"While an errorfree tax return can be processed by the IRS within six to eight weeks at this time of the year, a return with an error can take up to 12 weeks, and, in some cases, considerably longer," said Sharon Wrublesky, Chief, Taxpayer Service Division for the Internal Revenue Service. "With three-fourths of taxpayers expecting refund checks, it is important to avoid the most common filing errors.

Along with the errors of failing to attach Forms W-2 and schedules, failing to sign and transposing numbers. MS. Wrublesky listed the following problem areas to steer clear of:

Entry on wrong line-Many taxpayers are entering W-2 wages on line 7 and then repeating this figure on line 8E. If IRS does not catch this mistake, the taxpayer's tax will be doubled and a balance due notice will be issued instead of the refund check the taxpayer might have expected.
