Burglaries Plague Deport, Blossom

Three burglaries and a theft, the largest in Deport at Roach Oil Company, the others at Blossom, have plagued area residents during the last week.

Roach Oil Company, located on Hwy. 271 in Deport, was burglarized last Tuesday, July 7, sometime during the night.

The burglars broke a shop window in the back, then crawled in and let the others in by the front door.

The entire safe was removed from the building, as well as \$30 in change, and the coke machine money.

The loss, co-owner Philip Muri Roach said, was not in the money, since there was

only a little over \$100 within the safe, but in the charge tickets, which were locked in the safe. The amount of charge tickets is unknown, but the Roach's are reconstructing them. "Farmers have been coming by and saying, just let us know what you think we owe and we'll pay it," Mrs. Roach said. At

this time of the year, when flat fixing, and diesel bills are high the amounts could well be large. The Roachs have been impressed by such helpfulness. The case is under investigation.

In Blossom someone took a riding lawn mower from the corner of Thelma Poole's lawn on Saturday or Sunday.

The home of Stephen E. Hodges, Blossom, was broken into while the Hodges were on vacation. The kitchen door glass was broken to provide entry. A stereo system, valued at \$500 and three diamond rings were taken.

David Merritt of Blossom

reported of Lamar Sheriff's deputies that his father's mobile home had been broken into and someone had taken an air conditioner valued at \$600 from him.

Oh, sure, there has been a few isolated cases of good tans or painful sunburns, but nothing like the usual yearly harvest.

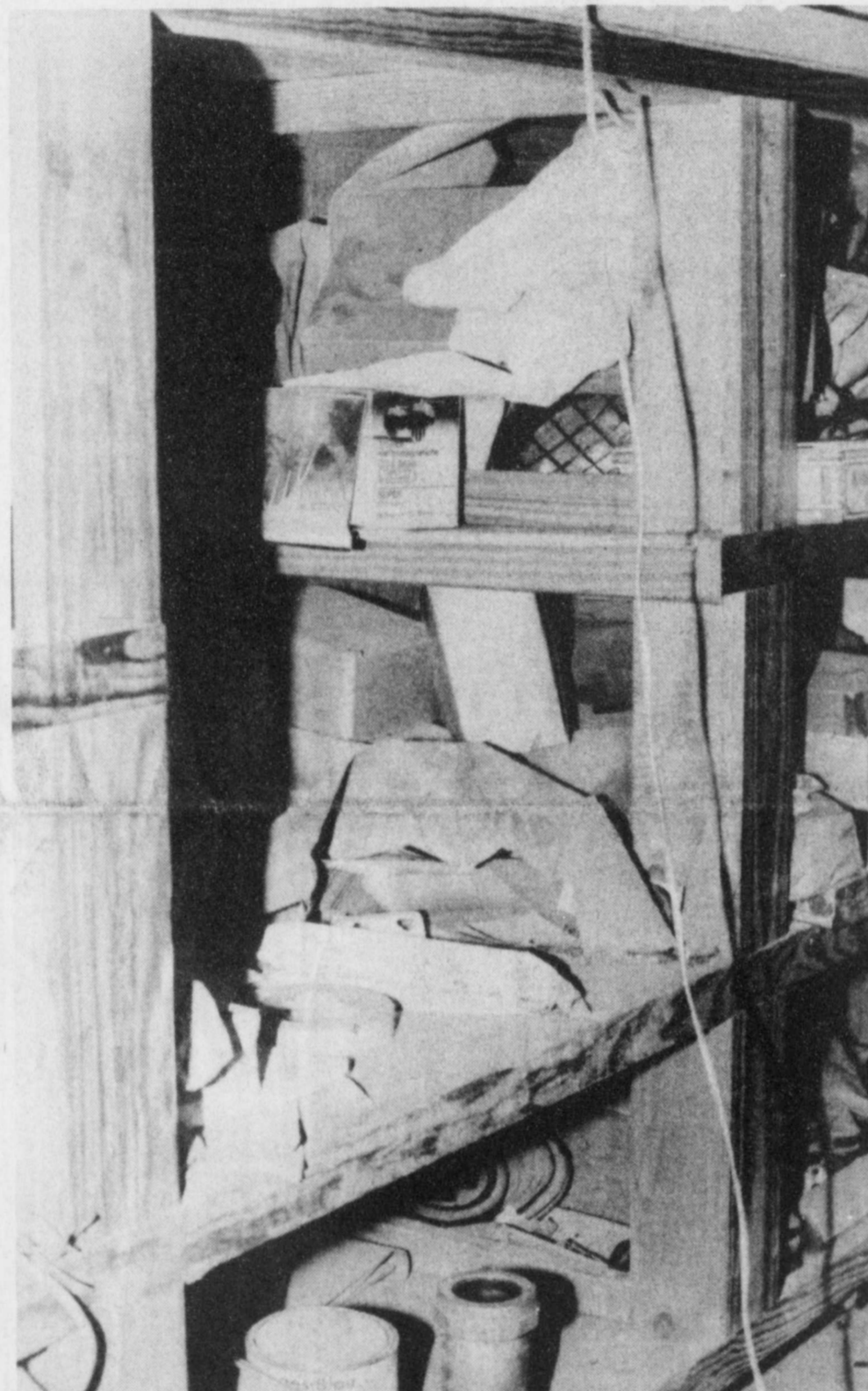
The reason, obviously is the wet or overcast weekends

Farm Union President, Patterson To Be Featured At Meeting

Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller and State Representative Pete Patterson of Brookston will be the featured guests at the chartering of the Lamar County Farmers Union on Friday, July 17 at 8 p.m. The pot luck supper will be held at the Paris Rodeo-Horse Club Barn meeting room.

Incoming Lamar County Farmers Union officers are: President Jim West of Roxton, Vice President Max Fair of Arthur City,

Secretary Bill Knight of Brookston and Treasurer Ronnie Hicks of Sumner.

TFU President Moeller will speak on the impact of the Farm Bill on area farmers which is now under debate by the Congress. Unless farmers become more active and express their views on this vital piece of legislation, the Farm Bill will do more harm than good to family producers.

Moeller will join with Representative Patterson in covering issues of importance to agriculture and rural areas in the past regular session and the current special session of the state legislature. Representative Patterson is an outspoken proponent of legislation designed to help agricultural producers including prohibition of future purchases of agricultural land by foreigners and gasohol.

Moeller, 33, was elected to the presidency of the TFU in January. Since that time, the TFU has come to the forefront in promoting issues

of importance to the family farm and ranch and explaining the problems faced by agricultural producers both in Austin and

Washington, D.C. The TFU is composed of 10,000 families across the state actively involved in

agricultural production. The state organization is headquartered in Waco with legislative offices in Austin.

Melvin Webb Farm Has Milo Demonstration

The prospects for a high yield from area milo looks really promising. The summer rain has enabled the crop to set a full head of grain and midge activity was less than expected, which should help grain prospects.

Now is a good time for farmers to drive out to Melvin Webb's place for an inspection of the twelve-variety milo demonstration. All of the varieties have set grain and one can determine plant characteristics. Each of the varieties are identified with a stake located in the middle row of each variety. There are 16 rows of each variety.

The spring hail storm that went through the county destroyed four varieties and these were replanted to another variety.

The Webb Farm is located in the Byrdtown Community which is between Pattonville and Blossom. To reach the demonstration site, take FM 196 north of Pattonville for a distance of two miles, take the oil top road to the east and travel about one mile and the site will be on your right.

Varieties included in the demonstration are Harpool 6203 GR, Oro GXTRA, Ring Around 807, Pioneer 8680, Golden Acres TE 66B, Conlee Top Hand TA, Pioneer 8311, Ring Around 7336 B, DeKalb 42, Paymaster DR1125, TE Bird-A-Boo II and Paymaster GR1089.

Melvin and his son, Mark have the demonstration in good shape. They will be pleased for farmers to inspect the crop and keep up with the progress. For a personal guide of the demonstration stop by Mr. Less' house (Melvin's dad). But be prepared to stay for a while.

SOYBEAN WEED CONTROL
Weeds and grass are presenting a real problem in soybean field. It seems as though every weed and grass seed has come up and this

this condition is presenting a real challenge to the producer.

George O'Connor, Direct, has some of the cleanest soybean fields that I have seen. George was running the middles for the last time using a rope wick applicator with Round-Up on sporadic Johnson Grass and Pigweed plants last week when I stopped for a visit.

George showed me a soybean field in the bottom that he was particularly proud of. It had a severe cotton root rot problem and would not grow soybeans. So he planted it to milo and wheat for three or four years and came back with beans in 1980 and also this year. No problems were seen last year and this year should be a good test with all of the moisture.

This coming week we will be putting out some soybean chemical weed control demonstration plots in the Direct bottom, and will give more information in a future column. Chemicals to be used are Basagran for cocklebur and morning glory control and Vistar for Johnson Grass. In addition, we will be using a new

product that is not available to the farmer yet.

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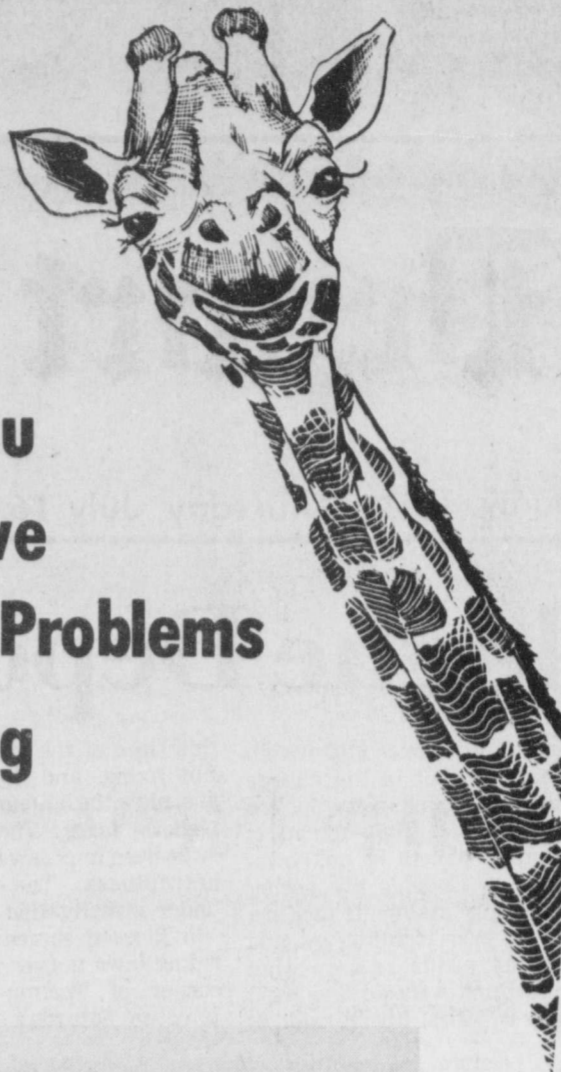

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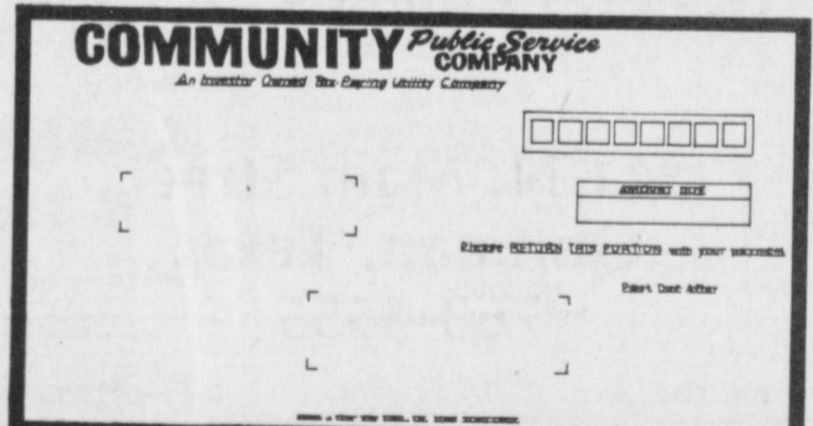
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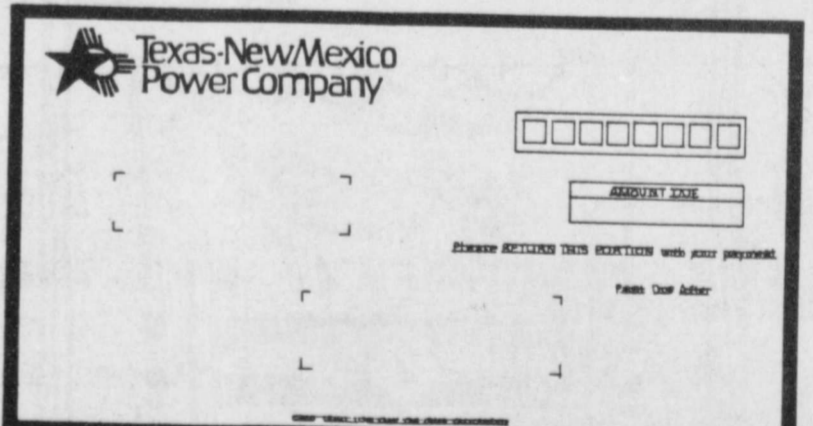
