DEATH AND FUNERAL OF MRS. J. N. ELLIS

Died in El Paso Last Friday and
Interment Occurred in This
City Sunday Morning

Mrs. Margaret A. Ellis was born Dec. 27th, 1861 in Fannin County, Texas, and was married to Jasper N. Ellis, in 1877.

To this union were born seven children, of whom five are now living: Mrs. Edna Brockman in Idaho, Ira N. Ellis at Richmond, Texas, Mrs. Jesty Irby at Italy, Texas, Mrs. Annie Westbrook at Rule, Texas, and Miss Husie Ellis, who will live with her sister at Rule.

She died in El Paso, Texas, Oct. 8th, 1915. The body was brought to Haskell for burial. The funeral services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. J. F. Lloyd, in the little Presbyterian church of which she was a member, and where she had worshipped for the last half of her life; and as God would have it the services took place at the hour of regular Sabbath morning services, a fitting time to turn back to God that which is his own.

The family has lived in Haskell for the past twenty-five

years until the last few months. Being one of the old families of the country, they are so well known that little need be said. During all this time there has been no bad conduct or disgrace in the family, all living upright lives, and this is enough to commend them to any community. Few families can say as much as this.

Mrs. Ellis was a charter member of the Presbyterian church in Haskell and continued an honored member till death. She was humble in estimating herself, charitable towards others, ready to forgive an injury, ready for any good work. To know was to love her, hence all who knew her were her warm friends. For many years she had been in bad health and was a constant sufferer. Amidst the trials of life and constant suffering, instead of growing sour and bitter she steadily grew sweeter and more forbearing. She was a diligent student of the bible and meditated much on its truths. At last like a ripe shock of corn she was gathered up and taken to her everlasting home for which she had made diligent preparations for so many years.

"I can see no reason," he said, "why some of the enterprising citizens of this section do not start a movement looking to the establishment of some industries of this nature. It has been demonstrated that this is the greatest grain country of all and for cotton it can't be beat."

WHEN FALL PLOWING IS ADVISABLE

A friend asks us if we recommend fall plowing. Our answer is that we do and we don't; it all depends.

In the dry regions of central and west Texas and parts of Oklahoma, deep fall breaking as a means of catching and holding the fall and winter rains for the crop the following year is undoubtedly advisable. Likewise, anywhere in the Cotton Belt, rich, level lands with an abundance of vegetable matter that should be well rotted before spring may very profitably be plowed in the fall.

On the other hand, there are all over the South millions of acres of rolling sandy loam cotton and corn lands on which we doubt if fall breaking will be profitable,—at least we feel sure there are other practices that will pay better. On a rolling field already deficient in plant food and humus, we are convinced that fall plowing and leaving the soil exposed to the washing, leaching winter rains is a poor practice. On such lands a far better plan would be to plant a cover crop of clover, vetch, rye or oats, turning these under the following spring.

As we have repeatedly pointed out, the South's great potential agricultural advantage lies in its ability to grow crops for twelve months in the year, and any system of farming is defective that prevents our doing this. So, on our average lands, we would say that if fall plowing and winter cover crops can go together, we see no very serious objection to the fall breaking; but if it must come to a choice between the two, give us the cover crops every time.—Progressive Farmer.

BONDED WAREHOUSE NOW A POSSIBILITY

Meeting Was Held in City Monday to Organize Stock Company to Handle Proposition

On Monday, Oct. 11, a meeting of the following named gentlemen was held in Haskell to discuss the organization of a stock company to operate a bonded warehouse under the permanent warehouse law of Texas, in Haskell: G. R. Couch, R. C. Montgomery, F. G. Alexander, Hardy Grissom, Courtney Hunt, R. E. Sherrill, E. F. Lamm, J. W. Tarbet, D. Anderson, J. R. Johnson, John McGregor, V. J. Josselet, Dave Josselet and Geo. E. Courtney.

Geo. E. Courtney stated the object of the meeting and introduced J. L. Armstrong, who is a representative of the State Warehouse and Marketing Department. Mr. Armstrong, in turn, made some explanations of the workings of the warehouse law.

G. R. Couch acted as chairman and Geo. E. Courtney as secretary of the meeting.

A motion was made and carried for the business men of Haskell and the farmers of Haskell County to co-operate together and organize a bonded warehouse company, and either build or buy a warehouse. After a general discussion of the details of the matter, it was moved and carried for the chairman to appoint two committees of three men each, to solicit or sell stock, one to be known as the town committee, to sell stock among the business men of Haskell, and the other to be known as the farmers' committee, to solicit and sell stock among the farm-

ers. The town committee, as appointed by the chairman, is composed of R. C. Montgomery, F. G. Alexander and Courtney Hunt. The farmers' committee, as appointed, is composed of E. F. Lamm, John McGregor and Geo. E. Courtney.

It was agreed that the two committees would do all they could in the matter of selling stock this week and report to each other in a meeting of the two committees, to be held Monday morning Oct. 18th.

This meeting was called by a few farmers, and to show their faith in a bonded warehouse to be operated under the laws of the State, they presented a subscription list showing the names of eighty-four farmers taking stock in the proposed company, proposing to buy the warehouse and four lots from the Farmers' Supply Company.

With each one promising to support the movement, adjournment was taken, to meet Oct. 18th.
