#### THE COTTON CONVENTION

From the reports in the Dallas News of the first day's proceedings of the big cotton convention being held in Dallas by the Southern States Cotton Corporation, we gather that they are having a great and enthusiastic time. The News states that about 500 people were present the first day from several states. The first day's session was given largly to business matters, such as the annual election of directors, passing on the by-laws, etc., by the stockholders. By a vote of the stockholders and with the consent of President George Dole Wadley of Georgia, the general headquarters of the Corporation will be moved from Macon, Ga., to Dallas, Texas.

At the afternoon and night sessions several strong speeches were made presenting the advantages that would follow to all interests of the South from the putting into effect the Corporation's plan for 15 cent cotton.

Rev. Geo. C. Rankin of Dallas delivered the opening prayer. City Commissioner W. T. Henderson and J. R. Babcock of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce delivered addresses of welcome in which they spoke in high terms of approval of the purposes of the Corporation. A very strong exposition of the plans and purposes of the Corporation was made in a speech by W. H. Carter of Columbus, Miss., and Thos. H. McGallard, a cotton farmer for thirty es were also made by Ed R. Kone, sell of Eastland, Texas, J. W. L. Corley of Oklahoma and others. To be entitled A Joint Resolution proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Sec. tions 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds and the levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same for public improvements,

Be It Resolved by The Legisla. ture of The State of Texas: Section 1. That Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Section 49. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection, and defend the State in war or pay existing debts, and no debt created to supply deficiencies in current revenues shall ever exceed in the aggregate at any one time five hundred thousand dollars. 
