For the elderly looking on the Christmas season may be sad. Their

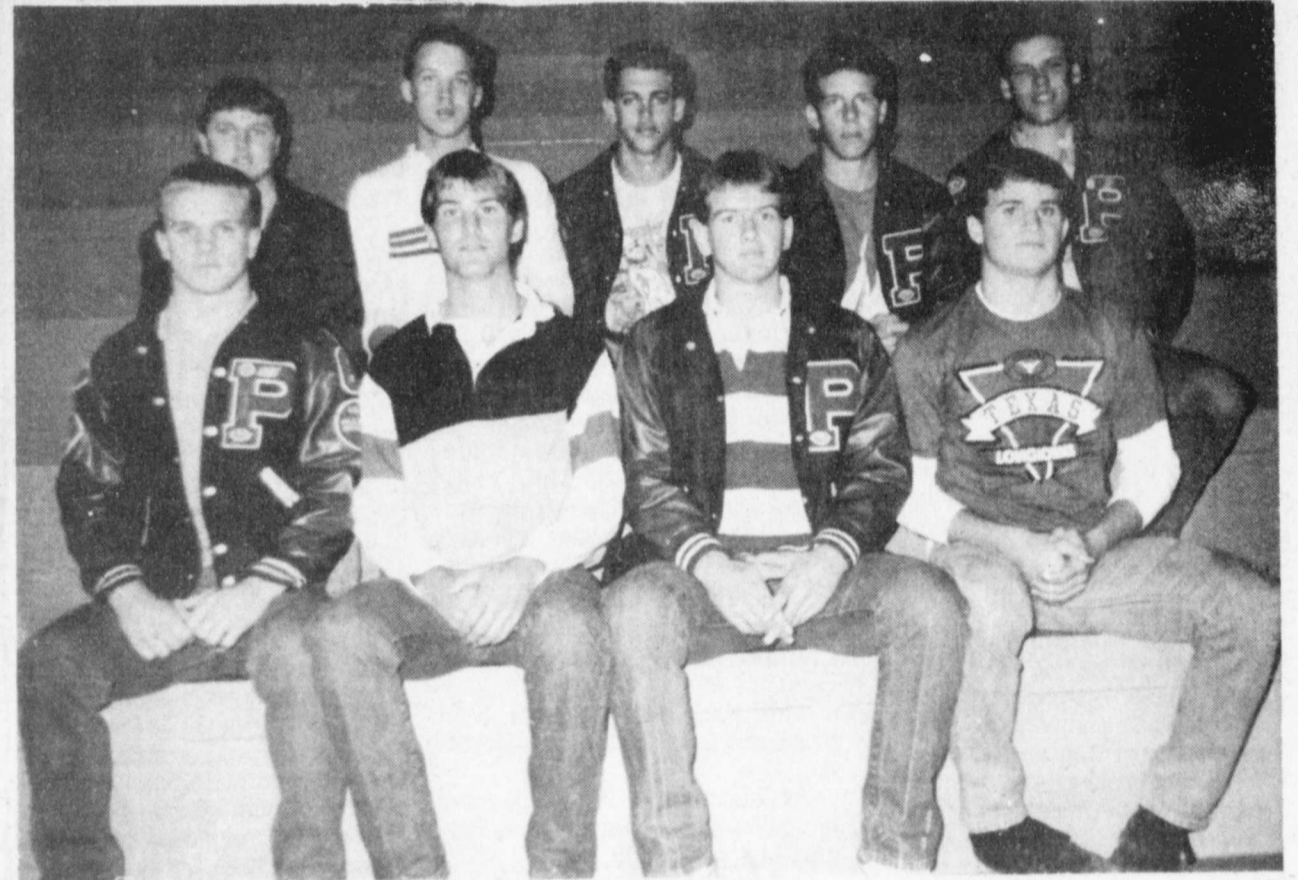
children are grown, frequently far away. They feel out of the mainstream, isolated, useless.

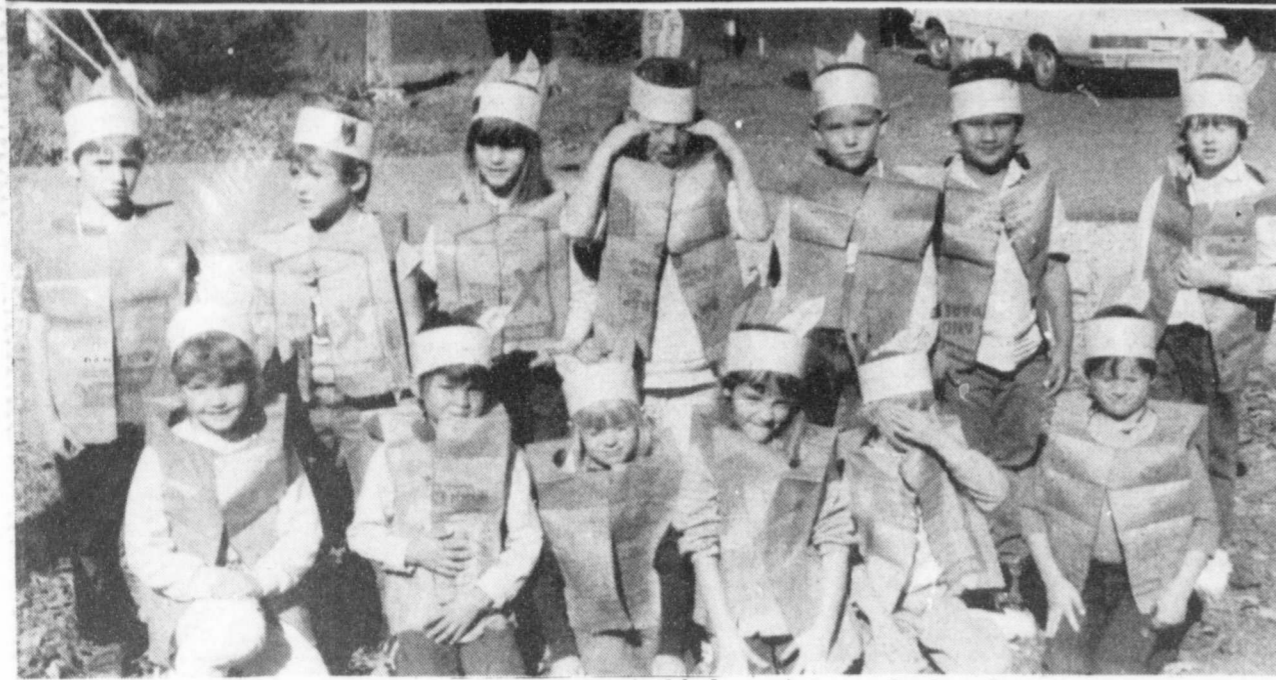

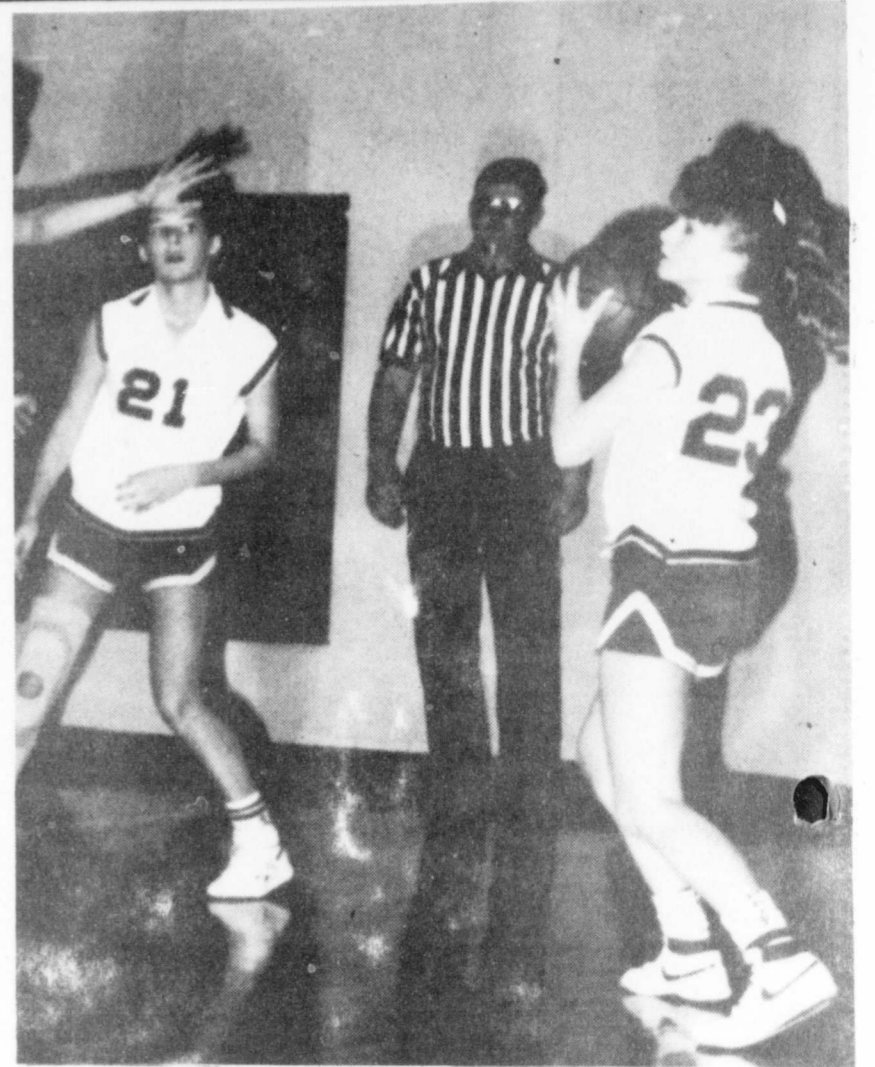

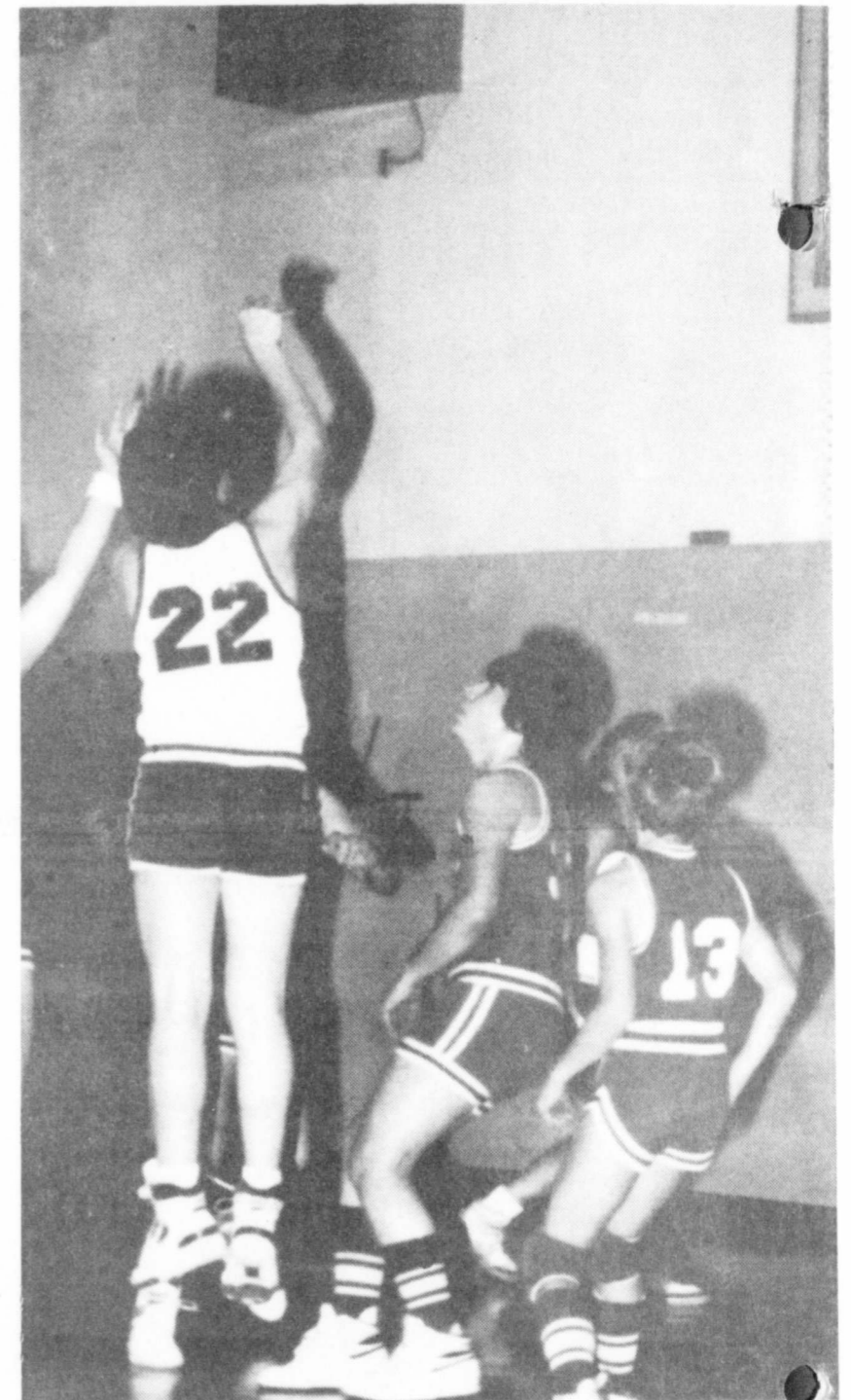
