Pointers For Parents **Avoiding Pillow Problems**

In a study it was found that nearly half of Americans surveyed never wash their pillow.


· Since drool, sweat, mildew and bacteria can permeate pillowcases, it's imperative to wash pillows in hot water (130 degrees F.) every three to six months.

• It's also important to inspect your pillows twice a year, for example the first day of spring and the first day of fall. Wash stained or discolored pillows, and replace pillows that are flat, lumpy or torn.

Consider replacing your pillows every one to three years.



ETMC to open pulmonary unit

The opening of the Pulmonary Health and Rehabilitation Program will occur on May 1, 2000. The program will offer a comprehensive exercise regime that is tailored to the needs of the individual participant. The participant will be enrolled ion the program through physician referral and undergo a preadmission evaluation, which will consist of a physical assessment by the professional staff, a Pulmonary Function test and a Graded Exercise test.

From this information the staff will determine the participant's Maximal Exercise Tolerance and tailor the program to meet the needs and tolerance level of the participant. The participant will also be interviewed to ascertain the goals and expectations of the individuals in order that the staff can work with the participant in attaining these goals.

The facilities for the program will be located on the second floor of the ETMC-Clarksville campus. Included in the equipment will be a recumbent step machine, a bicycle ergometer an arm ergometer, a treadmill, weights and resistance trainers for strength training, mats for stretching exercise and steps for step aerobics. Participants with heart problems will be monitored by telemetry through all of their activities and the professional staff is always in attendance to encouraged the participant and insure a safe workout.


