Like the little boy in the movie "Home Alone" sometimes getting what you wish for just isn't quite as much fun as we think it is going to be.

The one small, bright spot in having my second knee replacement was, (I thought) the chance to have a little time to myself. You know, that precious time most of us simply don't have where we can get caught up on some reading, mending, some craft project there never seems time to do.

So, after the first few days of feeling so bad I would have had to make substantial improvement to die, I was all ready for some alone time.

My husband strapped me into the CPM machine, which slowly flexes the leg back and forth, back and forth, then took off for work. Somehow, the joy of having uninterrupted reading time was tempered by the fact the only way to read was by holding the book up above my face, since I was flat on my back. Even getting a drink form a glass of iced tea was a clumsy, uncomfortable ordeal. After my machine time my sister-in-law Mary came and got me unstrapped from the torture machine. Then she had to go back to work. More alone time. Painting my special Christmas ornaments wasn't possible, I can't sit up long enough to get a straight shot at them. Embroidery was much the same, about half an hour and I was worn out from the uncomfortable way I had to sit. I crawled back into bed and settled down with a book. After about 4 hours of reading I was heartily sick of it! I don't watch TV much in the evenings, and I can't believe

what's on daytime TV! I discovered that being me alone and having fur means being home alone and healthy! Not being able to sit on the porch and watch the hummingbirds, wander for the kitchen with a snack, stroll out to the wash room to play with Teddy, my latest cast off kitten makes being alone no fun at all. What it translates to is that it isn't any fun to be alone unless one is also self sufficient, not helpless!

When Thomas came home late that night from work I was sooo glad to have some company. When he left to repeat the next day's work schedule I hated for him to go. Each day someone appears to take me from my exercise machine, throw me a sandwich and then rushes back to work. It complicates their life worse than mine, too.

But, I don't particularly like being home alone this way. What I really can't figure out, though, is how, since it's only been five months since the first knee surgery, I could possible have forgotten how lonely, frustrated and left out I felt!

Like I say, I need to be careful what I wish for. I have it. I can't wait to get back to work!




