

A Look Back At The Events Of 1985

Nineteen eighty-five is little more than a memory, nineteen eighty-six nothing but a promise of things to come.

In looking over the past year, a number of local news events, gains and losses in the Deport and Blossom area can be noted.

Take a glance back at some of the local events of 1985.

During January of 1985, Deport seemed plagued by several cases of suspected arson.

The home of Bobby Nichols was destroyed by fire in Blossom.

Prairiland School decided to build a new cafeteria at the high school, continue remodeling, and build a science lab at Blossom.

A full week of snow and ice opened up the first week in February, festooning houses with icicles, and resulting in a large number of snowmen throughout the area.

March opened with high winds, destroying several barns and damaging several mobile homes, including one belonging to D.W. Smith of Blossom.

The Deport Volunteer Firemen were donating their time to clean up the Americana Legion Park area for the new park. The legion members were working on it.

Prairiland FFA were having their annual livestock show, pig wrestling, stew and auction in April. Deport's cable system was under reconstruction.

The Prairiland Patriots ended their first half of District in first place in baseball action. In May the baseball team clinched their district title.

On May 13, Blossom was again struck by a tornado, which destroyed several homes, barns and trees. High winds, accompanying the storm, did damage throughout the area.

Little League and Girls Softball teams were featured prominently in the papers in June.

Deport held its homecoming, an event highlighted by the Prairiland Ag Talent Team performance and

held only once every five years, in July.

Cunningham held their annual homecoming in July, complete with singing and dominoes. The Deport Methodist Church celebrated their 100th anniversary.

Also, in July the Prairiland Ag Talent Team captured the state championship.

In Blossom, a kidnapper, James Wesley Foote, was captured after his

escape from a jail in Cleburne, TX.

The area's crops looked good, but the prices were poor in August. Jim Chapman captured the seat vacated by Congressman Sam B. Hall.

Also in August a jetliner crashed, killing large numbers of passengers. Shortly after, several area businesses received charred, plastic sealed letters that had been damaged in the crash.

School began, Charles Nichols and James McKnight brought in the first bales of cotton and statistics proved the Texas crime rate was up from 1984.

In September, a motorcycle accident killed one Oklahoma man and seriously injured another near Pattonville.

October began with cool weather, and the Prairiland Patriots football team headed toward what would be

their best season record ever, 6-4.

Several bomb threats plagued Prairiland school systems, and efforts to start a senior citizen's center in Deport began, while Blossom's center continued its activities.

Blossom elementary school was heavily damaged by a fire set by two juveniles. The main building was only usable again at the end of 1985.

December brought the usual holiday activities...parades, parties,

visits and sadly, house fires.

The year contained many other events, too numerous to mention. During the year, of course, we lost citizens to death, gained new ones to births.

The world continues, with nothing "earth shaking" happening, but the slow, steady progression of events. That, probably, is the way it should be, and 1986 will hold many new things to record.

Lady Patriots Improve District Record

The Prairiland Lady Patriots improved their district record to 3-1 Friday night as they defeated the Daingerfield Tigers 44-43 at Prairiland.

The first quarter proved to be an indication of how the game would progress. The very physical Daingerfield team controlled the inside game while the Patriots dominated the outside game. Jenissa Baker made six points in the quarter and Jana Pomroy made the final basket of the quarter to tie the game at 12-12.

The second quarter was a nightmare for the Patriots. After jumping ahead 16-13, Jana Pomroy took a fall and was out of action for the rest of the quarter. The lack of Pomroy's steady game became evident when the Tigers reeled off the next six points to take the lead. Although Deana Watson closed out the scoring in the half with a couple of free shots, the Patriots trailed 19-18.

The third quarter started with Pomroy canning two long jumpers from the same spot. However, the

shots never seemed to put the Patriots in front. Daingerfield was hot in the quarter and could more than match Prairiland basket for basket. Klarissa Keys made an inside shot to cut the Tiger lead to 29-27, but the Tigers made the last three points in the quarter to lead 32-27.

The final quarter could not have been any closer. After a Patriot comeback, Deana Watson hit from the inside to tie the game at 41-41 with 1:29 left in the game. Then, Baker stole the ball and wound up at the charity stripe where she hit 1 of 2 to give Prairiland a brief 42-41 lead. After a Tiger basket switched the lead in the game, Baker again was shooting free shots, this time, with six seconds left in the game, and Prairiland trailing 43-42, Baker calmly swished two free throws to give Prairiland a 44-43 lead. Fortunately, Daingerfield failed to capitalize on their final possession and Prairiland won.

Baker was the leading scorer in the game for the Patriots with 14 and Watson added 12.

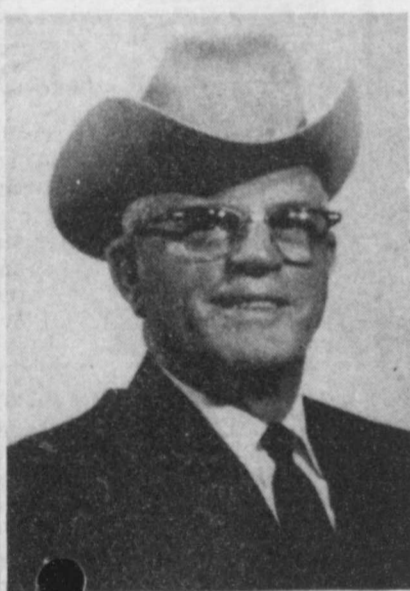

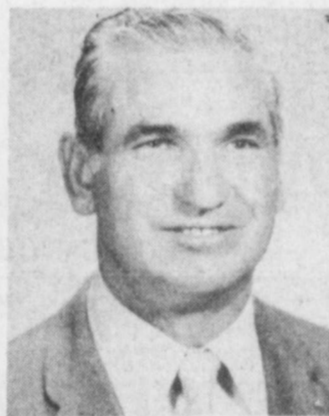

Holiday Death Toll Predicted

Texas Department of Public Safety officials have estimated that as many as 29 persons will die as a result of traffic accidents during the Christmas and New Year's holidays. The DPS expects 12 fatalities during the 30-hour Christmas period and 17 deaths during the 54-hour New Year's period.

Col. Jim Adams, DPS director, asked motorists to maintain safe driving habits during the holidays to minimize the loss of life in vehicle crashes.

"We'd certainly like to see our fatality estimates prove to be too high," Adams said. "Unfortunately, there will be drivers who will ignore speed limits and attempt to operate vehicles after drinking. The best way to avoid becoming involved in an accident with a careless driver is to drive in a defensive manner. It also makes good sense to be sure everyone in the vehicle uses a safety belt."

Adams said he has authorized Highway Patrol captains to utilize troopers from other uniformed Traffic Law Enforcement services to augment the regular patrol.

"Additional troopers will be assigned where large volumes of traffic or additional accidents are likely," Adams said.

During the 102-hour Christmas period in 1984, vehicle accidents caused 43 traffic deaths in Texas. A total of 42 deaths were attributed to crashes occurring during the 102-hour New Year's period last year.

The Department of Public Safety will provide state traffic death updates as part of the "Operation Motorcade" program. The counting period for Christmas begins at 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 24 and concludes at midnight on Wednesday, December 25. The New Year's counting period begins at 6 p.m. Monday, December 30 and ends at midnight on Wednesday, January 1.

Avoid Electrical Hazards At Home



With all the things that electricity does for us in our homes and businesses each and every day, it is very easy to forget about the possible harm electricity can do if it is carelessly handled.

Make sure your family learns to respect electricity and how to avoid possible accidents by coming in contact with it.

Here are a few simple guidelines that can help:

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2. DO NOT install radio and television antennas near powerlines.
3. Teach your children to NEVER climb trees, poles or fences around powerlines or utility company substations.
4. NEVER use any electrical appliance around sinks or bathtubs that are filled with water.

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Cattlemen Must Use Feed Dollars Wisely

Cattlemen must spend their feed dollars wisely, says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In this area of common and coastal bermudagrass, the greatest return on the dollar invested in supplemental feed is from a good mineral program. The mineral that has worked best when cattle are grazing these grasses or eating hay from these grasses is one that contains about six percent calcium, 12 percent phosphorus and four percent magnesium.

The next dollar invested should be to insure that cattle have an adequate supply of protein. Dry cows need from six to eight percent protein in their total diet. Thin cows that need

to gain weight need the higher protein. The protein requirement begins to rise during the last month of gestation and peaks at nine or ten percent when the calf is three to four months of age.

Adequacy of protein in the animal's diet can be very practically evaluated by studying the droppings. Cattle droppings should be moist and at least flattened slightly on the ground. Dry, high stools indicate protein deficiency.

Adequate protein is mandatory in a nutritional program to insure the health of the bugs in the rumen which digest grass and convert it to energy.

The third item of utmost importance is vitamin A. The cow has the ability to store a 100 day supply of vitamin A while she is grazing green

grass. If vitamin A is needed, injections are simple and inexpensive to administer.

Approximately 90 percent of the cow's diet is utilized as energy. Energy deficiency should not be confused with deficiencies of mineral, protein or vitamin A. Energy is probably most efficiently supplied from ground-corn or milo. Energy supplementation may not be cost effective, depending upon the cost of the supplement and the expected returns.

However, Grooms says that providing protein, minerals and vitamins is nearly always cost effective.

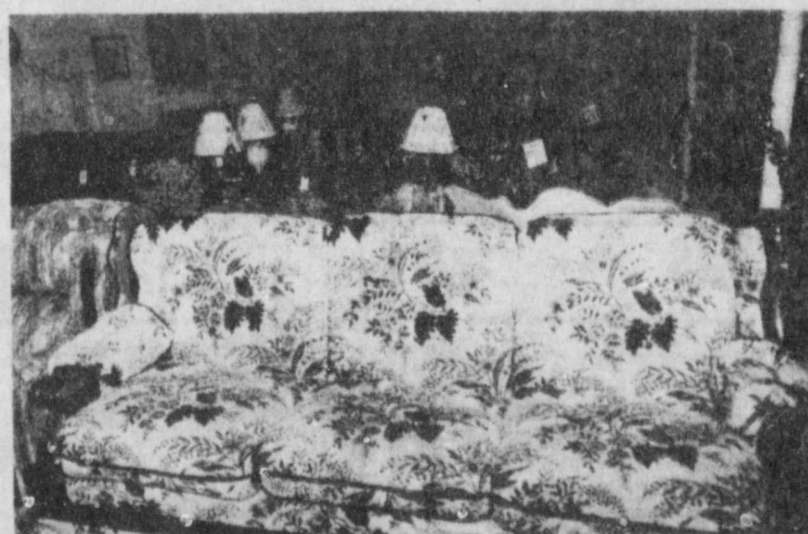
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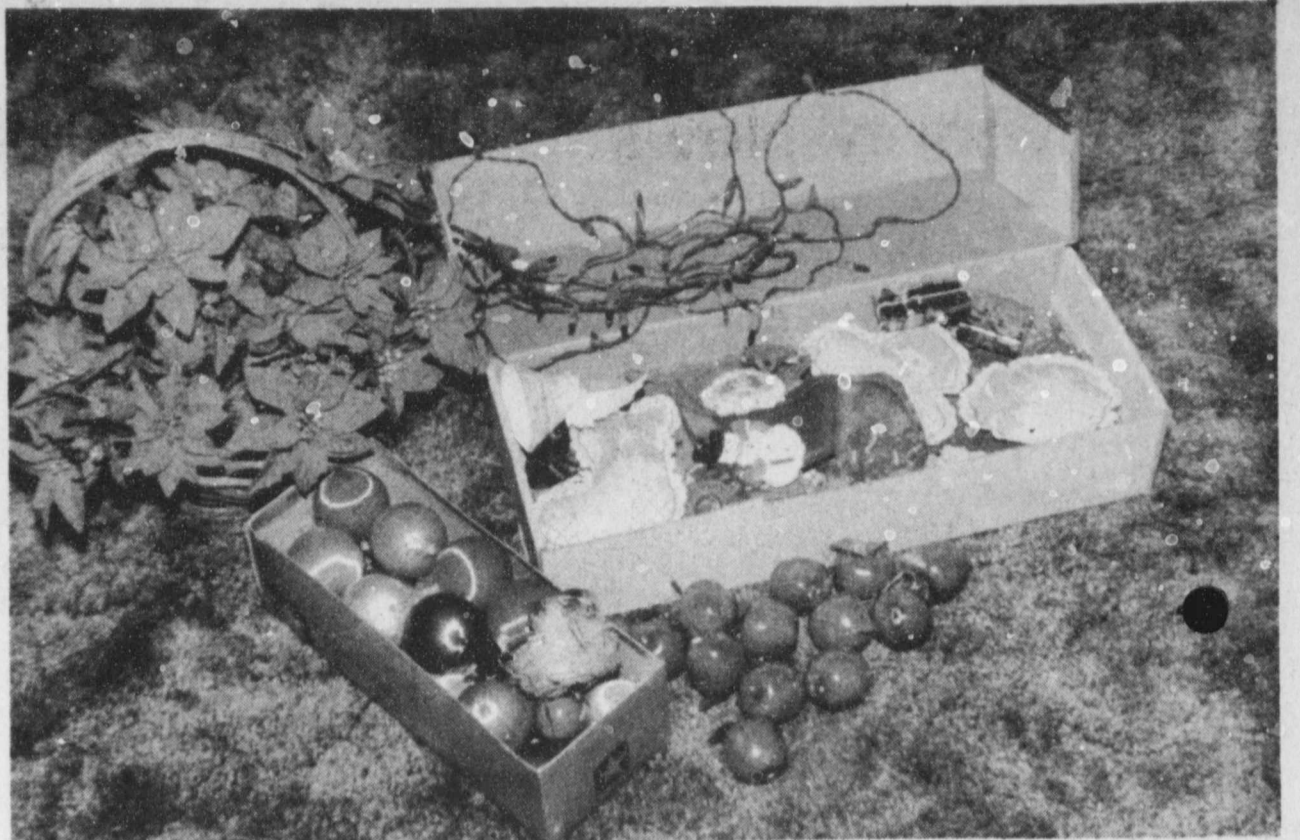

TYPES OF EXERCISE

Exercising gives you more energy, helps you cope with stress and tension, aids in relaxation, tones muscles and improves your self-image. Some exercises can be done standing or sitting, depending on your comfort and ability.

STRETCHING AND STRENGTHENING EXERCISES are designed to increase flexibility and strength of muscles, joints and bones. Head and neck rolls, arm circles, trunk twists, leg lifts and other stretching routines will keep your bones and joints limber.

AEROBIC EXERCISES strengthen the heart and cardiovascular system. Brisk walking, dancing, swimming, jogging, water exercise and biking all increase your heart and breathing rates and improve the circulatory system.

WALKING is one of the best and safest exercises for older adults. Brisk walking strengthens the heart and lungs and improves endurance.



EFFECTS OF EXERCISE

Good management A Must

The financial crisis of commercial cow-calf producers enhances the need for good management. The management program must increase the efficiency of production through the elimination of unnecessary costs and non-productive cows says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist.

The cost of wintering cattle is very expensive, consequently, if the cow herd has not been pregnancy tested, the herd should be checked and open cows sold to cut winter feed costs. Even if the open cows were bred tomorrow, it would be 16 to 18 months before pay day.

The next calf simply cannot pay for the costs of an open cow. Even if the producer decided to take the next two

or three calves to share in this lengthy expense, the cow will probably fail to breed again somewhere in that period.

Open, late calving cows are a liability and should be eliminated before they absorb more costs and increase the drain on the producers financial situation.

At the present time, most producers have relocated the bulls to separate pastures, but the breeding season is rapidly approaching. The beef bull requires about the same nutrition as the beef cow that is suckling a four month old calf. To get bulls in shape for the breeding season, Grooms suggests that extra good quality hay and supplemental grain be fed to improve body condition.

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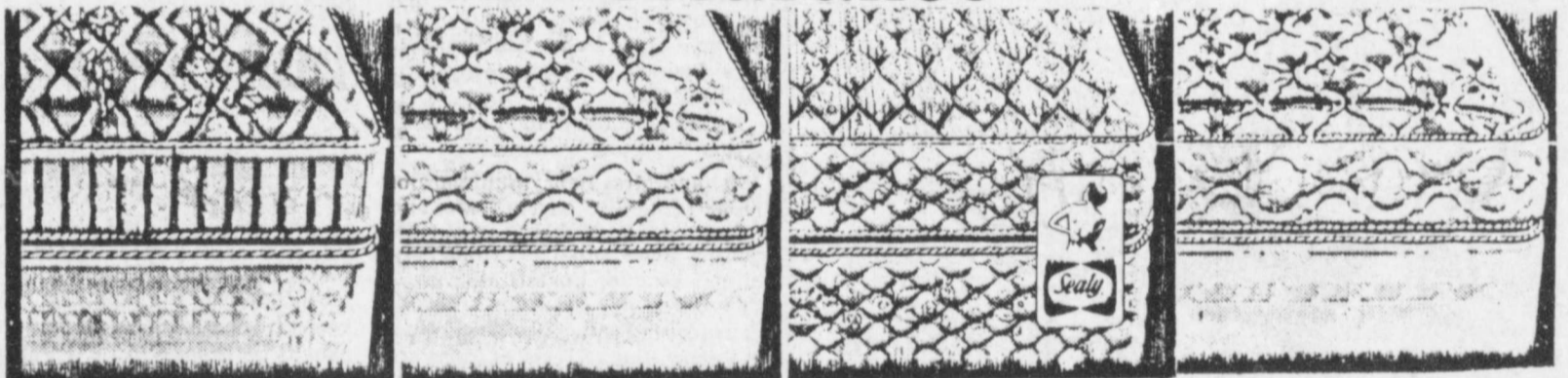
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Reads Celebrate 50th Anniversary

Planting Hints For Trees, Shrubs

Were you one of the lucky ones to have a special plant for the home landscape under the Christmas tree? If you were, then a few timely planting tips could prevent disappointments down the road.

The first consideration should be to keep the roots of the plants which are usually barerooted, from freezing or drying out prior to planting. If you are not ready to plant at this time, you would be well advised to heel in the plant temporarily. Remember, do not let the roots dry out before planting.

Give some thought to planting location. Keep in mind the projected size of the shrub or tree at maturity and allow ample room for growth. Remember that all fruit trees like a well drained, fertile soil and an open, sunny location free of competition

from other plants. Do not plant a fruit tree in soil that stays wet, as they cannot tolerate wet feet.

Spacing between plants is important and the following dimensions are suggested for fruit and nut trees: peaches, 25x25 feet; plums, 20x20 feet; pears and apples 20x20 and pecans 80x80.

Prepare planting holes or areas in advance if possible. Dig the planting areas large enough to accommodate the root system. Condition soils by adding peatmoss, leaf mold or organic matter, to insure proper drainage on poorly drained, tight soils.

Plant the tree at the exact same depth it stood in the nursery. This soil line can usually be detected on the plant. On grafted nursery stock, the soil line will generally be below the point of the graft.

Placing the soil around the roots and the placement of the roots in the hole are important steps. Prune away roots that have been damaged. Place a small amount of soil or mulching material in the hole at a time and pay particular attention to firming the soil around the roots. If you are planting in clay soil, consider adding sandy top soil back in the hole. Water to settle soil and to eliminate air pockets. Mound the soil slightly to allow for settling.

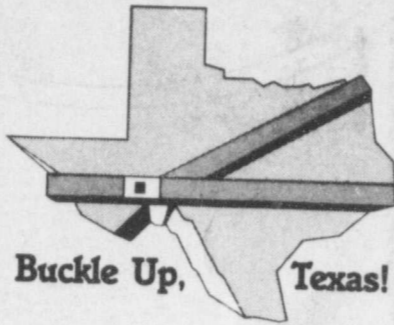
A portion of the top growth of all nut and fruit trees should be removed prior to planting. As a guide, leave about two feet of fruit trees above the soil line and about three feet of pecan trees. This will balance the amount of top growth with the root system.

Hopefully, your tree gift was the best variety. However, if you are purchasing trees, be sure to buy varieties adapted to our area. A complete list of the fruit and pecan varieties is available from our office.

Time To Control Cattle Parasites

This is the time of year for dairy and beef cattle producers to inspect for lice and ear ticks. Lice are a common insect pest during the fall and winter months. The five species that affect cattle in Texas either feed on skin tissue or blood. Cattle lice appear in early fall on poor, unthrifty animals. Infestations increase on these animals and then spread to other cattle in the herd.

Cattle with heavy lice infestations become weak, respond poorly to feed and become susceptible to disease. They will often rub against trees, fenceposts and other objects to relieve the itching and irritation. Loss of hair and raw skin may appear on the body, especially in the neck region.

Heavy lice infestations usually do not appear until late winter. But, now is the time to head off this problem. Look for lice on the skin at the base of the tail, on the shoulders, the neck and along the back. Lice are host specific. That is, cattle lice on cattle, hog lice feed on hogs, and so on. Horses may also be infested with the horse louse although it is uncommon.

When using a sprayer to control external parasites on cattle, it is important to penetrate the long winter hair of cattle to get good control. Spraying cattle to the point of runoff generally offers the best control.

Cattle need all the help they can get during the winter to hold their own, so do yourself and them a service by controlling ticks and lice.

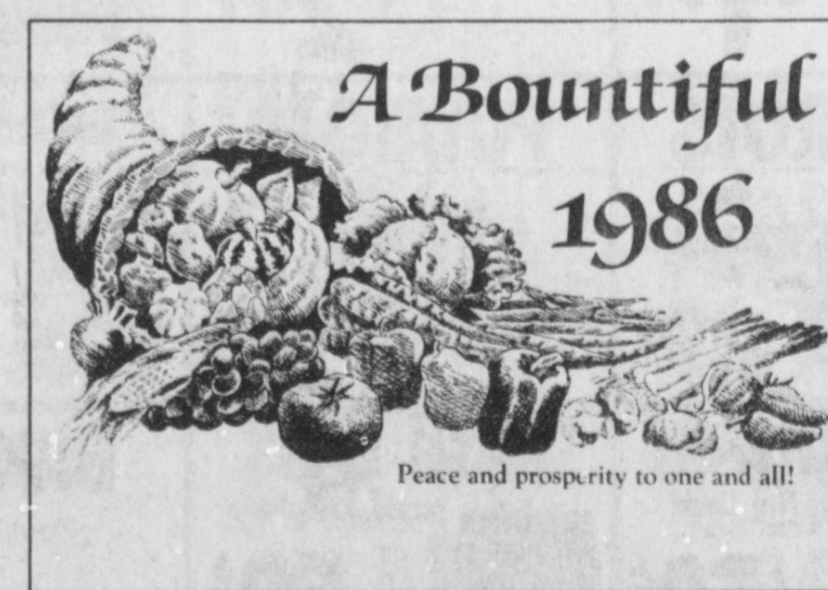
