Prairiland Heads Past Bi-District

Monday night in Mt. Pleasant the Patriots became the first ever Prairiland baseball team to get past bi-district as they beat Linden-Kildare 10-3 in a hard fought game.

After Patriot ace Scott Scudder retired the Tigers in the first inning without a major threat, the fired up Patriots had a rally. Following a leadoff flyout by Mike Connot, Joel Ballard got things going with a single to left. Then, following a Scott Scudder walk, cleanup man John Dusenberry singled past the shortstop to give Prairiland a 1-0 lead. Following the second out of the inning, Chris Sparks drove in Scudder for the final run of the inning and gave Prairiland an early 2-0 lead.

In the second inning, the Tigers got a leadoff homerun off of Scudder to cut the lead to 2-1. However, Scudder retired the next three batters in succession.

After Prairiland failed to get going offensively in the bottom of the second inning, the Tigers had their last offensive fireworks of the season in the top of the third. After the Tiger leadoff hitter reached on an error, the next batter hit a double off of the right field fence. Then, adouble to left field

secured a run to knot up the game at 2-2. A fine relay throw from shortstop Heath Kennedy to catcher Dusenberry nailed another potential run from the double. However, the next hitter drove in a run with a sacrifice fly to centerfield and Linden-Kildare had the lead for the first time at 3-2.

The next few innings were characterized by great defense and no runs. The best play was when Tony Duncan, perhaps the best all around outfielder in Prairiland's district, robbed a Tiger hitter of a sure homerun when he reached over the right field fence to record a fantastic out.

However, in the bottom of the sixth inning, Chris Sparks used the "hit 'em where they ain't" theory to tie up the game at 3-3. Where they weren't was behind the left centerfield fence where Sparks deposited a towering homerun. Then, after an out and a Craig Burns double, Mike Blackburn followed with another towering homerun and the Patriots had the lead back at 5-3. Mike Connot then singled up the middle and then scored after an out and a single to center by Scudder. Then, after Dusenberry and Kennedy reached base, Sparks con-

nected with his second homer of the game to put the Patriots ahead 10-3.

Although Prairiland failed to score again in the inning, eight proved to be enough as they were ahead 10-3.

In the top of the seventh inning, Scudder struck out one batter and got two to ground out as Prairiland went on to win.

Scudder was at his usual perfection in the game as he struck out eight and gave up only four hits. Sparks, with two home runs, a double and a single was the leading hitter of the day. Scudder went two for three at the plate with a walk and Blackburn went one for two with a walk.

As expected, the Prairiland Patriots dominated the District 1-AAA baseball all-district selections. The Pats placed four on the first team while district runner-up Mt. Vernon, North Lamar and Daingerfield each placed two on the first team.

Pitcher Scott Scudder was named the district's Most Valuable Player. Scudder, who was also selected as the district's MVP in basketball, completed the district season with an 8-0 record and a .74 earned run average. The Prairiland ace, who also played first base when not on the mound, batted a team high .429.

Catcher John Dusenberry was selected as a first team district selection. Dusenberry led the Patriots in home runs with three and runs batted in with 35. He also batted .386 from the plate in district play and .423 overall.

Infielders Joel Ballard and Chris Sparks were also selected to the first team. Ballard, second baseman, clubbed out a .317 during district while Sparks, a third baseman, batted .375 in district play.

Coach of the Year honors went to Prairiland Coach Bill Scudder. The Patriots were 23-1 during the season, which included a perfect 14-0 mark during district. Scudder has coached four straight teams into the playoffs.

Prairiland also placed four on the second team all district, while North Lamar added two more members to the squad.

Pitcher Mike Blackburn, who had a 4-0 record in district and a 7-1 overall, was selected to the team. Blackburn, who spent most of the season playing first base, batted .400 during the year.

Outfielders Craig Burns and Tony Duncan made up the last two district

selections for the Patriots. Burns batted .407 during district while Duncan was .381 at the plate. Both are seniors and batted .375 from the plate for the season.

Prairiland shortstop Heath Kennedy was selected to the second team while batting .318 in district.

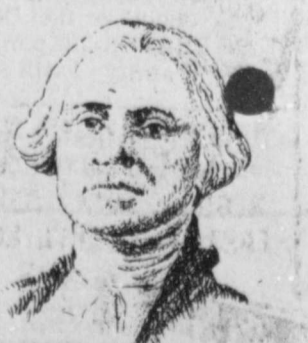

W. Amanda Tauch Dies At Age 94

Waldine Amanda Tauch, described as the first Texas woman to gain national fame as a sculptress, has left the city a legacy in bronze.

Tauch, whose works include the statue of Moses Austin standing in front of the City Hall, died Monday. She was 94.

Reared in Brady, she moved to Schulenburg about 1914, where she first trained with noted sculptor Pompei Coppini, the creator of the Alamo Cenotaph.

Once Coppini was convinced Tauch was a serious sculptress, she became his protegee and remained with him and his wife, Elisa, for a lengthy period.

Tauch and the Coppinis lived in New York for many years, but came to San Antonio in the early 1930's so Coppini could prepare the Cenotaph for the 1936 Texas Centennial.

Tauch had several Centennial projects of her own, her friend Belle Wesp said.

Among Tauch's works is the statue of an Indian that stands on the Commerce Street Bridge. In addition, she sculpted a tribute to higher education at the Chapman Graduate Center on the Trinity University Campus, Wesp said.

"She was active as a sculptress until the early 1970's when she developed problems with her eyes," Wesp said. Her last monumental work was called "The Doughboy" commissioned by the American Legion in Austin.

Along with Coppini, Tauch founded the Coppini Academy of Fine Arts in San Antonio in 1945. She was president emerita of that organization, which was founded to encourage an understanding and appreciation of art and to provide scholarships for aspiring artists. A holder of a doctorate in fine arts, Tauch was once a member of the Trinity University faculty.

Other affiliations included more than a dozen civic and arts groups including the Altrusa Club of San Antonio, the Fellow National Sculpture Society and the American Artists' Professional League of New York.

Services were at 1 p.m. Thursday at Porter Loring Mortuary. Interment was in Sunset Memorial Park. She will be buried next to the Coppinis. She is the first cousin of Mary Mauldin of Bogata.

Services were at the Ed C. Smith Funeral Home at 11:30 Monday, May 26, with the Rev. Edgar Huffstetler officiating. Interment was in Grove Hill Cemetery. Memorials may be made to the American Cancer Society.

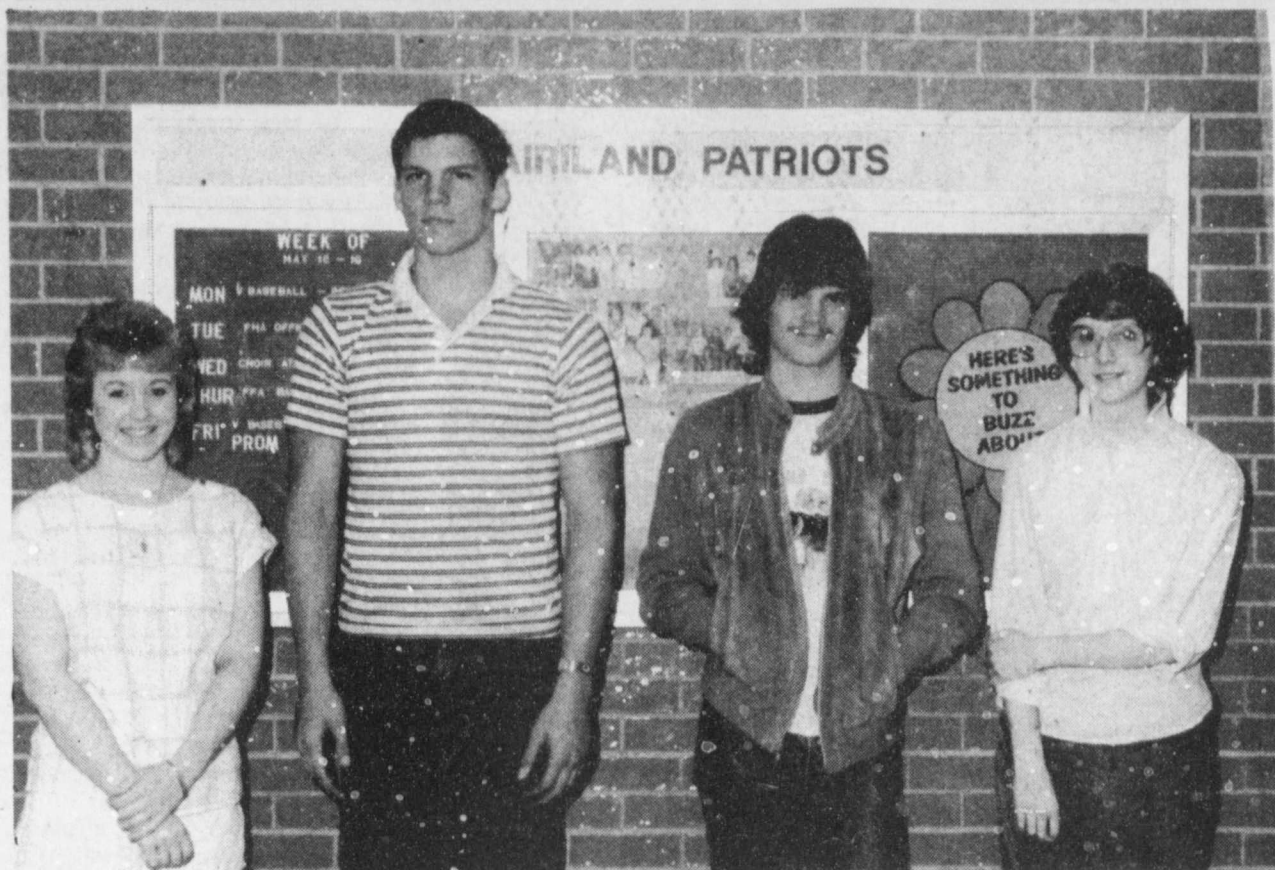
