

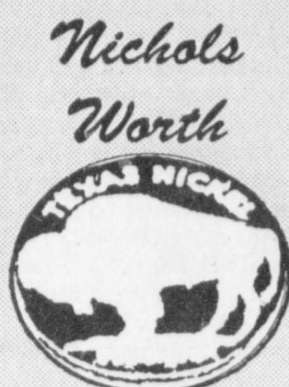

Kathy Stout Is Part Of Unusual Search And Rescue Team

When Kathy Stout went to Mexico on September 27, it wasn't for a vacation. Kathy was part of a rescue group that went to help when a six-story apartment complex collapsed, it's foundation apparently weakened by Hurricane Gilbert.

It wasn't that unusual for her, for her dedication to an organization called Children-Education Search and Rescue Association has taken her into a number of search and rescue situations.

Kathy is a graduate of Prairiland High School, and has been in the emergency field since 1979. She is currently a paramedic firefighter for the City of Waxahachie, and is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. L.C. Stout of Pattonville.

The volunteer group she is a part of is all made up of para-professionals and they train twice a week, usually working with their dogs.

In addition to actual search work, the group does education, teaching children what to do if they are lost, or in an emergency, and conducting fingerprinting clinics to provide body outline, fingerprints and other information that can be of enormous use in locating missing or lost youngsters.

Although other such groups are currently being formed in the state, the group she is associated with is currently the only such team in the state of Texas. They have gone as far as Missouri and all over Texas, as well as the Mexican trip.

Registered with the National Search and Rescue Registry, they can go wherever they are needed.

When the call came for them to go to the apartment disaster, forty people were reported missing.

A DPS plane flew the group to Laredo, where they expected to have to clear customs and walk across the border. On hand to meet them, however, was the governor's private jet

from Mexico, which took them to Monterrey. The equivalent of a federal SWAT team was their guide the whole time, and interpreters were provided. They arrived at the disaster site at 1 a.m. and went to work. The dogs indicated that there were two bidoes in the rubble, and two people still alive. On that information, rescue equipment began frantically digging through the debris where the hope of life existed. Unfortunately, too much time was required to shift tons of concrete and steel, and no one was recovered alive.

Nevertheless, the Governor, Jorge Trevino, praised the efforts of the team in a letter to Gov. William Clements, Jr. in Texas. Gov. Clements sent a commendation letter to the group, and the American consulate praised them as "ideal representatives of the state of Texas and of the U.S."

While there, the Americans worked with a team from Mexico City, whose dogs were trained for the purpose of locating earthquake victims.

Kathy explained that the dogs are trained from the time they are very young with rewards of love and praise, not food.

When they locate a "victim" during training, that victim praises them, loves them and hugs them, even plays the dog's favorite game. That is how they can distinguish a living human from a fatality...the scent changes upon death, and living humans cause them to become much more excited.

"The dogs actually become sad, depressed, when they locate human scent, but know it isn't alive," Kathy says.

The dogs also work better on the water! Water holds scent very well and skin oils or gases rise to the surface of water. Two dogs, approaching from two directions can become very excited as they pinpoint the strongest odor.

"When they locate human scent, they begin to run up and down the boat, barking and even biting at the water," Kathy reports.

Scuba divers are used to train the dogs and she says that the look of surprise on a dog's face the first time a diver surfaces in front of them is comical.

When questioned about what type of dog was used for this type of operation Kathy replied, "It isn't the breed...even a mutt will do. The dog has to want to please, has to love people, that's what's important." Labrador Retrievers, Dobermans, German Shepherds are all used, as well as crossbreeds.

The rescue group also does man tracking and scuba rescue or recovery.

The group is available for search and rescue whenever local authorities feel they are needed.

If local methods have failed, or authorities don't think they are properly equipped, the C.E.S.A.R. team can be summoned.

Why does someone devote so much time to an organization like this, when their job is already so demanding? "I enjoy helping people," Kathy says. "When I learned about these teams and what they do, I fell in love with it. Sometimes there isn't much to do, at other times everything breaks loose at once and we are so very busy," she continued.

In 1986, C.E.S.A.R. conducted nine searches. In 1987 there were 16, and 1988 will be even larger.

It's a concept her parents brought her up on, and one she puts to good use.

Kathy devotes many, many hours to keeping this organization ready to go where they are needed at a moment's notice.

Why, because it's exactly as she says "I enjoy helping people."

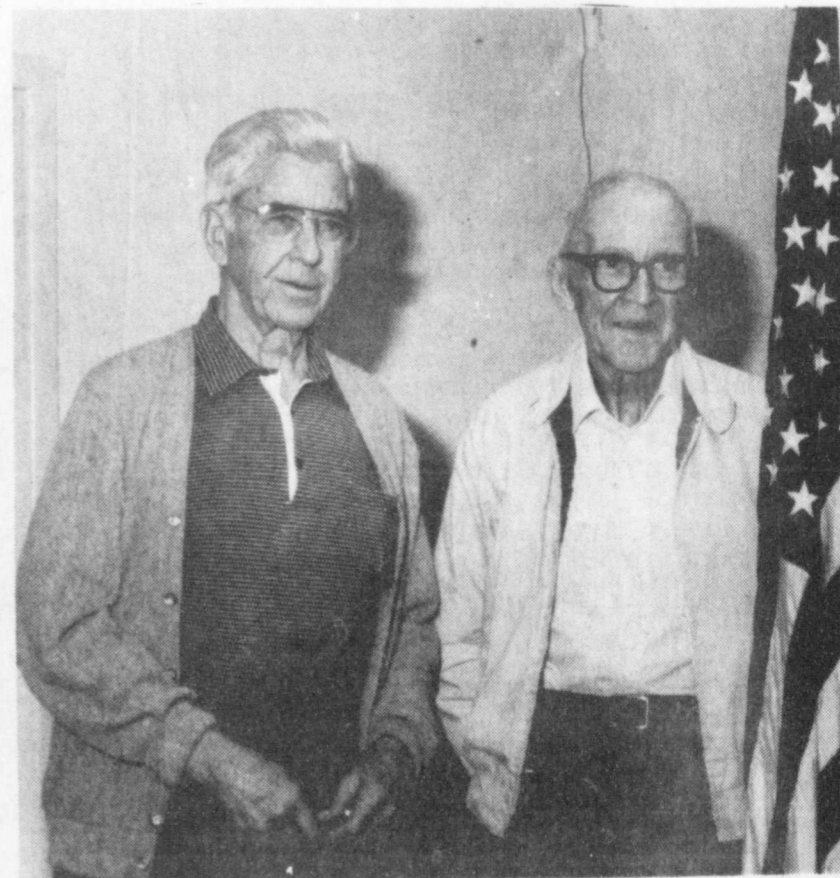

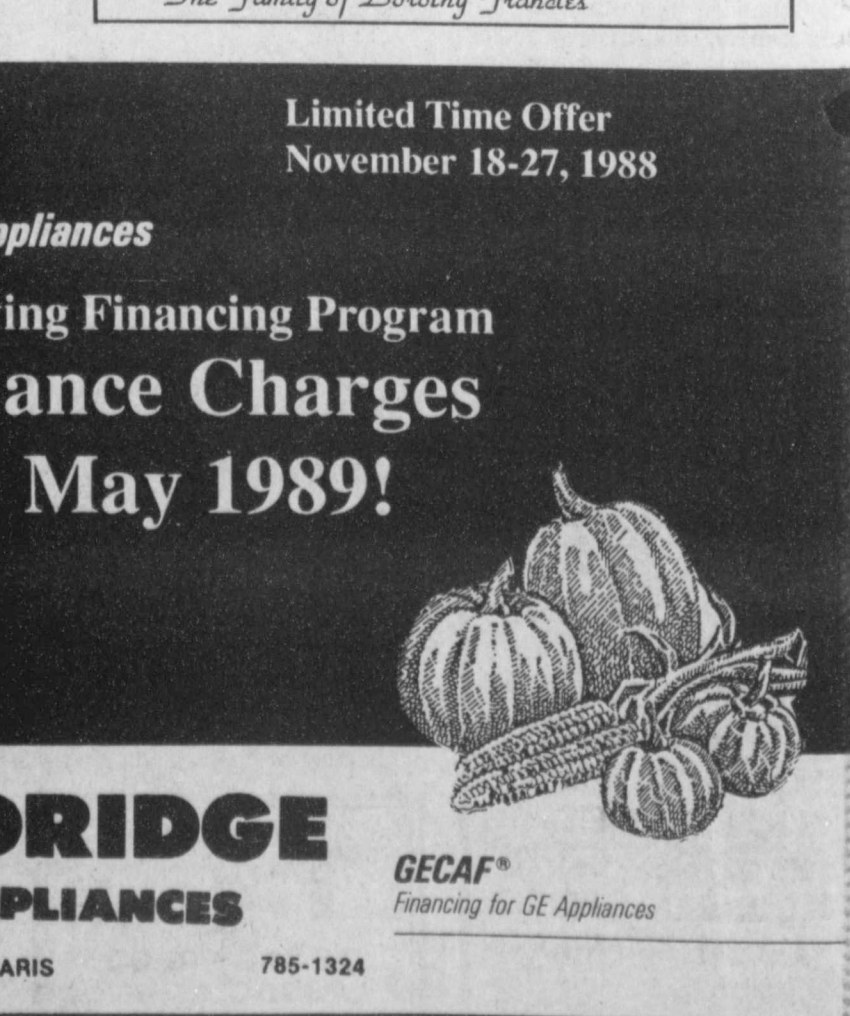
L.S. (Sam) Skidmore Dies November 11

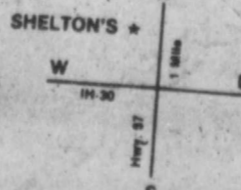

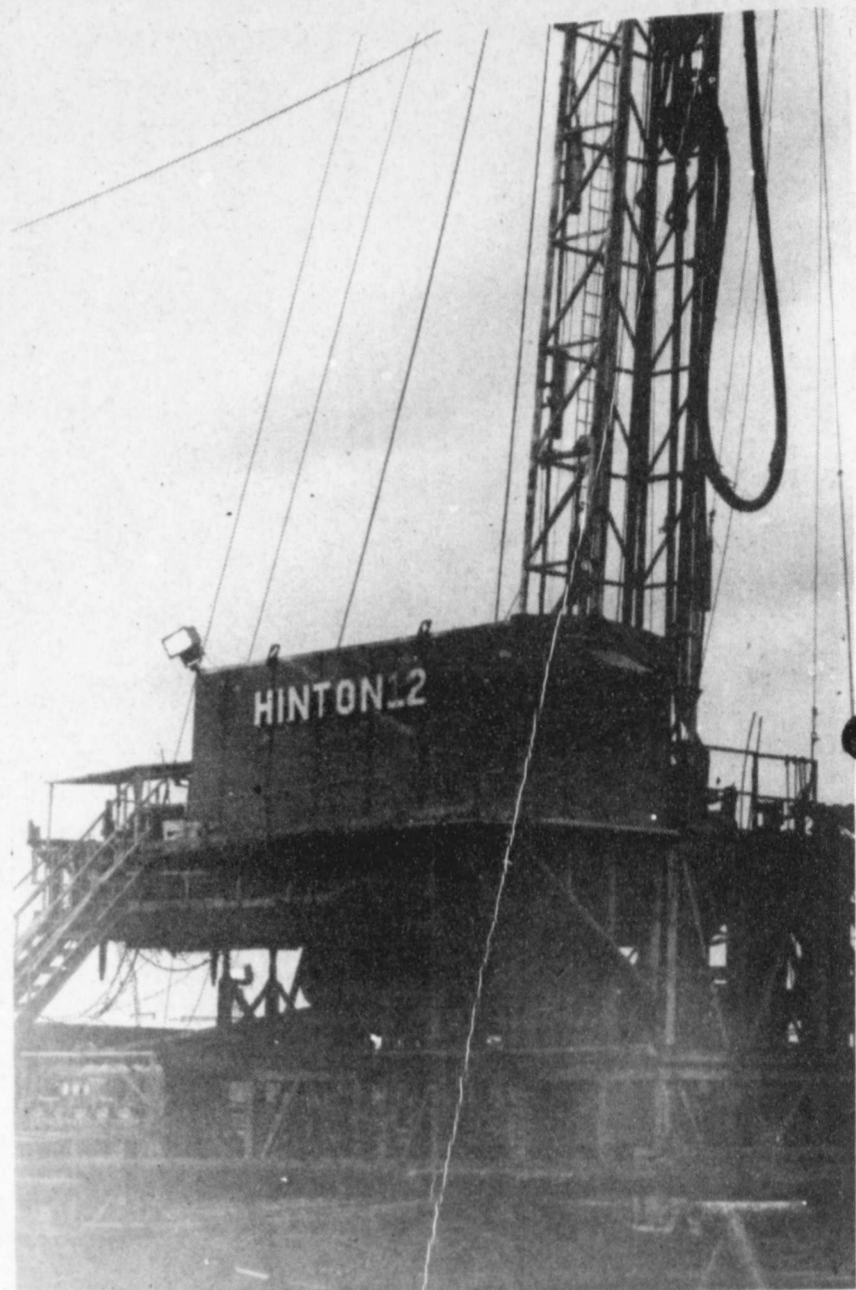

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Tax Rebates Increase Again In November

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that the monthly tax rebates sent to cities and counties that collect the local sales tax increased again in November.

"The payments to cities and counties continue to improve," Bullock said. "The state's economic recovery continues to pick up steam."

Bullock's office sent checks totaling \$118.4 million to 1,045 cities. Statewide, the 1988 year to date payments to cities are up 12.4 percent over last year.

Checks totaling \$52.6 million were sent to the state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department. This reflected a year to date increase of twelve percent over the same period last year.

Checks totaling \$10.2 million were also mailed Tuesday to the 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county sales tax.

Revenue to cities in the metropolitan areas increased again this month. Houston is still in the lead with a year

to date increase of 20.8 percent over 1987. Dallas had an increase of 8.3 percent and San Antonio saw an increase of 8.8 percent. El Paso gained 11.8 percent and Fort Worth increased 10.2 percent. Austin's allocation was up 7.9 percent.

November's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in September and taxes collected by quarterly filers in July, August and September.

Locally, Blossom received \$6,500.96 for a 30.17 percent increase while Deport received \$2,461.98, for a 3.53 percent increase. Paris received \$271,691.39 for a 7.08 percent increase.

Bogata received \$4,282.40 for a 3.81 percent decrease. Clarksville received \$26,273.89 for a 8.03 increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$122,939.59 for an 8.25 percent increase. Talco received \$2,706.88, for a 29.79 percent increase over last year's payments.

Insects Looking For A Place To Overwinter

As cooler weather approaches, insects will be seeking places to overwinter. Many will attempt to invade the home if given the opportunity says an entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Wasps, scorpions, roaches, earwings and others are common insects that seek a warm place to spend the winter," said Dr. James Robinson. "Caulking, filling cracks around windows, doors and foundations will help keep the insects out. Additionally, a barrier of insecticide sprayed around the foundation and the eaves of the house will help."

Another source of insect invasion

into the home is from plants being moved into the house for the winter. Aphids, thrips, spider mites, millipedes, sowbugs, slugs and snails are some of the common pests which hitchhike on plants.

"Control of these pests can include a thorough washing of the plant prior to moving it inside," Robinson said. "If more drastic measures are required, an insecticide can be applied, either to the foliage or the soil."

Several insecticides are available for controlling these pests. Robinson cautions users to read and follow label directions when using any insecticide.

Producers Selecting Feeding Alternatives

Texas beef cattle producers are scrambling to identify economical alternative winter feed sources.

"With a short hay supply, winter pastures getting off to a slow start, current cattle prices and reductions in cow numbers in other sections, most cattlemen want to maintain their herd size," said Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "To do that, producers must have a good nutrition program for the winter."

Several factors are involved in winter feeding. "First, an adequate supply of Vitamin A and high phos-

phorus minerals is a must," Grooms said. "Additionally, adequate protein must be provided for the class and type of animal being fed. This means a seven percent protein ration for the dry cows, a nine to ten percent ration for lactating cows and a 12 percent ration for growing calves."


Cattle need at least two percent of their body weight in dry matter daily for maintenance. This dry matter may vary from 30 to 65 percent total digestible nutrients.

"The cattlemen must remember that whichever feed source he chooses, he must consider cost,

method of feeding and labor," Grooms said. "He must also balance feed nutrients with the nutritional requirements of his cattle."

Alternative protein feed sources include broiler litter, cottonseed, cottonseed meal or cake, protein blocks, molasses blocks and liquid feeds.

Alternative sources of energy feeds include soybean hulls, rice bran, cotton burs, wheat middlings, corn or milo, cottonseed hulls and a host of others. Grooms pointed out that many of these energy feeds are also good courses of protein.

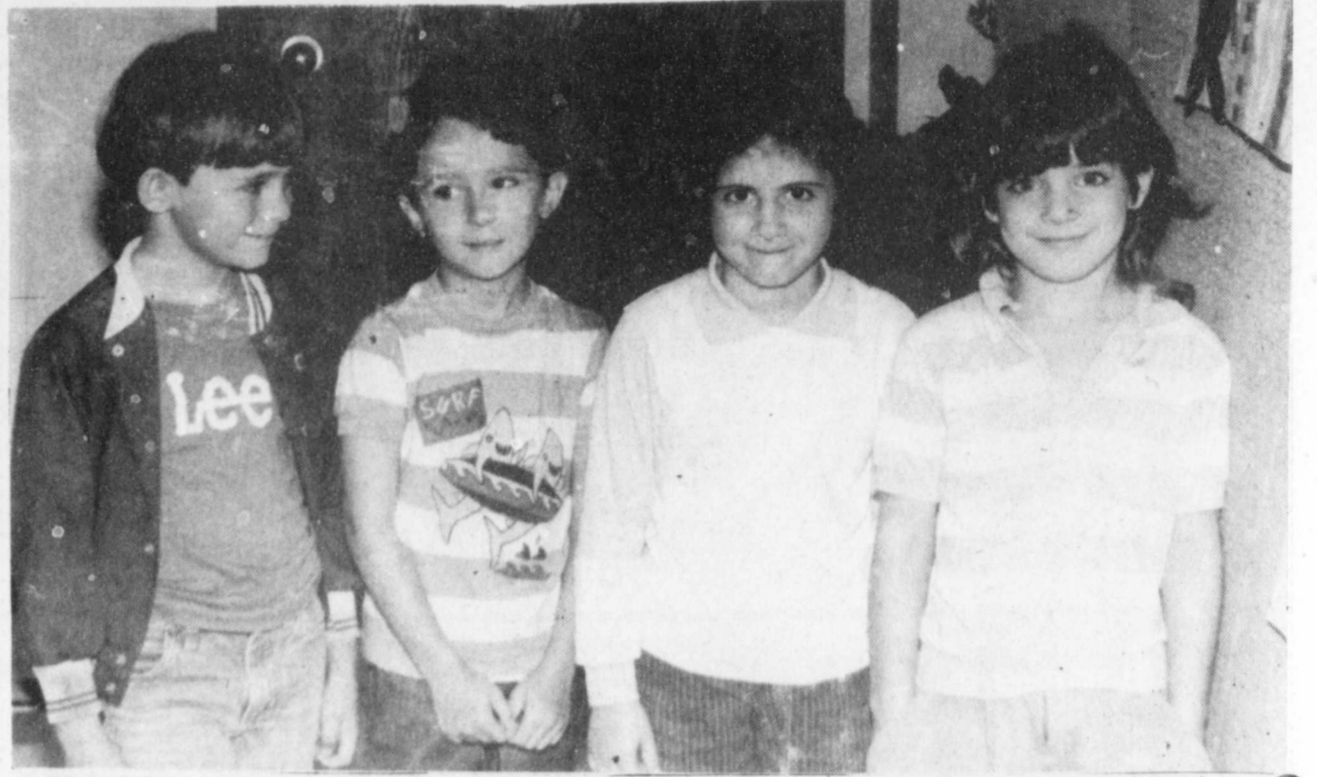

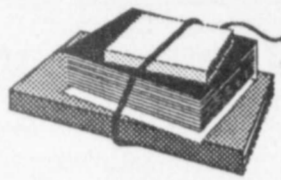

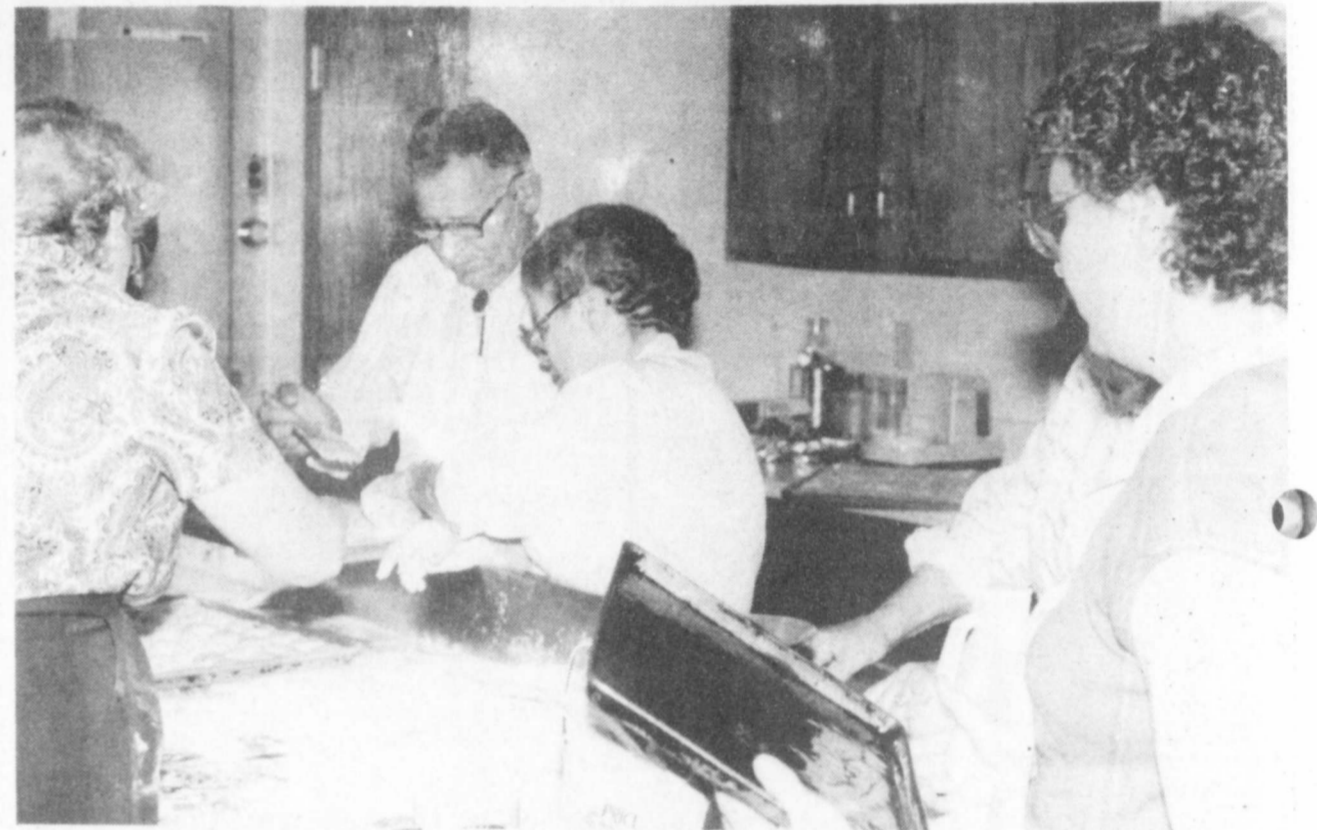
