Byrd continued that "I believe that taxes are so burdensome that if continued they will lead to a slow down in economic growth, and a tremendous inflatinary force." BINGO, Senator Byrd!

Byrd urged the government to cut back in every conceivable place. He called for a reduction of the Federal Debt instead of an increase. He also said he feared no one would need him.

Elbert Boren of Clardy died Sunday night when his home burned to the ground

Mr. Boren was 90 years old, and his body was discovered in the kitchen area of the two story home.

The fire was reported to Lamar County Sheriff's Office about 10 p.m. that night, and volunteer fire departments from Reno, Deport and Pattonville all responded to the call.

The house had already burned to the ground when the call was turned in, apparently

The fire departments began efforts to cool down the ashes in order to begin toe search for Boren, while others took flashlights and searched the surrounding area in case he had

managed to get out of the house and fallen or was injured.

Relatives watched helplessly while the volunteers spent ovr one and onehalf hours sifting through the ashes, removing sheet iron, and finally locating the body.

Justice of the Peace Fred Nutt ordered an autopsy Monday morning. Cause of the blaze is undetermined, and the complete destruction of the structure will make it difficult to determine.

Deport Fire Chief Duane Glover commented that the sheet iron roof on teh house helped contain the fire within the structure, making the heat more intense





Founding Fathers, Travelling Showman Share Highland Cemetery

Highland Cemetery in Deport is much like any other cemetery. It is peaceful, quiet and pleasant. It contains, of course, the history of Deport...it's leading citizens, it's s, it's hopes and dreams, shattered early, sometimes brought to fulfillment with a long life

When the old Deport Cemetery south of town became full, and no more land was available, some of the citizens in town decided to create a new cemetery, one with room to house generations yet to come when their time ended.

V.C. Oliver, Joe Grant, Rufus Bevill, D.F. Barham, L.E. Hayes, J.I. Mathews, W.B. Fuller, E.O. Thompson and J.R. Kelsey formed the original charter and purchased land from the Luke Roberts Land Survey on September 5, 1925.

Plots went up for sale almost immediately, but it was only a matter of days before pre-need became actual need, and on September 29, 1925. Myrble Banane Guest, infant daughter of J.A. and S.J. Guest became the first to occupy a plot at Highland Cemetery

Her tiny grave is now shaded by one of the huge evergreen cedars that grace the burial ground.

Obviously, cemeteries require no promotion to grow...time and the inevitability of death takes care of that. There are war veterans from

numerous conflicts...elderly people

who rest there after long, long

lives...babies and the young. There are those of numerous religious beliefs, and those who never really knew Deport at all.

Among the latter is Pete Peterson, whose grave is headed by a simple cross-marked stone int he far northeast corner of the cemetery.

The date of death, July 1, 1930 is recorded...his date of birth is not. It is unknown.

The story of Pete Peterson is told in clear script in the old record book. He was part of a small traveling tent show. He was at Cunningham when he died of a heart attack. Three sons and two daughters were with him. He was born in Canada of French parents. He was Catholic...the Priest from Paris came down to do the service. The people of Deport took up a collection to provide him with a decent burial. His children must have loved him...for James Grant of Grant Funeral Home, recalls that every year, from somewhere in the country. a small donation came in to see that "father's grave was tended." About ten yers ago, the donations stopped. James figures that the last of the

children must have died. Pete Peterson is not the only transient buried in Highland He isn't the only person there whose fortunes were too low to provide for burial. The citizens of Deport and the Grants of Grant Funeral Home did their civic duty, seeing that dignity was bestow

ed on any whom they felt deserving. And the graves are not untended, nor is any other grave at Highland.

The organization has recently put on a full time grounds superintendent, and hopes to get enough money in certificates of deposit to provide continued perpetual care. Melba Ladd 'pleads'' for funds to further this

A donation from the First National Bank of Deport has recently provided for a new sign. The old cedars are being trimmed so that they no longer hide grave stones

The stones record birth and death, and also gives glimpses into personalities, what was important to people. Bits of poetry, a porcelain likeness, religious symbols, they all provide insight into the people who are buried beneath the stones.

Generations of youngsters roam the graves, wandering across from the near-by ball park. They find, frequently, last names that correspond with their own...grandparents, aunts and uncles. There is nothing morbid in this...it is a natural way to discover something about the past, about roots in a small town

What of those founders, the original people who decided in 1925 to provide for the resting place of a town? All nine are gone, and all but two (both of whom moved away) found their final resting place in the ground they purchased...Highland Cemetery.


