1981 Cotton Crop Heavy, Price Poor

Cotton may not be King anymore, but this year it's sheer volume has put it back up among the top ranks in this area.

Several local farmers express the opinion that more cotton was planted this

year, and that coupled with a high yield year, has kept local gins in full swing for about a month now, with little let-up in sight.

John G. Wright, owner of the Blackland Prairie Gin in Deport stated that they had ginned some 900 bales so far,

with 100-150 on the gin lot waiting to be ginned. The gin has operated with one crew, since most of the farmers in their area only lacked about a week of stripping being finished.

Cunningham consistently has a steady supply of cotton

year after year, farmers in that area expressing the opinion that cotton is a consistently money-making crop over the "Long haul". Those who live near Cunningham or Deport are more familiar with the gentle-low hum of the gins. It

becomes a part of their lives and one is more prone to notice the cessation of the noise than when it begins.

Although the 1981 cotton harvest may show up poorly this year, and Wright predicts another month of ginning.

Pat Norwood of the Cunningham Co-Op gin in Cunningham expressed much the same opinion. They have been working "Fourteen hours a day, seven days a week" and have 250 bales of cotton sitting on the lot even though rain will give them a chance to catch up.

They have weighed in a total of 1360 bales, and last year only ginned 1269 all total.


The Norwood's said that they would be finished with their major ginning soon,

working a twelve to fourteen hour day, and has suffered no major breakdowns to delay ginning, yet the volume of cotton has kept them continuously behind since the start of the season.

Wright expressed the opinion that the cotton stripped so far this season is some of the best quality ever. However, the price, only 54 cents per pound, is causing most farmers to do little more than break even, in spite of the good crop.

As a comparison to the amount of cotton harvest last year the Blackland Prairie Gin only ginned a total of 927 bales all season, less than

price wise, it still will contribute heavily to the area economy. Years such as this and the 1979 cotton season are much to be appreciated.

First Baptist Church To Celebrate Anniversary


Sunday October 18, the First Baptist Church of Deport will celebrate its one-hundredth anniversary.

Lamar County Allocated Road Funds

State Treasurer Warren G. Harding announced today that early next week \$25,770,675.15 will be distributed to the 254 Texas counties. These funds are the Lateral Road Fund administered by the State Treasurer's office as allocated by the sixty-

seventh legislature.

The Lamar County allocation is \$128,386.85, and the funds will be used for the construction and improvement of county roads. The lateral road fund is comprised of monies derived from gasoline taxes collected at the pump. The

county allocations are based on the county square mile area, the rural population, and the county lateral road mileage. Expenditures of the funds are reported by the counties to the State Treasurer.

Treasurer Harding stated that the distribution includes

money appropriated for fiscal years 1980, 1981, and 1982, as well as interest earned on these funds. The 1982 funds are being distributed now rather than at the completion of the fiscal year.

PJC To Hold Private Pilot School

Beginning Tuesday, Nov. 3, a private pilot ground school will be held at Paris Junior College, according to June Jones, director of continuing education for PJC. Objective of the course is to prepare student pilots for the FAA written examination for the private pilot's certificate.

Bill Boothe of the Paris Flight Center Inc. at Cox Field will be instructor for the course, scheduled from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. on Tuesdays

for 12 weeks. The fee will be \$150, which includes the 36 hours of instruction, a text-book, workbook, practice examinations, plotter and \$75 student kit which contains a navigation computer. If a student already has the kit, the fee would be reduced to \$75.

The instructor, who holds a commercial pilot certificate, has certified flight instructor, multi-engine and instrument ratings. Classes will be held in the Alford

Center at PJC.
