



Author Gunnison Steele Was Local Native

A recent item in the Times about Barry Gardner reminded a reader of Barry's father, who wrote western and adventure stories under thename of Gunnison Steele. His widow, the ner Mercedes Reece, reminisced

He was born February 4, 1906 in the Martin community south of Deport to James R. and Marietta Evans Gardner, the last of four children. They named him Benjamin Wilson and he was inevitably called "Bennie", which he hated.

"Bennie" didn't mingle much about other boys, not even with his brothers, Earl and Jimmie. He was most often to be found in his room with tablet and pencil for by the time he was eight years old he knew that he meant to write. He was being published in the Lone Scout magazine when he was not much older. (The Lone Scout magazine existed for the benefit of country boys who ha dno access to the regular Boy Scouts in the towns.) By the time he was in his twenties, he was selling regularly to the pulp western and adventure magazines at first undr his own name.

As with most writers a time occurred when he wasn't selling so he decided to change his name and start over altogether. The name he chose, Gunnison Steele, seemed to him to have a look and sound to be appropriate to appear in a western magazine. That seemed to be the answer-the first story sent out under that name brought back a check. Years later he regretted that he hadn't kept his own name whic he did use occasionally

when eh had tow pieces in the same

Gardner was never much interested in school and left at the end of his junior year. He wanted to get on ith his writing. He always regretted

but he was listed as among the top ten paper in the typerwiter. His typewestern and adventure writers in hi

Most western magazines were printed on news print and writers who sold to them were called pulp writers. Ther highest amibition was to selto the "slicks", the Saturday Evening Post; Collier's Liberty, etc. the last two are long defunct. Gunnison Steele submitted his work to them frequently and editors were asking to see more of his work. But it was not to be, he died January 8, 1948 in Eureka Springs, AR of a heart attack. He would have been 42 years old February 4.

Steele had married Mercedes Reece, also of Deport in 1930 and their only child, Barry Wilson, was born May 13, 1939, who is now a Deputy Chief with almost 30 years in the Dallas Fire Department. Barry's father always planned for him to be a writer but until recently his only writing has been as a part of his duties in the Fire Department. Now in his "spare time" he is publishing a monthly newsletter, Uncommon Lodgings, a project of which his father would have definitely approved.

Nowadays unless a writer has published a book he has no status. Steele has only one book to his credit,

"Passport to Perdition", published first as the lead novel in a western magazine. "Lead" novels were just thatbook length stories the wordage of which comprised almost all of the magazine and featured the story title and the author's name on the cover which depicted a scene from the

As a typist, Gunnison Steele used the old two-finger hunt and peck system but he was a fast an daccurate typist and seldom re-typed a page. He knew just what he wanted to sya and le called himself a hack writer, how to say it before he put a sheet of

writer was a rebuil Remington purchased from Sears Roebuck & Co. for \$150.00. It was a heavy one, no

plastic parts on it. Always an individualist, "Bennie" had his desk made to order, low enough for him to use a comfortable rocking chair instead of the usual desk chair. It was in that chair that he thought out most of his plots and composed the story. His notes are

unreadable now, even his widow can't read them although she could at that time. She uses his desk now.

He tried to keep copies of each magazine that had one of his stories, but friends would borrow an fail to reurn them oftentimes.

Western magazines as they were then are no more although there are a very few being published. And Gunnison Steele, also known as Bennie Gardner, is just a memory.



FmHA Activates Farm Loans For Disadvantaged

The Farmers Home Administration is preparing to activate a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming, J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, said today.

Under the new program, FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm owndership loan. The agency would also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if

any are available in that county, Futch

FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.


The new program was included in the agricultural credit act signed earlier this year, Futch said, and funds have been reserved for farm purchases based on thepopulation of socially disadvantaged persons.

The population of such persons range from as low as one percent in some New England and midwestern
