Ballard Approved As New Principal

The Prairiland School Board, after an executive session during their regular meeting Monday night, voted to approve Billy Max Ballard as the new principal of Blossom Elementary School.

three of her history students at Deport for their trip to San Antonio to enter in a history project competition at a state-wide level. The students have already won at Commerce on an area level. The textbook committee's recommendations on new textbooks for the next school year were approved.

The board also accepted the contract of Associated Tax Services, the firm which does the Prairiland CISD's tax statements and other tax-related business. The board then approved the minutes of the last meeting and payment of bills.

Blossom Council Covers Variety Of Subjects

The Blossom City Council met in regular session Tuesday, March 2 at 7 p.m. Mayor George Lemley and council members JoAnn Campbell, Ann Dudley and Nathaniel McDonald were present.

There were about 25 interested citizens present. Minutes were approved as read. The business meeting was conducted by Mayor Lemley.

Arena Cablevision Corporation was granted an ordinance to erect and operate a new earth satellite service. Randy Wright of Arena Cablevision stated the company hoped to have the satellite in operation by August or September. There will be two new channels and a one dollar increase when the signal is turned on.

The council voted to have new guidelines for use of the ballparks drawn up by their attorney in official form.

The Council voted to enforce an ordinance the city has, concerning overdue water and sewer bills. Water and sewer bills are due ten days from the date of the bill and are delinquent on the 21st day after that date and will be cut-off on the 21st day after the billing date. No longer will two months or more be given to pay the water or sewer bills. If the

21st day from the date of bill falls on a weekend, the payment must be in the mail slot on Monday morning when the business office opens or paid on the previous Friday. There will be a \$10.00 service charge on each meter that is cut off. It was brought to the attention of the council, when cut-off lists are made up in February for those people who were past due, the amount was \$1295.45. This did not include water used in January.

The Council voted to help the Garden Club with a clean-up week this spring, with the city sponsoring a one day trash pick-up for those who cannot dispose of their trash.

The girls softball league donated the city \$600.00 and the council voted to match the money to help build restrooms at the ballpark.

The members voted to pay all current bills. The meeting adjourned.

Mail Box Destruction Stretches Across East End Of County

Friday night, a spree of mail box destruction stretched from Pattonville to Deport.

The Postal Department has the matter under investigation at present.

Michael Bright Wins In Houston Calf Scramble

Michael Bright wrestled a calf over the finish line at the February 27 performance of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo to earn a \$400 calf purchase certificate. The certificate, donated by Houston Agricultural Credit

Corporation, will enable Michael to purchase a beef or dairy heifer which he will feed and groom during the coming year under the direction of Randy Cole. At next year's Livestock Show, the youngster will return with the calf to compete in the special show ring competition.

The rough and tumble scramble takes place at each of the Rodeo performances. Twelve calves and 24 youngsters are turned loose. Each contestant who manages to halter a calf and drag it across the finish line receives a purchase certificate donated by Houston-area businesses and individuals. While the viewing public sees only the scramble and judging events, the heart of the Calf Scramble program is the knowledge the scramble winners gain in the intervening year. Closely supervised by a Vocational Agricultural Teacher or County Extension Agent, each youth keeps the accurate records and performs other obligations designed to underscore the responsibilities involved in raising a calf.

The Calf Scramble is only one example of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's commitment to the youth of Texas, and the benefits of this one event alone are considerable. Many heifers purchased with these certificated form the basis for future cattle herds. Since the calf scramble began, more than 9,000 animals valued at more than \$2 million have been donated to Texas youngsters.

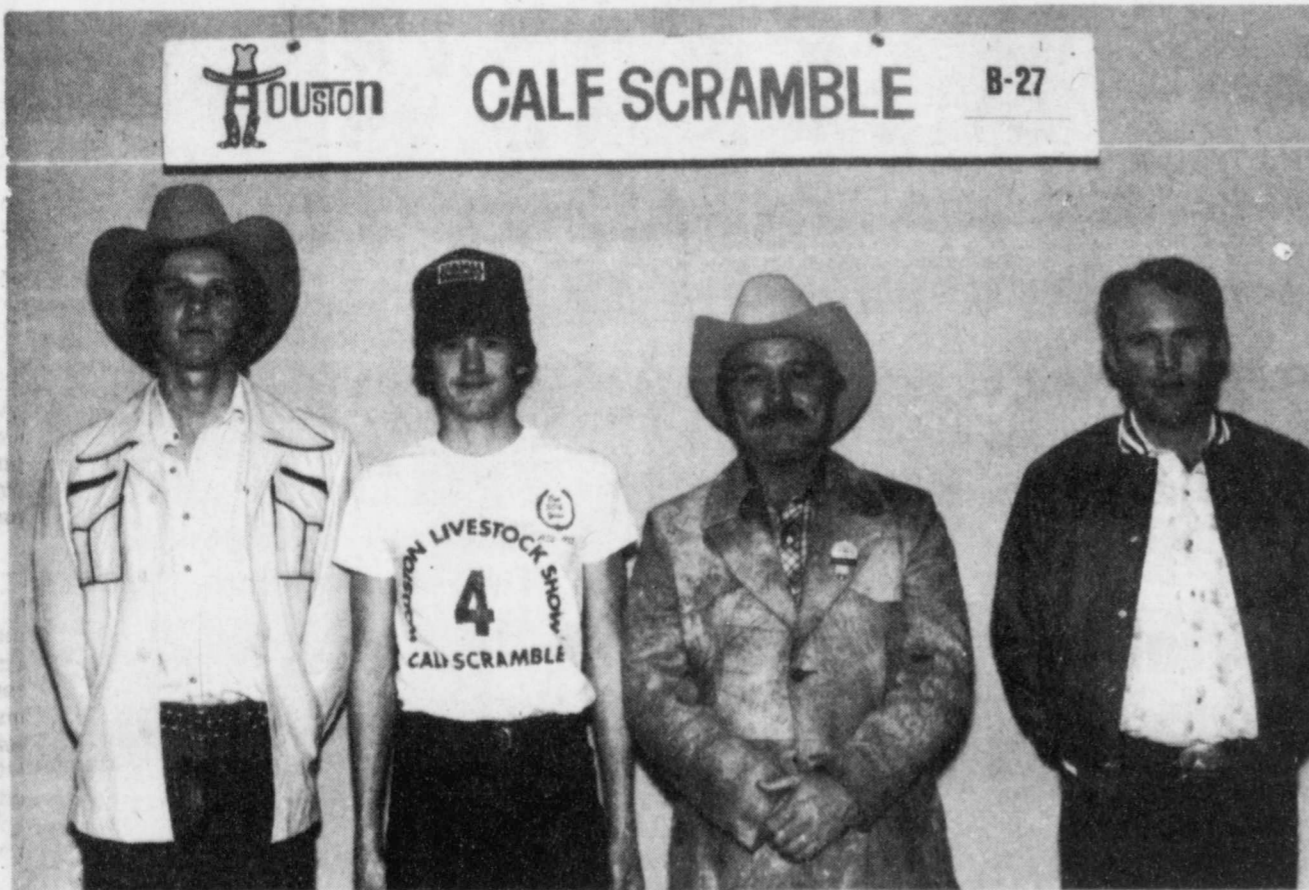
Deport Methodist Revival Scheduled

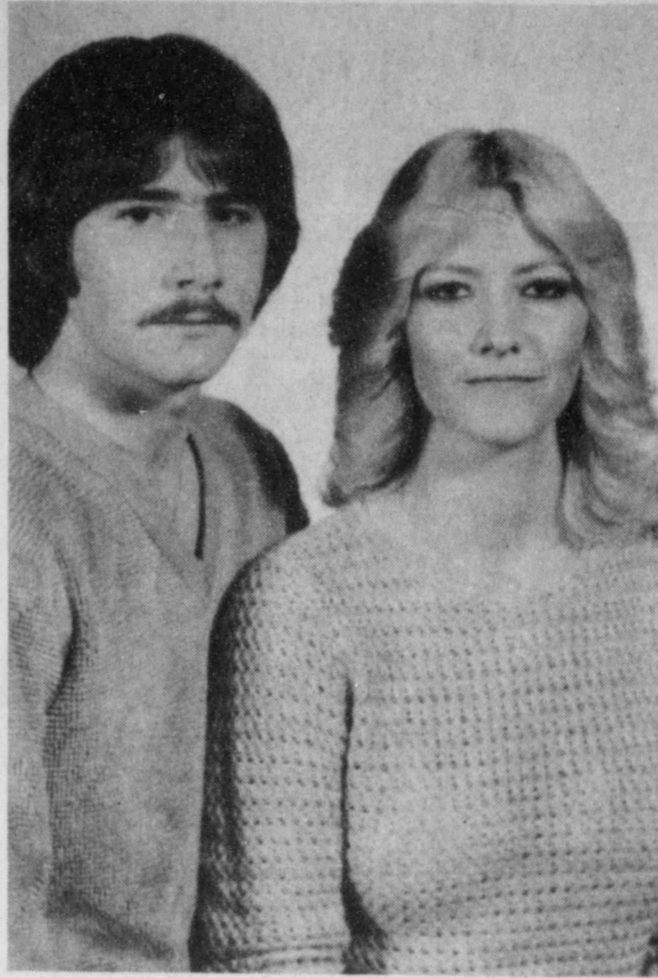

Donna and her daughters, Leigh Annis and Tracy, are members of the McKenzie United Methodist Church in Clarksville.



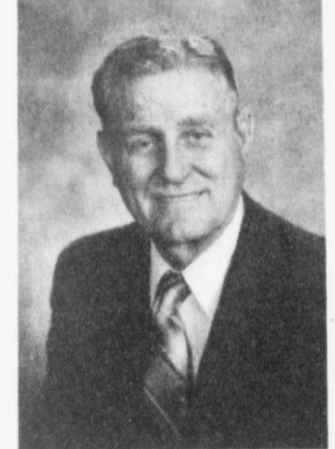

PJC Hosts Employment Program

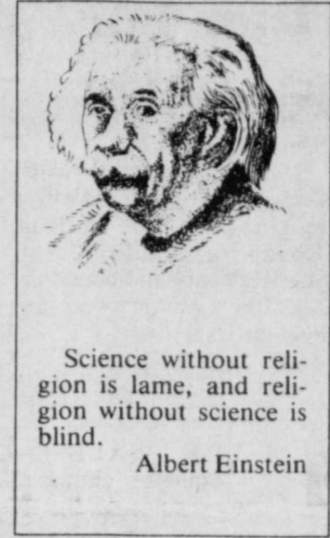

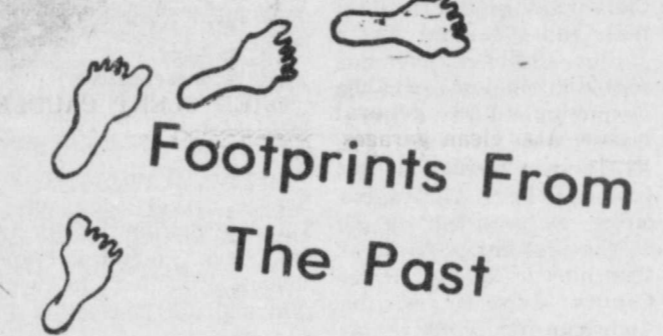

Modification Made In Trooper Requirements

Colonel Jim Adams, Department of Public Safety director, announced recently that "effective with the June recruit class, DPS trooper candidates may substitute law enforcement-related experience for the current educational requirement of 60 college hours. Thus, applicants with two years of commissioned law enforcement experience or two years of honorable active military service would be eligible for a waiver of the two-year college requirement. Likewise, one year of such qualifying experience could be substituted for one year of college work."

This temporary modification is intended to increase the reservoir of qualified applicants yet ensure a continuance of the high personal standards which have been the hallmark of the Department's success.

Colonel Adams said the DPS hopes to recruit 268 new troopers this year, including the 92 who are presently in training.

Recruits live in the DPS law enforcement academy in Austin during the 18 week training course. The starting monthly salary for recruits is \$1,223. Upon graduation, the officers are paid \$1,347 per month plus allowances

for uniforms and equipment. These salaries will increase September 1, 1982.

Of the 92 recruits scheduled for graduation from the law enforcement academy on May 14, 1982, 35 are members of minority groups. There are six women in the class.

One Percent Local Tax Is Safe
State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently that in nearly 1,000 Texas cities, if a one percent local sales tax is levied, their city coffers are safe from a legal challenge that could have forced the refund of millions in local tax revenue.
"The other shoe has fallen," Bullock said in announcing that U.S. Steel Corporation has dropped its appeal to a ruling upholding the way Texas local sales and use taxes are collected. The corporation had attacked the constitutionality of the local option sales tax and State District Judge Hume Cofer ruled in favor of the state last April. If U.S. Steel had pressed and won its appeal on Judge Cofer's ruling, Bullock said, many cities might have faced economic chaos, because city sales tax revenue would have been subject to claims for refunds.
