The indictments of Jimmie and Yuba, known to almost everyone in Precinct 1 as good, honest folks who have spent many, many years just trying to do what they believed was right, is a disgrace.

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Japanese Students Learn Fast!!

Masahiro and Toshio aren't typical names for students at Prairiland High School. But then, "Mas" and "MeMe" aren't typical students. They're exchange students from Japan, and possessed of an amazing amount of courage and determination.

The two 17-year olds are both Juniors at Prairiland, and in spite of their limited knowledge of English, are fast becoming "regular students".

Mas is from Tokyo, and is staying with the Birch family, who lives near Pattonville.

MeMe is staying with Rufus Merritt, who lives at Pattonville, and is from Yokohama.

Looking at their earnest and eager faces, one is instantly struck by the awesome idea of teenagers living so far from home, in an environment as alien to them as is conceivable, trying to cope with a language barrier, different food, different attitudes and attempting to get an education.

Yet both hope to return next year, and are enthusiastic about learning more about the customs of America.

MeMe is specifically interested in American History, the country's customs and culture, and Mas, too, wants to know more about the nation.

Both have the desire to speak English well.

When told they might go back to Japan "with a Texas accent" they giggled in delight.

Mas wants to play tennis, and MeMe is already participating in band. They have made friends quickly, and state that "In America, everyone is so open, friendly."

In Japan, they say, they would not be watching or playing football. Sports there consist of baseball, soccer and volleyball, plus some of the martial arts.

Mas has his mother and father, and

two older brothers in Japan, while MeMe has younger brothers and his parents. They confess to being homesick "just a little sometimes."

Mostly though, coping with learning the language, and studying and doing their work in an alien tongue keeps them busy.

When questioned as to what they liked about going to Prairiland, their answers exposed the difference in personalities that they possess.

"Basketball and band," smiled MeMe. "Algebra" spoke Mas! They love American food, finding it very different from the usual fare in their native Japan.

When asked what the biggest difference in the two countries was, they spoke together, consulted their English-Japanese dictionary, and replied, with broad, expressive hand gestures, "Everything L-A-R-G-E here!"

They are definitely equipped with a teenager's adaptability, blending into school and home environment. They are also endowed with a burning desire to achieve the goals they have set for themselves.

The differences must be great at times. However, some things remain the same, world-wide.

Questioned about what the biggest difference between the two peoples was, they again consulted, thumbed through the dictionary and pointed out the phrase, "one's point of view, one's outlook."

That was clear enough. The next question was "can you give me an example?" Again the consultation, the look through the book.

Finally, Mas smiled and said, "In Japan, girl very, very shy. In America, girl not shy at all...and that's GOOD!!" Looking at their laughter-creaked faces it was clear...these youngsters will be fine...just fine, no matter what culture they are in!

Jimmie, Yuba Sparks Indicted For Misdemeanor Misconduct

Precinct 1 Commissioner Yuba Sparks and her husband, Jimmie Sparks, former Precinct 1 Commissioner, were indicted Tuesday by a Lamar County Grand Jury. Each were charged with a misdemeanor count of official misconduct.

The indictments came from an investigation begun several months ago alleging misuse of public county road funds. The indictment alleges that they used the road funds for improvements and maintenance on a private road, specifically the road leading to Woodall Field, local youth baseball field sponsored by the Breakfast Optimist Club.

Official misconduct of a public servant as alleged is a Class A misdemeanor which carries a maximum

punishment of one year in the county jail and/or up to \$2,000 fine.

Yuba Sparks told the Deport Times on Tuesday, September 27, "We have not done anything wrong or committed a crime, we've only tried to do something good."

After being asked to come up to Paris, the Sparks' were processed according to the law on Friday, September 23. Bond was set at \$500 apiece, and the couple was released on their own recognizance.

At a Commissioners' Court meeting Monday morning, a number of people appeared. Three of these people spoke, protesting the treatment of both Jimmie and Yuba Sparks in the matter.

Yuba Sparks was appointed a year

and a half ago when her husband resigned as Commissioner due to health reasons.

Her term expires in December, and Troy Owens and James Anderson will be running for that seat in November.

Jimmie Sparks was accused of knowingly and intentionally encouraging and directing his wife to violate the law by contracting with a local company to pave and asphalt a road known as the Breakfast Optimist Club Road leading to Woodall Field on U.S. Highway 271 South.

Commissioner Yuba Sparks is accused of allowing the work to occur and billing the taxpayers of Lamar County.

Postage Increases Force Rise In Subscription Price-First Time In Four Years

For the first time in over four years, the Deport Times, Bogata News, Talco Times and Blossom Times must increase their subscription price.

Editor Nanalee Nichols says, "We have made every effort possible to keep our subscription costs down, but after two postage increases PER YEAR for the past few years, we have to go up. Last year, our postage bill was \$11,000.00 and they've already gone up this year."

Effective October 1, 1988, all

subscriptions will be raised one dollar.

This will still keep the price well below those of most weekly newspapers.

An In County subscription within Lamar, Red River or Titus Counties, will cost \$11.00. In the state of Texas, but outside of those three counties will be \$13.50. Out of state subscriptions will be \$16.00.

The last increase was 50¢. A subscription to the paper only pays for

the postage, not even all the printing. Advertising must pay for salaries, business expenses such as phones, electricity, etc., taxes, equipment and all other forms of overhead. In addition to postage increases, printing costs have increased once a year for the last four years, and all overhead such as supplies have gone up sharply.

Although the price increase is regretted, it is absolutely necessary.

The December sale will still be held, but will reflect the increase.

Fund Established To Defend Jimmie and Yuba Sparks

A fund has been established at the First National Bank of Deport for the defense of Jimmie and Yuba Sparks, accused of misdemeanor misconduct of a public official by a Lamar County Grand Jury last week.

Kenneth Gifford is chairman of the fund, and contributions can be made at the First National Bank to "Jimmie Sparks Fund".

Jimmie Sparks has served as

Commissioner Precinct 1 for 14 years and his wife, Yuba, has served for a year and a half in that capacity, and a number of contributions have already been made to the fund.

Deport To Hold Public Hearing

The City of Deport will hold a public hearing to discuss the city's community development needs at 7:30 p.m. October 3, 1988 in the council chambers of Deport City Hall.

Projects to receive priority funding under the Texas Community Development Fund (TCDF) will also be determined. The hearing will include a discussion on the develop-

ment of housing, a presentation of the funding available, and a listing of all eligible activities under the TCDF program and the city's past TCDF funding.

All interested citizens and especially those of moderate or low income are encouraged to attend.

The chambers are handicapped-accessible, and those requiring

assistance to be able to attend should call the city secretary at 652-3875 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Persons unable to attend may submit written comments to City of Deport, P.O. Box 354-A, Deport, TX. 75435, attention: TCDF comments.

Non-english speaking persons should advise the city secretary prior to the hearing that an interpreter will be required. For more information, call the city secretary at 652-3875.

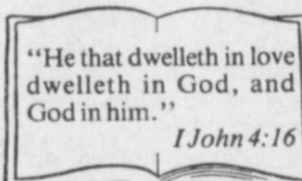

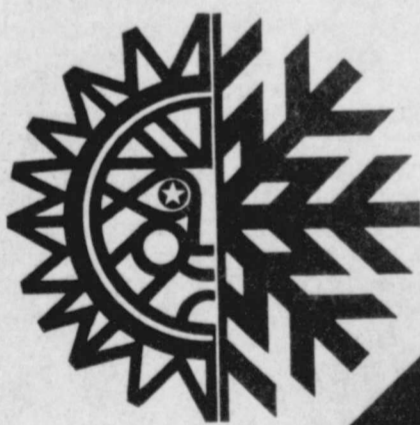

Patriots Drop First Loss To Leonard Tigers

On the first play of the second quarter, Wilkerson dove in for the

score and ran the margin to 18-7. On its following kickoff, Martin Babb took the ball and outran everybody 82 yards for the score.

Kindle proved true again on the point after, and the Patriots drew closer at 18-14.

The Tigers came right back with a seven minute, 88-yard drive, which ended with Wilkerson getting his fourth T.D. of the night. The conversion was good and the half ended with the score 26-14, Leonard.

Leonard took the second half kickoff at their own 45 and went once again to their punishing ground game.

On third and four, Kindle crashed into the line and stopped McIntosh in his tracks. Facing fourth and four, the Tigers faked the expected punt and Judd Marshall took it all the way for the score. The conversion attempt was knocked loose by Michael Madewell and the score stood at 32-14.

The Patriot offense was then stymied and Leonard took over on downs. On the second play, Chris Garza took the pitch back and zipped his way 76 yards for the touchdown. Once again, the conversion attempt failed and the third quarter ended with the score 38-14, Leonard.

But Prairiland wasn't finished, yet. Early in the fourth, Randy Barber stepped in front of a Judd Marshall pass and ran it back to the Tiger 23.

On the first play from scrimmage, Babb kept the ball himself and fought his way to the one yard line. Upchurch crashed in for the T.D. and then waltzed in for the two-point conversion making the score 38-22 with 10 minutes remaining.

The Tigers then fumbled on the second play after the kickoff and David Harrelson recovered for the Patriots.

But the Tiger defense tightened the screws and the Patriots had to give up the ball again on fourth and nine.

The Tigers ate up a little clock but could get nowhere and had to punt the ball away. Prairiland got the ball at the Tiger 45 and on the first play, Babb had the ball knocked loose. But Randy Barber was once again in the right place at the right time, picked up the bouncing ball and raced to the 15-yard line. A clipping penalty on the Patriots brought the ball back to the Tiger 30. A pitchout to P.G. Morrison got the 15 back and personal foul on the Tigers put the ball on the 6 and the Patriots closer to paydirt. The very next play saw Upchurch get his third touchdown of the night. Once again, Upchurch was called on to get the two-point conversion and run the score to 38-30, Leonard.

An onside kick attempt by the Patriots was unsuccessful and the Tigers ran out the clock, handing the Patriots their first defeat of the season.

Trevor Upchurch ended the night with 120 yards and 22 points.

After beating Fannindel 12-6 last week, the Patriots junior high team couldn't get it to come together against the Leonard Tigers last week, losing 20-0.

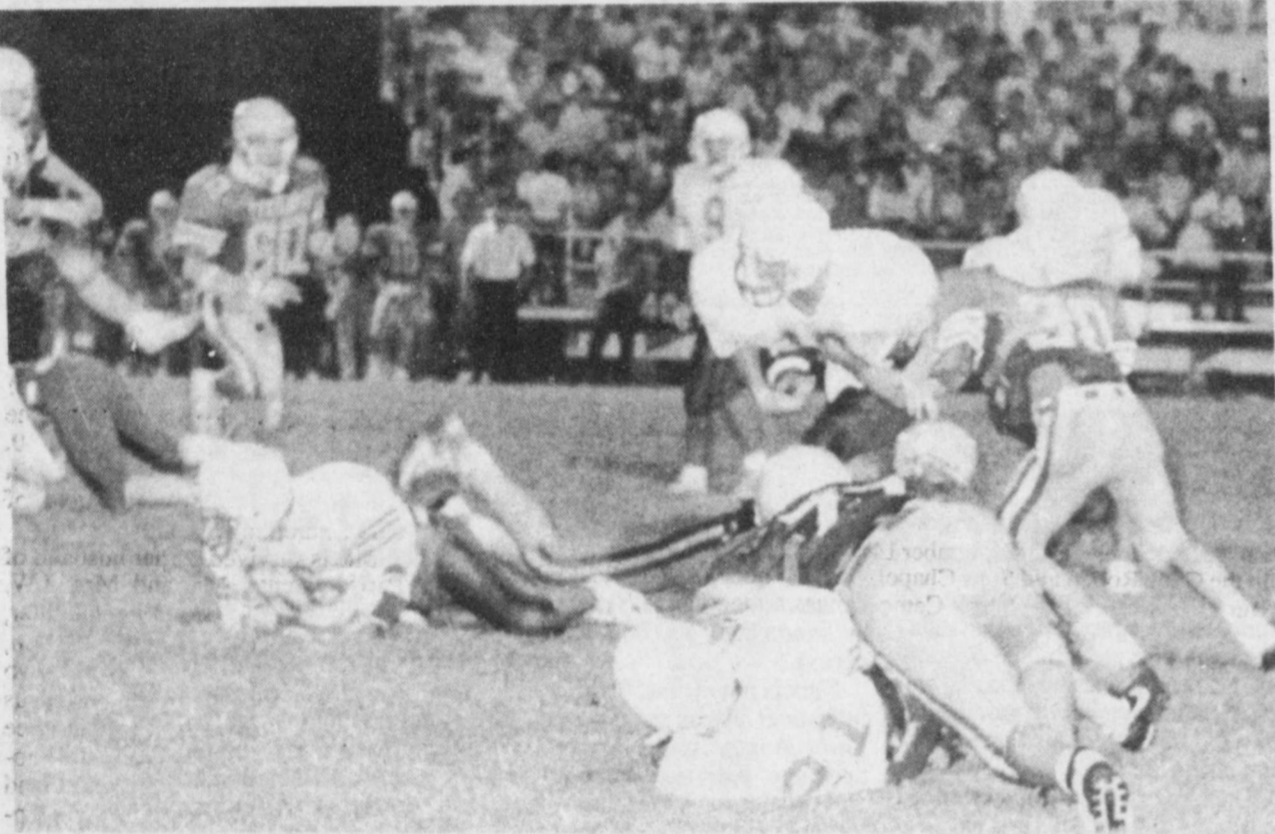
The leading rusher for the Patriots was Jacky Crawford, who carried the ball 13 times for a total of 59 yards.

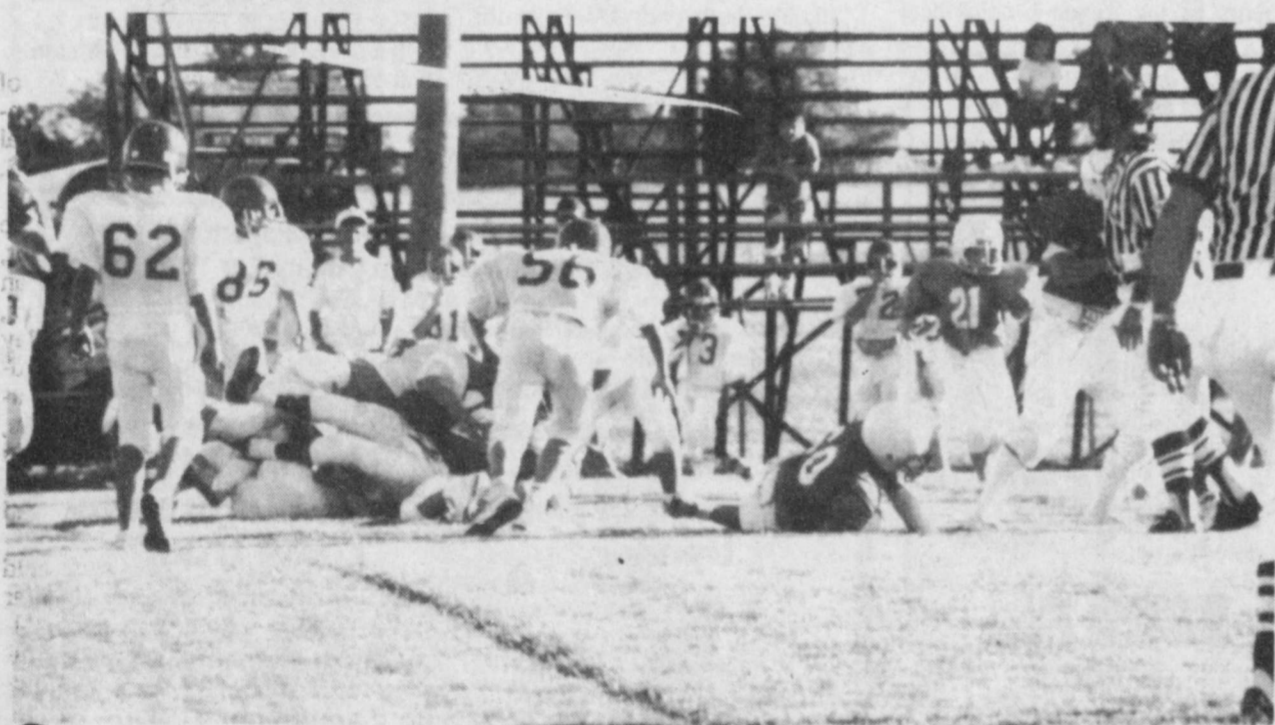
quarterback sacks. In the B-team game, it also was a losing cause, the score being 6-0.

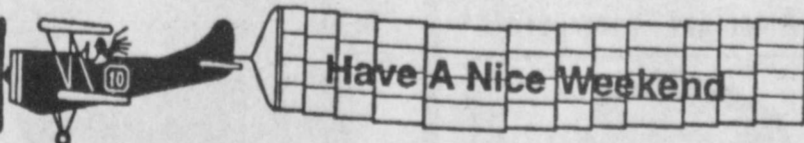

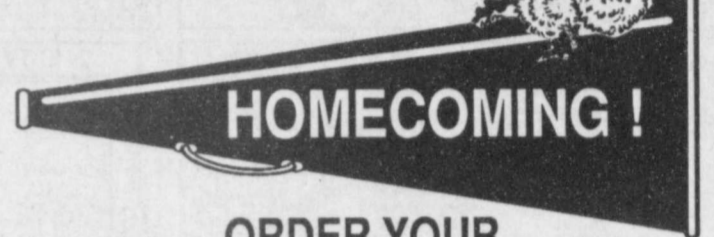

Statewide Economy Improving: 7.9 Million Texans Employed

The Texas economy continued to improve in August, with the statewide unemployment rate at 6.7 percent. Statistics released today by the Texas Employment Commission show the lowest August unemployment since 1985.

"The August non-farm employment of 7.9 million Texans is 159,000 more than in August, 1987, with many of the additional jobs in manufacturing," said Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers of the Texas Employment

Commission. "Salaried jobs increased by more than 120,000 during that period."

Nabers noted that all Metropolitan Statistical Areas in Texas posted lower August unemployment rates than one year ago. In August, 14 areas had rates lower than the state average, while 13 were above it.

Areas with the lowest unemployment rates were Bryan-College Station at 4.2 percent; Lubbock and Midland, both with 5.1; Amarillo, Dallas and Wichita Falls, all at 5.4; Abilene, at 5.7 percent; Austin, Ft.

Worth-Arlington and San Angelo, all with 5.8 percent; Sherman-Denison at 5.9 percent; Houston, at 6.2 percent; Victoria, at 6.4 and Waco at 6.5.

Those areas with the highest rates in August were McAllen--Edinburg-Mission, at 15.9; Brownsville-Harlingen at 12.5; Laredo, at 11.1; El Paso at 10.0; Beaumont-Port Arthur,

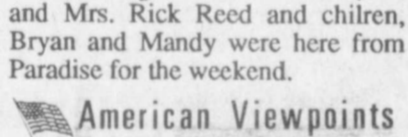
