That continued well into the 1980s.



William H. (Happy) Brown, age 74 of Bogata died at his residence Thursday, May 16.



of the city I stayed, most people lived in small blocked homes with hard tiled floors and little (if any) furniture. The houses had electricity that would occasionally go out each day. They did have running water and indoor plumbing, but not like ours (I'll go no further). No toilet paper or towelswere used. The raw sewage ran into ditches between the house and the street. Animals were every where; dogs, cows, water buffalo. The animals ate the waste and the garbage thrown out on the streets. Some people sleep on the road sides, as well as the cattle, goats and other animals.

In the countryside areas that I visited most people lived in banana leaf huts. These huts had no electricity, no running water, no indoor or outdoor toilet facilities. But, the government did pay for each village to have one T.V. The T.V. was in its own special hut large enough to protect it from the elements and the people sat on the dirt under the stars to watch TV.

In the city most men wore dhotis (a long dress, usually down to the feet), or American (western) clothing. The women wore beautiful dresses and other garments off silks and other nice materials. Most wore sandals and kicked them off before going into any building.

In the country, dress varied. The men typically wore a dhoti. Some wore not much more than a loin cloth. The women dressed often modestly, but in poorer materials than their city sisters. Others were topless. Many lived on about the equivalent of 25 of our cents perday in the country (in the city the middle class might live on 5 US dollars per day). Those in the country often did not own shoes or sandals. Life Span/Appearance-Their life span is very short. I am told that most die in their 50's.

One for fertility; another to go to if you want to be blessed with a job; another to protect against evil spirits-bring your gift and you can be blessed.

> India is also either the 2nd or 3rd largest Muslim community in the world (depending on which list you look at). Indonesia is first, some put Pakistan second by numbers and then India. The Muslim community is a very small part percentage-wise of India.

My Lessions-68 of my lessons were presented during the day to member of the church, mainly, but not exclusively to men. These lessons were on: study of Titus; the qualifications of shepherd and deacons; the work of and relationship of shepherds, deacons, preachers and members; personal evangelism; church discipline; current issues there in the church (they gave to me); and a Question and Answer session. Many took the entire period off from their work to attend these leadership classes. Many traveled great distances to be there. 60 men and women completed all the leadership classes, all these received a graduation certificate. The church at Erode, after prayer and fasting, appointed two elders and six deacons. One of the leaders is retiring from his job early so that he can shepherd full time. Other churches in the area were also selecting and appointing men. I was scheduled to have 12 "open air meetings". I envisioned speaking to hundreds or perhaps thousands each night. What actually took place was somewhat different than expectations. They took me each night to some small banana-leaf hut village, I spoke to a tribal group of perhaps 15 or 20 or 30 souls each night. I went to a different village each night. I sometime spoke under the stars while they sat on the ground. At other times I would sit on a chair in a one room house; they would sit on the ground from my feet and out the door. These lessons were aimed at winning souls to Christ. The results: (1) There were 66 baptisms (63 of the 66 were Hindus, 3 were denominational people tired of denominationalism, they simply wanted to be New Testament Christians, nothing more or less); of these, 39 were men and 27 women. The ages broke down this way; 3 were in their sixties; 1 was in his fifties; 7 were in their forties; 13 were in their thirties; 24 were in their twenties and 18 were in their teens. (2) One new church was established. One of the men from Erode has agreed to work with this newly planted church and help them mature. (3) A building up on the brethren's faith in the power of the Word. To God be the glory! The Gospel will change people when preached (by the way, if you are wondering the percentage of Christians there that remain faithful is much higher there than here! I understand that the retention there is between 70 and 80%. The retention rate here is between 40 and 50%. People take their decision very serious there, to obey the Gospel means being shunned from family and sometimes persecution). The Blunders-Blunder one: I backed very hard into a policeman , so hard in fact, that I knocked his billy club out of his hand! He had a machine gun in the other hand!! But no difficulty occurred. The government has had to make sonograms illegal because so many were using this to selectively abort if the unborn be female. Also, some place cow urine and dung upon themselves to receive blessings from the gods (they worship the female cow).

They are a superstitious people that believes that earthquakes are caused by their god holding up the world, getting tired and having to shift hands. They believe if an elephant's snout touches the head of a person, that person is blessed. They worship the elephant.

The Barber Shop-The barber shop was interesting. They cut everyone's hair with the same scissors without sanitizing them between cuts. They shaved every face and every man's underarms (that's right--underarms!) with the same razor blade, then wiped the blade off and went on to the next customer. They did shave me with a new blade however.

While I am speaking of the barber ship, a young Hindu was in the middle of a hair cut, when he saw me come in. He got up and wanted me to go first because I was an American and a guest in his country. But, I insisted that he finish.

When one gets his hair cut, he must thoroughly bath with water and change clothes before entering any home of a Hindu. The hair clippings, to them represent evil spirits. They think if such clippings get into their home that bad

things will happen to that home.

Interesting Notes-While on the plane returning to London, an Indian man now living in the US asked me what we believed. I told him. He said I need to find out about the Syrian Christians. He said they simply referred to themselves as Christians, but all others call them Syrian Christians. Supposedly, they fled Syria in the first century A.D. due to the persecutions. They traveled by ship down the Persian Gulf and ended up in Western India, in what is now Cochin. He said that they seem to worship and practice as we do, though there are not very many of them. He said their history goes back to the first century A.D. and that they have continued to worship there ever since. Another tidbit, did you know that there is good evidence that the Apostie Thomas took the Gospel into Persia (Iran), Parthia (corresponds to Iran and Turkmenistan) and India? In fact, there is a monument erected for him in Madras, India. The Thompson chain-reference Bible says, "Tradition says he labored in Parthia, Persia and India suffering martyrdom near Madras at Mt. St. Thomas.' Honor and Persecution-Each state is different and city to city the treatment of Christians is different as well. I heard of people being evicted from their homes and yes, an occasional death due to Hindu persecution in some areas. The persecution does not come from the Indian government but from the people themselves. It is illegal in India for a foreigner to baptize an Indian. I did not find that out until I had baptized many. After finding out, I usually let an Indian do the baptizing. But I was never treated harsh. In fact, I was honored as a special guest at their harvest festival (the equivalent of our county fair). I was given the equivalent of the city keys, due to the influence of my host. Moreover, I signed autographs for the people on that occasion. They even provided special entertainment just for me. I think they really wanted to please American. You see, they need help with Pakistani terrorism. They really wanted to treat me with honor. Sunday-Their typical Sunday service starts at 10:00 a.m. From 10 to 11 they sing; from 11 to 1 preaching occurs; from 1 to 1:30 someone speaks on the meaning of the Lord's Supper; from 1:30-1:40 the Lord's Supper is taken; from 1:40 to 1:55 a member gives a lesson on giving; from 1:55 to 2:00 the collection it taken up.

The last Sunday I was there they had a special service to install elders and deacons before we ate lunch. This lasted from 2 pm to 3:30 pm. So services that day were plaints. their pagan names; Epaphras; Epaphroditus-both show honor to Venus or Aphrodite. He was told that instead of changing his name it was more important that he wear the name "Christian". He still insisted and changed his name to Paul.

In another case, a young mother asked me to give her newly born daughter a Bible name. I selected the name Priscilla. She was thrilled.

Illness/Living as they do-I was the first American to go work with these people in some time. They were well pleased. They said that many Americans want to stay in American hotels, eat American food, only preach at the church buildings, and then return to the hotel. But, I lived as they did. Such pleased them. Paul said, " I am made all things to all men, that I might by all means save some" I've even heard stories of Americans showing up and seeing the conditions and leaving immediately. Such is a shame. These souls are precious and hungry for the truth.

Living conditions were interesting at times. The day they picked me up they brought me bottled water to spare me from drinking their polluted water. I took a sip. The next man grabbed the bottle and sipped. They passed it around and then back to me to drink again. They thought they were doing me a favor.

I did drink much unsanitary water in people's homes. I ate things that, I didn't know what it was. The mosquitos were very thick. One of my host contracted malaria while I was there. They did erect a mosquito net for me. But I tell you all this to say I don't know what I contracted. It could be a result of bad water and unclean conditions. They also are having an epidemic of malaria, yellow fever and typhoid. I thought maybe I had malaria, I guess I didn't. I am almost back to normal.

work and escorted me the eight hour trip by train to see me off. The day that I was to leave from the airport they rented a bus and took me around sight-seeing. I don't think that a day went by without their placing a rose lei around my neck. They brought me flowers of different kinds. They put a sandalwood lei around my neck and brought me more food than I could have ever eaten. They

were always smiling and very gra-

cious. One of the men I baptized spun and wove a blanket for me with my name on it.

Conclusion-Would I do it again? In a heart beat. If one truly loves souls and believes the Gospel, how could he do otherwise? They have invited me to return in 1 1/2 years from now. They want me to bring 3 or 4 other preachers with me at the time. I do have plans for other possible future trips to Jamaica, Ghana Africa Russia.




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At as 14, most youth look about 9 or 10 years of age. At 20, most look about 14 or 15 years of age. But, by the time they are 40 or 45 they look very old and weathered.

Many looked very Asian. Others looked very African or perhaps like the Australian Aborignes.

I am considered above average height in India. (Editor's note: For those who do not know him, Bro. Bryan is probably 5'6 or 5'7). The women in the family I stayed with were about four feet tall, the man was bout 5'5.

Transportation-Transportation was interesting at times. We traveled by every conceivable means. We traveled by steam train, taxis with seven men in the back seat of one taxi. We traveled in caravans of mopeds and small motorcycles with three or four men on each at one time. I saw people travel by elephant. We traveled by ox-cart. At one point, one man asked me, "What type of animals do you use in America to get around on?"

One man that was baptized had just one leg. He owned a small bicycle repair shop. He made his own bicycle which he could pedal with his hands to get around.

The only time I really feared anything while there was when traveling in traffic on the streets. At times the cars seemed to be within one handsbreadth of another. Lanes mean nothing. One way streets mean nothing. Passing is treacherous. More than once I thought we would have a headone collision. The space they use to pass in is much, much smaller than what we are used to. It definitely makes central American traffic look mild. But I am still in one piece. Cows and goats sometimes laid in the middle of the busy streets. The air pollution is the thickest I've ever seen in the big cities. Los Angeles has no air pollution problems when compared to there. People are everywhere and busy as ants.

Crops/Food-Their major cash crops were: coconuts, sugar cane, bananas, rice, teakwood, tea, dates, figs and pineapples. Their hot tea was extremely good to the taste.

# Please, remember your Star Spangled manners!!

This Independence Day, more people than ever will be showing their patriotism and loyalty to America by displaying the American Flag. Here are examples of how to display the flag properly:

\*\*Unless illuminated at night, flags displayed outdoors should only be flown from sunrise to sunset.

\*\*The flag should not be flown on days when the weather is inclement, expect when an all weather flag is used.

\*\*The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff should be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender.

zontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flat's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, the flag should be displayed in the same

\*\*When used on a speaker's platform, the flag, if displayed flat, should be displayed above and behind the speaker.

\*\*The flag, when flown at halfpeak before it is lowered for the Day. day. On Memorial Day the flag should be displayed at half-mast until noon only, then raised to the top of the staff.

\*\*The flag should never be displayed up side down, except as a signal of dire distress instances of extreme danger to life or property. \*\*The flag should never


touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water or merchandise.

\*\*The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding or drapery. It should never be festooned, drawn back, not up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free. \*\*The flag should never be

used as a covering for a ceiling. \*\*The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything.

\*\*The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever.

\*\*The flag, when it is in such condition that it no longer is a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferable by burning. Contact your local American Legion or VFW post for information on flag-burning ceremonies, which are often held on June 14, which is Flag





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# PET TALK

If it seems your horse has a frog in its throat, the culprit may be treptococcus equi, or "strangles." this contagious bacterial infecion affects young horses with cases ranging from only mild swelling to severe respiratory dis-

"Strangles is a contagious and very common disease in horses red one to three years," said Dr.

ggy Marsh, a veterinarian in the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

"Streptococcus equi is in the same family of bacteria as the oranism that causes strep throat in numans. In horses, it creates abscesses in the throat, swelling of he lymph nodes and nasal disharge.

Strangles is spread through diect contact with sick horses, or through contact with infected equipment, such as water buckets, brushes or blankets. Traveling stock are particularly at risk, as they are most likely to mingle with ses from other herds.

Marsh says prevention is the best way to keep strangles out of a herd. Be sure to quarantine new horses away from the established herd for three to four weeks. In addition, she says you may opt for vaccines, which can be administered by injection or delivered brough the nasal passages.

However, Marsh cautions that no vaccine is one 100 percent effective. Young foals are usually less susceptible to strangles since they are protected by the mare's immunity gleaned through nurs-

If strangles does make its way into your herd, it is important to consult your veterinarian when symptoms surface. Marsh says a horse's appetite is not a good indicator of the presence or absence of strangles, as a horse may eat well in spite of minor pain and swelling, noted Marsh.

Most cases are not considered emergencies, but some cases can quickly escalate into respiratory distress. Your veterinarian will be able to prescribe a treatment appropriate for your horse's condition, which may include antibiotics and local, surgical drainage of any abscesses.

In very rare cases, strangles may cause one or more complications. These horses may develop pneumonia, myopathy (muscle swelling), purpura hemmhoragica (generalized swelling caused by the and / or abscesses in various othe places, such as the abdomen. Most cases of strangles are curable, with only rare exceptions in which the bacteria "hides" in the guttural pouches, resulting in chronic shedding of the bacteria. avoiding and treating strangles in your herd is to isolate sick horses and contaminated equipment from the rest of the herd," said Marsh. When traveling, carefully monitor your horses' exposure to unfamiliar trailers and equipment. And, if symptoms do appear, it's best to seek the advice of your veterinarian."
