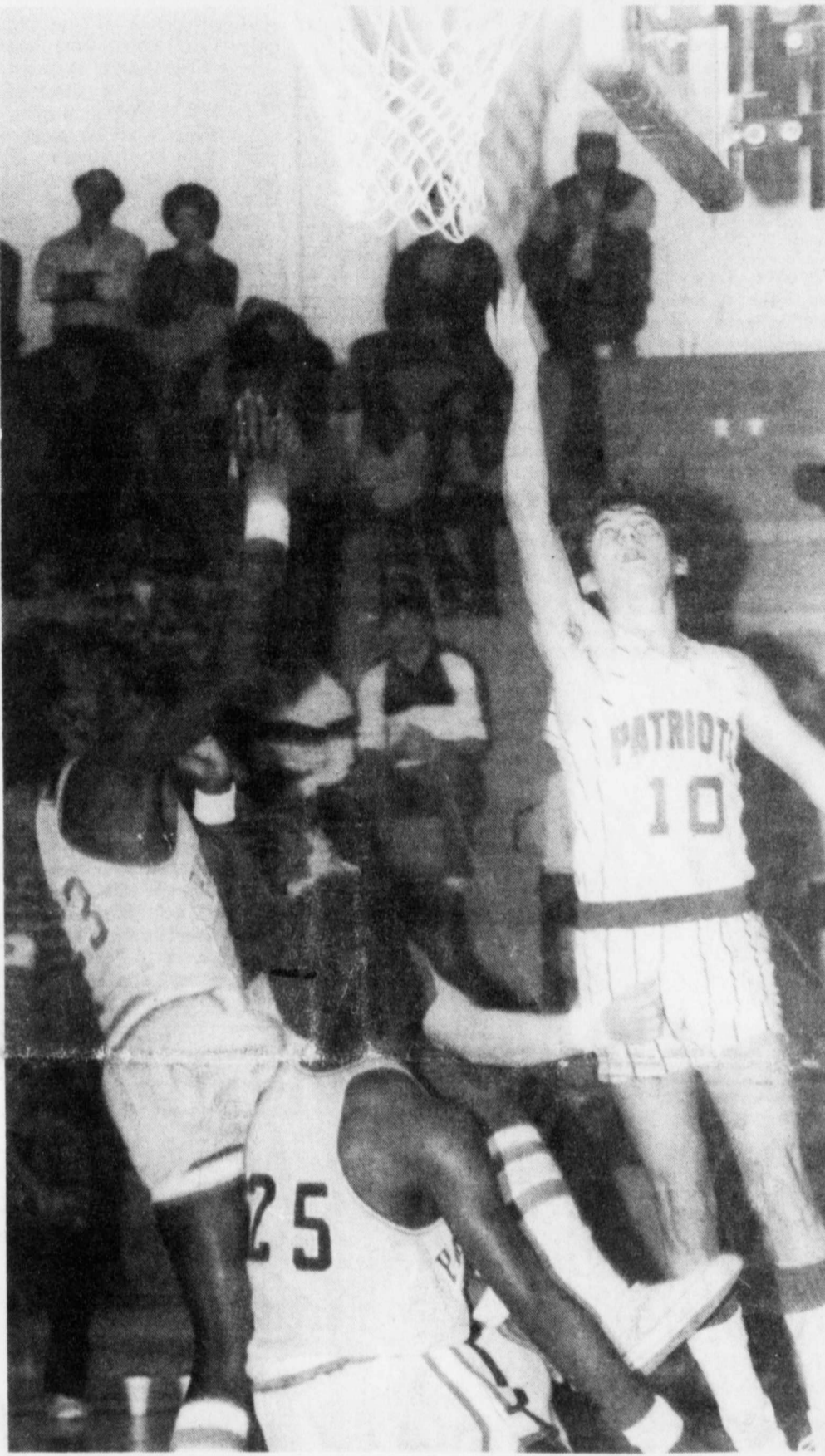

The Prairiland Patriots moved to 4-1 in District 13 AAA play this past Friday night as they defeated their cross-country rivals of North Lamar in a fiercely fought battle. The Patriots managed to out-rebound and out-score the Panthers to pull off the win 55-51. First quarter action began very slowly Friday night on the Patriot home court. Neither North Lamar nor Prairiland could generate any type of offense. North Lamar drew first blood on a free-throw made by sophomore David Washington. The Patriots managed to get their scoring drive going late in the first only to find themselves three points behind when the buzzer sounded. North Lamar's long outside

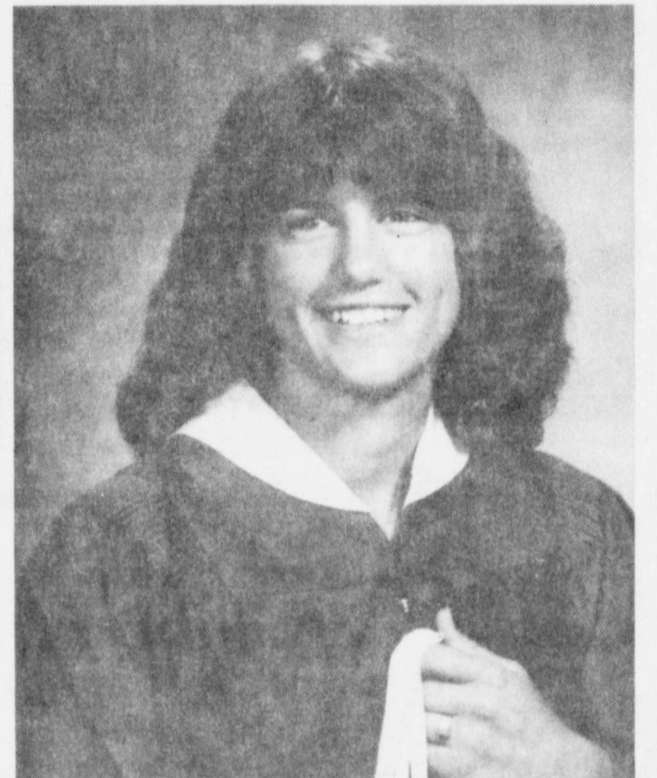
shooting was what had given the the 6-9 lead. The second period remained as close as the first. The Patriots took over the lead with hot outside shooting from Richard Williams and Mark Reily. North Lamar stayed right behind them with their outside shooting and inside work. The action speeded up to end the first half 25-23, Patriots. The Patriots scored fourteen points in the third stanza to give themselves a four point lead over the Panthers. Williams, Riley, and Harrell all contributed to the Patriot score column. The Pat's continued to control the boards and North Lamar continued to bomb from the outside. The third quarter ended with Prairiland 39 and North

Lamar 35. The fourth quarter was played much as the other three. Prairiland continued to lead the Panthers in scoring and rebounding. North Lamar wouldn't give up though, and always seemed to stay within at least six points of the Pats. Williams and Brad Sessums hit some crucial points in the fourth to keep North Lamar from having a chance at the win. The final score once again was 55-51, Prairiland. Richard Williams pumped in 24 points for the Pats while Mark Reily followed with 12. Rick Harrell and Brad Sessums didn't break double figures but scored seven and six points respectively. North Lamar's scoring was lead by sophomore David Washingtons 13 points. Team-mate Kenny Dollins hit 10 more for the Panthers.

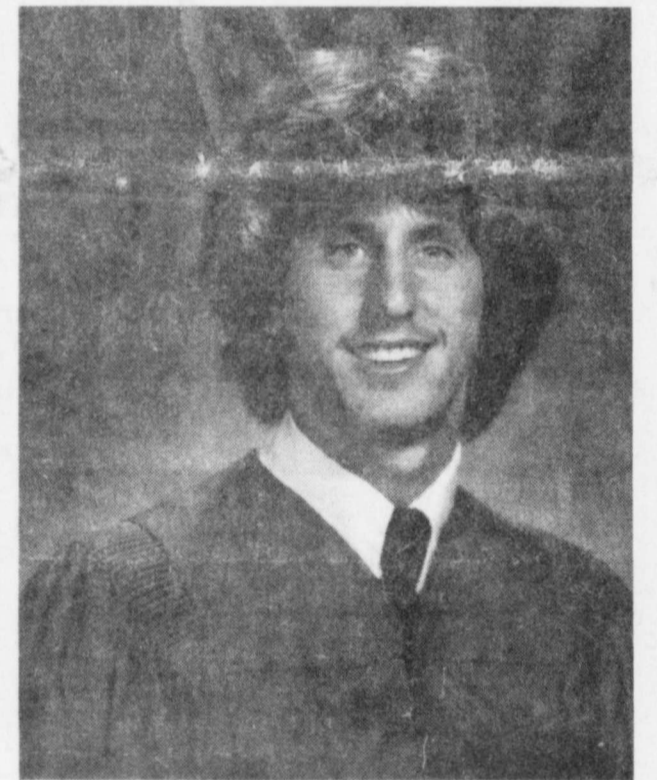


MARK Reilly goes up with the ball against the North Lamar Panthers last Friday night in the continuing rivalry bet-

tact Wayland Ayers, assistand fire chief, at 982-5355. Your support of this annual event will insure the building of a new fire station for Blossom.

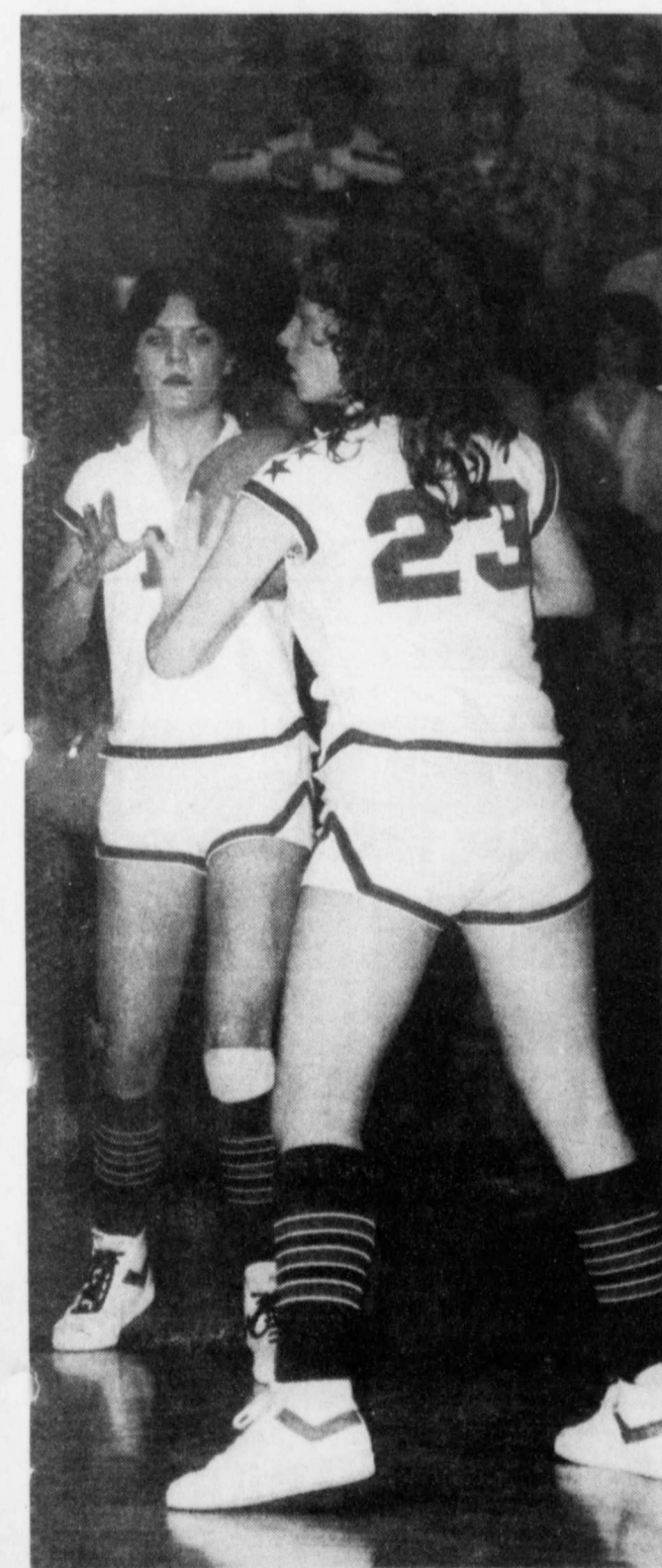
East Texas Meeting Rescheduled
