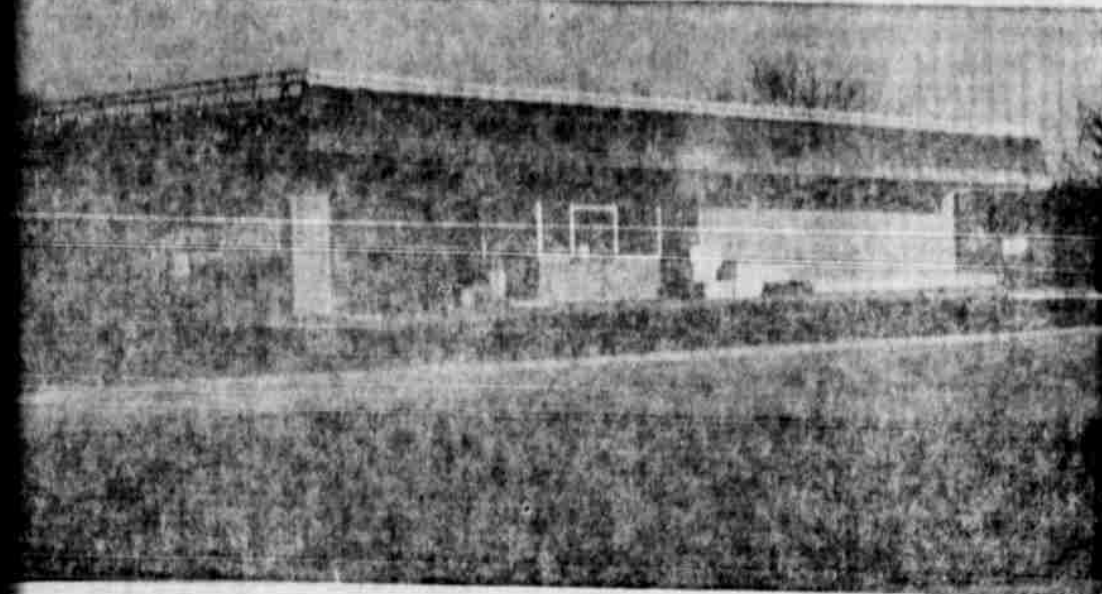

Haskell County 4-H and FFA youngsters earned Haskell the overall lead in the recent Abilene Livestock Show, when Miss Kim Hager, 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Hager, brought home the Grand Champion banner from the show. Her steer weighed in at 1,175 pounds and brought \$1,500.00. Abilene Clearing House bought her Charolais-Angus cross. She is an 8th grade student in Weinert.

Cindy Thomas, freshman at IHHS and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Thomas, showed her one-fourth Angus, one-fourth Hereford and one-half Simmental cross to reserve grand champion honors of the show, and she also won the Dorothea C. Griffin Showmanship Award. Cindy's 1,240 pound steer sold for \$1,000.00.

In the steer show, Rod Townsend placed 8th in his Hereford class, Cindy Thomas placed 6th with a Hereford, and Stanley Hager 7th with a shorthorn.

Kim Hager showed her polled Hereford to Breed Championship in its class, and Les Lane's steer placed 1st in the carcass class.

Kyle Wilfong showed his Simmental to the champion of breed spot, and Calvin and Joe Wilfong and Jim Ballard also had animals at Fort Worth.

## Dickey Is Featured At C of C Banquet

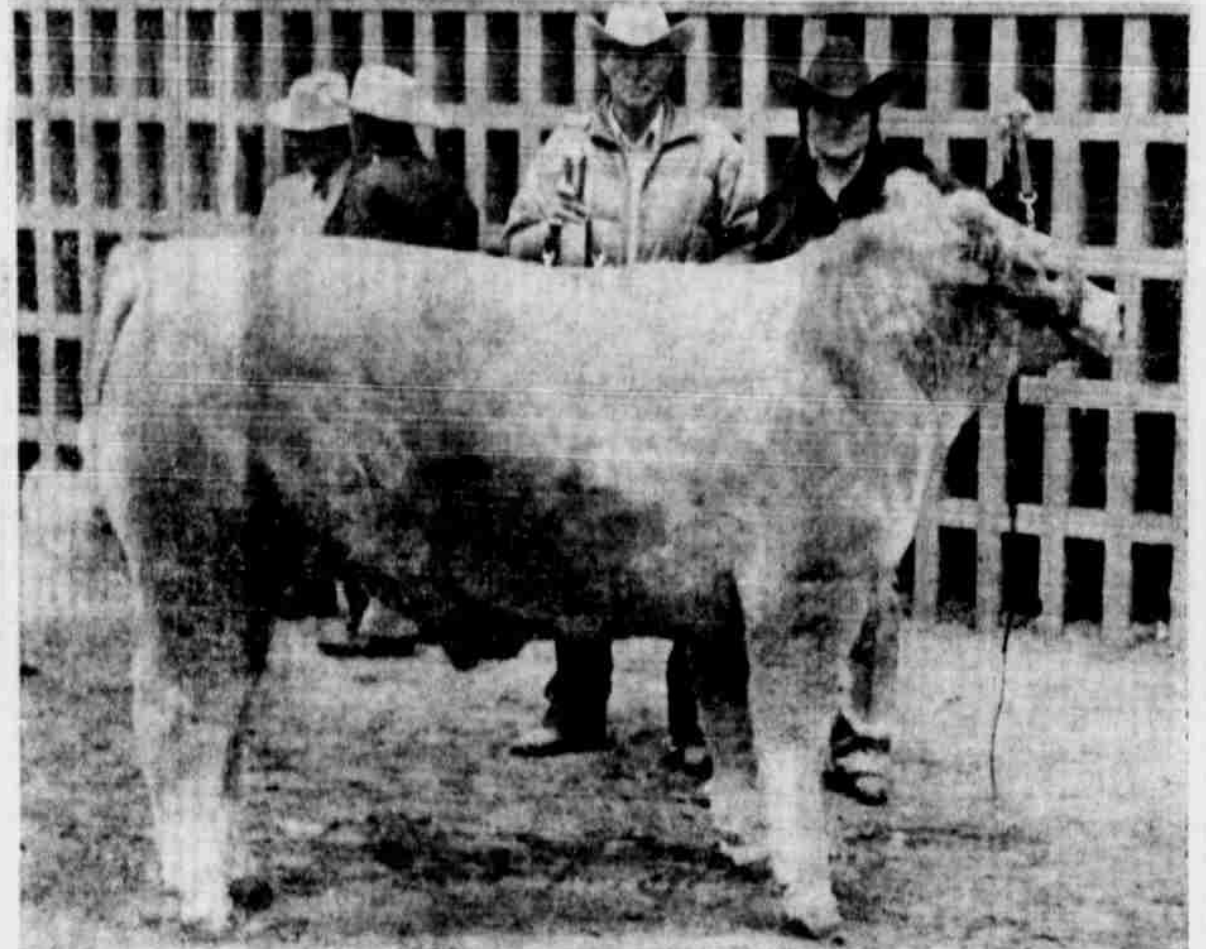

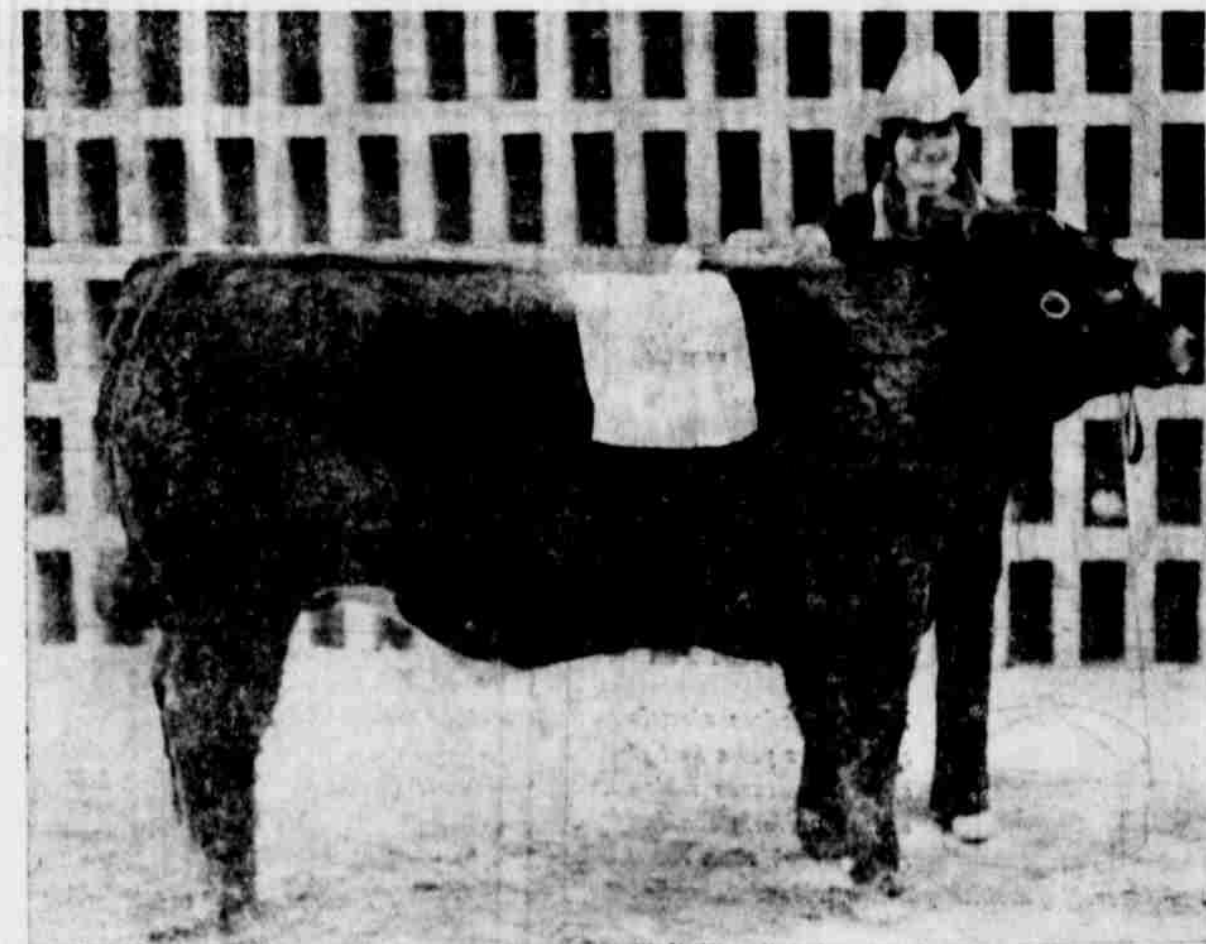

## Rep. Finnell Named To Judiciary Committee of Constitutional Conv.

AUSTIN — Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday has been named to the Judiciary Committee of the Constitutional Convention and has pledged to work for continued strong local control of courts and judges.

Finnell was appointed to the post by the President of the Convention and the appointment was confirmed by a vote of the 189 House members and state senators serving as Convention Delegates.

The Judiciary Committee is one of eight major committees named to draft a proposed revision of the 98-year-old constitution.

"There is no area of government deserving greater protection than the state judiciary," Finnell said. "Unlike the legislative and executive branches which are subject to politics and personalities, the judiciary must stand solid as the basis for everything this state and country believes in."

"The judiciary must be independent in administering law and order and in protecting every right and justice for which this country was founded," Finnell said.

Finnell, an attorney with 8 years legislative experience, said he opposes efforts to do away with the Justice of the Peace system and opposes ef-

orts to make judges appointive instead of elective.

"Appointive judges smacks of the federal court system, and I don't think Texas wants any part of that," Finnell said. "As for the Justice of the Peace system, it must be retained because this is the one level where the average person can know first hand how justice is working and have his say in it."

Finnell said he expects liberals to "try to come in through the back door" of the Judiciary Committee with proposals that would hamper judges in the handling of criminal cases. He pledged to strengthen the election state Court of Criminal Appeals and give all criminal courts the resources they need to shorten the time between arrest and punishment of the guilty.

CONSERVATION VIEW POINTS

J. C. YEARY, JR. District Conservationist



All we hear today on radio and television is about the energy crisis. We have been advised to run down the thermostat, turn off unnecessary lighting, and a host of other things. We have even had our speed limits reduced from 70 to 55 miles per hour, all in an all-out campaign to reduce fuel consumption.

A national campaign to stress energy management among the nation's farmers was recently launched by the US Department of Agriculture, agricultural groups, and farm organizations. The education - information campaign will help farmers by alerting them to fuel-conserving steps they can take. Some of these steps are:

- making sure tractors are in good condition and properly tuned;
-keeping proper air pressure in tires for maximum efficiency;
-keeping plowshares and cutting tools sharp and correctly adjusted to reduce "drag" of the tractor;
-matching machinery and tractor size carefully to obtain full efficiency;
-reducing tillage operations... this saves approximately 2 gallons of fuel per acre;
-combining field operations to save another 2 gallons of fuel per acre;
-storing fuel in a protected or

shaded area to reduce loss through volatilization evaporation).

The planning and implementation of a system of minimum tillage can be of value to the farmer in reducing the number of trips across the field. Any reduction in operations from the normal can be considered as minimum tillage. Several recognized ways are now in use—pulling a shredder behind the cotton harvester or drilling small grains into standing cotton or maize stalks; forming beds at planting time; and reducing the number of cultivations by use of chemical weed killers. All are forms of minimum tillage and fuel saving.

Any trip across the field can also save compaction of the soil as well as fuel. This is one of the prime objectives of minimum tillage. Excessive soil compaction by repeated trips across the field can and does result in poorer root development, less moisture holding capacity of the soil, more chance for harmful soil bacteria to soil crops, and consequently, less dollar return per acre. Your Soil Conservation Service technicians can discuss other means of implementing a system of minimum tillage that can save you fuel and dollars. Come by and discuss this matter with us.

Tuesday night the three teams met Anson here, winning the two A games, and losing the B game.

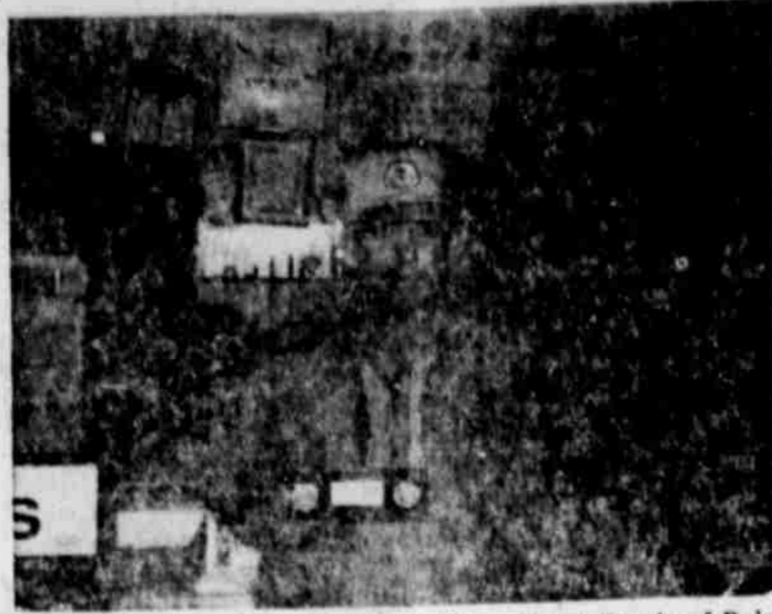
