I suppose it was easy for us to become self-satisfied and over-secure. After all, the cold war was over, World War II something in a history book, and Viet Nam...well, we wanted to forget about that as much as possible.

There was a brief resurgence in national pride back during Desert Storm, but then we sank right back into our apathy.

It's different now, with over 6,000 people dead. We watch the stories unfold, we fear for the future, we want to punish someone, but it's hard to do.

So, we turn to Patriotic displays, as we should. Instead of standing looking bored while the National

Anthem plays, sports fans stand at attention, singing with tears coursing down their cheeks.

Instead of passing our flags day by day with never a glance, we look in pride at those glorious colors as they fly from pubic buildings, private homes, cemeteries.

We are a nation, united, proud, strong. We can stay that way, if we will.

There are things we must get ready for. The sight of our flag draped on coffins will most probably be one of them. We must prepare for months, and years of work. and it will require sacrifice from all of us.

But, our patriotism must be heartfelt and real. We must continue to feel it, and accept the responsibilities that go with it.

For the first time in many years, there is an upsurge in buying American made products. Why has it taken this terrible tragedy to make us realize that we provide Americans with jobs when we buy U.S. products?

Keep flying those flags, and get ready to do whatever sacrificing is necessary. We've been complacent too long, and now we have to accept the responsibilities that come with living in this great nation. Let's do it! And OH, don't those colors look beautiful!

My family and I want you to know that we think of you and your country. Some say that time can cure pains and sufferings. Not in this case. Someone has to be punished for those crimes.


May the victims and their families find peace and the courage to accept.

Those events could happen to other countries all over the world, that's why, in this great moment of sadness and unbearable pain, American people need to know they have friends thinking of them and sharing their pain.


