The World's Record

Help ease up the tight monetary conditions, by paying your obligation as soon as you can. It will make money matters loosen up if everybody will do this.

The people of the old world are starving in war. They have been taught it is great to go to war and get shot and shoot people. It may be grand and certain the iron cross of the German Emperor or honorable mention by a British General will be most comforting to the widows and orphans of the dead soldiers?

The most able labor leaders of the country are attending the convention at Philadelphia. The tone of the discussion and of the resolutions show a high order of intellect. The speakers are free of prejudice and show that the laboring class is making progress in intelligence and fair discussion of the vital problems. This accounts for the slow progress of some radical appeals being made to labor for selfish reasons.

When the bank loans a dollar to a farmer to pay for cotton picking, it is paid to a cotton picker, who spends it with the local merchant, who pays it to the bank for a loan made last summer, and it is loaned again to the farmer and makes the round again. Liquidation is going on daily. The cotton is bringing in a little money, and gradually the situation is improving. The trade with the local merchants is increasing in volume, and gradually business is getting back to the normal. Our subscribers are coming around and paying up their subscription accounts. The great majority of them do this once a year. Some are slow, and a few fail to pay. A few who fail to pay do so from some misfortune, and we most cheerfully forgive such

debtors. We personally know many of our subscribers and know how to make allowances. Yes, we get pretty well acquainted with the people and so does the merchant. A man makes his own character, and the business man fixes the estimate nearly correct. Prompt or slow tendency may run in a family. Some are known as slow pay, some as inclined to dispute at least one item every time he settles an account, and he is charged extra for his goods and the clerks are instructed not to encourage him or his family to trade much. When you get the money, go pay a debt and do it cheerfully. It will help your credit. To get away from the credit system, the people will have to be more provident in the future than they have been in the past.

It is said that Glynn, the democratic nominee for Governor of New York, who was defeated in the late election in that state, was a Catholic, and that the Protestants made a fight against him on this ground, and that this accounts for the election of Whitman, the republican nominee. The Menace, an anti-Catholic publication, claims credit for raising the issue and injecting it into politics. The New York World, a leading democratic paper, deplors the injection of religious issues in politics. The Menace charges that the Catholics have always been in politics and urges Protestants to get in and meet the Catholics.

The Great war in Europe has brought to humanity a blessing, that will in time fully compensate humanity for all the sacrifices a worldwide war can bring. The Czar of Russia has issued an edict against the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages, and has closed all the government saloons. Partial prohibition has already wonderfully improved the condition of the people, and when the war came on, the Czar took steps to restrict its use, and the benefit to all of his subjects was so great, and the financial and moral condition of the people have so improved, that he has issued an edict putting in force absolute prohibition. Emperor William of Germany has forbidden the use of liquor in his army and navy. The "Grape Juice" policy is spreading. The Swiss have shown that a company of soldiers after a period of total abstinence, scored an average of 23 hits in 30 shots. The company was then given, in the evening a glass of beer and a glass likewise the next morning. In the evening following, they shot, making only an average of three hits in a possible 30. After a period of abstinence, they again made an average of 26 hits.
