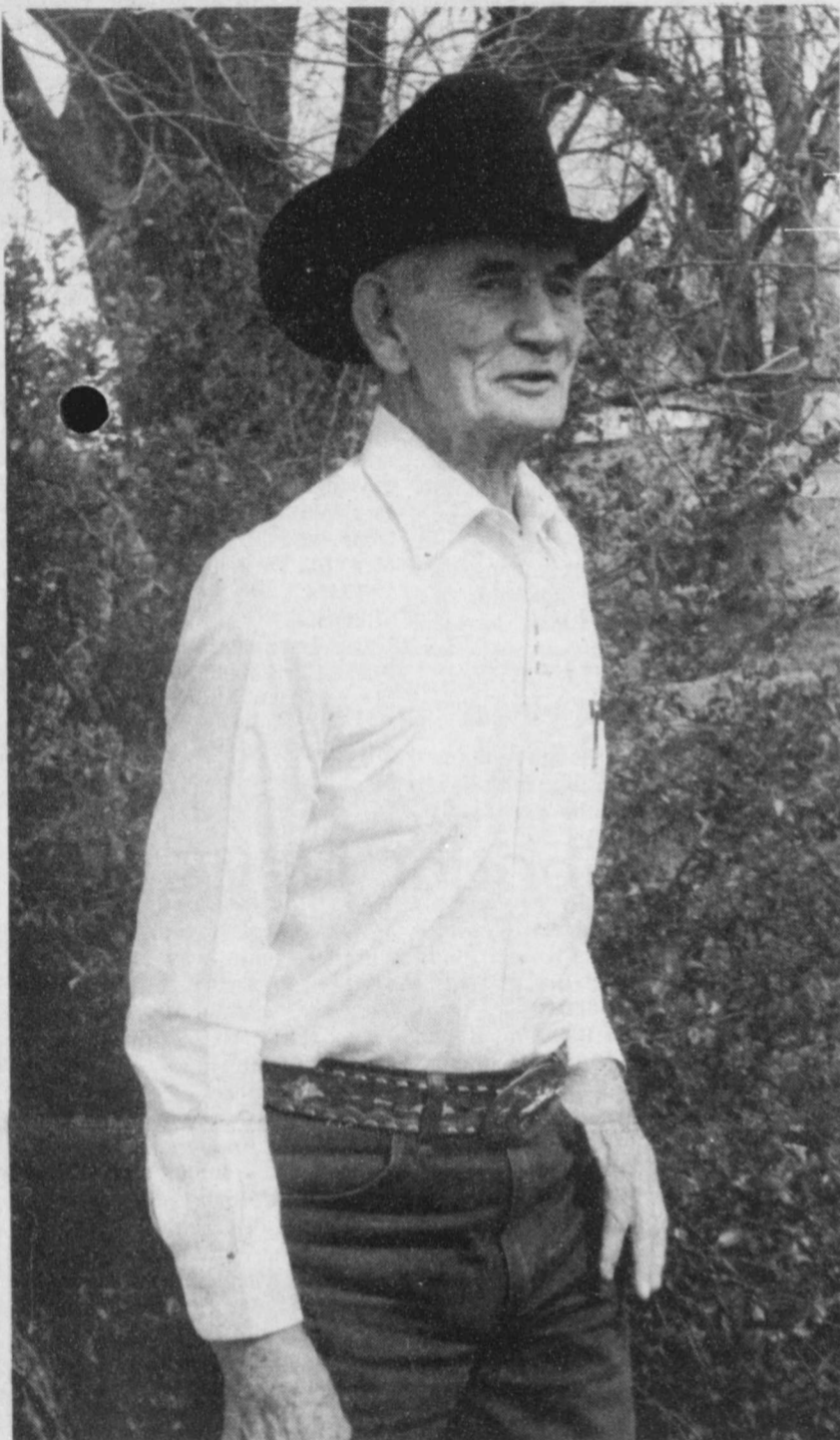


Babe Rogers, Not Just A Coca-Cola Cowboy He's The Real Thing

Babe Rogers' weathered face and humour-crikkled eyes give testimony to the many things he has seen and done during his 76 years.

A living page from a Western history book, he is the typical soft-spoken cowboy, and a distant relative to the legendary Will Rogers.

His blue jeans and boots fit like only a real cowboy's can. His belt buckle was honestly won roping and riding, his crisp white shirt and cowboy hat have the stamp of authenticity. A gentler, kinder spoken man cannot be imagined.

Cowboying, as he will smile wryly and admit, has been his first love since the age of 13. "I always kept going back to that", he grins.

He was born the youngest of four children in Claremore, Oklahoma. His father was a full-blood Cherokee Indian, who came from Georgia as a child on the infamous "Trail of Tears" which resulted in the death of so many.

His mother died while Babe was a small child, and his father, he recalls was strict.

"We learned to cook, wash, iron and clean pretty young. I know we scrubbed that old pine floor until it was white as paper," Babe murmurs, eyes looking inward to those long-ago times.

His father attended Bacon College at Muskogee, OK and when Babe was 13 years old, sent him to boarding school there. Babe, however, had different ideas, and ran away. He didn't see his father again for five years.

His first job was for a Mr. Brandon in Wagoner, OK. He worked on the Half Circle Ranch there. That meant punching cows, cutting wood or whatever chores were to be done. For this, he received \$5.00 per month and his board.

Babe recalls that Mr. Brandon was a pretty hard taskmaster, not just with the hired hands, but with his own boys. He smiles as he recalls one of the boys badgering his Pa about going to a dance. The man grabbed up a handy bridle and promptly belted the youngster across the head with the bit end. It laid him out cold.

"Ole Frank didn't pester his Pa about going to that dance anymore," Babe reflects.

From Wagoner, Babe wandered on to Western Oklahoma. He saw his dad again and worked near him for a while, then hired on with "The Bows Boys" and headed for West Texas.

They were looking for a cook, and he told them he could fill the bill. Everything was fine for a while, he says, but the kitchen was set up in a big tent and one afternoon he got it afire. "That kitchen just plumb burned up," he ruefully ponders.

From near Amarillo, he signed on at the Matador Ranch.

"The first pair of new boots I ever had cost me a whole month's wages," Babe tells. "I ordered them from a White and Davis catalogue, and they were black with white stitched eagles on the tops." He obviously recalls clearly the delight those boots were

to him back then. "Fifteen dollars, the whole month's wages," he says again, shaking his head a little.

Those were top wages back in those days, too.

He drifted, by his own admission, wherever it took to make a living. Through good times and bad, through a depression era never equalled, Babe did what he had to do to pay his own way.

Some of the things he has done besides cowboying include butchering, painting, general odd jobs, working in a glass factory, and every aspect of rodeo cowboying.

He met his wife, Bonnie, in Oklahoma City in 1936. She loved the rodeo circuit as much as he did, and the two traveled together until her death in 1985.

"Mercy, I hauled her and a horse a jillion miles up and down the road", he muses. It is obvious that he loved every minute of it.

He has ridden bareback horses, bulls and roped. About the only thing he didn't do was "doggin", which he was too small for.

Although he and his wife, a native of Detroit, Texas, had no children, they raised his brother's three youngsters. They are "just like my own" and a lot of visiting goes on between them.

Babe hasn't let years slow him down much. He still runs about 100 head of cattle, taking care of them himself. He still keeps a horse, and

seldom misses a rodeo within anywhere in driving distance.

No stranger to broken bones, he walks with a slight limp, legacy of a cantankerous race horse who shattered his knee. It doesn't keep him off horseback, or from doing anything he wants to do.

In Detroit, where he has lived since 1969, he is known as "Uncle Babe" by most of the youngsters. Black or white, they all adore his stories of life when cowboys roamed the range and the spirit of the west flourished.

Quietly, sadly, he recalls traveling with his wife in a just-purchased travel trailer back in '85.

"She turned to me and said 'Babe, this is the best vacation we've ever had' ". That was on a Saturday and by the next Friday morning she had died.

That he misses her is evident. Quickly he smiles and says once again "Oh boy, the miles, all those miles we traveled around this country."

He answers questions honestly, straight-out and with no shilly-shallying around. Except for one.

Eyes twinkling, he refuses politely to reveal his real name.

"Aw", he grins, "nobody knows me by anything but Babe, anyhow."

It only takes a second to realize that there's no use to press the point...it's what Babe Rogers is, not what his given name is that makes him such a likeable, special person, and a genuine cowboy.

Fishing Permit Required To Fish At City Lake

With better weather, more people are thinking about fishing, and it's a good time to obtain a fishing permit for the Tom Jeffus Reservoir located north of Deport.

The City of Deport requires that a permit be obtained, at the cost of \$5 for a family of four for the year, or \$10 for a family of more than four.

It is illegal to fish at the lake without a permit.

Other rules and regulations apply to fishing at the lake. They are: no nets, small boats with paddles or trolling motors only; no firearms; no swimming; trot lines must be marked and not left over five days at a time in the lake; 25 hooks per trot line and

not over one line per person; catfish and bass kept must be no less than 10 inches in length; bag limit is 10 catfish and 10 bass per day.

A valid fishing license according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department must be held, and entry must be made on the west side of the lake on City property or it will be a trespassing violation.

No littering, no drinking alcoholic beverages or having narcotics will be permitted.

Fines from \$10 to \$200 will be enforced by the City of Deport and State laws by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Crime Stoppers Recaps 1986

During the year of 1986, Lamar County Crime Stoppers, in association with the Lamar County Sheriff's Office, the Paris Police Department and the Paris Fire Marshall's office, cleared 23 felony cases, made 36 stolen property and seized drugs and approved \$3,800 in rewards.
 Of the Crime Stopper calls that qualified for reward, 32% were drug related, 19% for burglary and 19% for theft. Also cleared were one robbery, one arson, one felony criminal mischief. A fugitive and an AWOL were also arrested on Crime Stopper tips.
 In addition, \$26,460.00 of illegal drugs were seized, \$11,303 of stolen property was recovered.
 Of the total number of calls received on the Crime Stoppers TIPS line, 39% were drug related, 13% for burglary, 9% for arson and 9% for theft. Calls were also received on homicide, rape and robbery.

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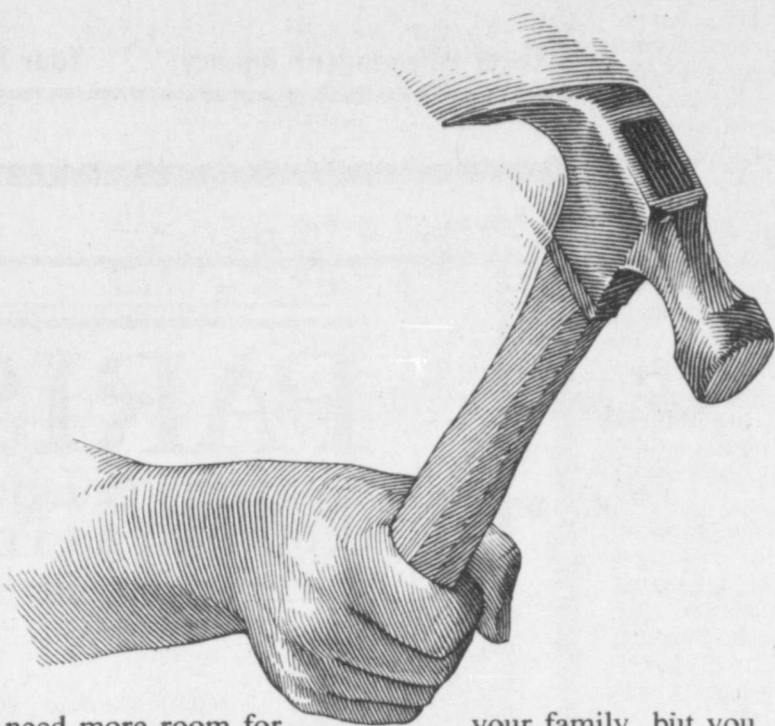

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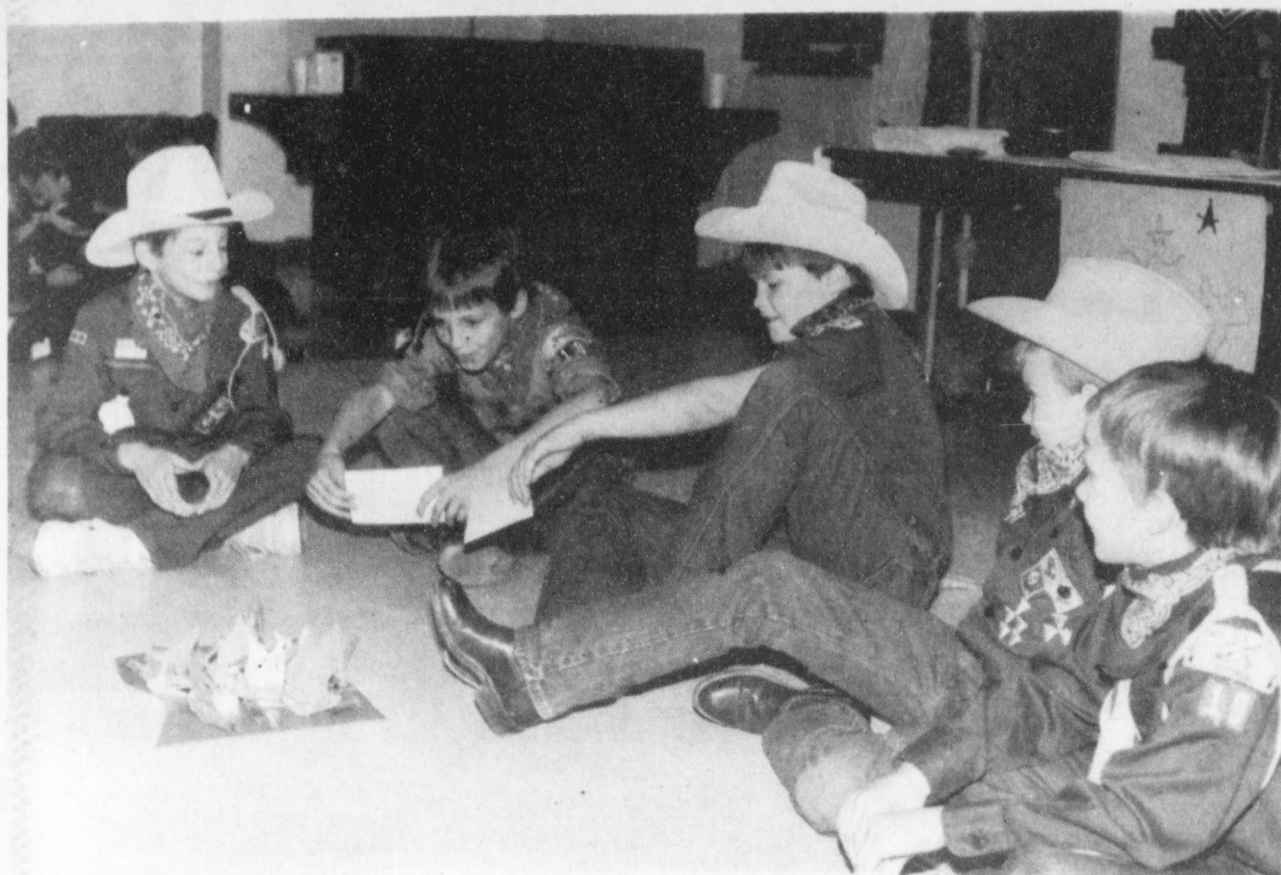

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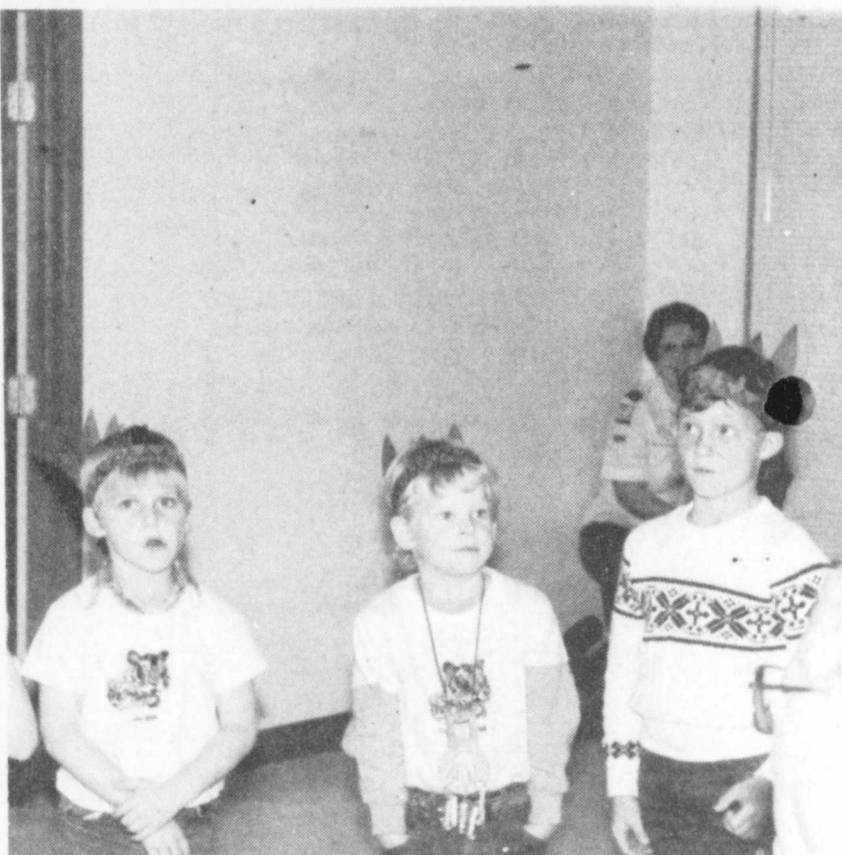
