## SBA Speaks At Chamber Meeting

J. B. Hare and Millard Townsend of the Lubbock District of the Small Business Association, were guest speakers at the chamber of commerce sponsored meeting of Haskell business men and women held here on Thursday night.

A good turnout of business men and women attended the two hour session at the Haskell Steak House. Particular emphasis was placed on management of business and the changing times that are creating untold problems for small business today. The difference in operating a business and managing one was discussed in detail and some of the pitfalls cited as a result of poor management.

Mr. Townsend pointed out that 450,000 small business firms were opened each year and that reliable records showed that 400,000 of them went broke and ceased operations. In most cases the failures could be the direct result of poor management by executive leaders who failed to adapt their type business to the changing times and habits of the buying public.

Hare devoted a major portion of his talk to the relations between management and employees and the competitive effect of numerous factors involved in the operation of a present day business.

Nineteen people were present for the Thursday night meeting.

# Frontier Celebration Set

Haskell's fifth annual Frontier Days Celebration and Jaycee Rodeo will officially get underway Monday night, May 14 with an old-fashioned square dance on the streets of downtown. Square dancers over a wide area of Texas are being invited to be in Haskell for this particular event which will begin at 8 p. m. and last until 10 p. m. The Haskell Square Dance Club will be hosts for the spectacular dance that was perhaps the most popular pastime of the settlers in the early days.

Another outstanding special event of the week's celebration will be held at the Texas Theatre on Tuesday night, May 15 with the Frontier Day Queen's pageant will be presented. Lovely ladies, sponsored by business firms, and dressed in fashions of a bygone era, will vie for the title Miss Frontier Days in the colorful pageant. Special entertainment will also be presented to create a wonderful night of old-time fun and pageantry. The entry fee for the queen's pageant will be \$10 but in addition to having a representative, each sponsoring firm will also receive two complimentary tickets for the chuckwagon supper to be served at 6 p. m., Thursday, May 17. Mrs. R. A. Lane will be chairman of the queen's pageant.

Present plans call for a big horseshoe pitching contest on the courthouse lawn Wednesday afternoon, with contestants being selected from local clubs and organizations.

Perhaps the busiest day of the entire week's celebration will be Thursday, May 17, when the old-time frontier days street parade will wind its way down the streets of the business district. To date, 23 area riding clubs and sheriff's posses have received special invitations to

be present for the spectacular event. Immediately following the parade, a giant chuck wagon supper will be served visiting riding club and sheriff posse guests and local folks at the rodeo grounds. Some 600 persons were served last year in the style of the cowboys who followed the wagon on roundups in days gone by.

Also on Thursday night, the

first performance of the Jaycee Rodeo will get underway in the arena with Campbell and Cordell of Childress, Texas providing the riding and roping stock from their well known rodeo string. A colorful grand entry will be staged prior to rodeo contests in which riding clubs and sheriff's posses will parade in the arena for the enjoyment of everyone.

All Haskell merchants and residents are urged to get ready early for the week of old-time celebration staged in memoriam of the pioneers who settled this area of the west.

Frank Jenkins, chairman of the Jaycee's Beard Growing Contest, reminds the men of Haskell that the water tank will be set up at the court house. Men not having shaving permits are advised to have a beard or suffer the consequences (the water tank).

Permits may be obtained from any Jaycee member for 50c during the Frontier Day Celebration and Jaycee Rodeo. Deadline for shaving permits will be Friday morning.

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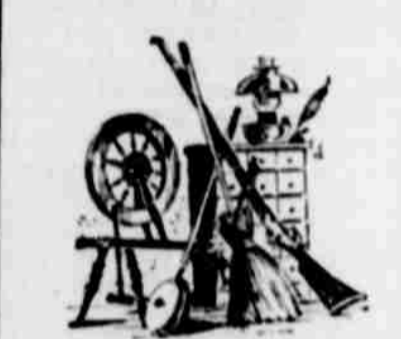

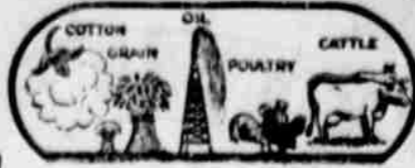

## 1973 Fertilizer Application May Present Problems

LUBBOCK—“Old timers are saying we have never before had a year like this on the Texas High Plains.” So says Jim Valentine, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, whose job it is to assist West Texas farmers in planning their programs of fertilizer use.

“Extremely late harvests hampered fall fertilizer applications, and continuing wet soil conditions have greatly curtailed applications for the 1973 crop,” Valentine asserts. “Much of the acreage is still unfertilized.”

The situation is further complicated, he says, by severe shortages at the dealer level of nitrogen materials other than ammonia. All phosphate materials are reported to be in very short supply.

“Because of these unusual problems, post-plant applications merit careful consideration,” the Lubbock-based specialist declares. “In many cases, these can be as effective as pre-plant applications. And there is still time to have soil tested for nitrate nitrogen and phosphorus, along with other plant nutrients. County Extension agents can supply information on sample collection and mailing.”

Many of the heavy soils are showing considerable nitrate carryover resulting from heavier than required previous applications, Valentine reports. If this condition exists, lighter applications or the possible omission of nitrogen may be in order for this growing season.

“Most soils contain sufficient nitrogen to get the crop started; therefore, nitrogen can be applied as soon as possible after planting when moisture conditions are favorable for cultivation. For sorghum and corn, applications made 35 to 40 days after planting can be expected to produce top yields. Regardless of the carrier used, the nitrogen will soon be changed to the mobile nitrate form which is readily available to the rapidly expanding root system. Care should be taken in all instances to avoid root pruning,” he warns.

Valentine reports that phosphorus is not nearly as deficient as nitrogen in the area, as a whole.

“If soil tests show adequate phosphorus, the grower is well ahead and phosphate applications for 1973 can be omitted without reduction of yield,” he explains.

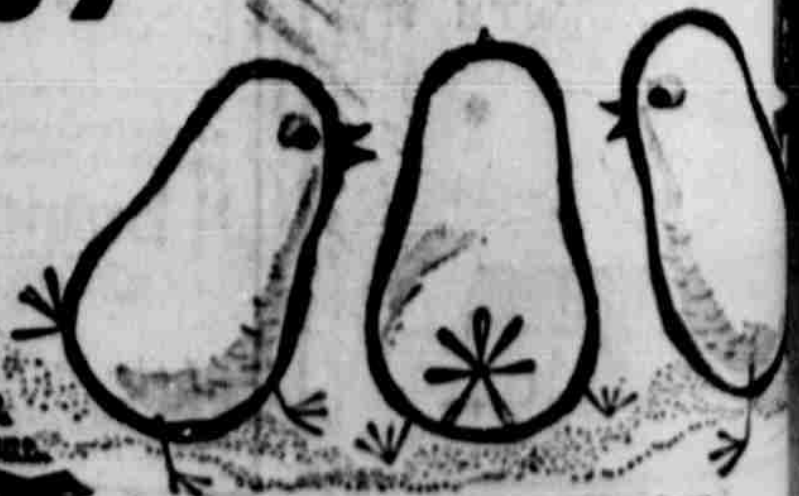
