Some people enjoy doing the strangest things for entertainment. Take white water rafting for example.

While up in Canada on vacation recently Thomas and I booked ourselves on a raft trip down the Kicking Horse River in British Columbia.

I almost chickened out when they told us to show up wearing shorts or a bathing suit. The last living creatures to see me in shorts were the labrador retrievers, who, I suspect give canine laughs every time I appear.

Guests to our remote country may have gotten the occasional glimpse of my considerable backside as it vanished around a corner, but that's all.

But Thomas pointed out that these folks would never see us again, and I decided to go ahead.

When we arrived, I scuttled behind the car like a criminal marked with a victim's blood while skinny people strolled around.

Then they began handing out the wet suits.

There isn't a whole lot of use for wet suits here in our part of East Texas, but basically they are a foam-type fabric suit that fits from ankle to neck. They are designed to conserve body heat if someone is thrown into the water. The reason body heat needs preserving is that the water on Canadian Rivers is ice only 24 hours before it becomes river water.

These wet suits were still soaking from the last strangers who had worn them. That didn't make them any easier to slip into.

Envision a snake trying to wiggle back into the skin it has just shed, or attempt to put the peel back onto a tomato and you can get an inkling of what I'm talking about.

Even the skinny people were having trouble with them!

Finally though, we all got suited up, from special booties up to our necks.

Wet suits definitely tend to point out people's finest physical features. That's great if you HAVE any fine physical features.

To top off this bizarre outfit we were strapped into special floatation devices. These are designed so that one floats face upward (definitely preferable to the alternative) and the head is high (so it doesn't bash on the rocks). The rafting companies try their best to take care of their passengers... I suspect that if they were to drown very man, their repeat business would be pretty poor.

After being cinched up like pack horses, our happy band waddled down to the riverside to hear instructions on paddling, bailing and helping hold people in the raft.

Waddled? Absolutely! We all waddled. No one but the experienced are graceful decked out like our bunch was.

Finally we all slogged into our rafts and set off. Our guide was a young Australian whose name is actually Jeff. The Canadian guides referred to him as Jiff...claiming that when asked his name he would always reply "Me name's Jiff". His cheerful "No worries, team" made the trip much nicer, and his willingness to impart knowledge on his native country was fascinating. We all learned quickly that when he yelled "Hold on!" he wasn't kidding, either!

The first little splash filled my right ear with ice water and put four or five inches of the same frigid substance in the bottom of the raft to chill our feet.

There I sat, the woman who wants a fire in the wood stove the first time it goes below fifty degrees. The only person in Deport, Texas who hopes that it WON'T come our semi-annual two inches snowfall!

I was having serious doubts about our wisdom.

Just about that time we hit our first rapid, and it was all over.

The raft was bucking, the water level was up to our knees, "Jiff" was shouting "paddle" and "Bail" and I had lost my heart completely, but not in fear.

As Thomas tells everyone he sees, "I've been married to her for nineteen years, and I've NEVER seen her laugh so much".

Wave after wave of ice cold water flew over us, slapped us in the face,

Prairiland States Intent To Raise Taxes

The Prairiland School Board met in regular session Monday night, one of the primary items on the agenda being setting up the intent to raise taxes.

Superintendent Leslie Taylor said "In order for us to have enough money to take care of our budget, build the classrooms and cafeteria at Blossom, we needed a tax rate. The board's intent is to set a tax rate for Prairiland CISD in 1988 at .6574 cents per one

hundred dollars of evaluation. This should bring in about \$31,000 more dollars".

The board reviewed the school budget, accepting it for 1988-89 school year with a total revenue of \$3,604,854.00. Total expenditures were set at \$3,604,821.29, leaving a deficit of \$13,927.29.

Superintendent Taylor said "We're confident that this will work out. Hopefully, we have some things over

budgeted. If not, we can take the money from reserve funds."

The increase, according to Taylor, will not handle inflation. The budget, he says, is running about \$40,000 more than last year, mostly due to mandatory state requirements.

A public hearing set for August 22 at 7 p.m. in the Prairiland High School Library. Everyone is invited to attend.

The board will meet again on

August 29, after the hearing, to set the tax rate.

In other business they opened bids for the school cafeteria supplies, with the bread contract going to Mrs. Baird's and milk tabled until Aug. 22.

They opened bids on the new Blossom School Cafeteria, but delayed acceptance of them until August 22.

The board also adopted a risk management program, which will be

used to set up ways to prevent students from dropping out of school.

Roach Oil Company was awarded the bid for fuel and oil for the transportation department.

They are also in the process of hiring a second grade teacher for the Deport campus.

Minutes were read and approved, financial statement heard and approved and payment of bills approved.

Parking Is Problem On Monroe and Main Streets

The State Highway Department has notified the City Council in Deport for infractions on newly paved Monroe Street and the east side of Main Street.

All parking on the sides of Monroe Street may soon be illegal unless it is an emergency.

Parallel parking ONLY will be

allowed on the east side of Main Street in Deport, including in front of the bank and other businesses on that side of the street.

Again, signs will be put up to this effect.

All residents are urged to observe these new rules.

Deport City Council Meets

The Deport City Council met in regular session Monday night.

One of the first items of business was a plan for a cottonseed line from Blackland Prairie Gin, Inc. across the street to the old gin building just south of the current gin. This line will be elevated and will shoot cottonseed into storage across the road and plans for it were approved.

A bus at John Filkins' was discussed but no action taken.

Under new business, Nancy Gresham made the motion to lay the

sewer line down from the corner of Nobles Street northward to the Deport City Limits. The motion carried 100%.

Duane Glover made the motion to adopt the 1988 tax rate of .3551 and it carried 100%.

A lengthy discussion was held concerning trash burning and a better solution is being looked for.

The Council decided to get another dumpster.

The bills were paid and financial report approved as were the minutes.

filled up the raft as fast as we could bail it out! I was having so much fun I kept forgetting to bail until Jiff, patient guide that he was, reminded me.

It was absolutely the greatest thing I have ever tried.

Over the years Thomas and I have tried piloting planes, glider piloting, fishing, boating, horseback riding and a world of other activities a try. Nothing, not even flying, came close to this experience.

When, after a full day on the river, our trip came to an end, I could have cried that it was over.

I hadn't been cold since that first dousing, I hadn't given thought to wet suit, weight or anything else for the whole trip.

So here I am, on my birthday, writing this little column. I'm thirty...oh, all right, 39 years old today. I weigh fifty pounds more than I have in my life, my knees are shot after multiple surgeries, I've developed arthritis, and I've finally found the one thing I really love to do!

And the opportunities to do it are so plentiful here in East Texas, too.

I could raft down Mustang creek, it's handy. Of course it would help if it had any water in it right now.

I could go over to the Red River, that big old sluggish giant the color of blood and the consistency of syrup.

Perhaps I could go 900 miles down to the Rio Grande, the temperature (of the water, not the air) is about 100 degrees these days, and one can hike on the bank faster than the current flows.

It's a little bit like discovering you love deep sea fishing when you live in Kansas, or rock climbing in Louisiana.

Still, I have a wonderful day's memories, came home and went on a diet, and have started pushing the lawn mower instead of using the tractor. That raft trip was the best thing that ever happened to me. If I get too stressed out, I just remember the trip. If I get tempted to go off my diet I remember the wet suit. It works like a charm.

Stray Dogs Once Again A Threat

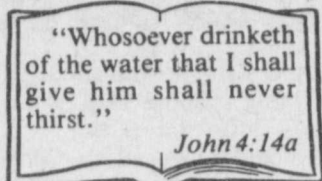

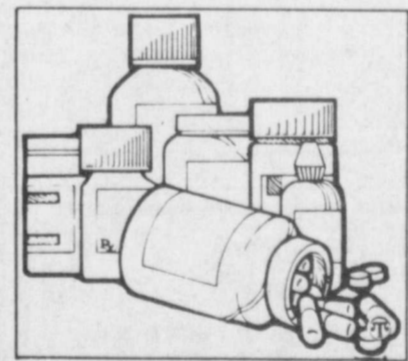

You can keep from becoming one of these statistics by being an alert consumer. The next time a medicine is prescribed for you, ask your health care professional these questions:

1. What is the name of the drug and what is it supposed to do?
2. How and when do I take it—and for how long?
3. What foods, drinks, other medicines, or activities should I avoid while taking this drug?
4. Are there any side effects and what do I do if they occur?
5. Is there any written information available about the drug?

Getting the answers to the questions could help solve America's "other drug problem."

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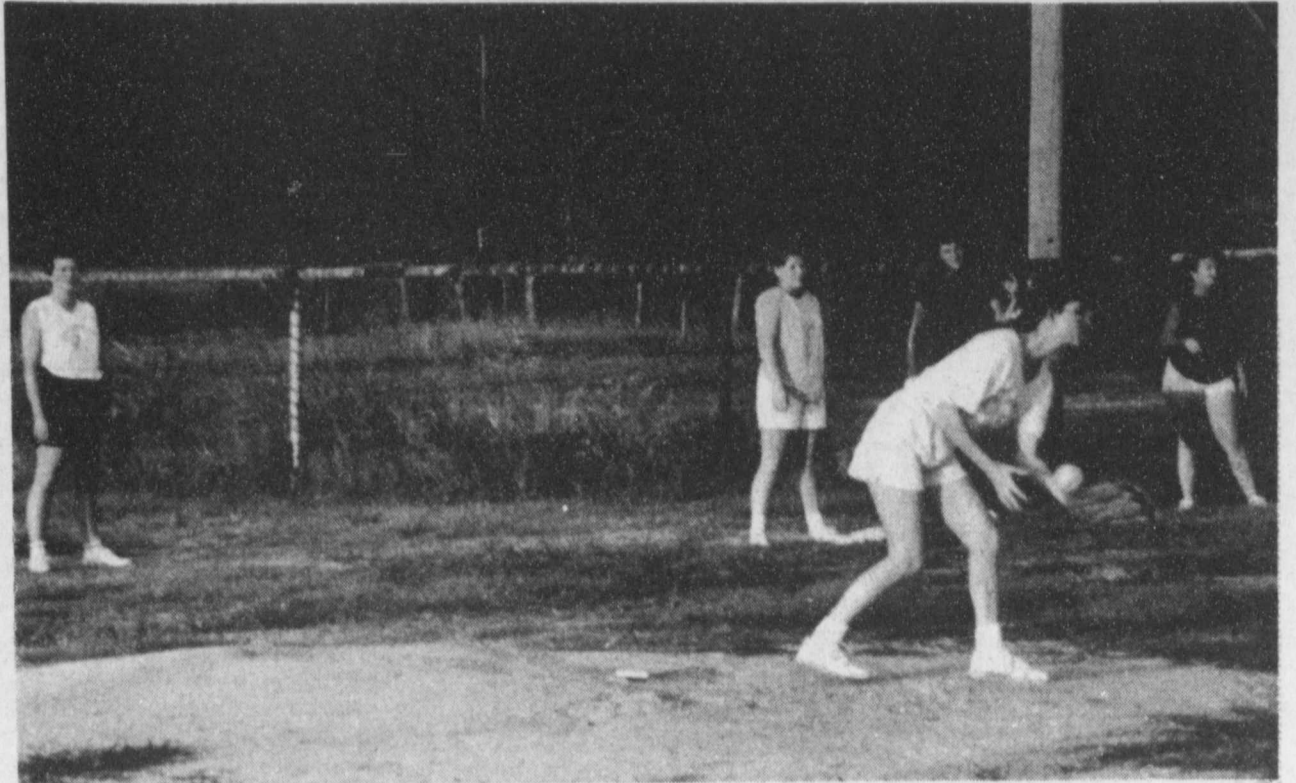

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Glaciers, Goats and Gasps Of Delight!

We've been back off vacation for nearly two weeks now. So many people have been to Alberta, Canada, that we didn't think anyone would really want to hear our vacation tales. We usually try to confine them to the unusual trips.

But dozens of people have begged us to write our little trip up, so we finally decided to go ahead. After all, for those who aren't interested, they can skip over this part of the paper. So many people say "We'll never get to go any other way".

Calgary, Alberta, Canada. Our flight arrived at 10 at night. It wasn't dark. During the following week and half we figured out that it wasn't going to be dark until nearly eleven. Since we're used to staying up until after dark, we certainly didn't waste much time on sleep!

Downtown Calgary is a beautiful city, new, built since the oil boom, and interspersed with lots of pristine parks. Two rivers meander through the city, the Bow...and (are you ready for this) the Elbow!

It was so late we didn't want to go out from our hotel to eat, so we ordered pizza for a nearby place known as "Baby Blue's". The pizza was delicious, and had shrimp on it!

Next morning we collected our rental car and headed west, past the Olympic park where the 1988 winter games were held, and on up the Icefields parkway, billed as one of the most beautiful highways in North America, and not in the least over-billed!

As the glorious mountains began to tower overhead the road revealed panorama after panorama of flowing rivers, majestic mountains and glaciers tumbling down through valleys.

We were supposed to be in the little town of Jasper that night, and kept stopping so much that a 280 mile journey turned into an all-day affair.

The further west we traveled the more gorgeous the scenery became. The water turned an amazing shade of turquoise and aqua blue, caused, we found out, by "rock flour" which is scoured by wind and ice from the mountains and refracts light in the water.

At Dead Man's Flats we began an odyssey...a full fledged bear hunt. For years Thomas has wanted to see a bear in the wild. We've stayed every

place there was bear trouble, but never seen so much as a beary backside vanishing over a hill.

We stopped at the Grizzly B'ar Cafe for a quick hamburger, and spent plenty of time with the waitress, talking about the country, and the bear that lived across the highway on the mountain. They had a picture of him, and affectionately called him "Granddad". This helpful lady promised us that if we would go out early along the rivers west of Jasper we would see the black bears playing in the river.

After filing this info away we headed west some more, passing Banff and Lake Louise, since we would be coming back to them.

At the Columbia Icefields we took a snow coach tour out onto the Athabasca Glacier. Ice 40,000 years old and nearly a thousand feet thick is pretty impressive!

Heaved up in bumpy layers, the blue-tinted ice seems to stretch forever, while a fierce, cold wind slashes across it.

The idea of the glaciers ever disappearing is inconceivable, but if they continue melting at their present one quarter inch and hour they only have about 500 years more before they are completely gone.

Shortly after rskidding around out on the glacier surface we continued on our drive, only to be halted by the sight of a family of mountain goats grazing on a steep mountainside.

These animals are wild, but because they are in Canadian National Parks they have never been hunted or chased. They ignore people as just something that happens.

With their little kids at their sides, the mama goats would wander into the road, confident, and correct in assuming that cars would stop for them. The big billies are quite a sight, and if they give the signal, the whole family can vanish up a sheer rockface as quick as a wink.

A little later we found ourselves stopped for waterfalls, cascading down thousands of feet to splash right at our feet.

Alongside the road was the blaze of purple Fireweed, tiny blue clusters of blooms, and an Indian Paintbrush very similar to our own.

It seemed we were always stopping, taking roll after roll of film.

When the big horn sheep appeared, I was in heaven. The majestic beasts were like the goats, completely oblivious to us.

One big ram wandered by me as I was tracking him up a mountainside and I said softly "Hey, buster, give me a break, I need you standing still with the mountains as a backdrop".

Honest, folks, he walked across the road to the edge of a cliff, raised his head and stood as still as a statue. Then he looked at me as if to say "Okay" and strolled off!

The whole trip continued that way... We took pictures of more mountains, more glaciers, more goats, more sheep, Jackdaws, Marmots, Ravens, ground squirrels, rivers and lakes than we had ever seen in Colorado, Wyoming or Montana!

At dark we pulled into the picturesque town of Jasper, and after a hasty supper settled in for a night's sleep.

The next morning, our alarm sounded. Now, why set an alarm on vacation? To go look for those bears, remember?

We drove slowly along the river, keeping an eagle eye out for bears. They must not have felt like playing the river that morning (as cold as it was, I don't blame em).

We did see more big horn sheep, including a tiny baby whose mom got aggravated at our invasion of her territory. She "bahhed" him to her, gave us a dirty look and departed, leaving a cloud of dust.

We spent time out at Jasper Parl Lodge, an elegant place way beyond our financial budget, but graced with beautiful gardens, gold courses, restaurants and shops, including museum quality Indian artwork. They don't mind visitors, even if they can't afford the prices!

After that we wove our way up to Maligne Canyon and Maligne Lake.

The Canyon is fabulous, with roaring, rushing falls carving chasms hundreds of feet deep and creating rainbows of colors.

Of course, all these feet, inches, miles per hour and miles to the next town are a translation. In Canada everything is in meters, kilometers, etc. It doesn't take long to catch on though, and the money is so simple that it's just like being at home.

When it comes to food, Thomas and I tend to be adventurous. We usually eat one good meal a day on vacation, picnicing at lunch.

That night in Jasper we descended on a place called "Tokyo Tom's" and featuring authentic Japanese food.

Chinese food we are familiar with, Japanese, no.

Seaweed and cold noodle salad drew some really disgusted looks from Thomas. I ate it, but confess it wasn't tremendous.

Thomas gave up on the chopsticks, and asked for a fork. I kept trying, and finally got the hang of it.

The soup was excellent, and my chicken dish was wonderful. Japanese green tea is, however, one of the worst things I've ever tried to eat!

Japanese pickles are bright yellow and very salty.

Leechee nuts are great, sweet and very, very unusual.

Finally, fed, walked out, still looking for a bear, we headed back to our hotel, certainly not as grand as the Jasper Park Lodge, but comfortable enough, and slept long and hard.

The next day we were to head back down the same highway we had come up. Once more we gave the Jasper bears a chance, but once more they weren't out at the river. We visited a cemetery too, looking at the different style of markers, and discovering a fact that is pretty remarkable to those of us who spend our life in milder climes.

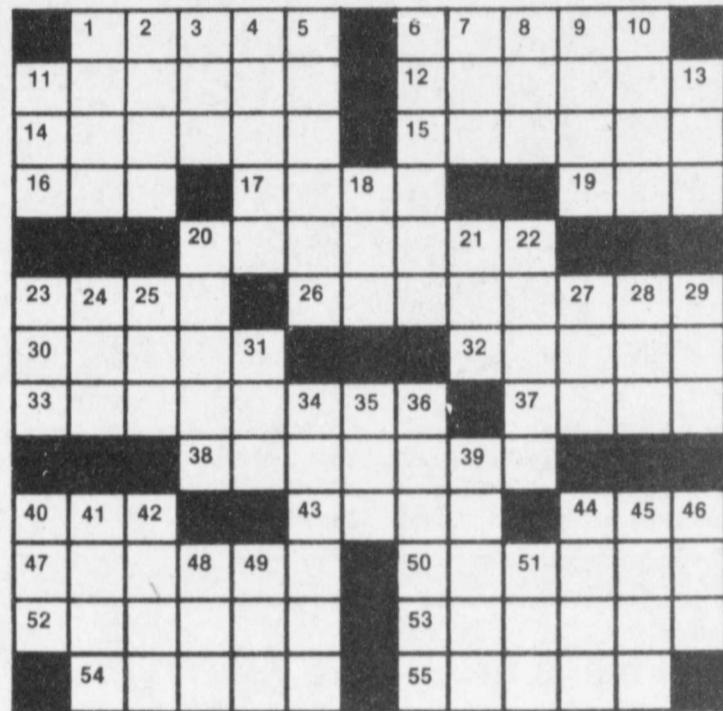
In the north, where the ground is hard-frozen all winter, they dig a line of graves each winter, line them with boards, and cover them with plywood. The ground cannot be dug during the depths of the winter, when up to nine feet of snow lies on the ground!

Then we headed back down towards Lake Louise, stopping a little less frequently, but still often to take even more pictures. If anyone had told us that we would finally get so used to seeing Big Horn Sheep and Mountain Goats that we would stop taking their picture, we wouldn't have believed them!

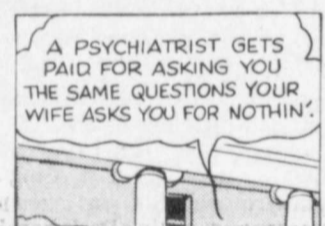

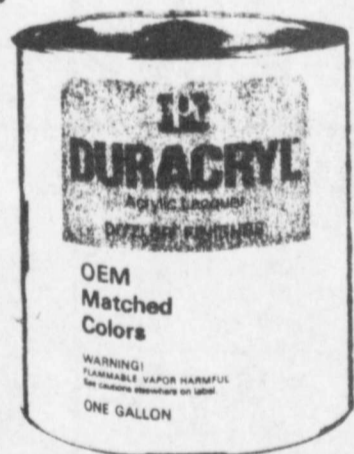
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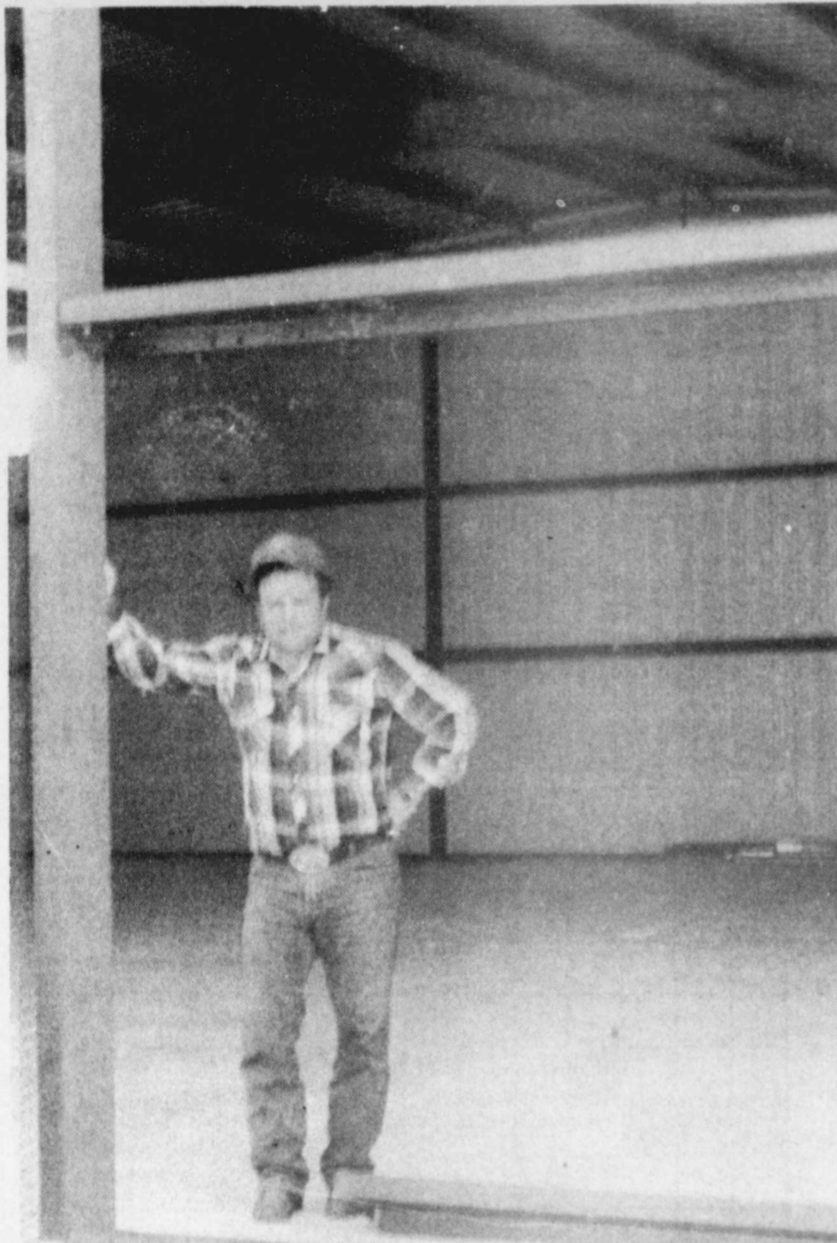


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REV. LARRY BRIDGES, pastor of the Blossom Church of God is pictured with the new gymnasium being built behind

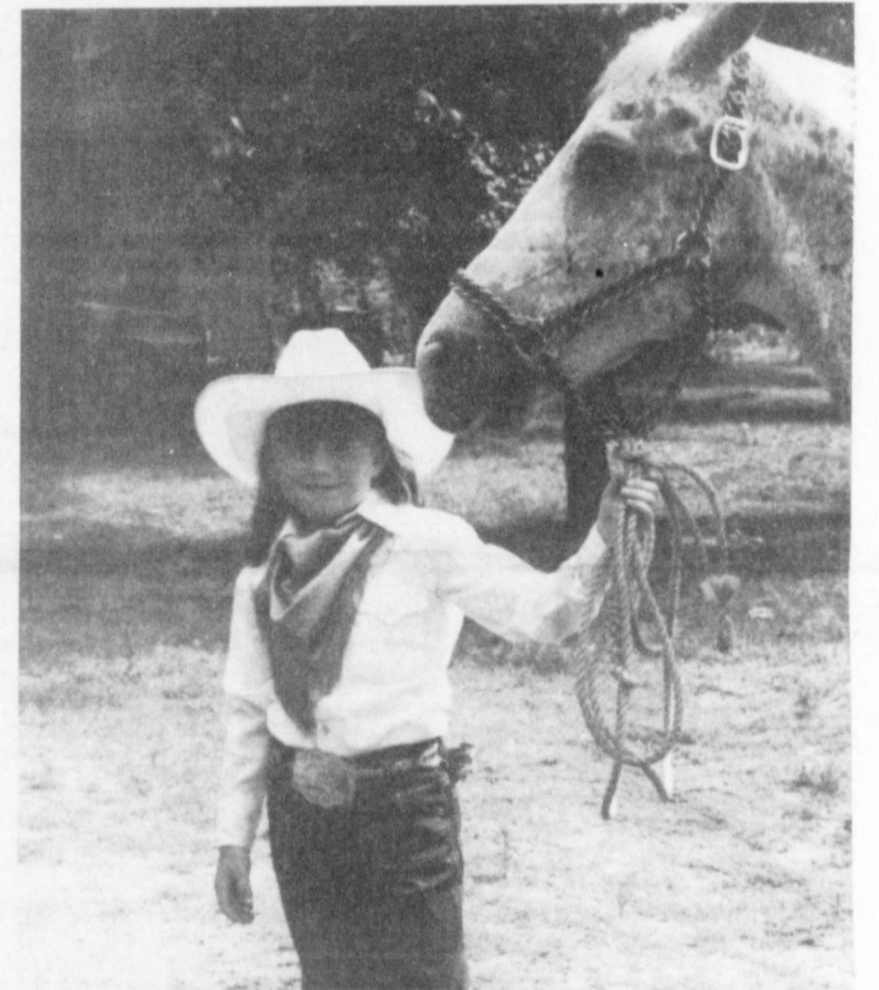
