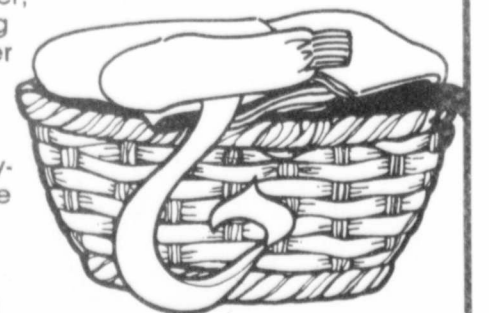

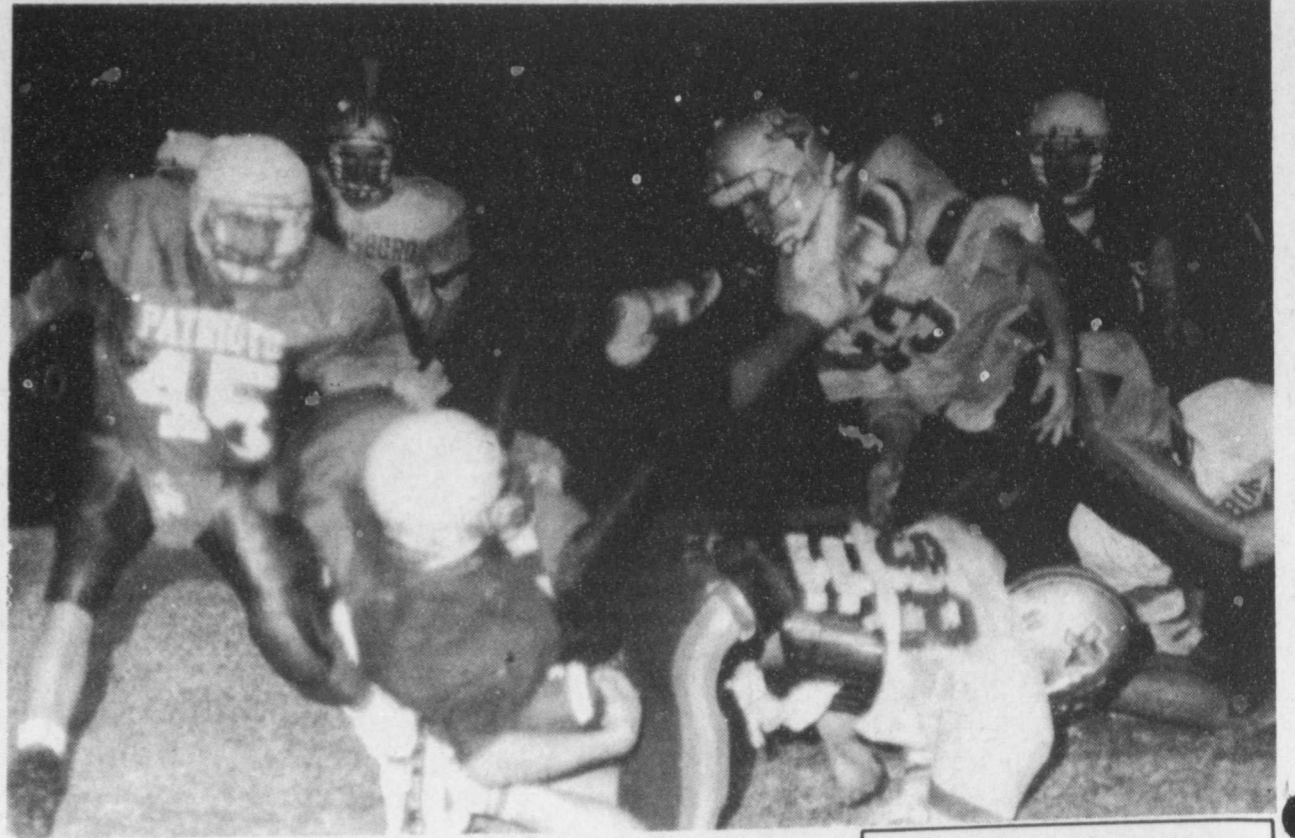

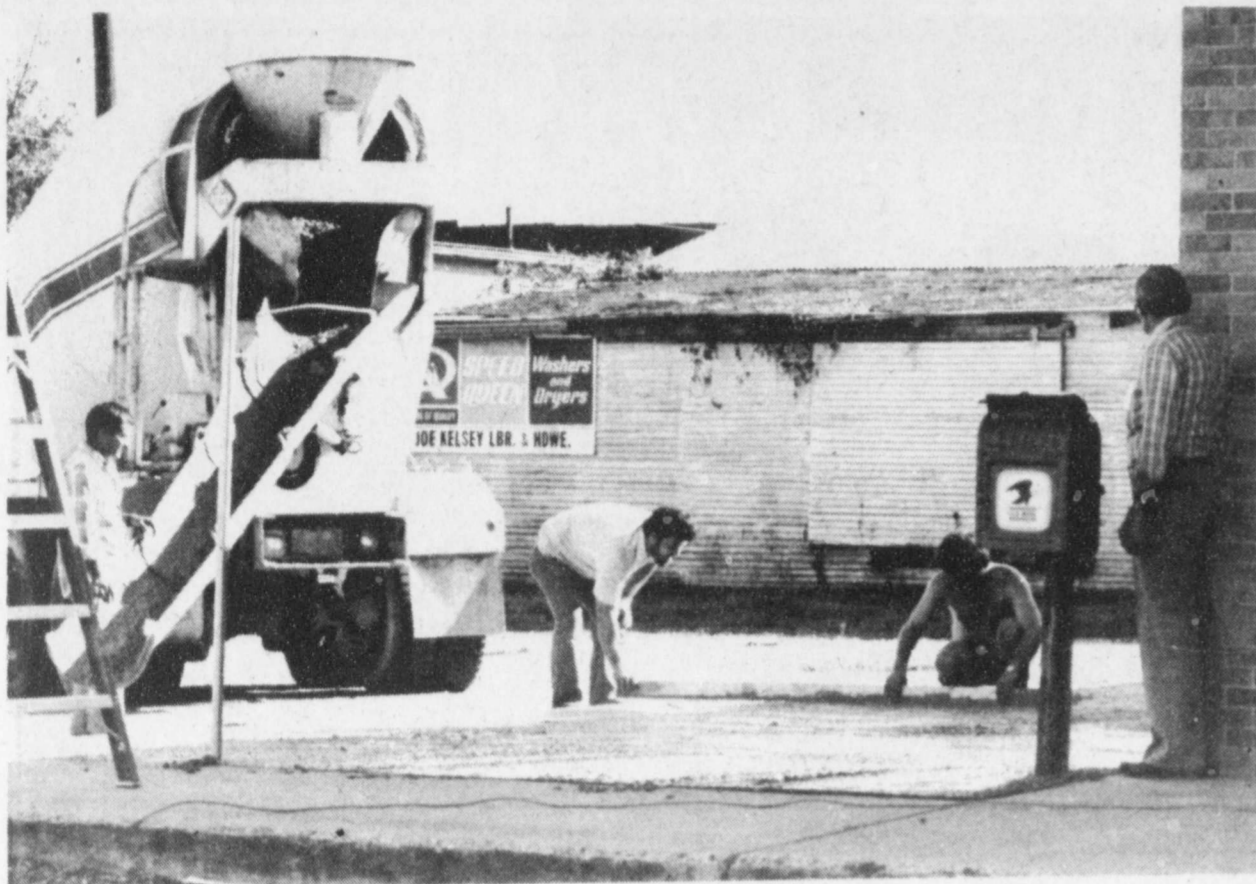

Local Sales Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that a surge in sales tax rebates to several large metropolitan areas in Texas reflects increasing statewide economic growth and stability.

"The state's metropolitan areas are doing even better than originally forecast. I'm glad to see Texas is sitting on solid economic ground again," Bullock said.

However, locally, rebates were down, as Blossom received no payment this period for a .68% decrease over the same period from last year.

Deport received no payment this period, for a 1.21% decrease over the same period last year.

Paris received \$144,914.56 this period, for a 6.27% increase.

Bogata received \$1,238.72 for this period, for an 8.61% decrease over last year's payments to date while Clarksville received \$12,869.76 for this period for a 7.31% increase.

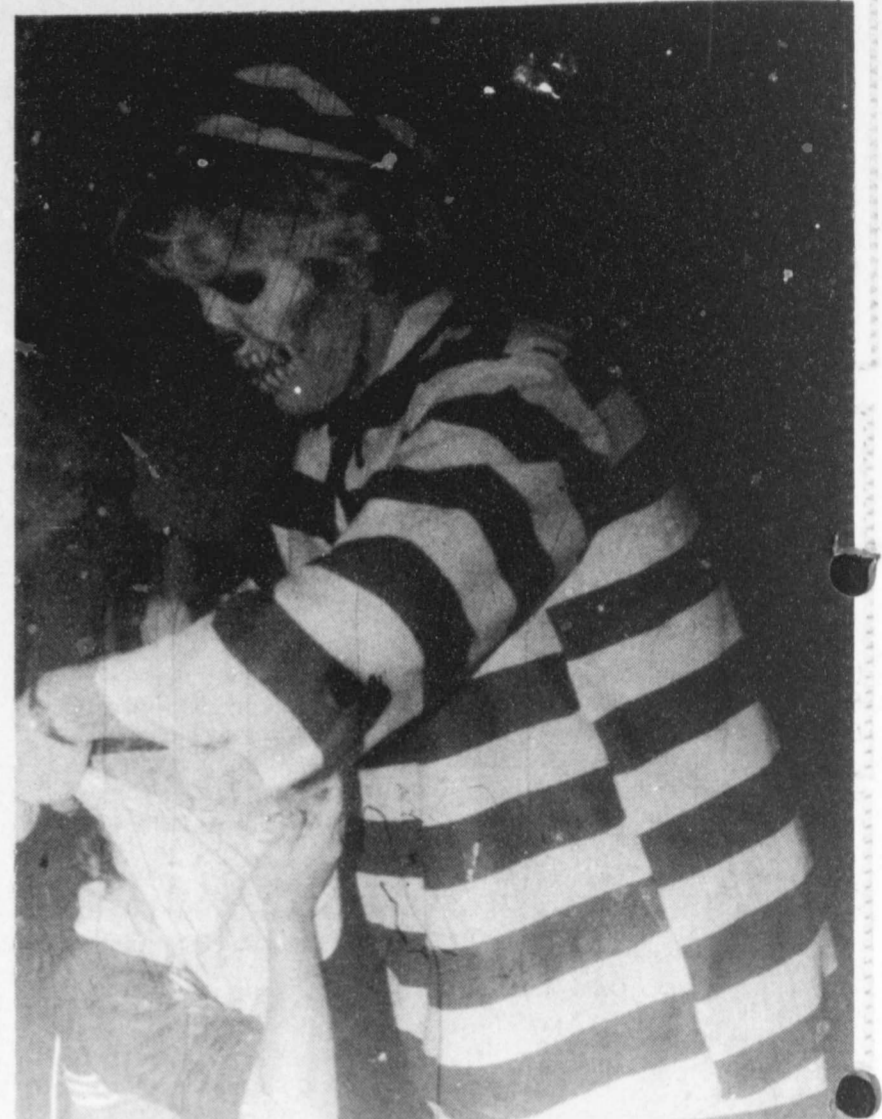
Talco received \$1,437.19 for this period, for a 33.08% decrease over last year's payments to date while Mt. Pleasant received \$77,639.15 for a 7.82% decrease.

In the larger metropolitan areas, such as Ft. Worth, whose payment showed a 27.4% increase and Houston, whose payment grew 22.4% for the same period, other cities showed large increases as well.

Checks totaling \$64.8 million were mailed to 914 Texas cities that collect an optional local sales tax at either one percent or one and one-

half percent, showing a growth of 17% in sales tax rebates this month over October 1987, Bullock said.

The checks represent taxes collected in August and reported by Sept. 20.

FmHA Activates Farm Loans For Disadvantaged

The Farmers Home Administration is preparing to activate a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming, J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, said today.

Under the new program, FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency would also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if

any are available in that county, Futch said.

FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

The new program was included in the agricultural credit act signed earlier this year, Futch said, and funds have been reserved for farm purchases based on the population of socially disadvantaged persons.

The population of such persons range from as low as one percent in some New England and midwestern

states to highs of 68 percent in Hawaii, 57 percent in New Mexico, and somewhat lower percentages in southeastern states. Population groups involved are Hispanics, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Persons who think they might be eligible and who are farming or who would like to become farmers are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office serving their area, Futch said.

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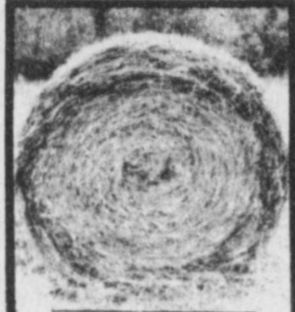

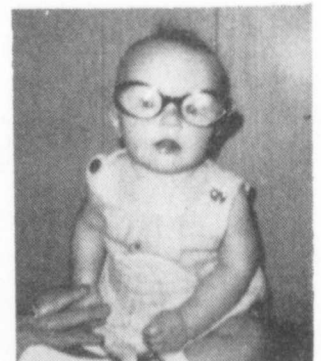
