Mind you, this isn't just an "old people's" syndrome, two of our guests are in their early 20s.


On Main Street Tuesday morning I watched as everyone going up or down the sidewalk shuffled along much like a sleepwalker.

Get ready to dial 10 digits!

Two big changes are around the corner for East Texas residents signaling tremendous growth in Dialing 911 is not impacted in any the region. VALOR Telecom is informing its customers who live in the 903 area code about the new way to dial a call this summer., as 10-digit numbers, start using using 10-digits, in preparation for 10-digit dialing now. Telephone the introduction next year of the new 430 area code.

Valor is notifying their entire customer base about the new changes since the 10-digit permissive dialing period begins July 20th.

Due to the high demand for phone, fax, pager and cell phone numbers, the Texas Public Utility commission (TPUC) last year assigned the new, 430 area code as an overlay to the existing 903 area code. Texas residents living in the 903 area code will be affected by these changes

The TPUC also designated July 20, 2002, as the beginning of the permissive dialing period. Residents are encouraged to begin using 10-digit dialing to complete a phone call. During the next few months, callers will dial 903-xxxxxxx, to make a local call to a 903 number. In April 2003, when the new area code is introduced, callers will dial 903-xxx-xxxx or 430xxx-xxxx to complete a local call. Toll calls from both of these area codes will require dialing 1 + (area code) xxx-xxxx.

Important things for 903 area code residents to keep in mid are: way. Existing area codes and phone numbers are not changing, start thinking of phone numbers rates will not be affected. Mandatory 10-digit dialing will go into effect on February 15, 2003. New 430 area code numbers will not be assigned until April 2003.

It is also important that parents begin teaching their children about dialing 10-digit calls.

Valor residential and business customers are advised to add 10digit dialing to: phone equipment such as cell phones, pagers and fax machines, features such as Call Forwarding and Call Blocking, home security systems, business phone systems, business cards, stationary, letterheads, invoices, purchase orders and advertising materials, internet and intranet sites. and personal checks and personal identification items.

Willing pleads guilty

On May 28, 2002, Foy Glenn revealed that Willing was a foster Willing, age 64, of Clarksville, Texas entered a plea of guilty to 3 separate cases of Promotion of Child Pornography. The cases arose during an investigation when a home health nurse observed Mr. Willing viewing child pornography on his personal computer. The Red River County Sheriff Department with the assistance of Val Varley, the Red River County Attorney, initiated the investigation which resulted in the arrest and indictment of Willing.

Willing entered a plea of guilty to all three cases in the 102nd District Court before A Judge John F. Miller and was sentenced to maximum sentence of 20 years in each case. Judge Miller further ordered each term to run consecutive to each other for a cumulative sentence of sixty years.

During the investigation it was

parent in Bowie County and had been previously investigated for an allegation of Indecency with a Child. He had denied the bowie County allegations and the investigation had been closed for insufficient evidence. During the Red River County investigation, he admitted that he had lied to the Child Protective Services and law enforcement authorities in the Bowie County Case and that those allegations were in fact true.

It further was determined that Mr. Willing was active in the 15th Street School PTA in Texarkana where he had been President of the PTA during the time period of the Bowie County allegations.

At the present time, an investigation remains ongoing concerning other allegations in Red River County.

New cardiac triage units available at Christus St. Joseph's

CHRISTUS St. Joseph's Health System has recently purchased a often leads to shorter stays in the dies May 21 second "Biosite Triage Cardiac System" for use in its emergency rooms, a device that dramatically reduces the time it takes to confirm or rule out suspected heart attacks.

emergency CHRISTUS St. Joseph's, said a Biosite system is now located in the emergency rooms on both the North and South Campuses. "These units are ready for immediate use in the ER when a suspected heart attack victim arrives. Three tests critical to diagnosing a heart attack can be performed right in the emergency room in a matter of minutes.

Previously, suspected heart patients had blood drawn and send to the laboratory for analysis, a process that took considerably more time. With the new Biosite system, three important basic tests can be completed in 20 minutes.

"The Biosite system allows the ER staff and physicians to begin early intervention therapeutics much sooner, generally within 30 minutes of arrival," Mallory said. "Time is a critical factor in successfully treating those suffering much better.

The portable Biosite Triage Cardiac System measures the presence of three cardiac "marker" proteins, typically released into Mark Mallory, RN, director of the bloodstream following an services for acute myocardial infraction, or heart attack. The same device can also be used to conduct yet another blood test associated with diagnosing heart failure, the BNP test. That test measures B-type natriuretic peptide in blood plasma, the circulating blood protein secreted by the overloaded and failing heart.

Mallory said six million Americans visit emergency departments annually suffering from chest pain, yet only 11 percent are ultimately diagnosed as having had a heart attack. "But," he cautioned, "this does not mean that those who have classic heart attack symptoms should not seek immediate medical help." With the addition of the Biosite systems, he added, those suspected of having a heart attack can be diagnosed much faster, treatment can begin sooner, and - hopefully -outcomes will be

and whirring of circular saws ripping lumber echoed through the post oaks near Hopewell. And, Eddy Denny of Bogata is one of the "Baptist Builders" who were helping to run these carpentry tools.

The Texas Baptist Men Retiree Builders began work May 14 on the home for the family of 11year-old Courtney Akard. The sixth grade honor student with a beaming smile has been confined to a wheelchair since a car wreck five years ago injured her spinal cord.

The Retiree Builders typically build churches or facilities for Baptist camps. They seldom build private residences.

But the volunteers agreed to make an exception for "Courtney's house" after Debbie Drake called the Texas Baptist Men office at the urging of her pastor, Randall Scott at Immanuel Baptist Church in Paris.

Drake, a registered nurse, explained that an auto accident had left Courtney unable to walk and with severely limited use of her hands and arms. She lived with her mother and two teenaged brothers in a one-bedroom rent house.

Their home on a busy highway north of Paris lacked insulation, and Courtney could barely maneuver her electronic wheelchair through it's narrow hallways. All the countertops and fixtures were beyond her reach.

Courtney's mother had worked as a home health care provider before her daughter's accident. Since then, she has scraped together a living for her family by selling advertising and promotional fund-raising items, painting houses and doing other part time jobs during school hours.

The staccato pounding of nails complaining. I'm still proud to we should step out occasionally have it. It could be worse," Dianne and take on tasks that are outside Akard said.

She managed to buy a 1.3 acre lot in the Hopewell community and she and her sons cleared a site by hand on the heavily wooded property where she dreamed of building a home for Courtney.

But, she soon learned that the government considered any property that was currently unoccupied to be a financial asset. Until she moved on the property or sold it, Courtney was ineligible for any state or federal financial assistance or medical benefits.

Akard struggled with the decision, but she chose to hold onto the land and give up government benefits until they could build a house. She saw it as Courtney's security into the future. And, she dreamed of a handicapped accessible home that would provide her daughter the opportunity to regain a degree of independence.

"I'm getting older. There's going to be a point in my life when I can't pick up Courtney", Akard said.

She looked forward to the prospect of a home where her daughter could bathe herself, cook her own meals and learn other independent living skills.


Courtney's mother contacted Chris Whitaker, a local homebuilding and layman at First Baptist Church of Paris. He worked with a PJC architect to draw plans for a house that would be fully handicapped accessible and he secured many donated building supplies. But the project could not be completed without volunteer laborers to coordinate it

"A lot of people were willing to come out and help, but it just wasn't enough. We all have to work for a living, and people have to provide for their won families", Akard said. The Texas Baptist Men Retiree Builders met the challenge. "I think

the norm of church building" said James Griffin of Seven Oaks Baptist Church in Wills Point.

Members of churches related to the Baptist General Convention of Texas help support the TBMRB through their gifts to the Mary Hill Davis Offering for Texas Missions. The builders live in their own RVs and donate their labor. the missions offering provides them a fully equipped tool trailer and local churches provide meals.

The Retiree Builders agreed to frame the house, put sheeting on the outside and install the ceiling joists. The contractor will install rafters and decking. Volunteers form Immanuel Baptist Church will roof the house and a local bricklayer already agreed to donate his time.



The new house is three times the size of the rent house where the Akards currently live in. Dianne Akard finds it hard to express the depth of her gratitude for the Retiree Builders' role in what she calls "Courfney's House".

We're just so happy and grateful people care. You know how the world gets; sometimes you wonder how things really are. But there's good people still around" she said.

Every day Courtney's mother brought her to the building site? While her mother wheeled her around the slab, Courtney stretched her arms as wide as she could, showing how spacious the hallways would be. "Oh, momma, won't be scraping my elbows against the walls," she said.

Courtney turns twelve next month, looks forward to the independence her new handicapped? accessible home will provide.

The Dragon Slayer

As I drive around this area there print of the ball's stitches were are things that always catch my eye. One of these is the rusty scoreboard at the north end of what was once the Bogata football field. Now the location is occupied by a softball field. I was witness to many football games on that field between the Bogata Bulldogs and the Deport Tigers. Farther east is also the remains of another football field, the home of the Talco Trojans where I also saw several football games in the late 1940's.

A year or so ago, my wife Sherri and I stopped at the Talco School during the summer months and met the principal, Kelly. found some old photographs, and Stansell. She kindly consented to allow us to take another look at the football field and gym where I once played basketball for Deport Elementary School in 1948-49. There wasn't much left of the field. There were slight traces of the asphalt track around the field and the concrete bleachers on the east side were still there and probably always will be.

To prove what a small world it is, I found that Mrs. Stansell's father-in-law is Gerald Stansell, a friend of mine when I attended Paris Junior College in the mid 1950's. When we were getting in the pickup I said to Sherri, "When I went to school I never had a principal as attractive as Mrs. Stansell."

At Deport, sadly, there are no traces left of the two football fields I remember there. The oldest field was on the gin lot just across Mustang Creek on land now occupied by a large warehouse used by Blackland Prairie Gin. This field never had lights and seemed to get very muddy on the southern end. The baseball diamond was located on the northeast part of the lot. Recently Larry McGill and I recalled the game in which his older brother, Gaylon, while batting,

clearly visible on Gaylon's head for quite a while. This was before batting helmets were used. At this time, the coach at Deport was my father, R.L. Maddox.

The other football field was on land now occupied by the City of Deport Housing Authority. This field had lights and metal bleachers on the north side. Deport High School could now have night games at home. A few weeks ago, I stopped by the Housing Authority and had a very interesting conversation with the administrator, Melba Ladd, her husband Carlos, and Kenneth Gifford. Melba one of them showed the remains of the metal bleaches just before construction of the Housing authority began.

We moved to Powderly just before I began my freshman year, so I never had the opportunity to play high school football, but I did my share of playing baseball in high school at the Paris Boys' Club and in the Lamar County League. I was never a good hitter and didn't have a strong enough arm to make a hard throw from third or shortstop, but I could catch a ground ball fairly well and considered myself to be an adequate second baseman

Some of the earliest games I remember plaing in were against Pattonville in the late 1940's. When we played in Pattonville, we played on the baseball diamond located in an pasture just east of town and had some very exciting games there. We didn't have a coach. We just organized ourselves with the older boys usually playing the key positions. As I recall, southpaw Cotton Anderson did most of the pitching for Pattonville. We were lucky to have two or three baseballs and a few bats, some of which had tape around the handles to cover the shaking her head.


In the summer of 1950, I played in a league at the Paris Boys' Club. The league I played in had a team for each Ward School in Paris. I played for the Graham Crackers and was issued my first baseball uniform. I don't remember the age group, but the league was between the Soda Pop League for 12-year olds and the American Legion.

When we were organized, we found taht nobody wanted to play catcher. I knew just the person. My good friend, Donnie Bryson from Deport, was just what we needed. Donnie had the skin between his forefinger and middle finger on his right hand split by a foul tip while playing for Deport High School, a few weeks before. He taped these two fingers together and continued to play that summer for the Graham Crackers.

I'll never forget the time that Donnie and I were in Deport with no transportatin to Paris on game day. We put on our uniforms and walked down to the highway. With our baseball shoes in hand, we hitchhiked to Paris, played the game and came back to Deport the same way. We enjoyed playing baseball very much and had no intention of missing the game. I'm glad we went because for the first and only time I got three hits in a game. I think organized baseball is a great way for a boy to spend the summer.

A few weeks ago, as I was about to leave the house to go for a ride, my wife said, "Where are you going?" I replied, "Oh, I don't know, just driving around." She continued, "What are you going to do?" I paused a moment and answered, " I may find a goose that can lay golden eggs, or a pot of gold at the end of a rainbow. If I feel real energetic I might even slay a dragon." As I walked out the door, Sherri just stood there



If your fat cat suddenly turns up his nose to his favorite kibble, it's no time to applaud his dieting efforts. A cat that doesn't eat -- even for one day -- may catapult its delicate system into hepatic lipidosis, or fatty liver disease.

"When a cat stops eating for any reason, the body begins to use muscle and stored fat for energy," says Dr. Polly Peterson, a resident in medicine in the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

"Hepatic lipidosis occurs when the liver becomes clogged with fat droplets and ceases normal function. The normal liver processes nutrients for the body, filters out toxins and bacteria, and makes roteins and sugars."

Hepatic lipidosis accounts for about 40 percent of liver disease in cats, making it the most common liver disease in cats, adds Peterson.

"This disease can affect cats of all ages and weights, but is more common among overweight and middle-aged to older cats," she explains. "These cats exhibit anorexic behavior, vomiting and may have a yellowing of the whites of the eyes, gums or inside the ears.

Peterson says it is not fully understood if hepatic lipidosisis always caused by other disorders, or if other disorders cause hepatic lipidosis. It is likely a combination of the two. Stress, changes in diet, and illness are factors that may cause a cat to stop eating. But hepatic lipidosis causes

If your veterinarian suspects hepatic lipidosis, he or she will pea form a series of blood tests to determine if it is secondary to another condition. If so, the primary disease will be treated along with the hepatic lipidosis.

Treatment begins with food. In mild cases, an appetite stimulant or even exposure to a smellier food may be all that is needed. In severe cases, cats may require hospitalization and a feeding tube. Treatment can last from one to

eight weeks.

While there is no way to guarantee your cat will never develop hepatic lipidosis, Peterson recommends a few measures you can take to lower the risk.

"Provide your cat with an easily digestible, high quality, high protein diet," she says. "Help your cat avoid becoming overweight to begin with and then monitor its weight for fluctuations. When possible, minimize stress to your cat. Also, offer several small meals a day instead of just one or two. This may help your cat maintain a healthy metabolism."

Helping your cat lose excess weight has other benefits as well. Obesity in cats can cause pain in the hips and joints of an arthritic cat, can aggravate heart disease and even lead to diabetes.

Be aware that other diseases, such as lymphosarcoma (liver tumor) and bacterial liver infection can cause symptoms similar to hepatic lipidosis. For this reason, it is important for a veterinarian to diagnose and prescribe the appropriate treatment specific to each cat's condition. In any case, Peterson says if your cat refuses food, even for a day, promptly seek the advice of a veterinarian.

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
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stress, anorexia and illness. Whatever the cause, if a cat stops eating veterinary care should be sought and food given as soon as possible since hepatic lipidosis may become fatal if left untreated.

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
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
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service, "said LaRue, a two year Navy veteran.
