Lamar County Jr. Livestock Show Set

The Lamar County Junior Livestock Show is scheduled at the Livestock Show Barn at the Fair Grounds in Paris on Thursday, April 22 and Friday, April 23.

Kelli Salter, Prairiland High School student and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doug Salter of Pattonville, was selected at the Lamar County Livestock Show Queen for 1982 Monday night.

Kelli was representing the Prairiland FFA in the contest.

She has been in 4-H for five years and vocational ag for two. Among her projects are food, show pig and barrows, broilers and a market lamb.

She received the showmanship award for three years in the Denton County Livestock show and during her two years of FFA has received the Greenhand degree and Chapter Farmer degree. She is a member of the Greenhand Skills team, and the Dairy Judging team which won area and is going to state competition.

Kelli is on the Prairiland High School basketball and volleyball teams and runs track. She is a member of the Beta Club and the Math and Science Club. She also is a varsity cheerleader.

On Thursday the show will begin with the horse show at

8 a.m. The poultry and rabbits will be judged at 10 a.m. and miscellaneous classes at 10 a.m.

Suck Bucket and Dairy Show will also be at 10 a.m. The Sheep Show will begin

at 2 p.m.. Breeding beef will be from 11 to 2 p.m. Breeding swine will be at 3:30 p.m.,

barrow show at 3:30 p.m.

At 6 p.m., the kiddie class will be held and at 6:30 p.m. the steer show will start.

On Friday, breeding beef will be judged at 8 a.m. and the buyers banquet begins at noon. The sale will begin at 1 p.m.

A number of Prairiland students will be participating in the show, competing in almost every category. Parents, relatives and friends are urged to come out and see the show, and concessions of a wide variety will be available.

Newspapers Win Awards

The Bogata and Blossom papers won awards at the North and East Texas Press Association, held at the Best Western Inn of Paris Saturday, April 17.

Managing Editor Nanalee Nichols and Bogata Sports Editor Britt Morgan attended the convention awards banquet to accept their awards.

Morgan won first place for local news photos in weekly newspapers with a circulation under 2,500.

Judging was done by the University of Texas Journalism Class, and in their critique they said "Everything works for this photograph—All action is clear and visible without reader having to untangle assorted arms and legs or hunt for a ball the caption writer assures us must be there somewhere. Enough

blur to suggest motion without destroying our ability to sort out one of the team names. This must be the fantasy of everyone who has played or wants to play football...running full tilt away from your opponent over the fallen bodies of teammates and foes as well."

Nichols won fourth place for best local column in Blossom and Bogata. The judges commented "like this writer's short, sweet, switch-hitting columns. No wasted words to pad out the length. tivities include president of the Beta Club, president of FFA, member of the varsity football team and a member of the Choral Club.

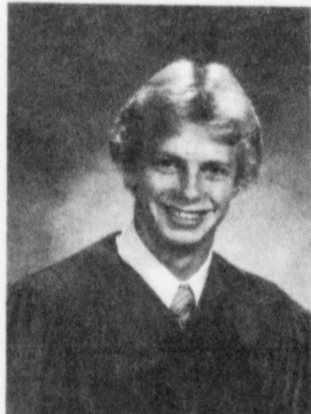
He was chosen Optimist Boy of the Year. Tony attended the state Beta Club Convention, state FFA Convention and the National

Texas Cities Receive \$31.8 Million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$31.8 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for April.

"Total payments we have sent to these cities so far this year are running more than 19 percent ahead of last year, which means sales of taxable merchandise in these cities are running that much more than 1981," Bullock said.

Houston received the biggest check, \$7 million, up 27.9 percent from the April 1981 check.

Locally, Blossom received \$574.46 for this period, a 13.68 percent increase over the \$614.59 received for the same period last year. Bogata has received \$5,207.71 to date thus far in 1982, a 0.89 percent decrease from 1981.

Deport has received 1,575.83 this far in 1982, a 2.86 percent decrease over the \$1,622.21 received for the same period in 1981. Talco received \$3,483.72 for payment this period, with payments totaling \$10,773.15 to date, a 51.37 percent increase over last year's payment of \$7,116.95.

The city sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated

monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

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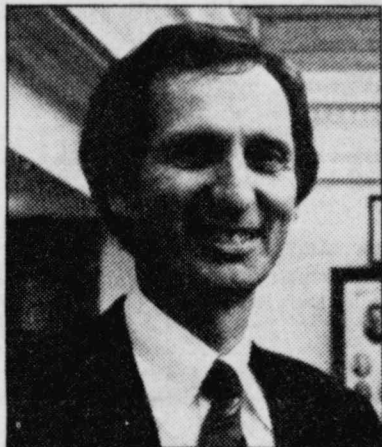

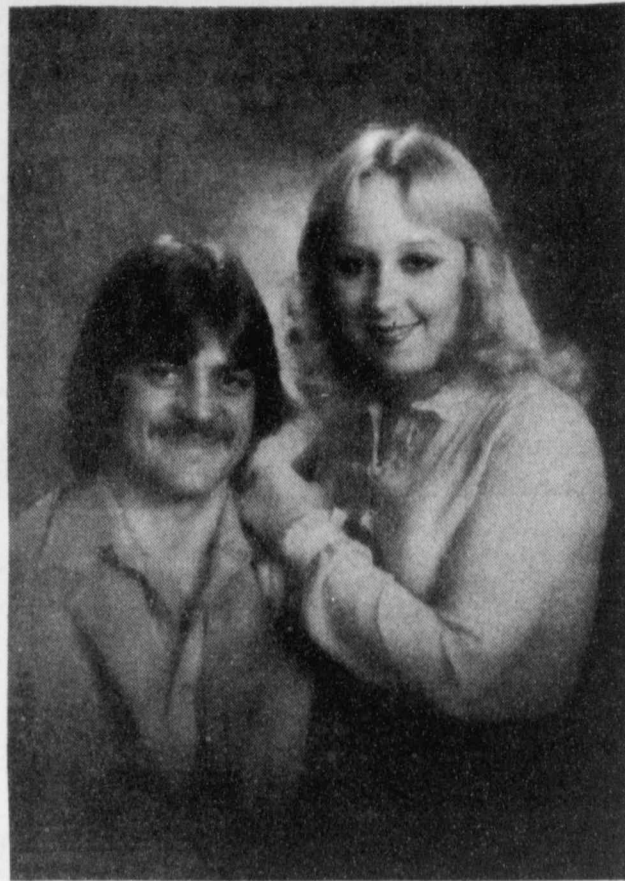

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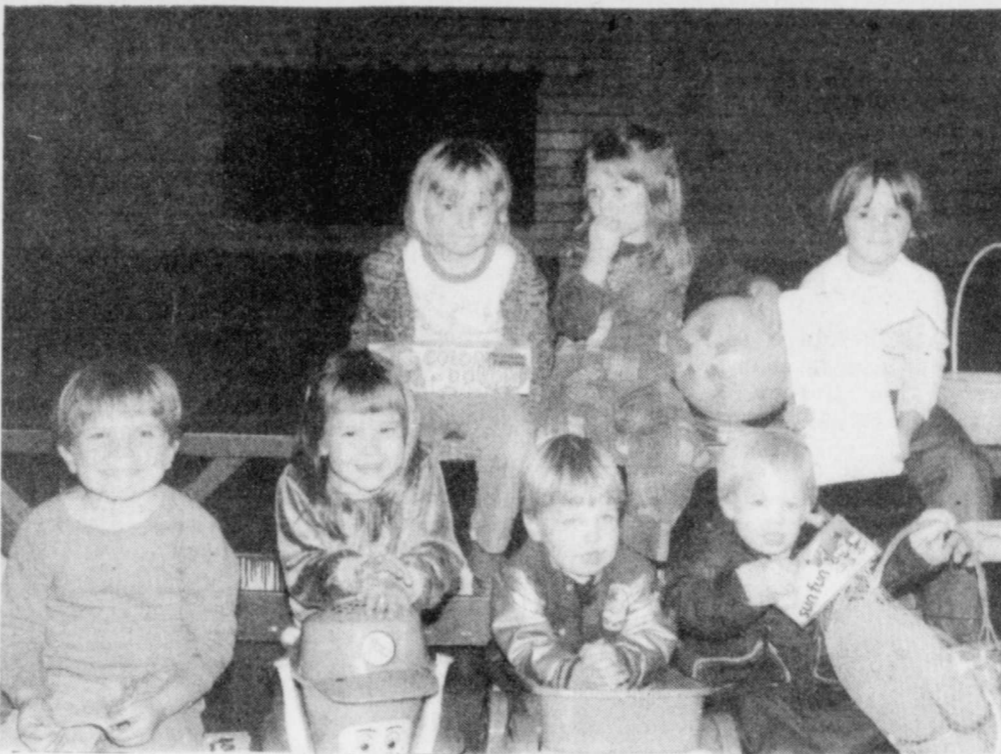

This is the time of year to fertilize bermudagrass pastures and meadows, says Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Fertilization according to a soil test will give the best results. Unless phosphorus and potassium were applied last fall, a complete fertilizer is needed this spring.

Cattle should be removed from crimson clover pastures, Reeves says, if the clover is to make adequate seed for natural reseeding. Because of the growth habits of crimson clover seed heads, cattle will eat most of the heads if left on the pastures.

Producers can leave cattle on Yuchi clover pastures until about the end of May when Yuchi begins to flower. A longer grazing season is one of the advantages of Yuchi clover in East Texas. Reeves says that producers should complete springing bermudagrasses by the end of April for best results. As summer approaches, rainfall normally decreases, thereby reducing the chances of survival for the sprigs. A pre-emergence should be used to control weeds.

Milk

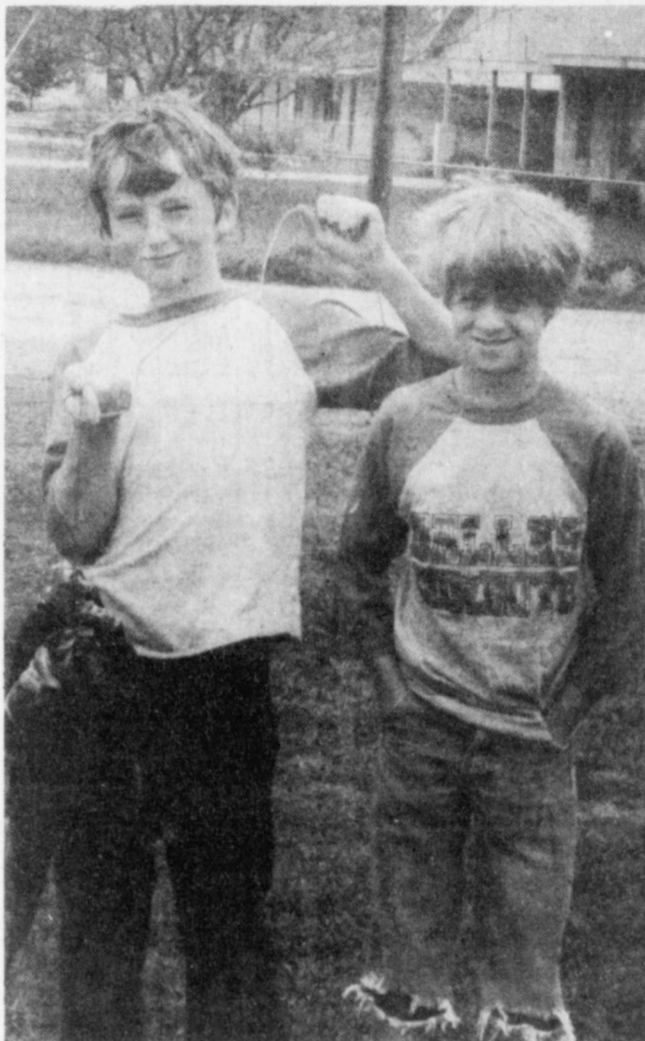
