Darling little quotation, isn't it? Obviously, though, the author had never been around any baby birds...or grown ones either!

Anyone who has ever seen a nest of baby birds has witnessed some of the most aggressive sibling rivalry in existence.

Crammed into a tiny cup of grass, sticks or mud, the tiny little baby birds push, shove, quarrel and do their best to be the only member of the family to get anything to eat. When mom or dad comes sailing in with a mouthful of tasty worm, bug or fish (depending on the kind of bird), a fight erupts that would put a wolf pack to shame!

Some little birds will even shove their weaker brothers or sisters out of the nest. The only thing baby fledglings agree on is that they are all hungry, all the time.

Adult birds aren't a lot better. Look at the amazingly aggressive little hummingbird. A classic example of big belligerence in a minuscule body, they dart around fighting any and all comers, not only among themselves, but challenging wasps, bees, other birds and even passing humans!

One will frequently sit on a feeder or blooming plant, squeaking tiny hummingbird profanity at others whenever they appear, and flying right into them. The audible swish of feathers as they clash is startling.

Blue Jays, a lovely bird with the temperament of an ax murderer, will raid the nest of other birds, killing and eating infants and eggs alike. If that doesn't do it they can fight each other, screaming, scratching and flogging one another in mid air.

They even resort to killing baby squirrels if they come upon a nest.

The birds of prey, the hawks, eagles and other majestic large raptors, have earned their name by being superbly adapted to catching everything from huge Salmon down to grasshoppers. And within their nests the same overwhelming goal exists...the drive for food, no matter at whose expense.

Ducks, chickens, all the fowl resort to "foul play" (Ohhhh, I can't believe I said that) when it comes to food, a mate, or anything else they want to obtain. Where did the expression "pecking order" come from? Take a guess.

At any rate, the little poem is charming. It conjures up visions of tiny birds chirping happily, gladly letting little sister have the incoming morsel of food, and growing up in perfect harmony. Hardly!

Perhaps it would be better to say: "Birds In Their Little Nests Do Fight, You Never Saw Such a Greedy Sight, To Get Along, Don't Imitate Them, Or You Will Be...Out On A Limb!"

Fall Festival And Stew Cookoff Promises Fun For All

3. Stew must be ready for judging at 11 a.m. Contestants will supply one quart of stew for the judges at the registration table by 11 a.m. Stew

will be on sale at 11:15 a.m.

4. Prize winning stew: first, stew bowl; second, stew bowl; third, ribbon. Showmanship: first, stew bowl; second, ribbon; third, ribbon. Showmanship will be judged on theme, costume, booth set up, action and audience appeal. Judging will be from 10 a.m. until 11 a.m.

5. A contestant is construed to mean cooking team and should include one headcook, one alternate cook, and as many team members as needed.

6. Bowls or containers and crack-

ers will be sold at the registration table. Bowls will be \$2.00 and quart containers will be \$4.50.

Small Town Sales Tax Down, Cities Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that monthly payments to cities and counties that collect the local sales tax were up again in September.

"Once again, as in the last several months, the state's rebates to cities and counties have shown a marked increase, demonstrating that the Texas economy continues to expand," Bullock said.

Bullock's office sent checks totaling \$67.8 million to 895 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

Statewide, year to date payments to cities are up an impressive 12.1 percent, Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$30.5 million were sent to six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department which also are funded by the sales tax. This allocation was up 17.4

percent over the same period in 1987.

Checks were also mailed Monday to 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county tax, Bullock said.

Bullock noted that the top five cities receiving rebate revenue showed impressive gains.

"The major metropolitan areas continue to surge forward as consumer confidence mounts," Bullock said.

Locally, Blossom received \$608.13 for this pay period, bringing total 1988 payments to date to \$13,285.84. This marks a 7.26% increase.

Deport received \$537.90 for this period, bringing total payments to date to \$9,089.57 for a 4.87% increase over last year's payments for the same period.

Paris received \$173,187.86 for a 6.78% increase over last year.

Bogata received \$1,156.12 for this period, bringing total payments to date to \$19,132.15, marking a 7.44% decrease from last year's payments to date.

Clarksville received \$14,648.38 for a 7.83% increase while Detroit received no payment this period. Total payments to date are \$9,588.08 for a 63.46% increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$80,797.77 for this period for an 8.07% increase.

Talco received \$1,269.03 for this period bringing total payments to date for 1988 to \$18,309.92 for a 33% decrease from the same period last year.

Houston's year to date allocation was up 20.1% over 1987, Dallas saw an increase of 9.3% and San Antonio received 9% more. Austin and Ft. Worth posted gains of 7.7% and 8.7%.

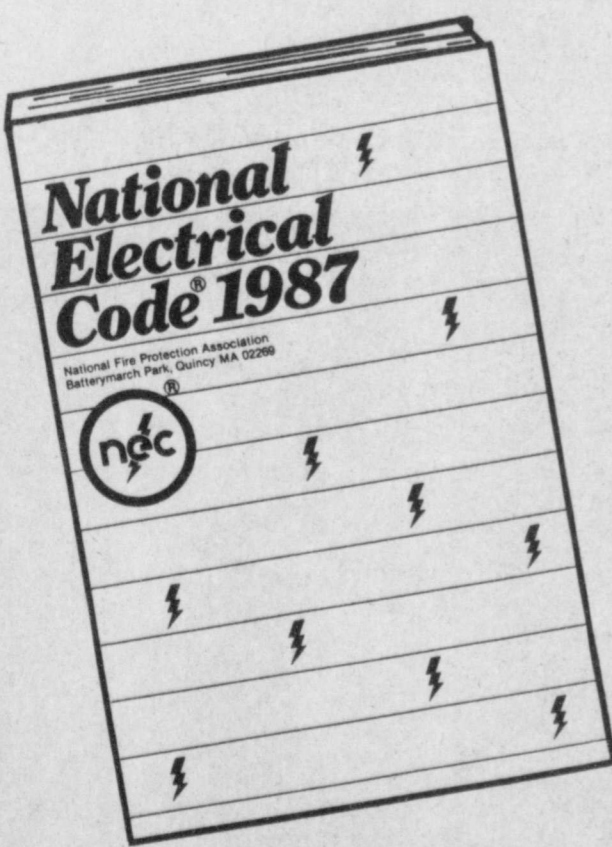

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

Patriots Floor Fannindel With Defeat

Back in August during two-a-day workouts at Prairiland, Head Coach Jim Chambers said his main goal was for his team to have confidence. To believe in their ability to win.

After two pre-season scrimmages, and three regular season games under their belts, without a loss, the young Patriot team appears to be building some of that confidence Coach Chambers wanted.

Last Friday night at Patriot Stadium, the Patriots put the Fannindel Falcons to rest, 18-6, despite a nineteen point handicap.

nected with Jack Kindle for the TD pass and put the Patriots on the board.

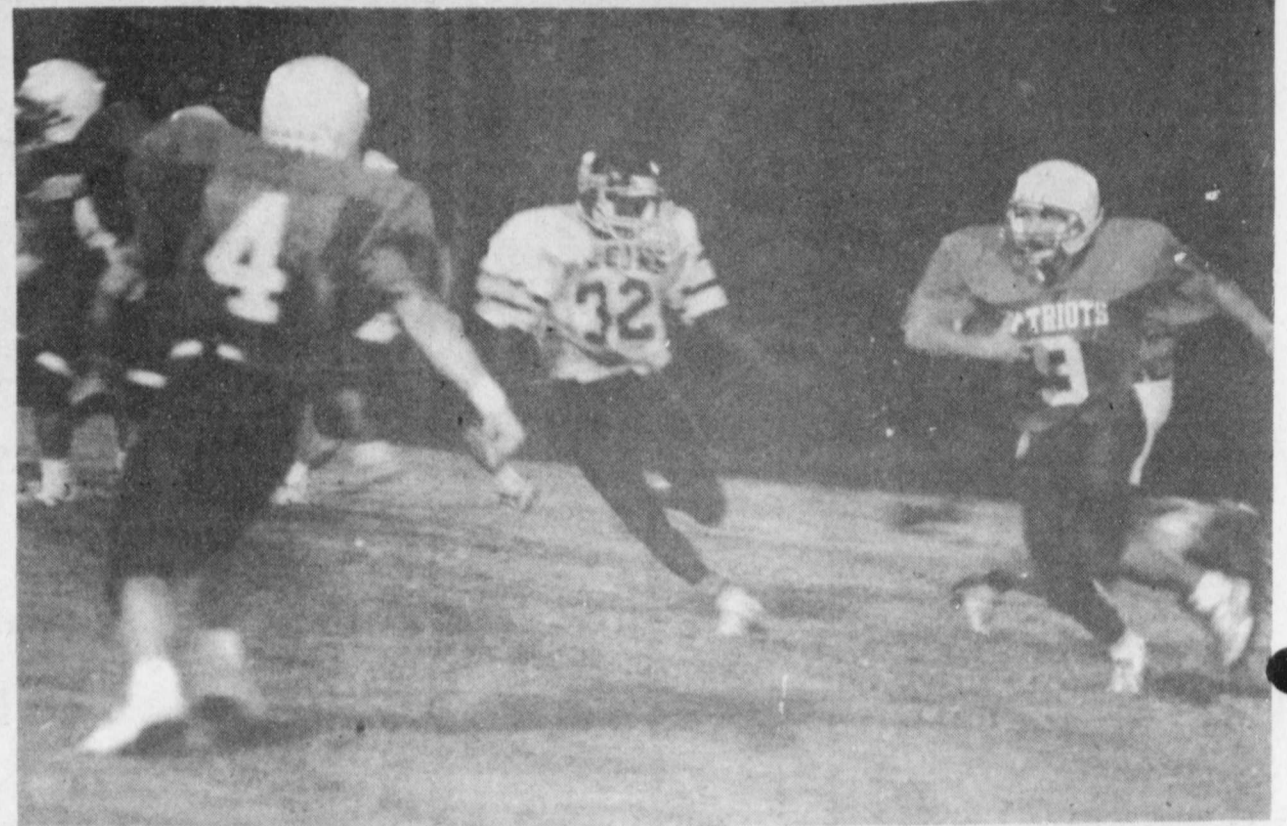
Five minutes later, Trevor Upchurch pounded across the goal line for the Patriot second TD.

In the bottom half of the third quarter, Wade Sparks intercepted a Bruce Jones pass.

Three plays later, Trevor Upchurch raced 48 yards for the third Patriot TD.

The Patriots dominated the Falcons until late in the fourth quarter. With sixteen seconds left on the clock, the Falcons recovered a Patriot fumble on the Patriot 20-yard line. The toll free number is 1-800-ACS-2345 and can be called from anywhere in Texas. Hours of operation are 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. CST.

"People often have a lot of questions about cancer when they find out a loved one has the disease or when they suspect they have a warning sign or when they have read an article that leaves them with a question. Now anyone in Texas can have their questions answered with just a phone call, and its free," said Ms. Main.

Callers may ask technical questions about the disease, about cancer detection and warning signs, and about

treatments. But the unique aspect of the new phone line is that callers can find out about services available to cancer patients and their families in their own city or area.

The American Cancer Society loans equipment to cancer patients and offers free classes and information to cancer patients and their families. Information about local services, as well as education for public groups, can be obtained by calling the toll free number.
