Scudder First Round Draft Choice

It's been his dream since he was a little boy. But where most little boys let that dream go by, Scott Scudder worked harder and harder...until the dream is within his grasp.

On June 2, Scott Scudder was picked as the 17th draft choice. The Cincinnati Reds, National League, West Division, are hoping to sign him to a contract.

The 18 year old and his father.

Coach Bill Scudder of Prairiland, have had an exciting year. The Patriots undefeated season has been fantastic, scouts from almost everywhere have flown, driven and flocked to time Scudder's 90 mph fastball, 171 strike outs and 0.74 ERA.

It is the first time major league scouts have ever come to Prairiland. Scott has already signed a national letter of intent to attend the Univer-

sity of Texas. He has not yet made the final decision as to exactly what he will do, planning to finish his high school career, finish his final exams, and graduate before making the big choice.

His mother, Sue, commented that "I'm very proud of him. I know, as does his father, the long hours and hard work he's put into this. I'm tickled to death that he's getting a chance

to do what he wants to do."

Both his mother and father are proud of him, and feel honored at the opportunities he is receiving.

Scott has been involved in more sports than just baseball in his years at Prairiland High School. He has done well as the quarterback on the football team, as a basketball player but most of all on his favorite sport, the baseball diamond.

The Blossom youth is truly in a no-lose situation...the chance to sign a contract with a major league baseball team, or play ball at the University of Texas comes to few people...and only those with talent.

Scott and his father, Bill, who has spent years coaching and watching his son's talent develop, have to be excited, and happy.

Pats Move Closer To State

The Prairiland Patriots move two more notches closer to that state playoff, defeating the Wills Point Tigers 7-1 in Sulphur Springs to finish off area competition last Thursday, then defeating the Mineola Yellowjackets Tuesday night 4-1 in Mineola to advance to regional finals.

Thursday, May 29, Sulphur Springs against Wills Point:

In the top of the first inning, leadoff batter Mike Connot got things going for the Patriots as he hit a sinking liner to right field for a likely single. However, Connot wound up on third base when the ball took a bad hop and rolled to the right field fence. Connot then came around to score when Joel Ballard lofted a deep sacrifice fly to right field. Although Prairiland failed to score again in the inning, they led 1-0 after half an inning.

After Prairiland ace pitcher Scott Scudder struck out the side to close out the first inning, the Patriots opened up the second looking to extend their lead. Heath Kennedy started off the inning by reaching second base on a throwing error by the third baseman. Then, Chris Sparks drove in Kennedy with a sharp single to left field. After an out, Craig Burns closed out the Patriot scoring in the inning, driving in Sparks with a single to make the score 3-0.

In the bottom of the second inning, a Tiger batter got hold of the first pitch in the inning by Scudder and sent it over the fence for a solo homer. Luckily, the home run was the last hit for the Tigers as well as their final run.

With two outs in the fourth inning, the Patriots got a rally going. Sparks, who has been looking great at the plate, singled by third base and then stole second. Tony Duncan then

scored Sparks with the only run of the inning with a single and the Patriots led 4-1.

In the sixth inning, the Patriots scored yet another run off of the Tiger knuckle baller. With one out, Kennedy reached base on a single and then maneuvered on over to third. Duncan then scored Kennedy with a single to make the score 5-1. Craig Burns closed out the inning grounding out back to the pitcher and the Patriots led 5-1.

In the seventh inning, with the Patriots leading 5-1 and another Tiger run looking doubtful, Prairiland scored two insurance runs to insure a victory. Blackburn started off the inning with a single and Prairiland used aggressive base running in the inning to make the score 7-1.

In the bottom of the seventh, Scudder struck out the side after walking a batter as the Patriots defeated the Tigers 7-1.

Scudder was once again overpowering on the mound, pitching a one hitter while striking out 15. Duncan scored runners on two, two out singles and Sparks continued his torrid hitting as he got a pair of singles.

Tuesday, June 3, Mineola:

After Patriot pitching ace Scott Scudder retired the Mineola hitters in order, the Patriots got a first inning rally. Like against Wills Point, Mike Connot started the rally with a sharp double to right field. Then after stealing third base, Joel Ballard scored Connot with the first run of the game on a sacrifice fly to left field. Although John Dusenberry and Heath Kennedy got back to back singles in the inning, the Patriots failed to score again in the inning and led 1-0 after one inning of play.

In the top of the third inning, the Yellowjackets came up with their only run of the game. The run came in

as a result of an error and a towering shot over Mike Connot's head in centerfield. So after two and one-half innings, the Patriots and Yellowjackets were knotted up at 1-1.

In the bottom of the third inning, the Patriots were determined to unknott the tie. After a leadoff single by Joel Ballard, catcher John Dusenberry hit a mammoth home run to make the score 3-1 Patriots. Chris Sparks followed with a double but failed to score so the Patriots led 3-1 after three innings.

Everything was smooth sailing for the Patriots until the bottom of the fifth inning. When Scott Scudder got into scoring position by stealing second base, the throw from the catcher to second hit Scudder in the arm. As Patriot Coach Bill Scudder explained, "The ball hit a nerve in Scott's elbow and put his arm to sleep." However, after numerous warmup pitches, Scudder had no problem pitching.

Prairiland got a lone run in the bottom of the sixth inning to almost insure a victory with Scudder on the mound. Heath Kennedy led off the inning with a single by first base and eventually came in to score on a wild pitch. After six complete innings, the Patriots led 4-1.

In the top of the seventh inning, Scudder had no problem shutting out the highly regarded Mineola Yellowjackets. The final two outs were strike outs and the Patriots won the game 4-1.

Scudder had a great game on the hill, striking out 16 while giving up only four hits. Dusenberry and Kennedy were the leading hitters on the night each going two for three. The regional final game will pit the Patriots against the winner of Waco Connally. Barring rain, the Patriots will play the game Friday or Saturday.

FmHa Announces Operation Assist

The Farmers Home Administration office in Lamar County will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist". Orville Fretwell, county supervisor, announced recently.

Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans. County supervisors for FMHA will take completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," Fretwell said, "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements, and

appraisals. If necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent."

While direct operating loans funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for

the guarantee program. County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the paperwork done beforehand by FmHA.

Borrowers and lenders interested in an FmHA guaranteed loan should contact the FmHA county office.

Mayor Foster Endorses Judge Fisher

Deport Mayor Charles Foster has endorsed Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher in his race for re-election.

Foster, who said that he had never endorsed a candidate before, stressed the importance of this year's county judge's race. Foster said that he and Judge Fisher had worked closely as members of the Ark-Tex Council of Governments Board and Executive Committee, as well as the Northeast Texas Regional Review

Committee.

Together, their efforts had resulted in three consecutive grants to pave Church, Beville, Kelsey and Pecan Streets. They are currently working on efforts to replace the Dewey Street Bridge and repave Depot Street.

Foster added that Fisher had been a strong supporter of our county's volunteer fire departments, having led efforts to increase funding from \$11,200 per year to \$30,000 per year.

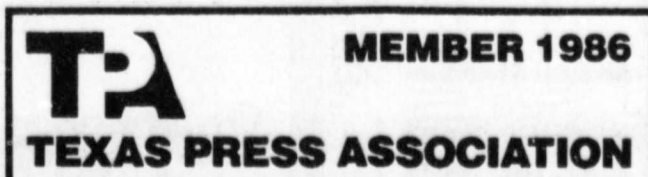
Two Arrested For Possession

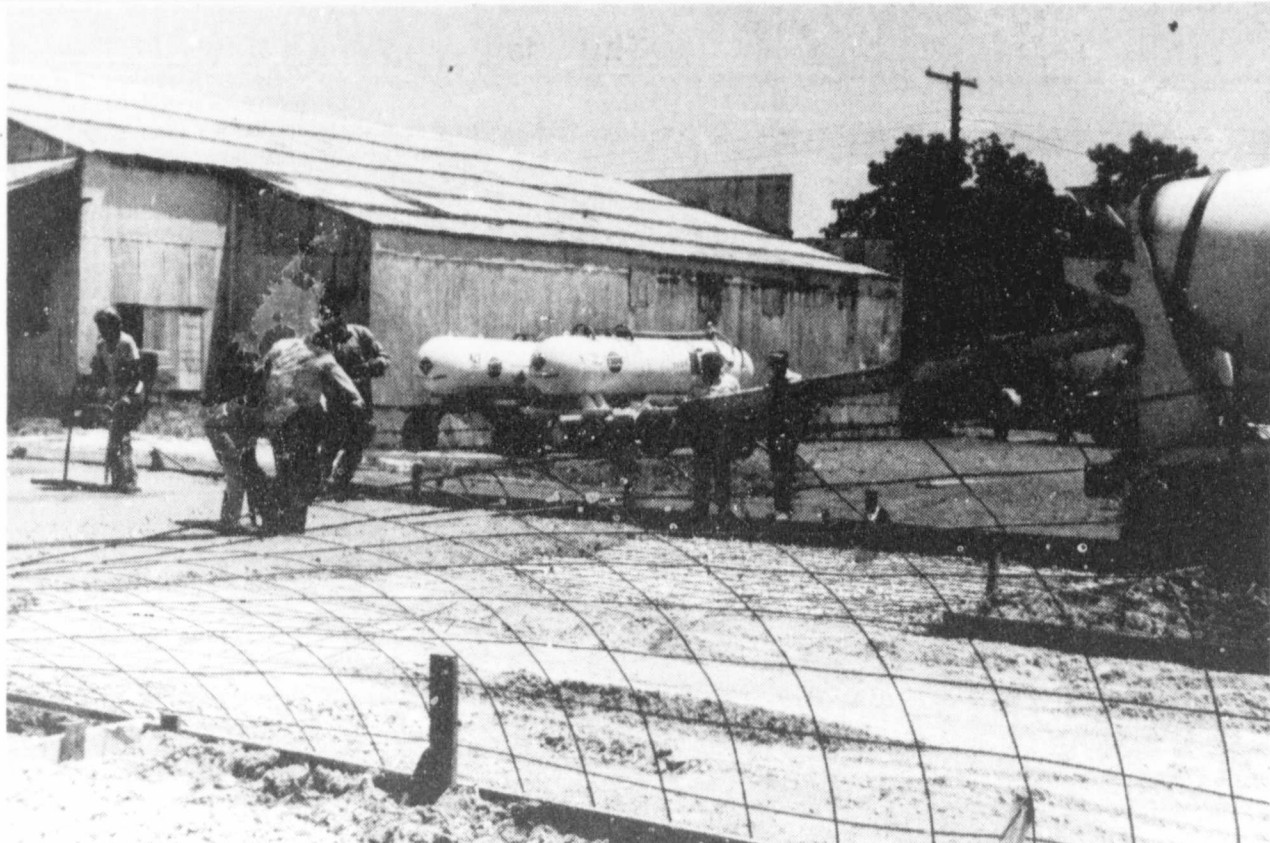

Albert Roach Chairman Of SWC

Albert Roach of Paris was elected chairman of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board by fellow members of the board at their recent regular scheduled May 22 meeting in their Temple headquarters.

Roach represents State Area IV which consists of 35 soil and water conservation districts in East Texas. The TSSWCB's chief responsibility is to coordinate the programs of Texas' 204 SWCDs. Unlike many state agencies and commissions whose policy making bodies are gubernatorial appointees, the TSSWCB consists of five elected members who must be landowners and actively engaged in farming or ranching.

A native of Northeast Texas, Roach was educated at East Texas State University in Commerce and Freed-Hardeman College in Henderson, TN. He owns and operates 776 acres of land a few miles outside of Paris. His operation is directed toward a cattle breeding program with the production of grain sorghum and wheat as his predominant cash crops.

Roach, a long time cooperor in the soil and water conservation program, is a past director of the North Texas SWCD, now known as Lamar SWCD. He is also a past director of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts and is a past chairman of the Association's Soil Stewardship Committee.

In addition to his farming and ranching operation, Roach served as a member and chairman on the Board of Directors of the Paris Milling Company. Later the company merged with the Archer-Daniel-Midland Company.

Active in various organizations, Roach is a member of the Paris Lions Club, Farm Bureau and Knife and Fork Club. He is past president of the local Farm Bureau and a past trustee of the Christian College of the Southwest in Mesquite. Roach, active in the Paris Chamber of Commerce, is also a past member of the Ark-Tex Council of Governments. He is also a former teacher and principal at Cunningham High School in Cunningham.

Because of outstanding achievements in business and civic affairs, Roach received the following recognitions: 1959, chosen outstanding soil and water conservation district supervisor in State Area IV by the Texas Bank and Trust Company of Dallas; 1962, received the Honorary Lone Star Degree for outstanding agricultural leadership; 1964, received the Hoblitzelle Award for contributions to the advancement of rural life; 1972, received the state Business/Professional Award by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce for outstanding conservation in Texas; 1975, named to Who's Who in America, Who's Who in the South and Southwest, Who's Who in Ecology and Who's Who International; 1980, commissioned a "Kentucky Colonel" by the Governor of Kentucky and the Kentucky State Senate.

Roach is an Elder in the Lamar Avenue Church of Christ.
