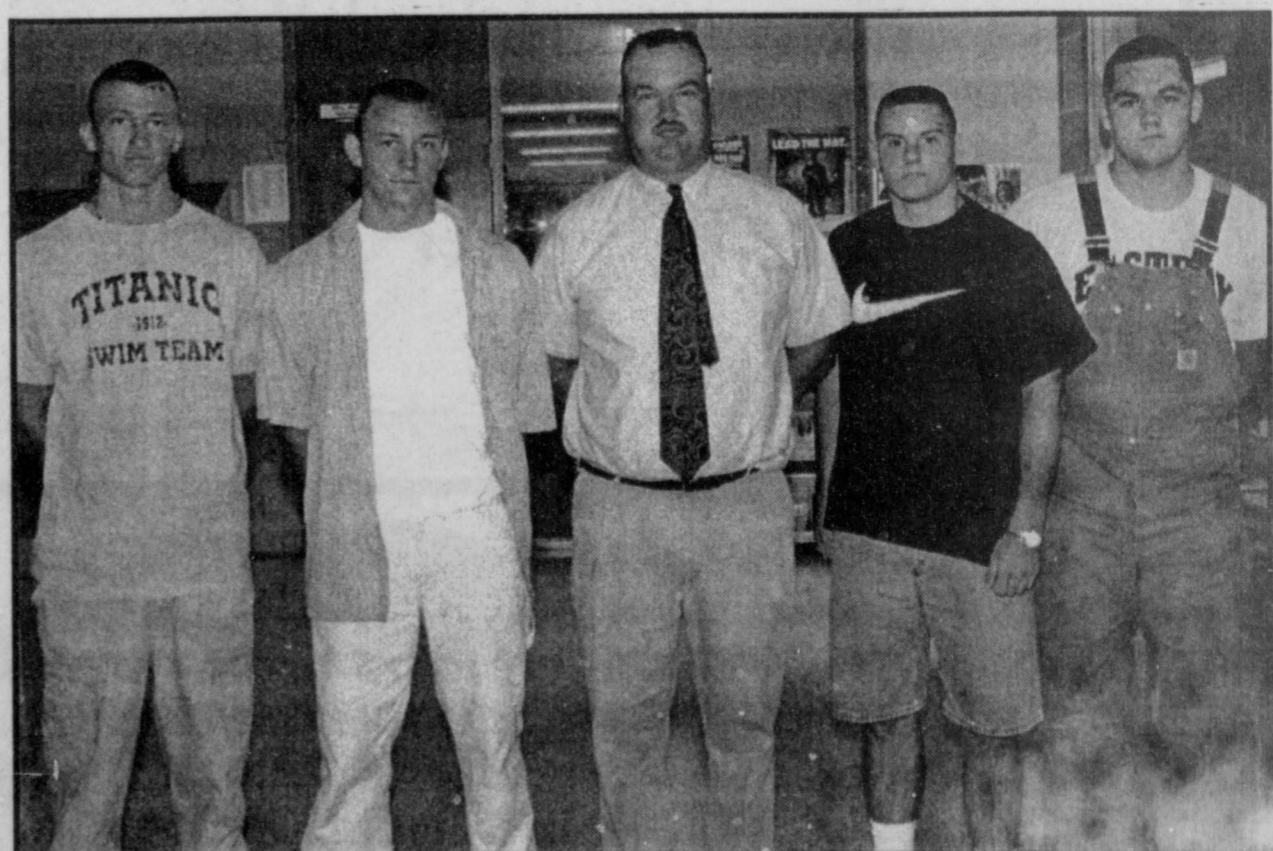

1 cup mushrooms, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 cups cooked string beans, 1/3 cup sour cream, 2 teaspoons chopped parsley...

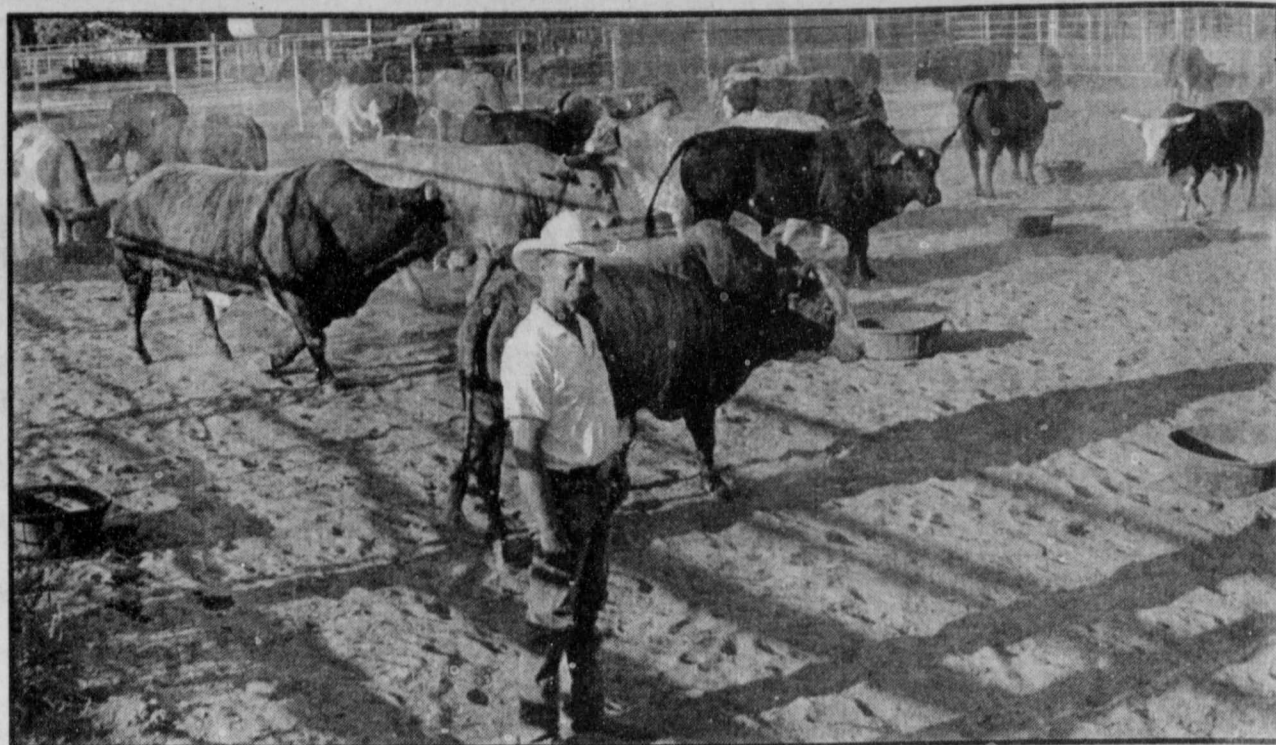

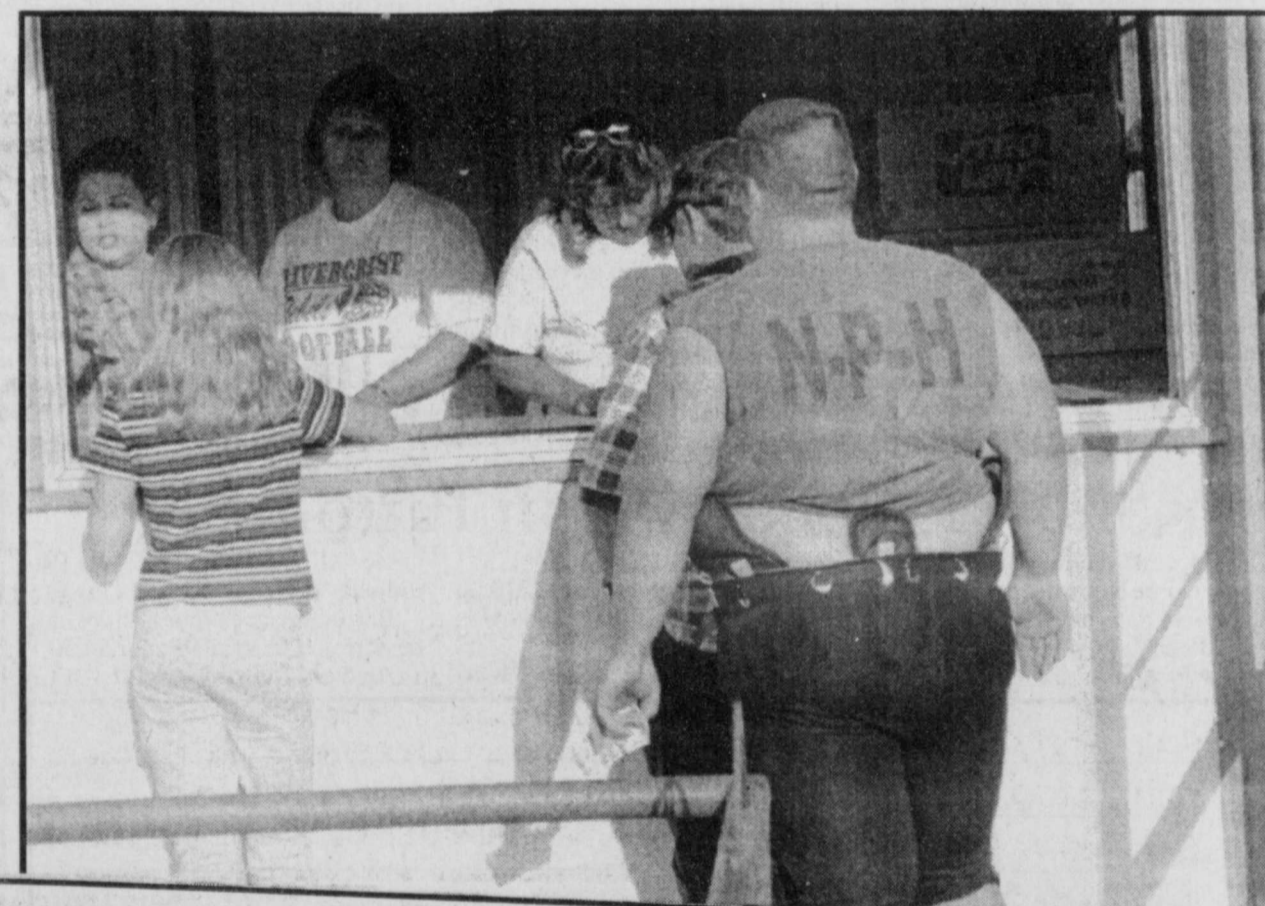

FOOTWEAR FOR DIABETICS
 For many people, buying shoes is a matter of fashion. If you like the way they look, never mind if they pinch a little here or rub a bit there. For people with diabetes, that kind of attitude can be deadly, as minor irritations can lead to life threatening infections. Diabetics should shop where sales staffs are knowledgeable about proper fit. Shoes should feel good in the store, no one should fall into the trap of thinking that a tight, slightly uncomfortable shoe will stretch to fit after wearing. Look for shoes with soft and flexible uppers, smooth linings, comfortable arch cushions, snug but not pinching heels, soles that flex at the ball, and a roomy toe box.

People sometimes don't realize how their feet mirror their body's general health. And when the body hurts, the pain demands attention, and it is especially important for diabetics to heed this demand. At DOCTORS FOOT CLINIC, we strongly recommend having foot problems attended to professionally to prevent them from becoming serious, as well as to keep a check on the rest of the body. 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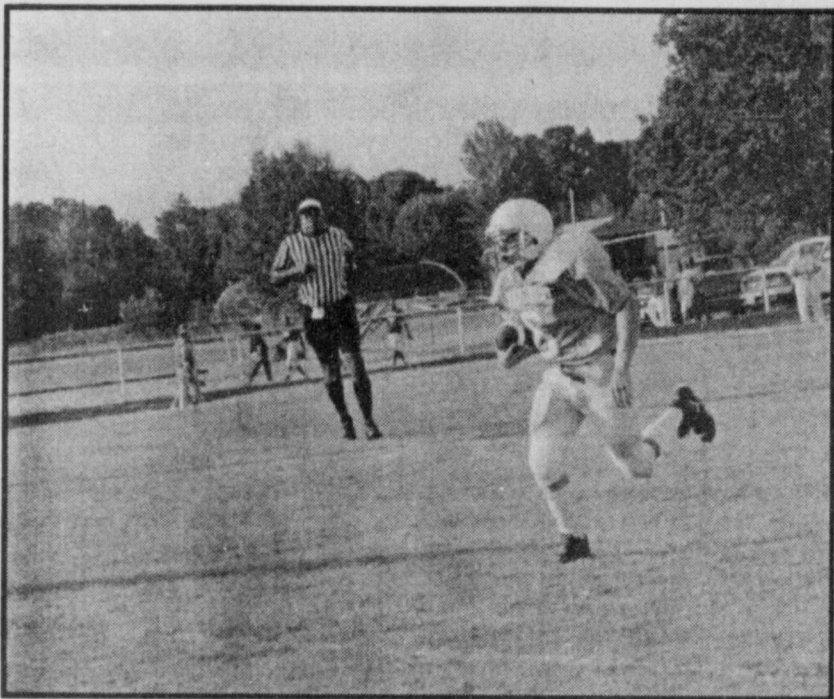
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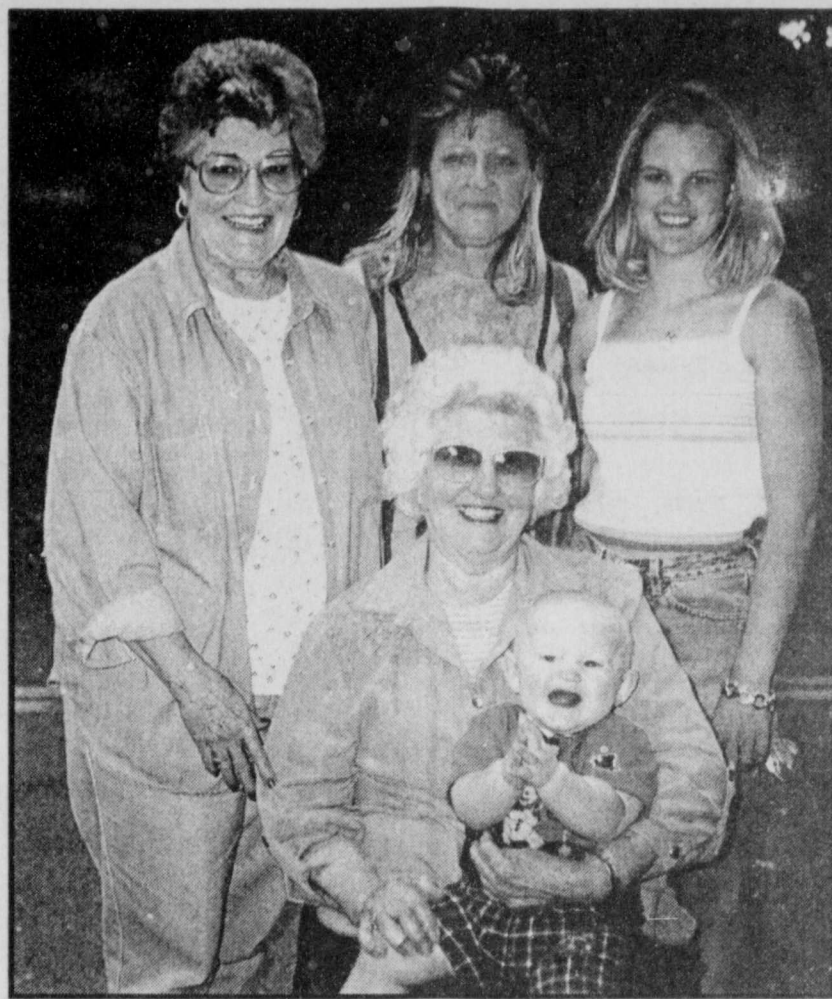

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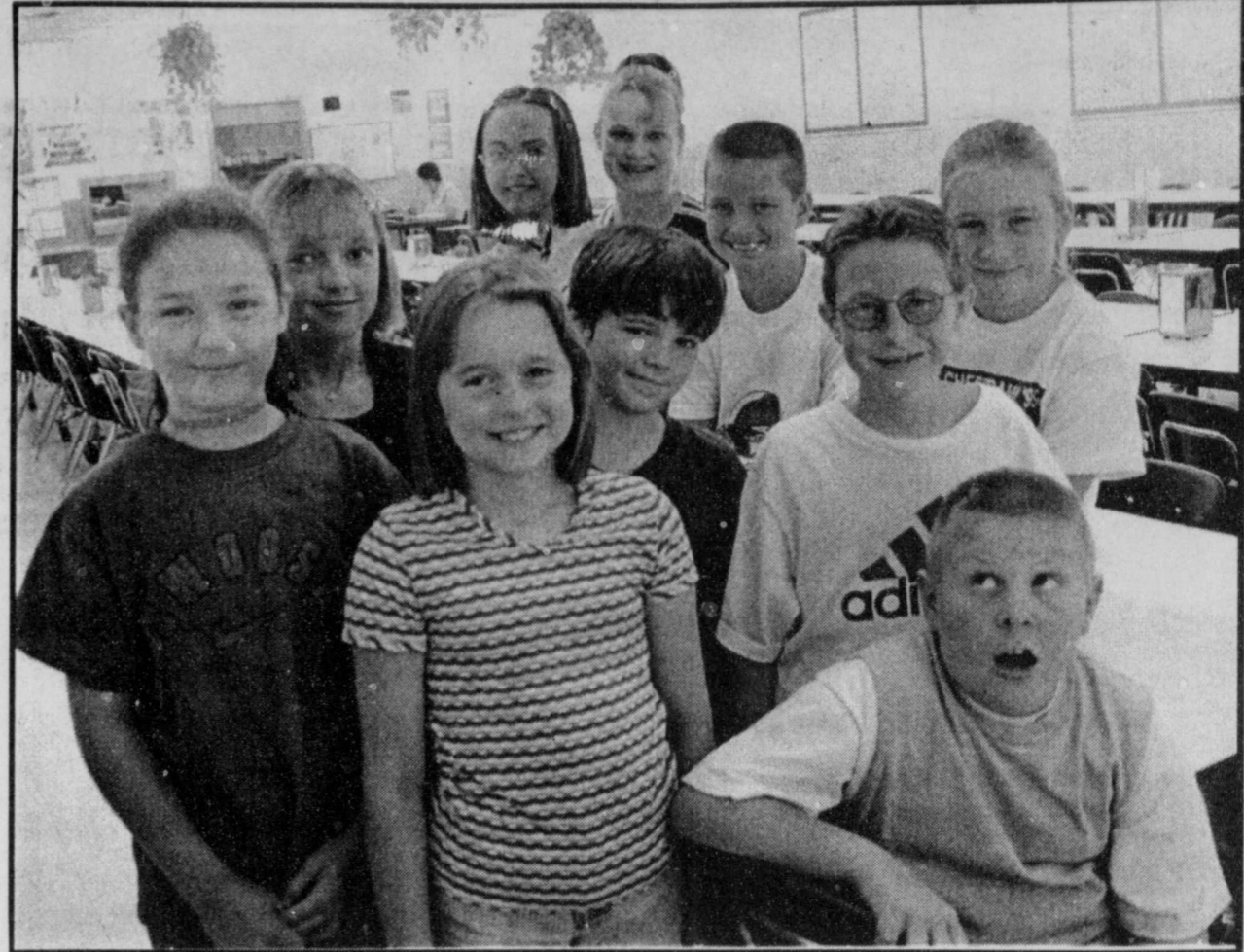
