Prairiland Proposes \$3,585 Million Budget

going to have to reduce our fund balance, to a point that would put the school's financial stability in jeopardy," Superintendent Max Ballard said, as the Prairiland School Board proposed a \$3,585 million budget.

"Our current tax rate is \$.6574. Other school districts in Lamar County include: North Lamar .8523; Paris .8554; Chisum .9473; and Roxton \$1.0352. Other school districts in 13AAA which have similar student populations to Prairiland have these tax rates," Ballard said. "Mineola \$1.15; Raines \$1.05; Winnsboro \$1.03; Quitman \$1.02; Mt. Vernon .97. This makes us with the lowest tax rate of ten schools. What makes it worse is that our taxable value per student is lower than most of those," Ballard continued.

Last week the board met to work on a budget which would take up the slack for nearly \$50,000 in state funding cuts and teacher pay raises.

The board slashed spending in every department, and still was nearly \$170,000 short of a balanced budget.

"School officials and board members made every expense reduction they could without affecting the instructional programs in the school, adn we still don't have enough revenue coming in to cover it," Superintendent Ballard said.

The school board's proposed budget is \$100,000 below last year's operating expenses, but \$3.39 million in revenue from state and local sources is all that is available this year, short of what they need.

Monday night, August 21, the board met in a called meeting to propose a tax rate for 1989-90. That rate was proposed as .7490 per \$100 evaluation, and a public hearing has

"Without a tax increase we are been scheduled for October 31, 1989 at 7 p.m. in the Prairiland High School Library.

Superintendent Ballard said "We haven't benefited from any inflation in this area during the past year, so we will not benefit from increased tax base in the district." The \$48,000 loss of state funding, a \$22,500 increase in the district's cost for employee insurance participation and about \$150,000 in pay hikes mandated by

the state. Ballard stated that "House Bill 1019 didn't do Prairiland any favors, since the bill added \$450 million to state public school funding, but raised its valuations of Prairiland school district property, which lowered the

school's share of state funds." Because of a \$40 per month employee insurance cost increase the board voted last Thursday night to pay \$90 a month towards the insurance, leaving teachers to pay \$25.46 per month themselves.

In other action, the board accepted bids from Mrs. Baird's for bread and from Borden's Milk for dairy products, amended school board policy #4324, and voted to let bids on a 1981 Ford school bus.

A days work policy for the auxiliary personnel at the school was decided upon, and Roach Oil Company received the fuel bid.

Salaries were set for the cooks and maintenance foreman.

If this town does not have something to offer, or if doctors do not know what there is to offer, there certainly won't be a doctor come to

they will not have medical care!

If it is necessary maybe we should consider if there are any incentives that might persuade a doctor to live here. Free office space? Free hous-

For heaven's sake, if it means baking cookies for his kids we should be willing to do it!

Why is it so important to have medical care here in town? For many, perhaps, it isn't. For those who are young enough to seldom need a doctor, a trip to Paris now and then isn't a hardship.

But we have a responsibility to our elderly people. Many of them do not have any way to go to a doctor located miles away. Many

require frequent visits to the doctor. Many may even be forced to move closer to their families so that they can be provided with proper medical care since it will no longer be available. This means that they cannot maintain their independence,

then perhaps we should continue to and have to leave lifelong friend-

Young families are a lot less likely to move into a town where they cannot take their child to the doctor for a cold or virus without making an appointment days or weeks in advance. What has always been a strong point to attract families will be gone

without a medical clinic. Economically the loss of a business in a town this size is tremendous. And EVERY business in town will suffer because of it.

If you don't think that matters to you because you work out of town...think again... taxes go up, populations go down, more businesses have to raise prices or go out of business. It all results in a less attractive place to live!

We are spoiled because for years we have had a doctor to see us for six days a week, without an appointment. Perhaps we cannot realistically expect THAT anymore. But a doctor in town for only three or four days a week would be a wonderful thing, and surely that is not impos-

It's all very well to sit back and hope that "something comes up" but it probably won't result in getting a doctor for Deport.

We need to work hard for what we want, and not expect anyone to do if for us. Come on, let's do something to help ourselves!

Deport VFD Orders New Truck

The Deport Volunteer Fire Department met in regular session Monday, August 21. The department voted to order a new fire truck from Wilson Fire Apparatus, Inc. from Van

Buren, AR. The new truck will be made up of a 2-ton GMC chassis with diesel engine, a 400 gallon tank, 400 gallon per minute pump, 18hp portable pump mounted at the rear of the truck for

grass fires and electric reels. The new truck meets N.F.P.A. 1901 standards, and can be used for a pumper truck inside the city if the department's present pumper truck should break down.

Cities Receive 9.8% More In Sales Tax Rebates Than In 1988

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently tha cities, counties and transit authorities received 9.8 percent more in sales tax rebates this month than they did in August 1988.

"We sent more than \$193 million in sales tax money to local governments this month, and Texas businesses continue to report higher sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Bullock noted that cities received an average of 7.4 percent more income from sales tax this month than in August 1988, and year to dat epayments to cities are up by an average of 9.7 percent over the same period last

one and one-half percent. Houston received \$20.9 million,

the largest payment in the state. Dallas' check for \$13.6 million was second largest, Bullock said.

Keeping Healthy

For Better Communication With Hearing-Impaired Persons The person with a hearing prob-

lem often feels left out because he or she cannot hear sufficiently to join in on conversations and feel part of a group.

A chart of "communication strat-

egies for hearing-impaired persons and their families" is published in Postgraduate Medicine. Some of the suggestions are listed below: Before speaking, be sure to have

Before speaking, be sure to have the attention of the hearing-impaired person. Say the person's name first. Alert him or her to changes in topics of conversation. Be sure that the face of the speaker can be watched easily.

Rather than repeating statements or questions, paraphrase those that have not been heard. Do not shout. Talk a little more slowly than usual and with more pauses. Reduce background noises, if possible, by turning off radio or television, talking in small groups, or one to one.

Include hearing-impaired persons in the conversation. Ask for information, comments, opinions.

The Company's Petition has been designated as Docket No. 8880 at the Commission. In such Petition the Company seeks an order from the Commission allowing the Company to defer the depreciation, operation and maintenance expenses, tax expenses and carrying costs associated with TNP One, Units 1 and 2 from the respective commercial-in-service dates of those units un the time rates reflecting such costs are effect. The Company is also requesting that the Commission approve an adjustment to the calculation of its PCRF factor. This change to the PCRF factor will not affect rates until the respective commercial operation dates of the units, and would be in effect from that date until each unit's costs are allowed into rate base by Commission order. Approval of this request will not result in an increase in current rates. The rate treatment afforded these costs will, however, have a bearing on overall costs which are included in rates that customers pay over the life of the plant. The Company seeks timely regulatory action to permit the deferral of these costs to be reflected in financial statements for the deferral period, which is from the date of commercial operation until each unit's costs are allowed in rate ba
