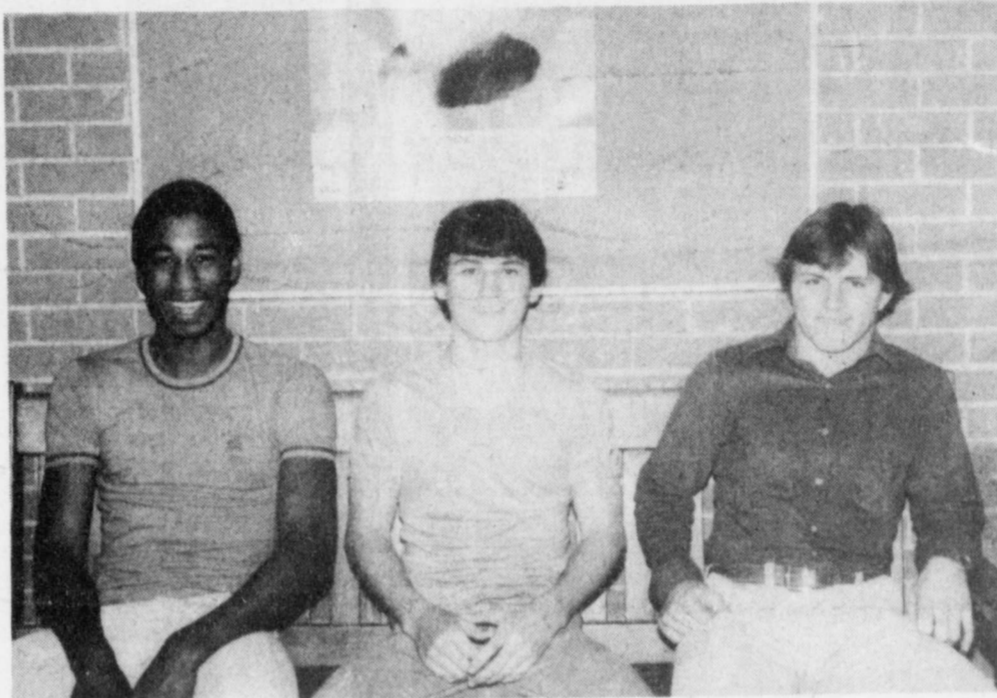

Texas Cities Receive \$48.9 Million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for March.

The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collection ever distributed—29 percent over the same period in 1981.

This record payment, reflecting taxable sales made by Texas businesses in January, is the second record payment in two months, but Bullock added a note of caution.

"Record sales can be one indicator of good times, but they are not an indicator of profit margins. These taxes are based on sales price or market value. True, Texans are spending more but these figures don't tell us what the merchants or suppliers or manufacturers are having to pay for the goods they buy."

The biggest check this month went to Houston, which received \$10.3 million, compared with \$8 million last March.

Locally, Blossom has received \$2,228.45 to date in 1982, a 20.39 percent increase over the same date in 1981.

Bogata received a check for \$735.95 for net payment this period, comparable to

\$628.48 for the same period last year, which brings the total to date of \$5,207.71, which is a 0.89 percent decrease over the same period in 1981.

Deport has received \$1,575.83 to date in 1982, a decrease of 2.86 percent from 1981.

Talco received a check for \$1,581.79, for a 2.42 percent

increase over the payment last year of \$1,291.59, receiving a total of \$7,289.43 to date this year.

The city and Metropolitan Transit Authorities sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

Blossom Bits From The Past

Source of information: April 2, 1871. Letter to Needham Whitley, Stanley, Co., North Carolina, from John Houneycutt (son-in-law).

According to John the nearest post office in this area was Starksville, farm labor was 75 cents per day, and the farmers had already planted their corn and were getting ready to plant cotton. He wrote the usual yield was 40 bushels of corn and about 1500 pounds of seed cotton per acre.

He described the prairie with such glowing words and the opportunities so great about two years later more of the family and some friends came.

In the early 1870's, North Carolinians came by steamboat to Jefferson, Texas and the rest of the journey to the Prairie was by oxen train.

Evidently the family agreed with what John wrote 111 years ago because the Needham Whitley descendants are still in the Blossom Prairie area.

Prairiland Places Well At Houston

Nelson Hevron's medium weight Poland China placed twenty-eighth. He did not

make the sale, as only the top twenty-five animals made the sale.

Errors Delay Refund Checks

"While an error-free tax return can be processed by the IRS within six to eight weeks at this time of the year, a return with an error can take up to 12 weeks, and, in some cases, considerably longer," said Sharon Wrublesky, Chief, Taxpayer Service Division for the Internal Revenue Service. "With three-fourths of taxpayers expecting refund checks, it is important to avoid the most common filing errors."

Along with the errors of failing to attach Forms W-2 and schedules, failing to sign and transposing numbers, MS. Wrublesky listed the following problem areas to steer clear of:

Entry on wrong line—Many taxpayers are entering W-2 wages on line 7 and then repeating this figure on line 8E. If IRS does not catch this mistake, the taxpayer's tax will be doubled and a balance due notice will be issued instead of the refund check the taxpayer might have expected.

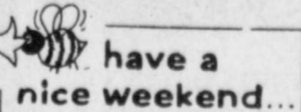

Weed And Insect Control Should Start Now

One of the most important chores for forage producers is the control of weeds in pastures and hay meadows. Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says the best control now is probably heavy grazing. Cattle will eat most of the young tender weeds and get a good amount of nutrition from them. It is too late to apply pre-emerge herbicides for controlling winter weeds. Reeves says that for broadleaf weeds that have begun to grow, 2,4-D or Banvel are two herbicides that do a good job of control.

Reeves says to pay particular attention to weed control in hay meadows so that a high quality first cutting can be obtained. With proper fertility and weed control, the first cutting could be the best produced during the year.

Many management decisions must be made now, according to Wayne Taylor, Extension economist-management. All inputs need to be reviewed carefully. The producer can do most of the figuring himself. Any input should return more than the cost of that input, Taylor says, whether considering equipment, fertilizer, insecticides, herbicides, etc.

Careful attention should be given to the practices, such as seed and proper varieties, that are necessary to produce returns. These practices should not be slighted or reduced if a comfortable return is expected.

Aphids are beginning to show up on vegetables and

ornamentals, says Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Control guidelines are available at local county Extension offices.

Even though dormant oil sprays may have been applied during the winter, Robinson suggests that an insecticide be applied for the control of the crawler stage of phylloxera and scale insects at bud break on pecans, fruit trees and ornamentals. It is very important on some ornamentals to apply insecticides for controlling other scale insects.

Spider mites are active on some house plants and plants in greenhouses. Robinson says that Kelthane is a suggested miticide for the control of spider mites.

The hornfly season is starting in southeast Texas and will be in northeast Texas by late March.

Robinson suggests that producers may want to wait until April or early May to put on insecticide impregnated ear tags for hornfly control. This will carry the control a little farther into the hornfly season.

More than one million Christmas tree seedlings were delivered to Texas producers this year, according to Jim Chandler, Extension forester headquartered at Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. 760,000 seedlings were delivered through the Texas Christmas Tree Growers Association and 417,000 were delivered through other channels, including the Texas Forest Service.

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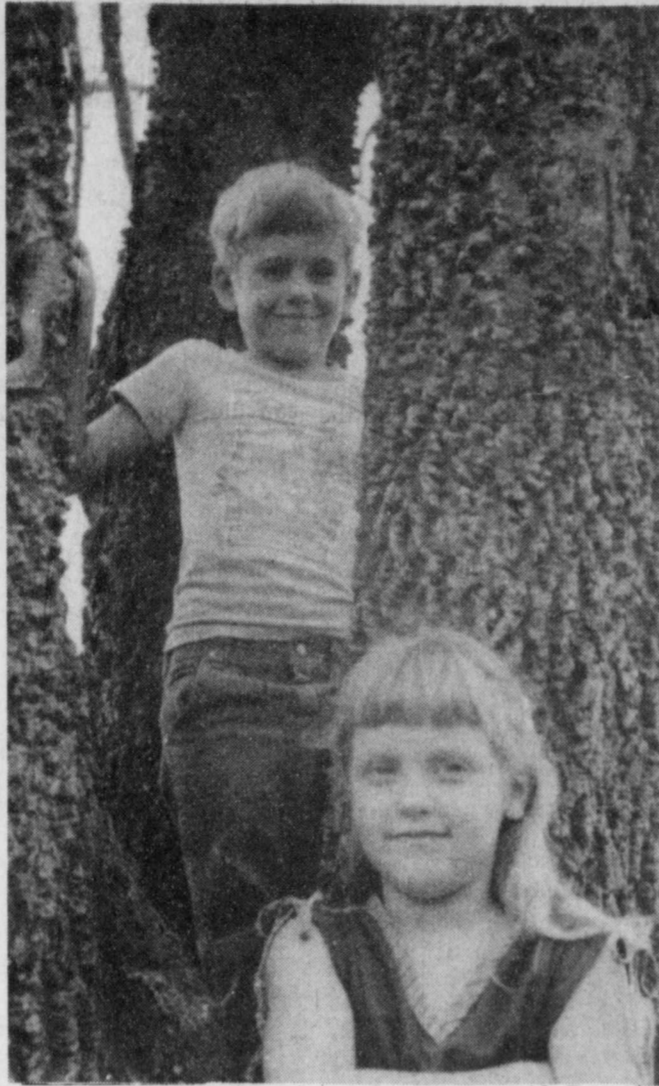

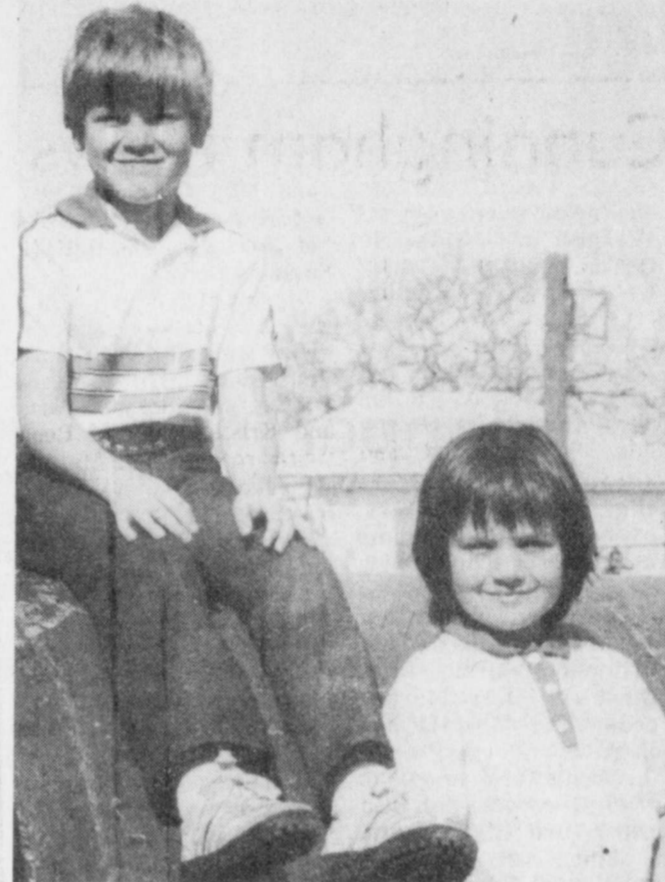

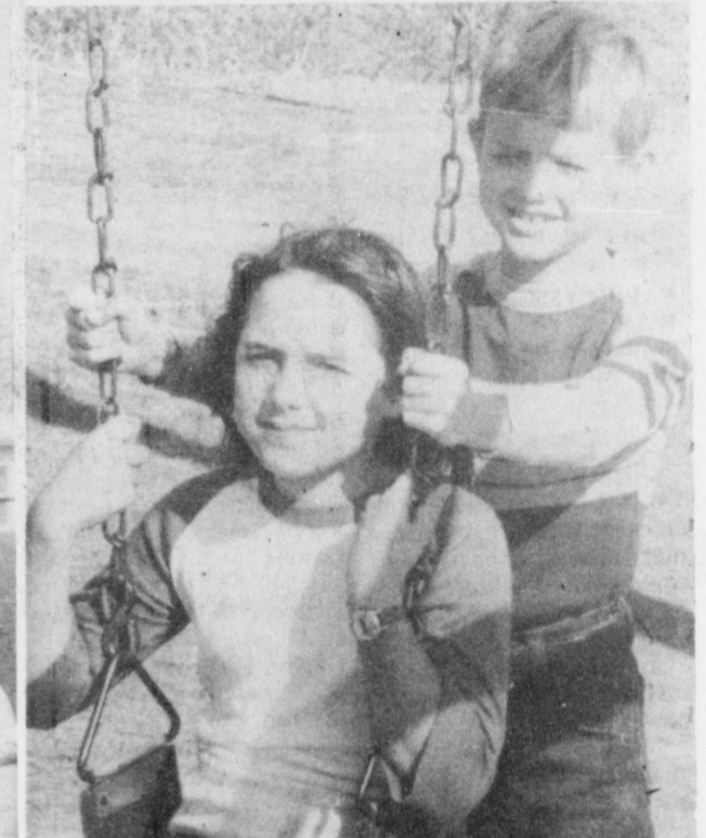
