NURSING HOME ABUSE

As for-profit corporations have taken over the nursing home market in Texas, the motivation to make bigger and bigger profits has slowly drained resources away from patient care. In fact, a GAO Report disclosed in a Congressional investigation in March of 1999 found that 40% of nursing homes (in California, Texas, Pennsylvania and Michigan), cited for patient abuse and neglect, were repeat offenders in recent years. As a result, Texas has seen a wave of injuries and deaths involving nursing home neglect and abuse.

If you, or your loved ones, have been a victim of nursing home abuse, you might have a claim against the nursing home for negligence. 

ICA testifies against

Canadian cattle

Chuck Kiker, President of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas testified recently before the International Trade Commission in

washington, D.C. The hearings before ITC were the result of a Countervailing Duty and Antidumping Duty petition filed last year by the Ranchers-Cattlemen Action Legal Fund and ICA against the Canadian cattle industry.

"We are here because our industry is in great trouble and because dumped cattle from Canada, in excess of one million head and nearly \$1 billion dollars annually, are sig-

nificantly contributing to our industry's troubles," said R-CALF President Leo McDonnell, Jr.

Since petitions were filed last October, live cattle imports from Canada are down by more than 25% and prices in the market are up pretty

The U.S. Department of Commerce has issued a prelimianry ruling in favor of R-CALF and ICA and has been collecting tariffs on Canadian cattle since July 1. The final ruling by the ITC is expected on November 8, 1999.







The Death Penalty in Texas #8 Witnesses

Witnesses to the execution should dress conservatively (no tank tops; no cutoffs/shorts, no see-through fabrics, no exercise clothing, no sleeveless tops). Only those persons approved to witness the execution shall be permitted into the Witness Rooms.

Witnesses cannot take purses, cameras, pictures, pocket knives, beepers, cell phones, signs or tape recorders into the Witness Room.

All witnesses shall be subject to a "pat" search prior to entering the Witness

Rooms. It is advisable that nothing be in the witnesses' pockets (wallet and keys

Victim witnesses shall be escorted into the Witness Room at a time separate from the witnesses of the condemned person. Victim witnesses do not ever see the condemned person's witnesses.

On e inside the Witness Room, all witnesses shall remain until the process is

Witnesses shall refrain from verbal outbursts or any inappropriate action during the execution process. Witnesses who arrive and are determined to be under the influence of drugs or

alcohol may not be allowed to view the execution. All witnesses must be approved by the ID Director
