### Shortcourse On Beef Cow Management Set

Haskell, Texas (Special) Managing beef cows in the Rolling Plains is theme of shortcourse here final day this month.

At the April 30 program, six specialists are to discuss as many different phases in the management of beef cows for greater net profit.

Registration fee is \$3 for the program, that begins at 9 a. m. and ends at 3 p. m. in Haskell National Bank. Co-sponsors are the Beef Cattle Task Force of the Rolling Plains Economic Program (R-PEP) and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

Stanton Brown, chairman of the R-PEP task force and manager of the League Ranch near Benjamin, said speakers will discuss exotic cattle, replacement heifers, liquid and dry supplements containing urea, performance records, anaplasmosis and herd health.

The speakers: Dr. Stewart H. Fowler, professor of animal science in the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station; Dr. Thomas L. Woodward, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Dr. Dennis R. White, Extension Service livestock specialist.

Also Bill Bradley of the Bradley 3 Ranch at Memphis, Texas; Dr. W. W. Collins, consulting veterinarian for the American Cyanamid Company, and Dr. Robert E. Jones of Veterinary Hospital Inc. at Childress.

### City Employee Gains Certificate

The Texas State Health Department has awarded its official certificate of competency for the oldest ecology oriented profession in Texas to Harley O. Poteet of 503 North Ave. G, Haskell, Texas.

Poteet is employed by the city of Haskell. To practice water ecology in Texas, he has been taught effective ways for producing safe drinking water and treatments to make wastewater into clean streams for public use.

Because of this training, through the Texas Water Utilities Assn., the largest water and wastewater training school in the U. S., there are cleaner streams and better operated facilities here than any other section of the country.

He received the certificate only after completing a formal and specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineering Section.

Our growing concern over clean water makes the water ecologist one of the most important workers in the community. Though his efforts are not seen by those he serves, his results are visible everytime one turns on a tap.

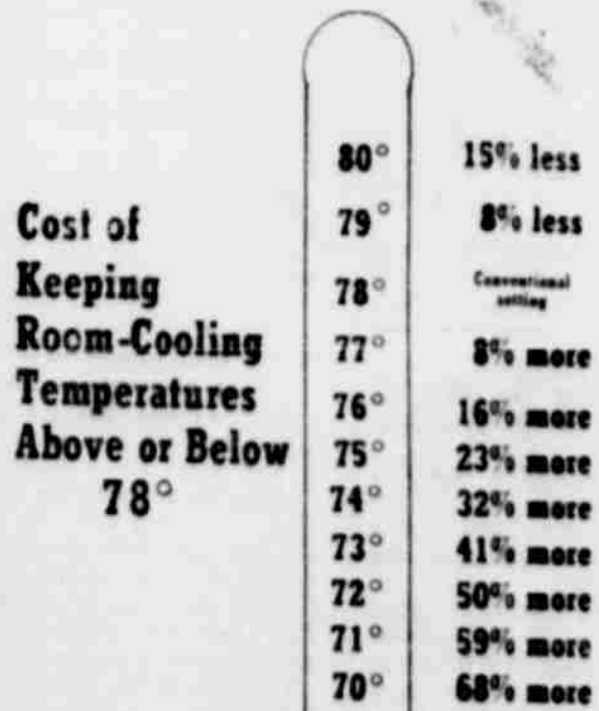

After Mickler's talk, the two men answered questions pertaining to his rehabilitation and his work.

President Gene Long conducted the meeting; John McDermott led the singing, accompanied at the piano by Becky Gholson; and Doyle High led the prayer. Gerry Covington was installed as a new member, and Max Courtney, candidate for State Representative of this district, was the guest of Don Comedy.

## Farm-facts

A Weekly Report Of Agri Business News

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture  
John C. White, Commissioner

**Farmers on Roller Coaster... Red Meat Processing Down... Art-Screwworms Plans Progress...Lack of Rain Reports Are Heard.**

THERE'S no doubt that Texas farmers are better off than they used to be—if you pick the right periods of time; and there is no doubt that they are worse off than they used to be—at other times.

The Texas Croo and Livestock Reporting Service says that the "All Farm Products Index of Prices Received" last March 15 was 543 percent of the January, 1910-December 1914 base. That is 34 points below the previous month of this year but 100 points (23 percent) above a year ago.

On the other hand, the livestock products index was about 8 percent below February 1974 and 10 percent below the same period last year, as any cattleman will testify. Beef cattle were down \$3.40 a hundred from February and \$5.60 below a year ago at \$40.40 per hundred.

Hogs at \$33.20 a hundred were down \$5.20 from February and \$4 from a year ago.

PROCESSING of red meat was down during February 1974 in Texas. Slaughtering plants produced 160.9 million lbs. during that month, which is 20 percent lower than the 201.0 million lbs. produced in January 1974 and 4 percent below February 1973. February 1974 slaughter of cattle totaled 252,000 head, 65,000 head fewer than the previous month and 17,000 below February a year ago.

There were 569,000 head of cattle slaughtered during the first two months of this year; 214,500 sheep and lambs were killed during the same two months. Sheep and lambs killed totaled 98,500 during February which is 17,500 fewer than the month earlier and 2,000 more than in February 1973.

SCREWORMS are showing up more frequently now in Mexico, it is reported. Slow help is on the way, however. Mexican and U. S. officials are reported by USDA to be negotiating with contractors for construction of the main facility in southern Mexico in which to produce more than 300 million sterile screwworm flies each week.

The production plant is supposed to be completed in 1975. The plan is to eradicate screwworms north of Tuxtla Gutierrez, Mexico, then to keep a permanent barrier of sterile flies across Mexico's narrow Isthmus of Tehuantepec to keep the pest from moving northward.

LACK of rain is a drawback to farming in many parts of Texas, but progress is reported in planting in 1974 crops. Oats are reported doing well in the southern and eastern half of the State where moisture has been adequate.

Wheat is heading out from the Cross Timbers to South Texas and is in the boot stage on the Low Plains. Irrigated

wheat is making good growth on the High Plains, and rains a couple of weeks ago helped some dryland wheat, but most dryland wheat has poor prospects.

Rice seeding is reported more than half completed, and cotton planting is about 7 percent complete over the State, all of it in South Texas. Peanut planting is underway in South Texas.

IF PECAN buds herald true spring weather, then such weather is here; because pecans are leafing in most South Texas areas and budding in other areas of the State.

Most any day of the week when a group of Haskell citizens get together for a visit over the coffee cups, if you listen in on the conversation, you are apt to hear someone mention, "Old Charley." Probably 99% of those present will at once think of Charley "Who" Franklin, the flashy Indian back of recent years who gave more than one 2AA football coach an early case of ulcers. This was caused by fretting about how he was going to stop the touchdown ace from crossing the goal line in the next football game. Rumor has it that there are now some college coaches who are having symptoms of the same physical ailment as Charley is still running wild with the pigskin.

However, it is just possible that the other one percent present might have a bit of seniority on the others and he would think of Charley Wells when the statement was made. Local folks can be justly proud of both "Charleys" even though they are noted for different fields of endeavor.

Charley Wells was born in Montgomery County, Texas, on September 12th, 1886, and has been a citizen of Haskell the past 36 years. He can be seen on the downtown streets most any day of the week as he goes about his daily activities. The unusual thing about this Charley is the fact that come Sep-

tember 12, 1974, he will have lived 88 years and everybody knows that is a lot of summers and winters.

Charley was a soldier in the 824th Transportation Corps during the World War I conflict and was stationed in the country of France. This was in the days when the chant of the American Doughboy was:

Kaiser Bill went up the hill,

To take a look at France.

Kaiser Bill came down the hill,

With bullets in his pants.

His mind is still very alert, and he readily recalls that General "Blackjack" Pershing commanded the American Expeditionary Force. When asked if he held any rank in the Army, he immediately replied that he was up for Corporal when the Armistice was signed and he was discharged as a Private.

He said that he did not have the flu which was so prevalent during World War I but that he came down with it after his discharge from military service. His eyesight and hearing are still good and he is apparently in the best of health. He walks the streets as erect in bearing as he must have been when the "Topkick" dismissed him from ranks at the last Muster.

Charley is very quiet and unassuming, courteous to everyone he comes into contact with and the esteem and regard in which he is held by local people was manifested in the will of the late Mr. and Mrs. Clayborn Payne. The Paynes left Charley the home where he has lived the past 30 years, and he is happy and proud of the little house on North 3rd street in Haskell.

He is a living example of the colored people who played an important role in Texas and the Nation during many trying periods of the Reconstruction era after the Civil War and up to the present time. Many of them fought for the South in the war

"As it looks from here"

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Not everyone has a boy or girl in college but those who do or have one about to enter, know very well the effects of inflation on education.

A number of government sources are available for student financing. In fact, it is possible for a student to seek three loans at the same time and reports indicate some have done so. It was not intended under the law and tends to reflect on those who diligently seek help for their education and who expect to repay their debt out of earnings from their training. The rate of repayment thus far has not been the best.

Dilemmas face both parents and lenders in certain situations. Financial aid officers at colleges and universities across the country are concerned over the growing number of students declaring themselves no longer dependent on their families and insisting they should be eligible for aid regardless of how high their family income.

The other side of the coin are reports from institutions of mounting instances of parents who say their offspring are on their own. Some parents refuse to provide personal income data necessary to determine the need for a student loan.

The question is intensified in some 49 states by legislation under the 20th Amendment recognizing 18-year-olds as adults for practically all purposes. Dr. Farber Young, an associate professor of higher education at the University of Georgia, pointed out that "Once a student has reached the age of majority and is not claimed by his parents as a dependent for income tax purposes, it will be most difficult to convince the courts that criteria related to the parents must be considered in the student's application for financial aid."

A recent survey conducted under the auspices of the College Entrance Examination Board found that more than two-thirds of 63 four-year colleges and universities which responded rated as "dramatic" the increase in self-supporting students.

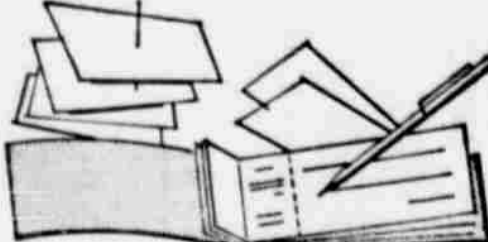
What seems to be at the core of the difficulty presented by the many new applications for assistance is the feeling that there simply is not enough money to go around and the year that students with affluent parents will get money that might otherwise go to those more needy.

At a recent conference in Dallas, sponsored by the college scholarship Service, it was found that aid officers and policy committees are confronted by resistance to financial disclosure on the part of some families, while others, however reluctantly, are bearing their financial souls for the sake of furthering the education of their children. One educator speaking to the Dallas conference said, "It is expedient to accept the appearance of emancipation, but it is immoral in my judgment for us to do so if some parents are released from the obligation to prepare

allow soils to erode waste energy. It takes more fuel and fertilizer to produce a good crop on eroding soils than on stable soils."

If the market for agricultural products continues as strong as expected, farmers will have an incentive to increase their cropland acreage even more. Future cropland expansion undoubtedly will be followed by even greater erosion because the additional acres available for conversion are often of lower quality.

Several hundred acres in Haskell County is being taken out of grass and put into cultivation. This land should be adequately protected both from wind and water erosion. Such lands will be high priority for assistance from the Haskell Field Office. Let us know your needs. Don't let us be a contributing factor to an increase in the national level of lost soil. Soil that is blown away or washed away from the fields can never be returned to its rightful place.
