



### Low Prices, Farm HOME OWNER - FARM - BUSINESS **Bill Threatening Farmers**

"This could be the last year many farmers in Texas and this nation will be growing crops because of the low prices they are receiving," Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller warned. Moeller spoke Thursday, July 9 at the Wells Brothers Grain Elevators in Plano, an area which contains many wheat and grain

farms. "Many farmers plunged deep into debt last year because of the devestating drought. This year, they are faced with even high prices for seed, fertilizer and equipment, unparalled high interest rates and a depressed market for their corps," Moeller stated. "And on top of all that, the prospects of having a Farm Bill in 1981 which will benefit

the family farmer does not appear all too rosy," he added.

In Texas wheat production is at an all time high, with the state agriculture department estimating 179 million bushels, 38 percent more than last year's production. Also, 29 percent more acreage was planted in wheat this year in the hope that many farmers could offset last year's losses with





By John W. Hood Driving around and seeing the farmers busy putting up their hay for the winter, takes me back to the days when I would spend a lot of my summer bailing hay. We did not have the modern equipment that is being used now. We used mule and man power to do the job. The tools consisted of one hay press that was mule powered, one or two mule drawn mowers, one sulkey rake, one buck rake, and about six pitch forks and five or six hay hooks

The mowers would start one or two days ahead of everyone else so the hay could cure. Then all the rest of the crew would come in and while the sulkey rake was running, the rest of the crew would be setting the press and when it was ready the sulkey rake would have when you went to sleep and enough hay in windrows for the buck rake to start to bring the hay to the press. When the buck rake had all he could haul he would take his load to where the scratchers could dig out enough from the pile that the tablers could put the hay on what we called the table. The pressman would put the loose hay into the press and punch it down into the mouth of the press and as the mule pulled, the press would go around and the hay would be forced back into where it made bales. To make the bales the pressman would have to put the block in the press at just the right time. The blocks had a small slot in them so the man we called the puncher could put the wire ties through and the tie man could tie the bales together. The stacker would then be waiting to pull the bale away from the press and stack it where it would be out of the way. The press was operated by a mule that was hooked to a leaver that was tied to some gears. Everytime the man that was feeding the press would put a load of hav into it , the press

It was so boring that I have gone to sleep and fell and of course when that happened everything had to stop until you got up and back on your seat. Everyone would laugh and tease you, but with all the hard and dry work we had fun.

After I got a little bigger, I was elected to operate the buck rake and that was better than riding the plunger to keep the old mule going.
