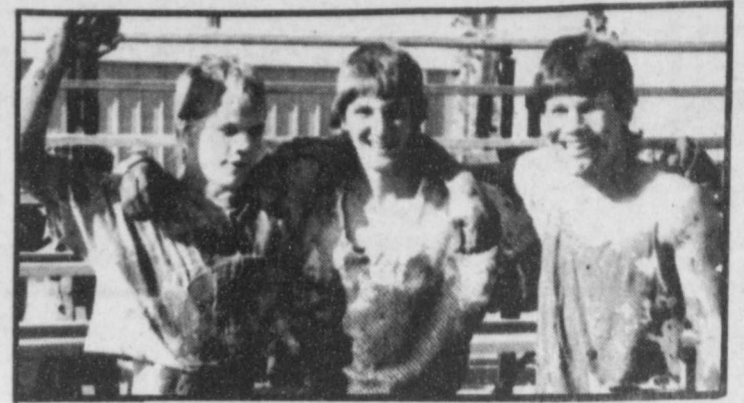

Incumbents Favored In Saturday Elections

Voter turn-out was light in Saturday's local school board and city council elections. Incumbents Harold Morrison, Kenneth Gifford and James Norwood were re-elected to the Prairiland CISD Board of Trustees. Two hundred and forty-six

voters cast their ballots. Place 2, the Blossom seat that Harold Morrison won with 134 votes, saw Bobby Kent receive 45 votes and Liz Irwin 43. Place 3, Deport, had 169 votes cast for Kenneth Gifford with one write-in

vote, and Place 6 had James Norwood with 162 votes and one write-in. The Blossom City Council election resulted in Frank Mowery, Stacy Lyons and Jim Hilliard being elected to serve in determining city government. Mowery received 68 votes,

Lyons 57 and Hilliard 50. Carolyn Wheelchel received 47 votes, Thomas House 46 and three write-in votes were cast for a total of 96 votes, according to Ann Ebbs, City Secretary. In the Deport City Council election,

Nancy Gresham, Gordon Isbell and James Short were all returned to their seats on the council. Gresham received 57 votes, Isbell 50, Short 45 and Jo Elmore Bryant 15. A total of 57 votes were cast in all.

Incumbents were heavily favored in all of the elections, which seems to herald a satisfaction on the whole with the way school board and city council members are doing their job.

Through on top of nature's little trick is a man-made trick called the time change. I don't know about the rest of you folks, but my system is thoroughly confused.

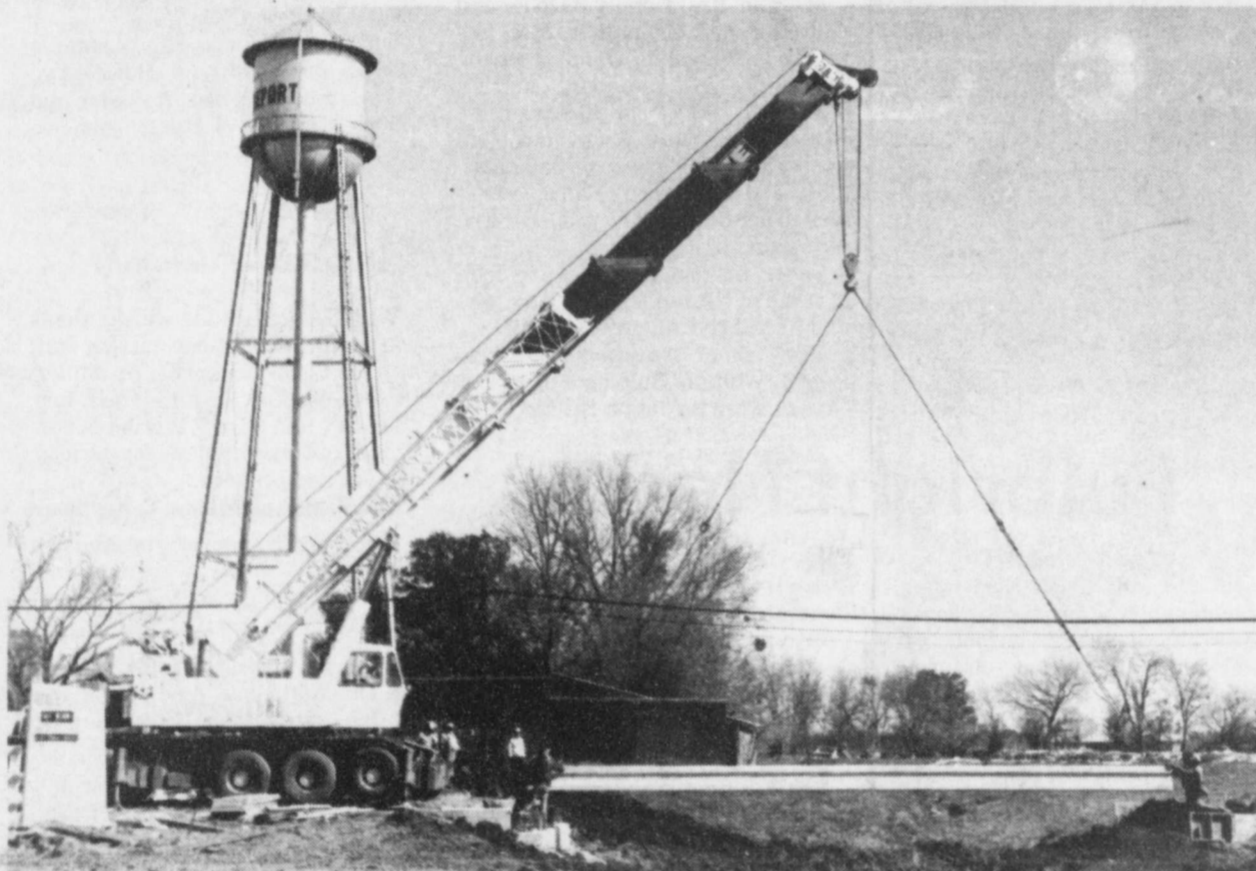

About the middle of April is a good time to begin fertilizing hay meadows and pastures, according to Dr. Tom A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist. By then, night temperatures should be above 60 degrees and bermudagrass should really begin to grow.

There is still time to take a soil test in order to make fertilizer applications more precise and thus more economical. Guessing at the fertility needs of a hay meadow or pasture can be an expensive gamble.

Reeves says that if premerge herbicides were not applied earlier and broadleaf weeds are infesting the hay meadow or pasture, a post emerge herbicide should be applied before fertilization. This will prevent growing weeds from using the nutrients before the bermudagrass gets growing good. If weeds are not controlled, they will consume most of the fertilizer. Weeds make poor quality forage and take up space, water and nutrients that are needed by the higher quality bermudagrass.

Once the fertilizer to be applied has been determined, shop around for the best prices. However, Reeves says, that price is not the only factor to consider. The honesty and reliability of the dealer are very important. A good job of spreading the fertilizer is very important for uniform production over the entire meadow or pasture.

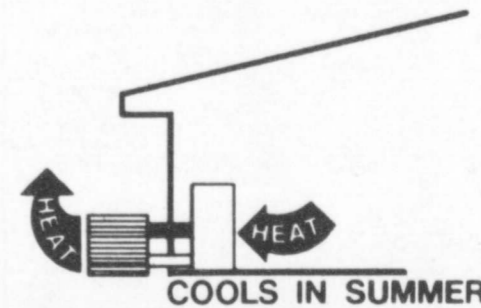
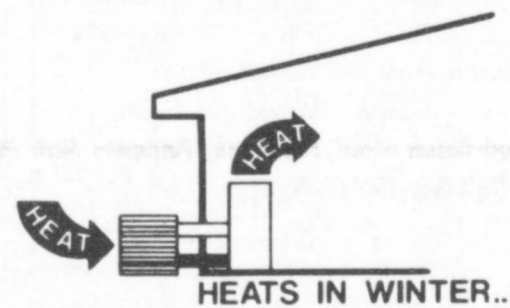

Prairiland Patriots Improve District Record

Tuesday afternoon at Prairiland, the Patriots upped their district record to four wins without a loss with a tight 4-2 victory over the Clarksville Tigers.

With Patriot pitcher Jack Kindle as well as the Clarksville pitcher pitching excellently, runs were hard to come by. However, in the bottom of the second inning, Giovanni Scarano drove a pitch over the left field fence to give the Patriots a lead of 1-0.

Not until the top of the sixth inning did another team score. Unfortunately, the team that scored twice in the inning was the Tigers. With the aid of a home run and two singles, the Tigers took the lead at 2-1. The Patriots next game will be in Mt. Vernon where they will take on the Tigers in a 6:00 p.m. game Friday. That game will finish up the first round of district play.

The Prairiland Patriots improved their district record to three wins without a loss in district play, with a 15-3 victory over the Paul Pewitt Brahms last Friday at home.

After Patriot hurler Martin Babb held the Brahms scoreless in the top of the first inning, Babb led off the bottom half of the inning with a single by the shortstop. Although Richard Eatherly followed with a ground ball which forced out Babb at second base, he promptly stole second base and came in to score the first run of the game when Jack Kindle followed with a double. Steven Johnson continued the rally with a walk to put runners at first and second base. Mike Blackburn followed with a fielder's choice which forced out Kindle for the second out. However, Giovanni Scarano drove in Johnson with a bad hop single over third base and the Patriots led 2-0. The final run of the inning was scored a few pitches later

when Blackburn streaked home on a wild pitch. After one inning, the Patriots led 3-0.

During the second inning, the Patriots continued their assault on the Brahms. After Babb retired the Brahms in order in the top half of the inning, Wade Sparks led off the bottom half with a perfect bunt single down the third baseline. Carey Borden followed with a single to put runners on the corners. One out later, Eatherly hit a single to left field driving in both Sparks and Borden to increase the lead to 5-0. What followed was five consecutive hits by Kindle, Johnson, Blackburn, Scarano and Mike Ray to make the score 11-0. Ray's hit was a tremendous home run over the left centerfield fence to drive in Scarano. The Patriots did not score again in the inning, but the 11-0 lead had everyone convinced that the game would not last seven innings.

In the top of the third inning, Babb once again held the Brahms scoreless. Once again, as he had done in the first inning, Babb led off the bottom of the third inning with a single. 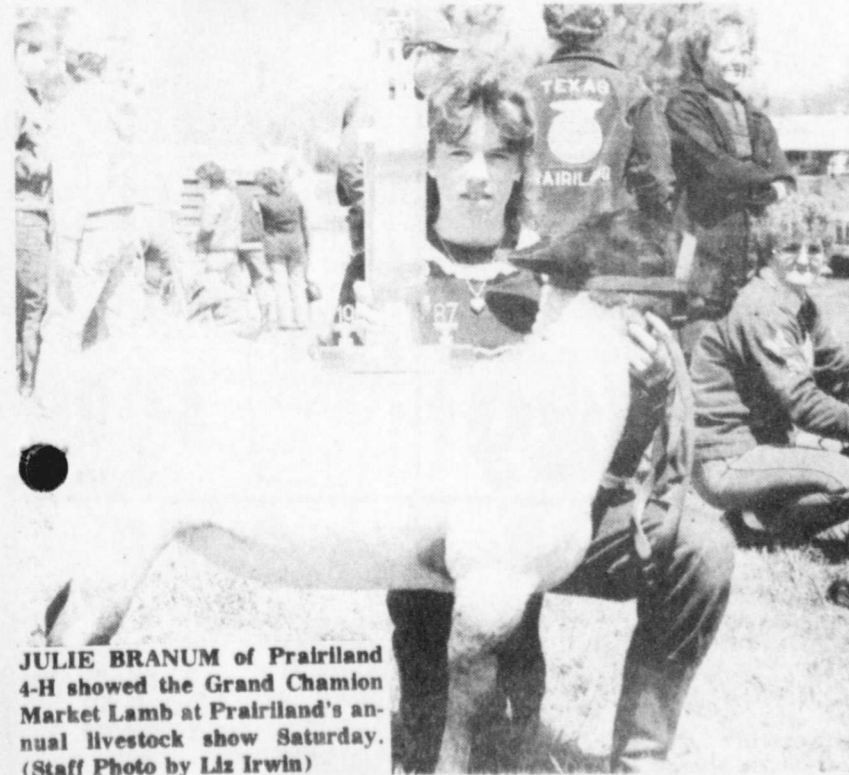

Keeping Healthy

Father/Infant Relationship
Fathers are playing an increasingly important role in child rearing and Michael W. Yogman, MD of Harvard Medical School has been studying the infant/father relationship for the past decade.

Dr. Yogman reports some similarities between paternal and maternal play, and that the infants exhibited the same number of positive facial and verbal expressions with the father as with the mother.

The differences in play with each parent may mean that each influences different elements of the child's development, according to the doctor. Turn-taking games more common with mothers may help the child to learn basic social skills, facilitate later language development, and promote the integration of new skills. The more vigorous games exhibited in play with fathers may encourage the infant's inquisitiveness, present alternatives in social play, and promote the acquisition of new skills and the capacity to experience intensity. "Together, these differential tracks, which appear to be available to infants as early as one month of age, may foster the development of a wider range of social skills than would develop if only one pattern were available," says Dr. Yogman.
