## Four Places Open In Trustee Election

The Prairiland School board has scheduled its trustee election for April 3, 1982. Four places are open on the board, Place 1, Place 6, Place 5 and Place 7.

Filing for Place 5 is Bobby Kennedy, also an incumbent. Raymond Hoover, long-time board member, has announced that he will not be running for re-election in Place 7. As yet no one has filed for the position.

Leon Anderson has not yet filed to fill the one year unexpired term. He is currently holding.

The filing deadline is March 3, and filing must be done at Prairiland Administration on the Prairiland High School campus.

In other business the board approved payment of bills, approved the minutes, heard Superintendent Buddy Taylor give a financial report and approved that report, and heard from a Mr. and Mrs. McIntire of Blossom concerning their concern for their child's school performance.

The board accepted the resignation of Bill Geer, principal of Blossom Elementary school at the end of this year. Mr. Geer is retiring and will do some ranching and farming.

The contracts of the other principals, James Lowry, Lloyd Simmons and Charles Martin, were extended for another year, making them two years contracts.

The board then elected to adopt a term contract for teachers. The term contract is similar to the present contract system, it provides for a one year hiring, with a two year probationary period. This means that for the first two years a teacher is on probation and the board does not have to renew a contract if that teacher should prove ineffective or incompetent.

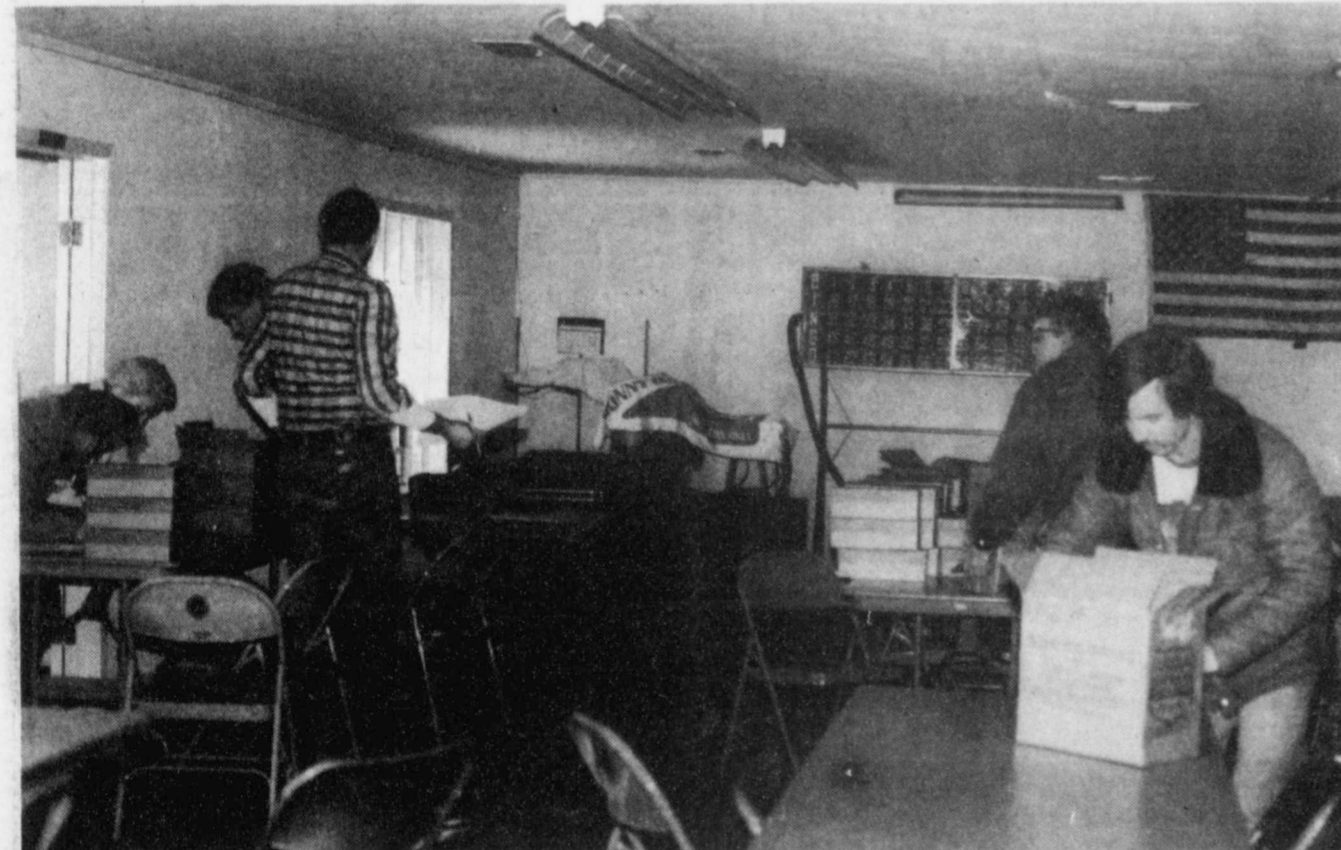
## Prairiland Defeats Winnsboro Tuesday Night

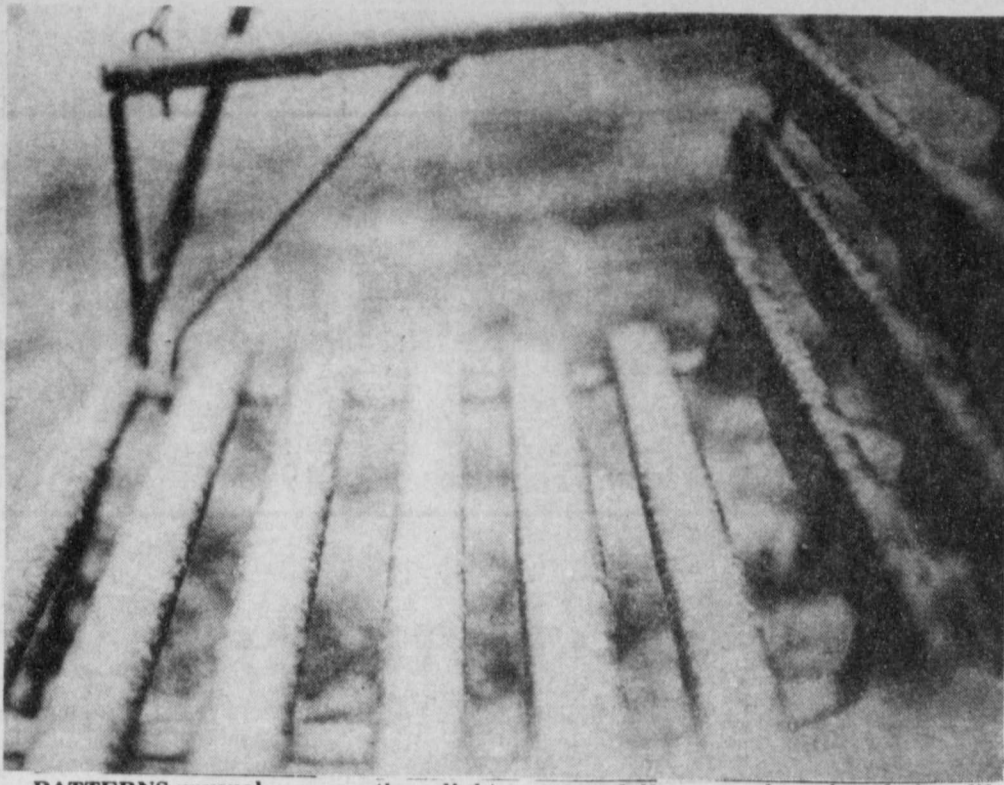

The church building was erected downtown, later moved two blocks north and in 1907 moved to its present location. That same year Masonic Lodge 303 moved its charter to Blossom from Starksville where it was originally chartered in 1868.

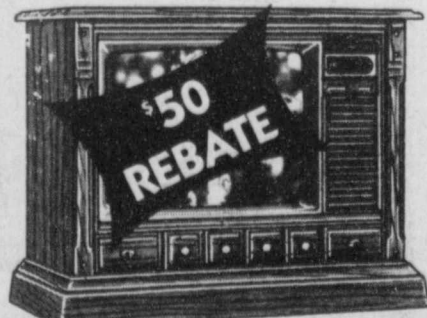

Mrs. Glenda Hatcher has been named Chairperson of the Cystic Fibrosis Spring Event in Blossom. The announcement was made by the North-East Texas Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Cystic fibrosis is an inherited and degenerative disease that attacks the lungs and the digestive system by producing a thick glue-like mucus that impairs normal breathing and digestion. An average of five children are born with cystic fibrosis every day.

There is still no cure for CF, but research continues in the effort to find one. In the meantime, this research serves to improve medical treatment that prolongs and enhances the quality of the lives of cystic fibrosis patients.

Major improvements have been made. Fifteen years ago, it was rare for a child to live long enough to enter school. Thanks to improved medical treatment, nearly half of the CF children born today will live past the age of

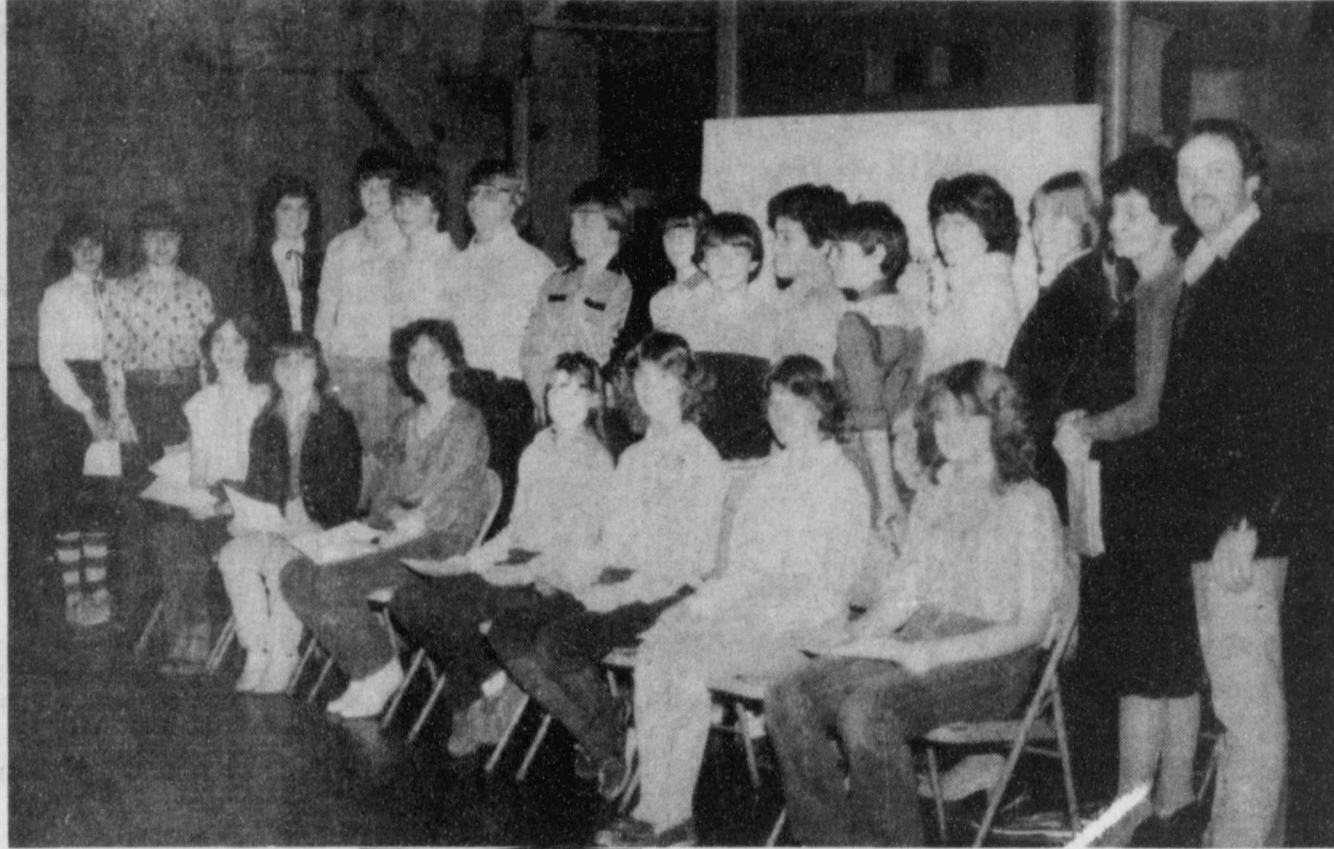
21. One key element in insuring a longer and better life is early diagnosis and treatment.

That is why the Spring Special Event Campaign has three parts: broadened public education, improved medical treatment, and research to find a control for the disease. There are presently 123 CF Medical Centers supported by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation throughout the United States.
