Thousands of books were stacked in dusty piles on the floors. Hundreds of "Barbie" dolls were stacked everywhere, Sandra's personal collection. Paint thinners, strippers and paints were stacked in corners. Molting pelts from the Senator 's era in the 1800s shed hair slowly upon creaking floors.

In the once magnificent dining room, our guide switched on a fabulous gilt light fixture. As we exclaimed in admiration, it began to sizzle and blink on and off! Calmly, she switched it back off and preceded to show us the bath rooms....thank goodness they were not occupied at that time!

These folks are, to say the least, odd. They have managed to put a new roof on the place, and have actually done a lot of work. But it is an absolutely incredible distance from being open to the public!

The state of New Mexico tried having it for a while, but sold it because so few tourists were willing to make the 12 miles trek. The previous owner was stranded during the winter, and had to chop up the antique billiard tables for fire wood

Would I do it again? No. Am I glad we did it? You bet. Once we weren't murdered and our bodies stashed in the 1800-era swimming pool, it was a blast!





Which brings me to this week's column. Several of you have requested some different canning and preserving recipes for the great vetables and fruits that we have this summer! So here we go!

A couple of tips first. When canning tomatoes, because of their acid content, need to be processed in a water bath solution. Cleaning and slicing or chopping hot peppers with your bare hand can cause you some severe burning and pain even after removing seeds, so be sure to wear rubber gloves for this venture. Rivercrest School District/Charter School National School Lunch/Breakfast Program School Year 2000-2001

The Rivercrest ISD school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.20 and breakfast for 65¢. Children who qualify under U.S. Dept. of Agriculture guidelines may get meals free or at a reduced-price of \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast. All meals served must meet nutrition standards established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information; telephone number 632-5204. (Rivercrest High School lunch \$1.50 and breakfast for \$.65. Reduced are .40 and .30.) Your child can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending on your income, your child may be eligible for either free or reduced price meals

To get free or reduced-price meals for your child, you must complete an application for Free and Reduced Price Meals form and return it to the school.

Households getting food stamps or TANF. You only have to include your child's name and case number, and an adult household member must sign the form.

Households that do not get food stamps or TANF. If you do not have a case number, ou must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number.

Households with a foster child. You must include the child's name and the amount of personal use" income the child received last month, and an adult must sign the form.

Will the form be verified? Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send written evidence that shows that your child should get free or reduced price meals.

Can I appeal the school's decision? You can talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your form. You also may ask for a fair hearing by calling or writing to: Gary VanDeaver, Superintendent, 903-632-5205 at Rt. 1, Box 253, Bogata, Texas 75417.

Must I report changes? If your child gets free or reduced price meals because of your ncome, you must tell us if your household size decreases, or if your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets free meals because your household gets food stamps or TANF, you must tell us when you no longer get these benefits.

Will information on my form be kept confidential .? We will use the information on your form to decide if your child should get free or reduced price meals. We may inform officials with other child nutrition, health and education programs of the information on your form to determine benefits for those programs or for funding and/or evaluation purposes

Can I apply for free and reduced price meals later? You may apply free and reduced price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a hange, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become inemployed or get food stamps or TANF, complete another form then.





the Board of Directors of Campus adult inpatient medical System approved a series of actions recommended by hospital leadership focused on preserving the scope and quality of health services presently offered by the health system while improving efficiency and reducing costs.

vices will change, the North Campus will remain open. It will house women's health services including: obstetrics, gynecology, neonatal care and pediatrics within the McCuistion Women's Pavilion. Limited surgery capacity will be preserved to support delivery of service to our patients, these services. The Outpatient GI Lab will remain in its current location on the 4th Floor. Ancillary and support areas such as Pharmacy, Laboratory, Radiology, Cardiopulmonary Services, Environmental Services and Food Services will be sized to more efficiently, yet appropriately support these remaining services. A long term acute care hospital separately owned by Dubuis Health System, also operated by parent company CHRISTUS Health, will open on August 19 and will be comprised of 25 beds on the building's 5th Floor. Additional services are being evaluated for possible location within the north campus facility in the coming months.

"The past year has presented many challenges for CHRISTUS St. Joseph's as we have merged two cultures, two medical staffs, Associates and volunteers into one organization," stated Jo Ann Parkman, board chair. With these challenges have come many positive opportunities to maintain the quality of healthcare our community has come to expect over the past 90 years.

Effective September 3, all surgery, with the exception of Cesarean sections and gynelogical and breast needle localization surgery, will be consolidated to the South

CHRISTUS St. Joseph's Health units will officially close. Pediatrics will relocate to the Women's Center, and to ICU in times of high census. The North Campus ER operations will cease and the ER will be converted to an urgent care center. The area created as a "Fast Track" on the 1st Floor of While the location of some ser- the South Campus will help reduce some strain created by this initiative.

Collectively, these changes will centralize all medicine, surgery and intensive care services within one location.

With these modifications in our our first and foremost goal is quality patient care," said Chief Ex-ecutive Officer, Monty McLaurin. It is our desire to gain efficiencies by our actions while affecting as few Associates as possible." These changes will require a number of Associates to relocate their normal workstation from the North campus to the South. This move will result in a reduction of approximately 5% of the current hospital workforce. Persons affected by position elimination will be determined according to the

hospital reduction in force policy. McLaurin noted these changes will entail potential operational challenges as they are implemented, particularly in periods of high patient census which occurs annually in the winter, but have been deemed necessary in preserving the viability of this longstanding health ministry. Annual savings of \$1.3 million are estimated from these consolidation efforts. The development of the Dubuis Hospital of Paris, is estimated to result in \$1.6 million annually in cost avoidance to the System. Additionally, departmental reorganizations are projected to create over \$420,000 in savings. Most immediately, the elimina- Mrs. Parkman.

sult in annual savings of \$2.1 million. The hospital will maintain appropriate nurse/patient staffing ratios within the limitations of the available number of CSJHS nursing staff. This could, on occasion limit the number of patients which will be admitted to the hospital in the coming months. Inpatient capacity will be expanded only based on the number of available nursing and support staff employed by the health system. .

Collectively these efforts are expected to have a positive bottom line impact of \$5.5 million. In addition to these changes, efforts are being made to reduce resource consumption and length of stay through a variety of performance improvement initiatives which will allow the system to reduce overall costs. CHRISTUS St. Joseph's net operating losses for FY 2002 totaled approximately \$8.3 million.

CSJHS Medical Director Arthur Tijerina, M.D., stressed, "It is the goal of the Medical Staff to meet the needs of our patients. The rich history of the mission of this System has survived difficult times and will be even better as a result of these challenges which secures our long-term viability." In addition to savings and revenue enhancements anticipated from undertaking the previously-stated initiatives, CHRISTUS St. Joseph's will be reclassified into the Dallas/Fort Worth MSA for Medicare reimbursement beginning in October of 2003 with an estimated positive fiscal impact of nearly \$7 million per year.

'The Board of Directors of long term acute care hospital, CHRISTUS St. Joseph's fully supports the recommendations of the Executive Staff and recognize the difficult decisions\ that must be made to maintain the viability of an organization which truly cares for the needs of all persons," said
