The key point to remember with these materials is to make it available prior to fly season. Dairymen, for all practical purposes, are unable to feed the tetracy cline supplements to lactating dairy cows because of antibiotic traces in the milk. However, dairymen can use it if consumption of the tetracy cline is limited to 70 mg. per insecticide is applied for head a day. Prior to using, a dairyman should read the label and following the instructions to a "T". It is my personal opinion that a dairyman having a Fly Fever problem has only one choice and that is to vaccinate: A dairyman in this situation can no longer take a chance of losing a \$1500 dairy cow.

Individuals with pecan trees are reminded to spray this spring with zinc sulfate on NZN. The first spray application should be made after bud break and when the new terminal growth is from one and one-half to two inches in length. The second application to be made prior to pollination and the third the last of May when an

Zinc on Pecan Trees

case-bearer control. Applying zinc to a pecan tree is probably the one best management practice that can be carried out with pecan trees. Homeowners with a tree oer two in their yard can effectively apply the material to the tree by using one of the hose-on type applicators.

Fly Fever in area beef and dairy herds was abig problem in 1981 and cattlemen are encouraged to consider a vaccination program in 1982 where the infestation level has been high.

These were the thoughts of Texas Agricultural Ex-Service tension Veterinarian, Dr. James Armstrong, at last week's animal health meeting held in Paris. The meeting attracted 61 area producers. Dr. Armstrong suggested that the vaccine be administered with caution and that nodose be given to pregnant animals in their seventh through ninth month of pregnancy. If the vaccine is given during this time period, there could be some calf deaths.

It is suggested that the vaccine be given while the cows are open. The two doses should be given six weeks apart and prior to the start of fly (horse fly mainly) season. A single booster shot



All rotate furiously, have dense atmospheres, and consist of far lighter elements from earthlike, or terrestial planets such as Mars and Venus. Uranus, for example, revolves around the sun with its axis lying at a sharp angle, instead of more nearly vertical like other planets. Thus, for half its 84year orbit, one of its poles constantly sees the "mid-night sun," while the oppo-site pole dwells in frigid darkness.

Cattlemen throughout the area are reporting cases of foot rot in cattle. Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says the condition can be prevented with proper medication. He says that 40 to 50 milligrams of ethylenediamine dihydriodide per head per day is a good preventative. The compound should be added to salt, mineral or feed. Grooms says to put the recommended dosage into the amount of feed or mineral the cattle are consuming each day to re the
