Prairiland Pats Defeat Roxton Lions

The Patriots tucked away another victory under their belt this past weekend as they defeated the Roxton Lions in a cross-country battle fought at Roxton. The game turned out to be a classic even though the Pats won by ten points.

The first quarter belonged solely to the Lions as they took a first quarter lead of 12-10. The Pats were in for something that they had

prepared for earlier. Roxton's tough "Deny man-to-man defense". Roxton again took control of the game in the second quarter as they slightly stretched their lead to three, 26-23. Their defense was truly hampering the Patriots offensive attack.

The third quarter turned out to be much like the first two. The Patriots were having to work for every point that they scored. Roxton's quickness and

aggressiveness was putting the Pats playing ability to the test. At the end of the third quarter the Lions still held a two point edge over the Patriots, 36-34.

The fourth quarter, you might say, was dominated by the Patriots. Like always, they brought out their trusty full court press and deployed it upon the unsuspecting Lions. Roxton was unable to cope with it. The Patriots

were able to catch the lead and steadily pull away from them. The score finally ended up Roxton 49 and the Patriots 59. Scoring honors for the Patriots were Richard Williams with 22 points, Jeff Ballard hit 15, and Mark Riley netted 10 more. Bobby Tinner paced the Roxton squad with 14 well earned points.

In girls action, Patriot fems were also forced to

stage a fourth quarter comeback in posting a 48-41 win.

Joyce McCarty, who hit for 16 points on the evening, paced the Lionettes to a 24-20 halftime lead, overcoming Prairiland's 12-10 first quarter advantage.

Roach Oil Co., on Hwy. 271 in Deport, was the victim of vandals Monday night or early Sunday morning.

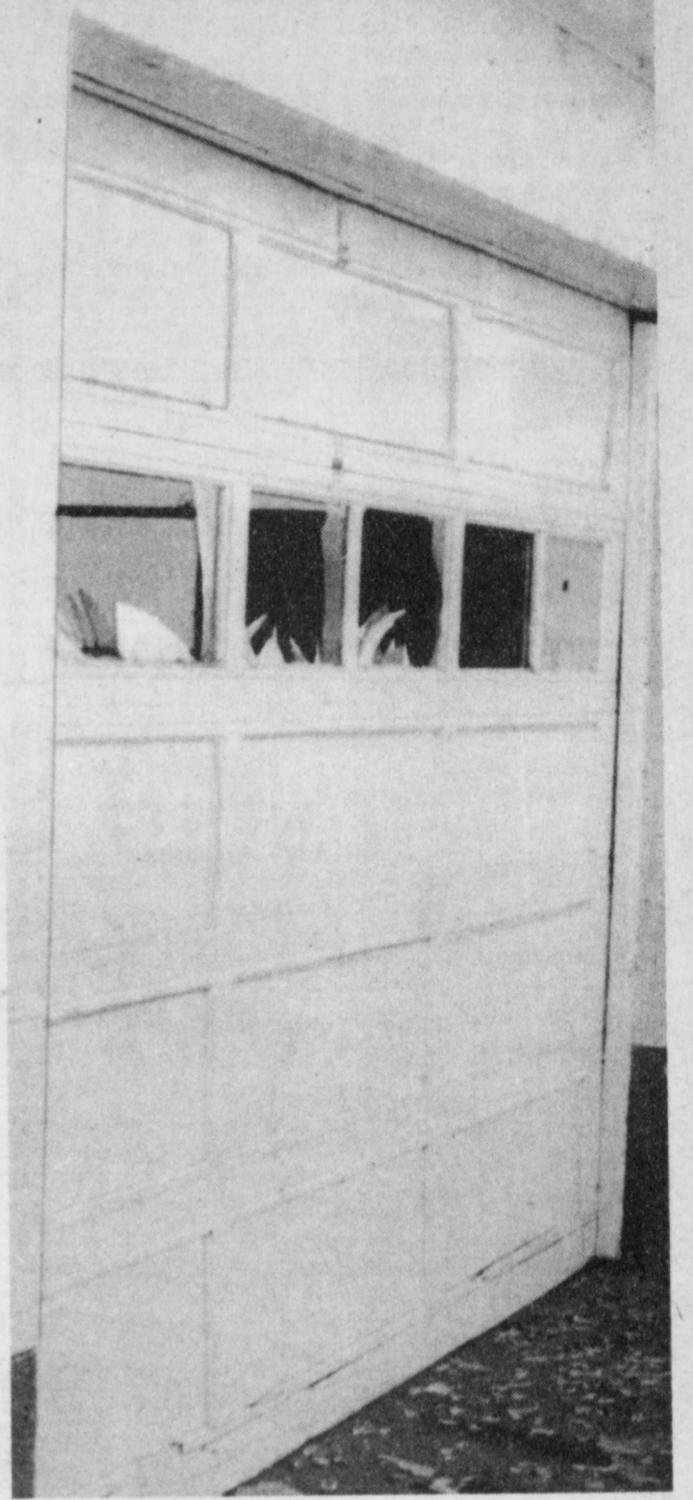

Bob Whites Call Part Of Area

The Bob White quail is related to the partridge (lately in a pear tree) of Old Europe. It's cheery call is so familiar to East Texans that a summer evening without it would seem unnatural.

There was never much doubt as to his name-whether people call them quail, partridge or what-he names himself endlessly with his repeated "Bob White, Bob, Bob White" call. A fine game bird, tasty and prolific, it is also one of the prettiest birds around.

Few area folks have avoided having their hearts thump wildly when the plump, short-winged birds erupt from underfoot during a tramp through brush or pasture!

The wings make a distinctive whirring sound, and more often than not he will make a bomber-like glide to a new resting place only yards in front of the hiker.

A covey of young quail observed is a comical sight. Mother seems quite distracted with her tiny babies as they dart along in single file behind her, making constant side trips hither and back again.

Often the mother will fake injury, dragging her wing and crying piteously to distract a supposed predator.

Besides their delightful call and neatly barred brown, white and black appearance the Bob-White serves yet another purpose.

They feed primarily on weed seeds and pernicious insects, and therefore are useful on any farm, yard or pasture.

They are plentiful, but must be hunted within season to keep from destroying their balance in the area.

The quail lives in dense brush and bramble, and the

local blackberry is a fine cover for them.

Unlike some birds the male is attentive to the female, a good provider and upon the death of a female they will brood, feed and raise the young by themselves.

The very fact they are so

prevalent and familiar to the locale makes them something of a symbol of East Texas.

They are recognized by everyone, and few people can claim not to feel soothed by their pretty, cheerful calls as daylight fades from the sky.

Tax Exemption For Elderly Available

If you were 65 years of age before Jan. 1, 1982, you may qualify for the over 65 years of age exemption. If you have claimed the over 65 years of age in a prior year, you may complete the form and mail it to the Lamar County Appraisal District. If you recently became 65 years, and have not claimed the exemption before, you will need to come to the office to document your age and file the application. These applications do not require filing each year, they are valid as long as the

qualification exists. If you are a veteran and have not signed up for your exemption please do so at the Lamar County Appraisal District Office on Lamar Ave. from January 1 to April 15. Their phone number is 785-7899.

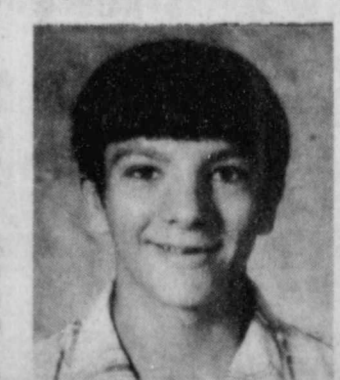

Estimated Tax Due

The fourth, and final, installment of estimated Federal tax payments on 1981 individual income is due by January 15, 1982, the Internal Revenue Service says.

This installment should be paid using declaration voucher No. 4 found in the Form 1040-ES package. "Declaration of Estimated Tax for Individuals."

Taxpayers whose anticipated income changed

during 1981 may have to file an amended declaration. Space is provided in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate.

For more detailed information, the IRS publication 505 "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," is available free by calling the IRS forms-tax information number in the local telephone directory.

Alcohol Program Celebrates Anniversary

The incidence of young alcoholism is growing. Currently, the average age of the alcoholic is 44. But, in 1986, the average alcoholic could be between 23 and 28 years old if education about alcoholism is not more extensive, predicts Colin Kennedy, executive director of the Houston Regional Council on Alcoholism.

Educating family members, doctors, and lay people that alcoholism is both a preventable and treatable disease can help them support the alcoholic's decision to seek treatment early, said Kennedy.

Although the American Medical Association recognized alcoholism as a disease almost 25 years ago, many people still try to ignore the issue and the alcoholic, according to Kennedy, who recently spoke at the eighth anniversary celebration of the Hermann Hospital Alcohol Problem Treatment Program.

He explained: "We're willing to talk about sex and cancer with each other, but we wouldn't dare talk about alcoholism. And we need to," Kennedy said that outpatient treatment clinics, new blood studies, and courses for medical students in treating alcoholism will soon be implemented in many places in order to help prevent and treat alcoholism.

Kennedy, a recovered alcoholic, helped establish the Alcohol Problem Treatment Program at Hermann Hospital in 1973 with a grant from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

The program began with just one counselor (Kennedy) and one patient. Today more than 1,400 people have participated in the program, which now includes six counselors, two doctors, 24 nurses and psychiatric specialists, two occupational therapy specialists, several clinical psychologists, and a dietitian. Some of the staff members share joint appointments at The University of Texas Medical School at Houston.

Participants usually enter the 28-day, in-patient program at Hermann on the own or after being referred by their companies. While they are at Hermann, patients are involved in a full medical, educational, recreational, and group therapy environment.

Adult family members may also take part in the program during the initial treatment period.

Follow-up groups for alumni are scheduled weekly to maintain on-going contact during the early months of recovery. For more information regarding the program, call 797-3370.

Voters To Decide Of Legalization Of Bingo

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that voters in at least 12 Texas counties and five cities will decide January 16 whether non-profit groups can legally operate bingo games in their communities.

"This is going to end the confusion about bingo in Texas. From now on, bingo is going to be approved by the voters and licensed by the state or it's going to be illegal," Bullock said.

Cities, counties and justice precincts that approve bingo can also levy a two percent gross receipts tax on the games. The Comptroller's office will handle licensing of the games, collect the tax and return it to the communities where the games are held.

Where voters approve bingo, non-profit groups must get licenses from the Comptroller's Bingo Regulation Division and can't legally operate games until 10 days after the local option election, according to Division Director George Garland.

"We are urging non-profit groups in these counties and cities to apply in advance for their licenses by contacting us right away," Garland said.

Organizations should contact the division by writing to 111 E. 17th Austin, Texas 78774 or calling 1-800-252-5555.

According to the new bingo law, cities, counties and justice precincts that don't vote to approve bingo in January must wait until the next constitutional election date of April 3.

To call a bingo election, a local governing body must receive a petition with the signatures of 10 percent of the number of voters who cast ballots in the last governor's election.

The Comptroller's first enforcement priority following the January voting will be to protect those groups who have obtained licenses.

"Especially where the local government has levied the two percent tax," Garland said, "we will be checking to make sure every bingo game is licensed. Those that don't have licenses will be urged to get them. If they don't become licensed and keep playing bingo, we will file complaints with local authorities and the Attorney General."

Counties due to vote first on the bingo question include Guadalupe, Comal, Kerr, Maverick, Klebert, Victoria, Fayette, Milam, Wharton, Nueces, Lavaca, Jimm Wells and Webb.

Cities holding January 16 elections include White Settlement, Schertz, Selma, Gregory and Reno.

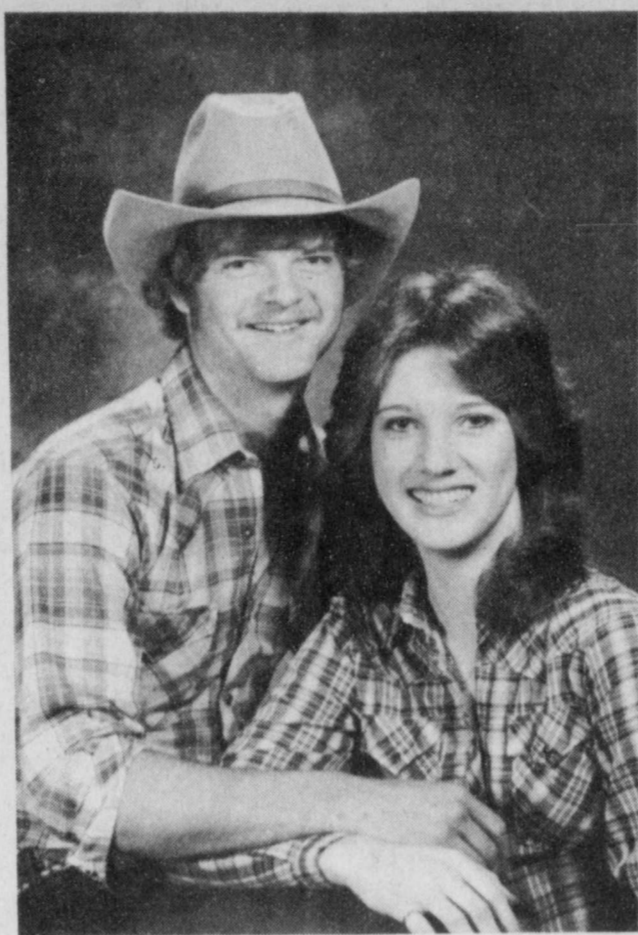

Beware Of "Bargain"

The planting season is almost upon us and the nursery ads are already expounding on the bargains that can be obtained. Most people like bargains or think they do. Before rushing off to the store with the bargain ad in your hand, stop a moment to consider what is meant by a bargain.

A bargain is only a bargain if you get something that gives enough personal satisfaction to make you feel it was worth the money needed to purchase it. Therefore, a cut-rate or special bargain may be a very unwise purchase to the unsuspecting buyer.

Good bargains do exist within the retail nursery trade, but how does one know if he is buying a bargain. The first rule in buying nursery stock is to always buy quality. Quality is the prime consideration of any bargain. Unless the nurseryman has been quality-conscious throughout his entire operation, the plant may not be a bargain at any price.

By the time you have planted it, the initial cost of the plant may be only a fraction of the cost of the

material and labor needed to do the job properly. You will probably have to purchase peat moss or other organic matter to prepare the back fill. Topsoil, fertilizer, tools, tree wrap, and pruning equipment may also be needed if you don't have them on hand. Keeping this in mind, if a plant fails to grow and flourish, much less survive because of poor production and harvesting techniques or improper handling before you bought, it is no bargain even if it was given to you; you would actually be losing money.

Quality in nursery stock is very difficult to define. The best way to be assured of good quality plant materials is to always deal with a local established and reputable nurseryman who takes a pride in providing good merchandise.

To help identify a bargain the next time you are in the market for nursery stock, ask yourself the following questions:

1. Can you recognize quality nursery stock? If not, does the firm have a good reputation for quality?
 2. Are the plants tagged and identifiable with specific variety names?
 3. Are the salespeople able and willing to offer opinions on what plants might best fill your needs in the landscaping?
 4. Do you have a varied choices of sizes, colors, and shapes from which to choose?
 5. What type of guarantee is mentioned, and is the salesman willing to discuss any inquiries you make about guarantees?
 6. Most important of all, does it fit into your landscape plan or are you buying it because the price is cheap?
- If you can give yourself a satisfactory answer to each of these questions, in all likelihood you have a bargain.

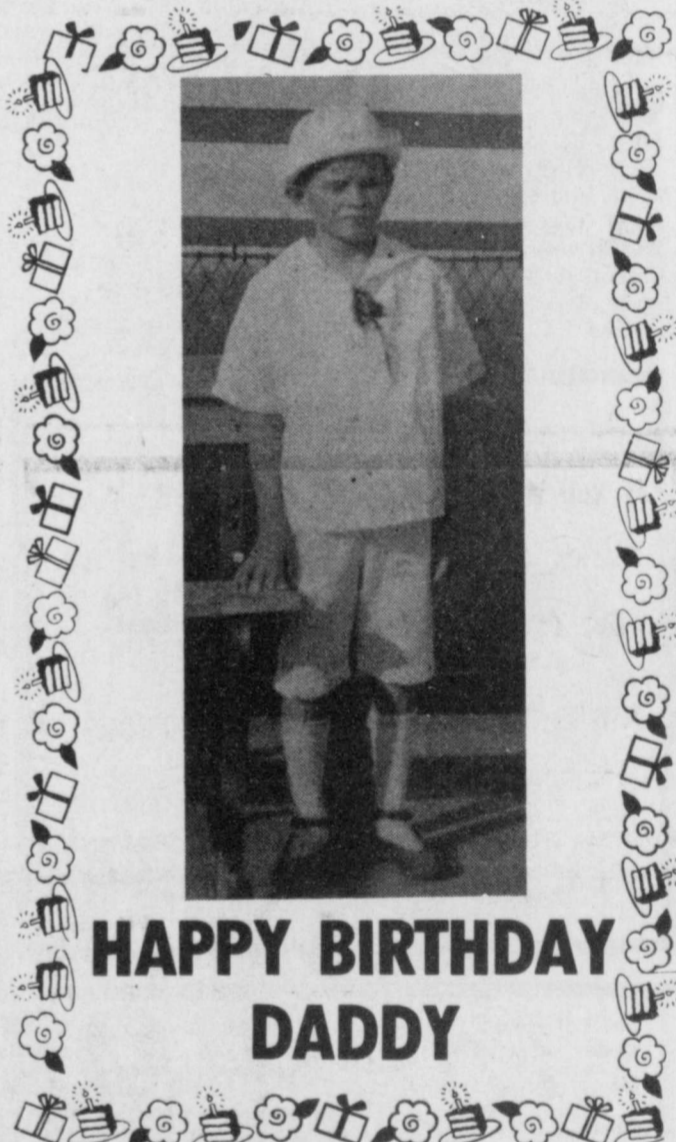

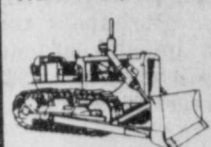
