As I said, I wish I had been the person who had sense enough to begin selling the stuff in bottles....it's sure turned into a lucrative business.

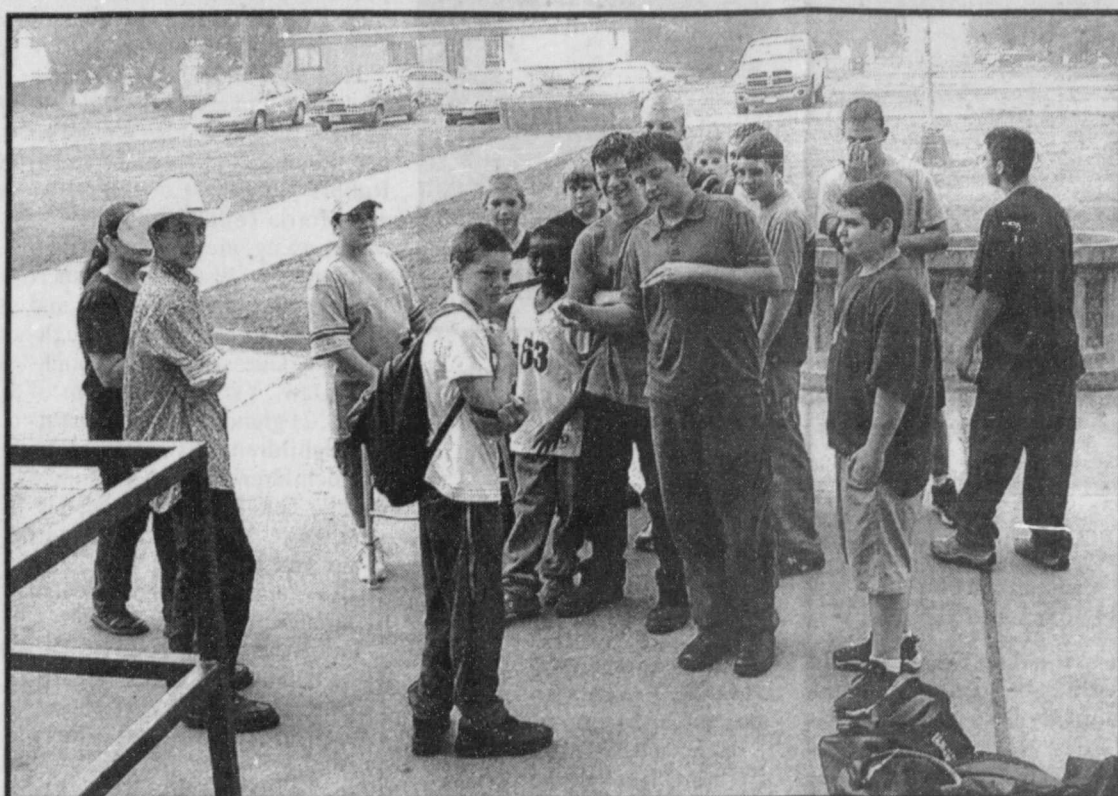

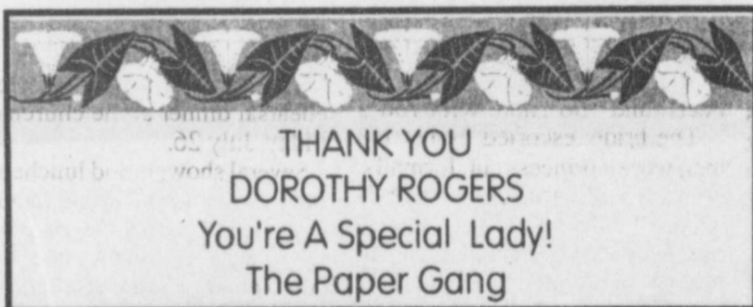

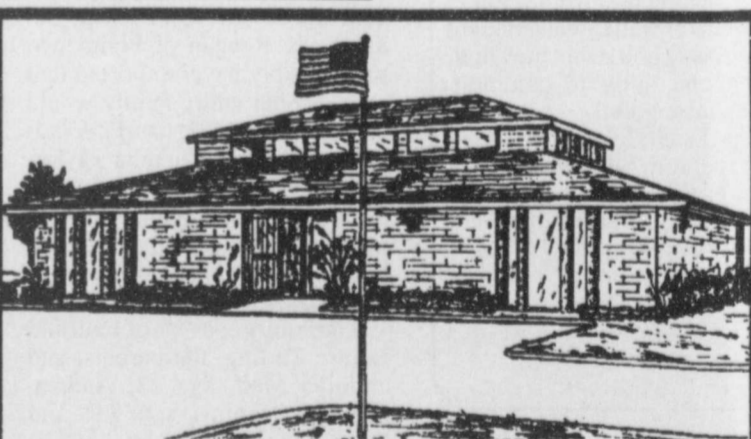
October 9 & 10 set for Alive 55 Class

friends of the bride. The bridal attendants wore A-line satin and crepe gowns of iced blue. They carried bouquets of long-stemmed marjon and skyline roses.

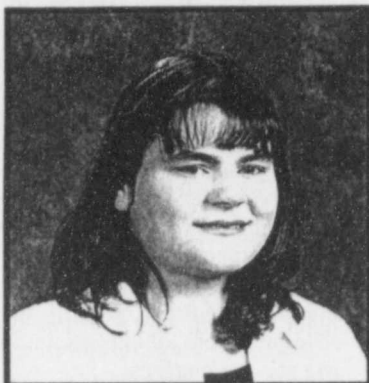

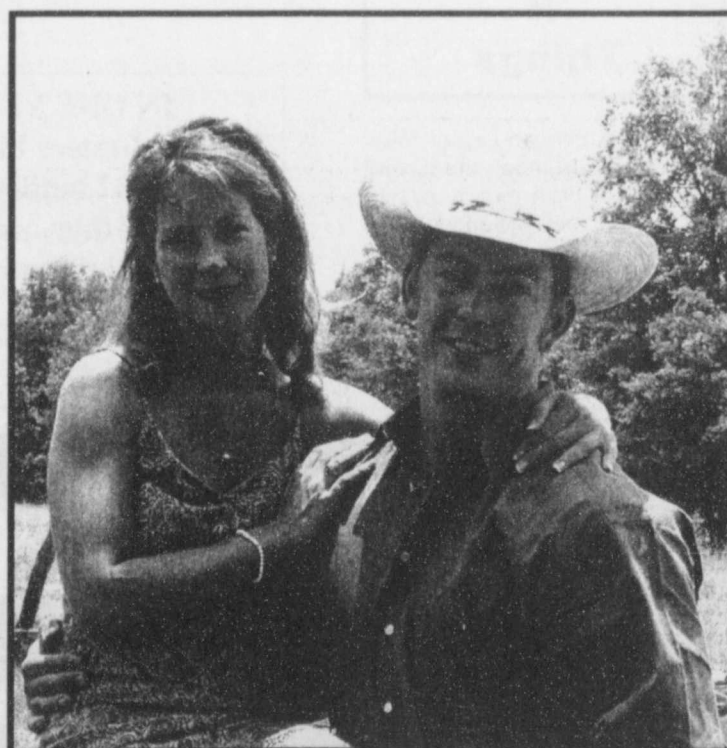
The 1972 graduating class of Rivercrest High School will reunite for their 30 year class reunion in 2002 at the Bogata Community Center. The official date will be announced soon.

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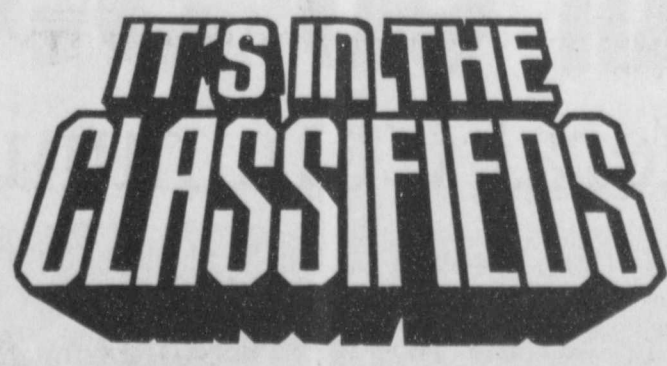

The special meeting adjourned at 7:17 p.m. and the council then held a budget workshop. Another budget workshop will be held Friday, August 31 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at which time they will hear a proposal for employee insurance.

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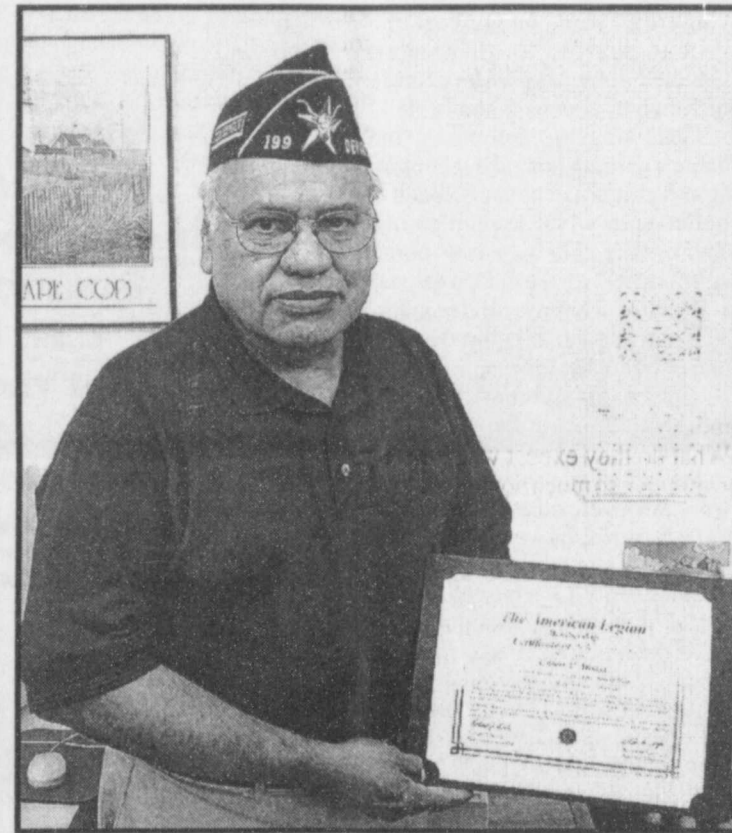

There were plenty of seats left, so I urge all that can, to attend the next meeting on September 18 at 2:00 p.m. in Gilmer, TX.

There are 23 members on the board. They stated their names and whose interest they represented. Small business, power companies, water planning board member, Texas Park and Wildlife and various other interests. They were from Dallas, Greenville, Paris and surrounding towns from our area. There is not one member from Red River County. There were two members that owned property that would be affected.

These folks are appointed, not elected, and are the people looking out for our best interests. It was asked of the board, "What are you all getting out of this?" One member stood up and said he was getting nothing. No one else answered. If nobody is getting anything out of this lake project, then why is this proposition even on the table? I suggest we do our homework and follow the money trail. I seems like someone is awful quick to want to give our land and water up for nothing.

After the business of the meeting was over, the public in attendance, were given a chance to make statements. I thought everyone did well and brought up some very good points. brought forth a statement asking that Marvin Nichols 1 Reservoir be taken off the agenda. This is great news. Unless he has changed his mind, Lt. Governor Bill Ratliff still supports the lake. This is bad news. Remember folks, there is an election in November. Please get out and vote, and, keep in mind who our representatives are. This includes our local politicians from County Judges to Commissioners.

The process of taking the lake off the agenda, we were told, will take 60 days. That will be after the elections, so we need to keep putting pressure on our politicians. Be sure you know where they stand. Keep writing those letters and making those phone calls.

The Sulphur River Basin runs right through the middle of our district. This is some, if not the best, hardwood river bottom in Texas. Water, like oil, gas and electricity is a powerful asset. To give up our control of these water rights to the DFW area or anybody else, would be ridiculous, even suicidal to our area. This river system is the heart, soul and the lifeblood of our area. Folks, this is our water, our property, our jobs, our businesses and our very way of life, that we are being told that we may have to sacrifice, and for what? Think about this. There are five different lake projects proposed for our Sulphur River Basin. We must keep up our efforts and keep fighting for what is rightfully ours. The water and water rights belong to us. Please do not let us be bullied into giving them up.

I would like to thank the folks from the Sulphur River Oversight Society. Without their public meetings in our towns and small communities, many of us would still be in the dark. They have worked very hard and tirelessly gathering information and conducting these meetings.

The Rivercrest ISD school serves meals each school day. Elementary children may buy lunch for \$1.20 and breakfast for 65¢. Children who qualify under U.S. Dept. of Agriculture guidelines may get meals free or at a reduced-price of \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast. All meals served must meet nutrition standards established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information; telephone number 632-5204. (Rivercrest High School lunch \$1.50 and breakfast for \$.65. Reduced are \$.40 and \$.30.) Your child can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending on your income, your child may be eligible for either free or reduced price meals.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your child, you must complete an application for Free and Reduced Price Meals form and return it to the school.

Households getting food stamps or TANF. You only have to include your child's name and case number, and an adult household member must sign the form.

Households that do not get food stamps or TANF. If you do not have a case number, you must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number.

Households with a foster child. You must include the child's name and the amount of "personal use" income the child received last month, and an adult must sign the form.

Will the form be verified? Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send written evidence that shows that your child should get free or reduced price meals.

Can I appeal the school's decision? You can talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your form. You also may ask for a fair hearing by calling or writing to: Gary VanDeaver, Superintendent, 903-632-5205 at Rt. 1, Box 253, Bogata, Texas 75417.

Must I report changes? If your child gets free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell us if your household size decreases, or if your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets free meals because your household gets food stamps or TANF, you must tell us when you no longer get these benefits.

Will information on my form be kept confidential? We will use the information on your form to decide if your child should get free or reduced price meals. We may inform officials with other child nutrition, health and education programs of the information on your form to determine benefits for those programs or for funding and/or evaluation purposes.

Can I apply for free and reduced price meals later? You may apply free and reduced price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF, complete another form then. You will be notified when your application is approved or denied.

Labor Day weekend

The Texas Department of Public Safety will join other state police agencies across the nation in promoting traffic safety through Operation CARE during the upcoming Labor Day holiday.

Operation CARE-Combined Accident Reduction Effort-focuses on strict enforcement of speed limits, alcohol and drug-related offenses, and occupant restraint laws. The increased presence of law enforcement on the state's highways will run from Friday, August 30 to Monday, September 2.

"During holidays, people sometimes think that tragedy won't strike them or their loved ones, but it can," said DPS Director Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr. "If you're speeding, driving while intoxicated or not properly restrained, you put your life and the lives of others at risk."

Holiday drivers are sometimes

tempted to drink and drive. They justify their illegal behavior by believing that their actions won't affect themselves or others. Drivers must remember that even one drink can diminish driving ability and there are no quick ways to "sober up."

DPS has a zero-tolerance policy for drunk driving. Vehicles that are being driven in a manner that indicates the driver is intoxicated will be stopped in every case, and appropriate action will be taken. Drunk drivers are a hazard to themselves and everyone who shares the roadway with them.

"We realize that not every driver will follow our suggestions for safe driving," said Col. Davis, "and that's why our troopers and agencies across the state are stepping up holiday enforcement. We'll do our best to make the roadways safer for Labor Day weekend travel."

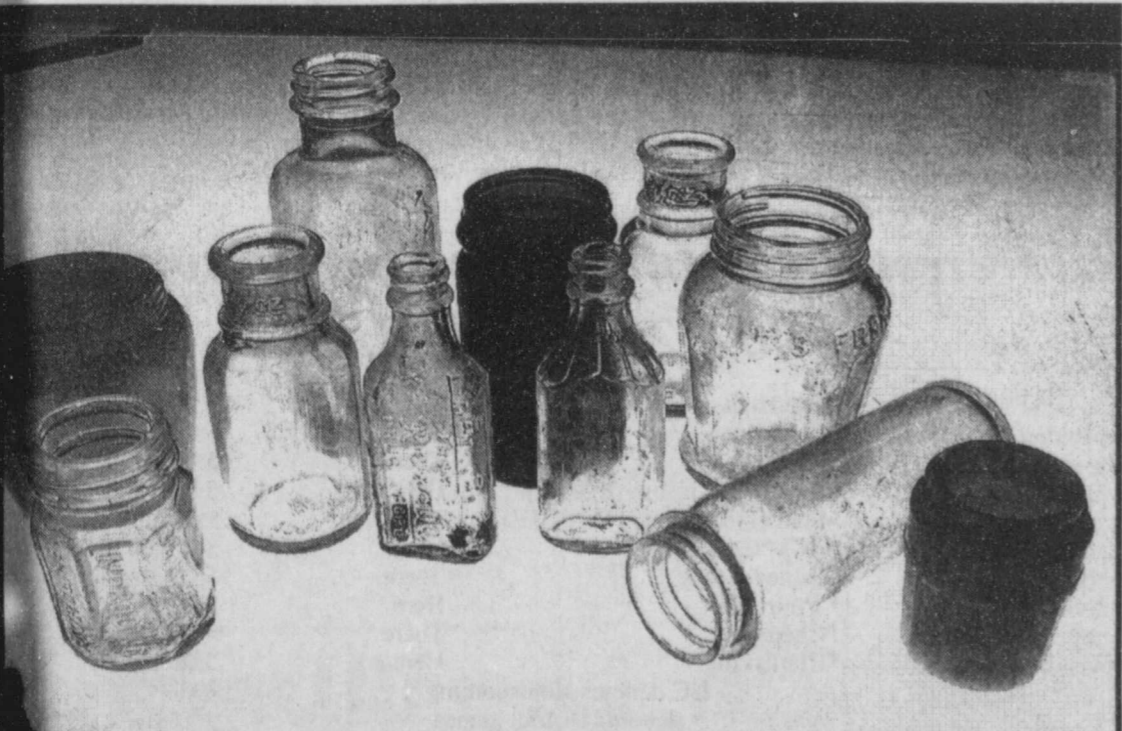

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Plan focuses on "high risk" animals

Texas livestock health officials have presented a compromise plan to the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) that, if approved, would eliminate a federal regulation requiring steers to be identified with approved ear tags, and feeder heifers to be tagged and tested for cattle tuberculosis (TB) when they leave Texas after January 1, 2003. The "Texas Cattle Tuberculosis (TB) Action Plan," which is under review by the USDA, would instead target surveillance on "at-risk" cattle populations within Texas. Cattle TB is a bacterial disease that can cause infected cattle to develop internal lesions in the lungs, lymph nodes or on other organs.

"In June, Texas lost its 'free' status for cattle tuberculosis (TB), because, during the past year, two of the state's 153,000 cattle herds were found to be infected. These two herds—a dairy and a purebred beef herd—have been depopulated and another 150 nearby or epidemiologically linked herds have tested negative for the disease," said veterinarian Dan Baca, who is the TB epidemiologist for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency.

"Nonetheless, under current federal regulations, Texas breeding cattle now must have a TB skin test and be officially identified with an ear tag prior to being transported out of state. The TB test can be waived only if the breeding animals originate from a TB accredited-free herd, are going directly to a slaughter plant or are transported to an approved (restricted) feedlot. About 150,000

breeding cattle are hauled from the state each year," said Dr. Logan. Dr. Logan explained that, when the USDA downgraded Texas' cattle TB status in June, the federal agency delayed its implementation of interstate movement regulations for feeder cattle until January 1, 2003. She said more than 1.5 million steers, feeder heifers and feeder bull calves are moved from Texas each year, and the federal regulations would require official ear tags be placed on the animals prior to movement.

"We have worked closely with Texas cattle associations, which formed a Texas TB Working Group, our neighboring states and the USDA to formulate an alternative plan that would eliminate the feeder regulations involving tagging and testing in 2003, while still providing for cost-effective disease surveillance tailored to our state's needs," said Dr. Logan. During the past five years, less than one in three million Texas feeder cattle have been found to have TB, so we see these animals as a negligible risk for the disease," said Dr. Baca. "On the other hand, we will continue to support the testing and identification of breeding cattle destined for a herd out of state. Breeding animals reside in herds for a number of years, and we certainly don't want to put receiving states or herds at risk." "In the Texas TB Plan, we have asked that additional USDA inspectors be added in US slaughter plants, to ensure that carcasses are thoroughly examined for internal lesions indica-

tion of cattle TB. Meat inspection is the basis for finding cattle TB cases, and enhancing this disease surveillance method could help us find any remaining infection in Texas," said Dr. Logan.

"Because cattle TB in Texas was detected during the past 12 months in a Texas dairy and in a purebred beef herd, we believe targeted live-animal testing should be conducted in these 'at-risk' populations," she said. "The Texas TB Plan calls for testing the state's 880 dairies, as well as about 2,400 of the state's purebred beef cattle herds.

"We also see a need to strengthen requirements for feeder cattle entering Texas from Mexico," said Dr. Baca. He explained that from 1997-2001, 109 cases of cattle TB were detected in Mexican feeder cattle that were grazed or fed in Texas. "The USDA in April implemented more strict entry requirements for Mexican feeder cattle. However, these animals do present a risk, and the 12 TAHC commissioners proposed a regulation at their meeting July 30 that would allow these animals to go only to approved pastures, quarantined feedlots or to designated pens within feedlots."

Mexican horned steers, which are frequently used for roping or rodeo stock, pose a cattle TB risk to our domestic livestock, as these animals are often commingled with domestic herds when they're not being used for recreation," said Dr. Logan. "Six of these Mexican rodeo animals slaughtered last year were found to have TB," said the TAHC commission-

ers also proposed regulations July 30 that would require that Mexican horned cattle (these are most often used for rodeos and roping events) originate from herds that had tested negative for cattle TB within 12 months before importation. This is in accordance with the new USDA interim rule, published April 20, 2002, that covers Mexican cattle importation. At the port, the horned animals would be required to be tested again by a USDA veterinarian and moved under permit to a premise. After being held for 60 to 120 days, the animal would be permanently identified and retested for cattle TB at the owner's expense prior to being allowed to move freely. Owners of the Mexican horned cattle would be required to have the animals retested annually for cattle TB.

"We are working with the roping and rodeo steer groups to raise the level of awareness about these new proposed TAHC regulations and are seeking their cooperation to ensure that recreational cattle are TB-free," said Dr. Logan.
