Crane, Lewis & Haynes take positions in Bogata city government

Three hundred and thirteen voters of the 638 registered to vote in Bogata turned out Saturday, May 6th, and elected two new council members and a new Mayor.

Jack Crane, who has been serving as a member of the council, was unopposed in his bid for mayor, as current Mayor Mike Garretson did not run again.

Two places on the council were open, and there were six people running for those two places.

Charles D. Lewis garnered 162

votes, and John L. Haynes received 128 votes to place them on the council.

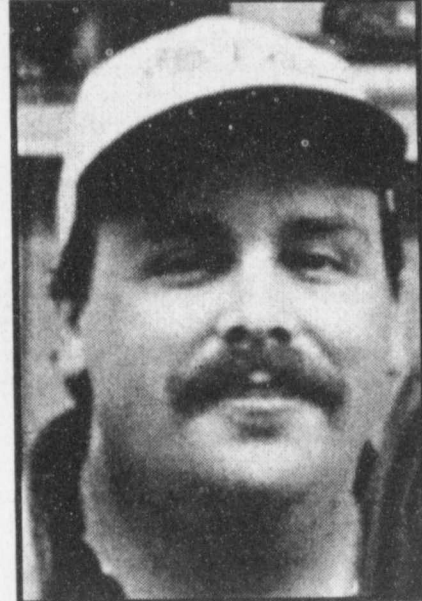
Receiving 92 votes was incumbent Tracie Osborne, who had been appointed to the council. Incumbent W.T. Harbison had 88 votes, Roland Screws 63 and Gina Allen 56 votes.

Another item on the Saturday ballot was a 1/2 cent Sales Tax proposition to help fund the police department.

This measure passed 154 for and 49 against.

Methodists dedicate new offices/library

Members of the First United Methodist Church of Bogata gathered on Palm Sunday to dedicate the new office and library facility built in the former home of John and Wretha Watkins. Located next to the church on North Main Street, the church purchased the home from the Watkins' daughter, Virginia Alexander.

Replacing the tiny offices located in the church and parsonage, the remodeled home houses the church office and the pastor's office. The connection between the church and this structure goes back way before the church purchased the property. The house was originally built by Vernon and Myrtle Thedford, prominent Bogata citizens. Mrs. Thedford had a parrot named Polly who was quite accomplished at singing and whistling. One of the parrot's favorite tunes was "The Old Rugged Cross". Given these were pre-air-condition-

ing days, the sounds of singing and the church organ could be heard floating out the open windows of the church. As the house is located only 40 feet from the church building, what could also be heard in the church was the singing coming from the Thedford's home, the singing of Polly.

Whenever the organ began playing, the parrot would contribute its ministry of music by singing and whistling "The Old Rugged Cross". Accounts from those who remember these "specials" indicate the parrot was indeed Methodist in the greatest Wesleyan tradition as it followed John Wesley's directions for singing hymns, especially direction #4, Sing lustily and with a good courage.

Grants awarded for courthouse renovation

The Texas Historical Commission has announced the grant recipients of the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program. Matching grants totaling more than \$42 million were awarded to 19 counties to restore and preserve their historic county courthouses. Local counties to receive funds in Round 1 of the program include Hopkins and Red River.

Grant recipients will submit architectural plans and specifications for improvements on the courthouse to the THC and construction will begin in 2001.

THC architects who have made broad assessments of the structures estimate the cost to repair and restore all of the state's historic courthouses could exceed \$750 million.

Easy White Bread

4 cups milk
2 tablespoon shortening
12 cups Bread flour
2 packages dry yeast
4 tablespoons sugar
4 teaspoons salt

Scald milk and add shortening. Set aside to cool. (baby bath temperature) In large mixing bowl combine 6 cups flour, sugar, salt and yeast. Beat in milk/shortening mixture. Gradually stir in remaining flour until dough is moderately stiff. Turn out on floured surface. Knead, adding flour until dough is elastic. Return to well greased bowl to rise to double. Punch down and allow to rise to double again. Punch down and divide into 4 on greased surface. Allow to rest while you grease 4 loaf pans. Knead and shape in loaves. Set aside to rise. Cover dough with damp cloth while rising. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Fruit Impossible Pie

1 cup milk
2 eggs
1/2 cup Bisquick
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 can -21 ounces favorite pie filling
Heat oven to 400 degrees. Blend milk, eggs, bisquick, sugar, butter, and extract in blender for 15 seconds or beat with mixer 1 minute at high speed. Pour into greased 10 inch pie pan. Spoon filling over top. Bake for 25-30 minutes until golden brown.

Dump Cake

1 can crushed pineapple
1 can cherry pie filling
1 box yellow cake mix-dry
2 sticks melted butter-oleo
pecan pieces
cocoanut
Grease a 9x13 pan. Pour ingredients in order given evenly, but do not mix. Bake for one hour at 350 degrees.

Chocolate Chippers

1 cup shortening
1 cup white sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups sifted flour
1-1/2 teaspoon soda
1-1/2 cups chocolate chips
1 cup nuts

Cream shortening, sugars, eggs and vanilla until light and fluffy. Sift together dry ingredients. Stir into creamed mixture. Blend well. Add chocolate chips and nuts. Drop from teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 10-12 minutes.

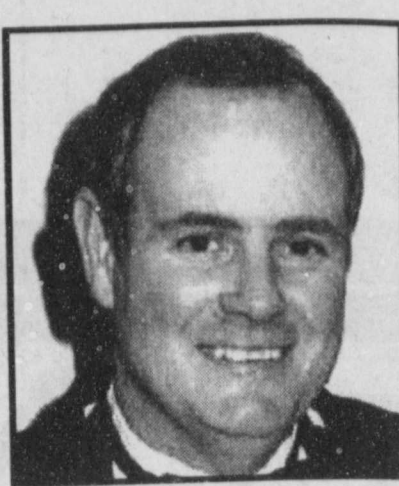
Peanut Butter Crisscrosses

1 cup shortening
1 cup white sugar
1 cup brown sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup peanut butter
3 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons soda
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening, sugars, eggs and vanilla. Stir in peanut butter. Sift dry ingredients; stir into creamed mixture. Drop by teaspoonfuls on ungreased cookie sheet. Press with back of fork dipped into a cinnamon/sugar mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Makes 5 dozen.

Simply Scalloped Potatoes

6-8 potatoes
1-2 onions
1 can creamy onion soup(Campbell's)
1 can milk
bread crumbs
Peel and slice potatoes and onions. Parboil and drain. Add soup and once can milk. Reheat. Place in oven-safe dish. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and brown in oven. May add bacon bits, ham or sausage before reheating.

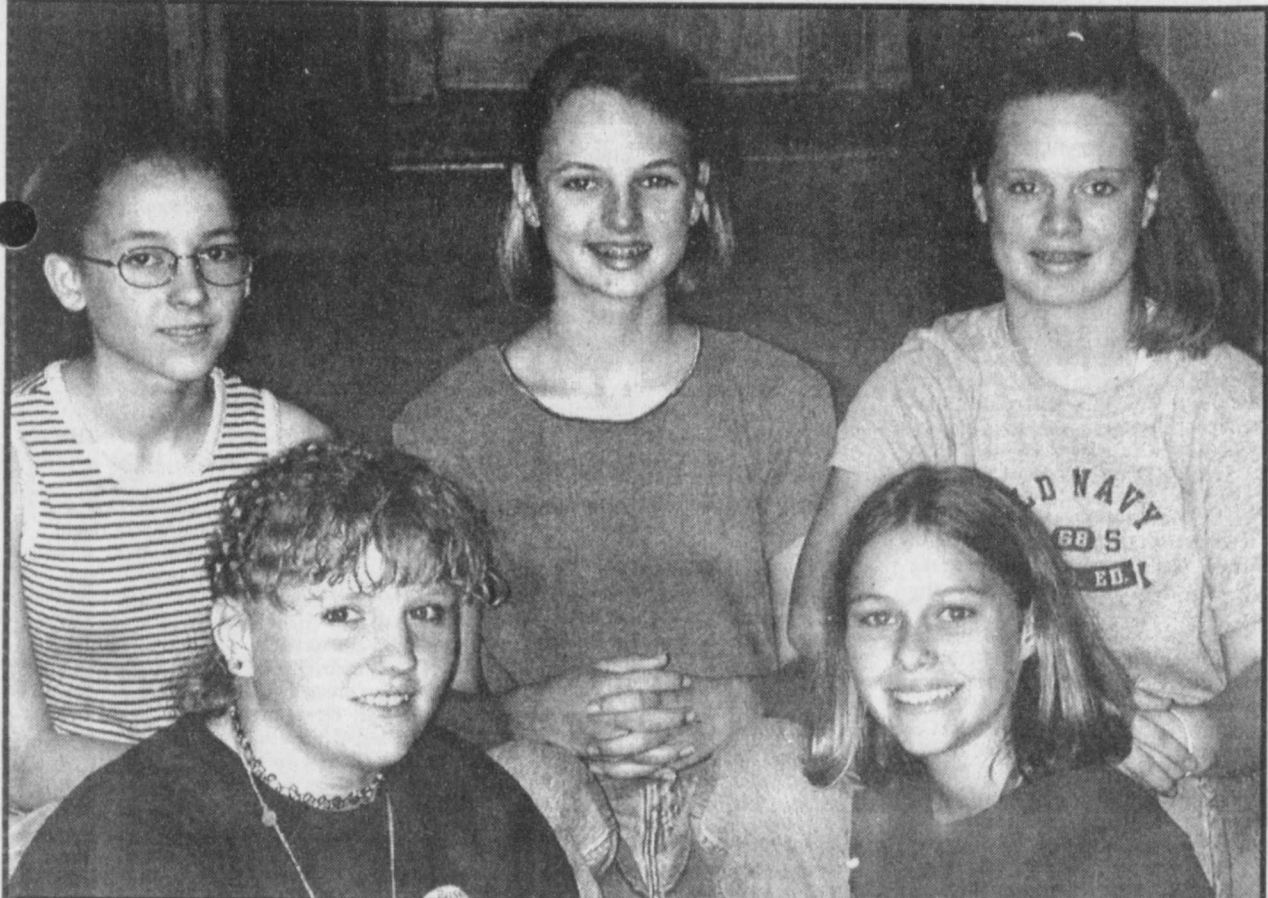

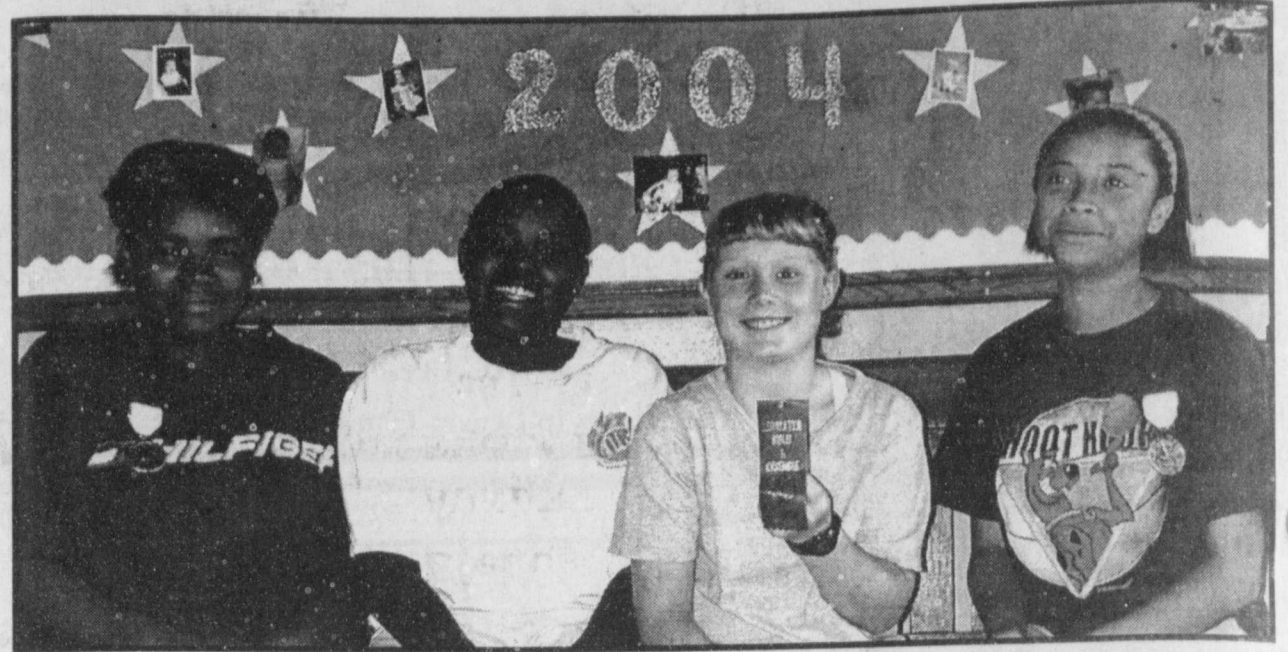
RHS class of 1985 to hold 15 year reunion

The evening event for those who have reserved a meal will start at 7:00 p.m.

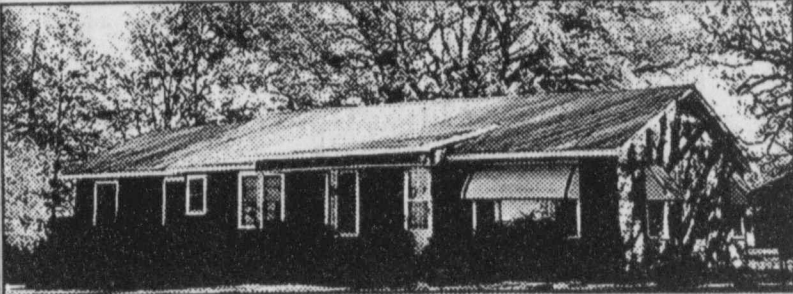

ETMC to open pulmonary unit

The opening of the Pulmonary Health and Rehabilitation Program will occur on May 1, 2000. The program will offer a comprehensive exercise regime that is tailored to the needs of the individual participant. The participant will be enrolled in the program through physician referral and undergo a preadmission evaluation, which will consist of a physical assessment by the professional staff, a Pulmonary Function test and a Graded Exercise test.

From this information the staff will determine the participant's Maximal Exercise Tolerance and tailor the program to meet the needs and tolerance level of the participant. The participant will also be interviewed to ascertain the goals and expectations of the individuals in order that the staff can work with the participant in attaining these goals.

The facilities for the program will be located on the second floor of the ETMC-Clarksville campus. Included in the equipment will be a recumbent step machine, a bicycle ergometer, an arm ergometer, a treadmill, weights and resistance trainers for strength training, mats for stretching exercise and steps for step aerobics. Participants with heart problems will be monitored by telemetry through all of their activities and the professional staff is always in attendance to encourage the participant and insure a safe workout.
